CEREMONY: Academic, Fine Arts, and Athletic Halls get new inductees Saturday

DONNELLSON – Eighteen former Central Lee students were inducted into the school's Halls of Fame Saturday in a ceremony at Central Lee High School.

Superintendent Dr. Andy Crozier welcomed a full house in the high school gymnasium to introduce nine inductees from 2022 and nine from 2023.

Included in the inductees are three medical doctors and a former CEO of Texas Instruments, among many others.

The 2022 Academic Hall of Fame honorees include Howard Lee Carter, Dr. John Charles Jabour, and Mary Sue Megchelsen Chat-

field

Carter spent 31 years as a Central Lee educator, teaching social studies and math. He was named the 1980 teacher of the year, in part due to his innovative Multi-Occupations Cooperative (MOC) program through which students were placed with manufacturers in business for hands-on training. He also began a World of Work class that enabled students to learn about resumes and interviewing, advertising, filing taxes, and other key concepts.

Chatfield is a former first-grade teacher leader who presented various curriculum ideas at the Iowa Reading Council and Iowa Social Studies Conferences. Chatfield also served on the steering

Iowa AG warns against growing scams aimed at grandparents

DES MOINES—Iowa Attorney General Brenna Bird today issued a warning to Iowans about the growing threat of grandparent scams.

Iowa has experienced an influx in reported grandparent scams, particularly in the Eastern part of the state. Grandparent

scams are when scammers target seniors and manipulate them to believe their loved ones are in distress. The scammer will often impersonate a grandchild, claiming to be arrested, in an accident, or in an urgent financial crisis. Grandparents are then pressured to immediately send money using

cash, gift cards, wire transfer, Bitcoin, or other methods where the grandparent has no financial safeguards.

Scammers will also introduce a fake law enforcement officer or lawyer to incite more


Lee County GOP to host primary sheriff debate

WASHINGTON – Speed events were key to the Fort Madison boys' 5th place finish at the Demon Relays Thursday in Washington.

Be wary of new scams against elderly

fear and create a sense of legitimacy. According to the Federal Trade Commission, older Americans lost \$1.6 billion to fraud in 2022.

"Scammers are lying and manipulative," said Attorney General Bird. "For a scammer to exploit the bond between a grandparent and their grandchild shows the depths scammers will go to. Older Iowans are often the wealthiest and most trusting among us, and scammers know that. If we are not careful, they will jump at the chance to steal someone's life savings. But Iowans are smart. By spreading the

word and reporting dangerous scams, I know we can catch these scammers red-handed."

To protect against grandparent scams, Iowans

Be wary of unknown calls: Do not answer calls you do not recognize. If suspicious of a call, hang up and call law enforcement or the Iowa Attorney General's office.

Always double-check: If concerned about whether a story is legitimate, call the loved one at a known number, not a number provided by the caller.

Never send money or per-

sonal information over the phone: Scammers will always pressure you to send money via methods that cannot be traced or retrieved. Never send money over the phone.

committee of the National Geographic Alliance of Iowa, along with the local Comprehensive School Improvement Plan committee. She was named Central Lee's teacher of the year in 2004. She was also named a Southeastern Community College Distinguished alumni in 2011.

A graduate of the class of 1973, Dr. John Jabour has also been inducted into the Academic Hall of Fame this year. While in high school, Dr. Jabour was on the campus bowl team, earned an ACT score over 30 was named a State of Iowa Scholar, and received a National Merit Letter of Commendation through the PSAT program.

Dr. Jabour went on to attend the University of Iowa, where he was a member of the honors program. He graduated with a bachelor's degree in chemistry with highest distinction, was the Merck Index award winner for being the top-ranked graduating senior in chemistry, and was a member of the prestigious Phi Beta Kappa Society.

Jabour also had the infamous claim to fame of treating heavy metal rocker Ozzy Osbourne after the singer ingested the head of a live bat.

The ceremony also recognized six former student athletes. The Class of 2022 includes Rich Schiller, Megan (Weirather) Warneke, and long-time Hawk coach Lon Spurgin. The 2023 class honored Don Ford, Jeff Brisby, and Christy (Holtkamp) Schrader.

Ford dedicated more than three decades to coaching at Central Lee. Throughout his career, he coached an impressive six sports. Among his notable achievements, he founded the volleyball program at Central Lee and served as the head coach for 31 years. Ford's guidance led the volleyball team to capture nine conference titles kamp) is a Central Lee

in a decade, earning him multiple conference coach of the year awards.

Ford's influence extended to numerous sports, with 11 years as head basketball coach, another 10 years as an assistant, as well as 10 years as head coach of girls' track and softball. Additionally, he served as an assistant football coach for one year and volunteered as the head girls' golf coach for three years.

Also inducted this year is Jeff Brisby, one of the most distinguished student-athletes in Central Lee's history. His exceptional talents transcended multiple sports, earning him firstteam all-conference honors in football, basketball, and baseball. Brisby was a standout on the All-Hawkeye Land team in both baseball and basketball and received honorable mention all-state recognition in all three sports.

Christy Schrader (Holt-

graduate and accomplished three-sport athlete. Her basketball achievements include scoring 1,311 points and grabbing 733 rebounds. Her defensive talent is evidenced by an astounding 273 blocked shots, placing her among the top 50 high school girl basketball players in state history.

2022 inductees include Lon Spurgin who served as a coach at Central Lee for over three decades. Over his career, he coached girls' basketball, volleyball, and baseball. Spurgin's career highlights as the girls' basketball coach include leading the team to a second-place finish at the state tournament in 2000 and coaching the team in the 1999 All-Star Game. Schiller held the scoring record for basketball at Central Lee for 35 years, with 40 percent of his shots made outside of what is now considered the three-point line.

Megan Weirather is a Central Lee Class of 2006 graduate who held 19 school athletic records, including 11 in softball and eight in volleyball. Weirather started on varsity softball as an eighthgrade student and earned allstate honors in softball three times. She received both the Bernie Saggau Award and Army Reserve National Scholar Athlete Award in

Weirather's career highlights included finishing as a 1,000 point-scorer in basketball, being recognized as academic all-conference between all sports from 2005-2006, and being named to the academic all-state basketball team as a senior.

best angle for some photography, I found myself listening to the presenters for the Hall of Fame inductees.

I started thinking about the accomplishments of these people. Jerry Junkins graduated from Central Lee and went on to become CEO of Texas Instruments. I didn't catch all the graduation years, but got swept away in the closeness of greatness.

There were three medical doctors in the 18 inductees, some remarkable media professionals that drew my attention, and some heroic teachers and former student athletes and coaches.

I found myself reflecting on my life, the recent deaths I've suffered, and am still suffering through I would imagine. I thought of how I've taken many, many steps to try to be the better adult that listens to his better angels, rather than the self-involved kid who reacted to every impulse of happiness and adventure. These men and women, many of whom are younger than me, are making an impact on a global level, and they started right here in Lee County.

It makes you feel somewhat smaller and unaccomplished. There's always more to do, but at what point do you fuel the jet and take off? It can't be everyone's role to do something so off-the-charts dynamic that your community recognizes you with a Hall of Fame induction. Some people just aren't built to do that.

I think I'm one of those people. Sure, we chronicle these other events and make people aware of these wonderful people, but as social media carries more and more of our days' unsubstantiated news blurbs, good journalism is maybe seeing its final days.

These stories from presenters about the accomplishments of the dozen and a half former Hawks had me thinking I haven't done enough. Do we ever feel like we've done enough? Is that what life is about. I'm not sure. These accomplishments are certainly worth recognition, don't get me wrong. It's not about that. It's about the value of one's efforts and whether we do it for recognition, to be the best, or "for the love of the game".

As long as I can get a week of golf with about 12 friends of mine from all walks of life in Lee County, I'll survive. Just like I survived playing Mr. Belvidere to Dan Fullenkamp after he beat me bowling Wednesday afternoon. We got our 18 holes in and the clubhouse was closed so we walked down to the local bowling alley where Dan was begging for a bowling battle. No one took him up despite repeated goading from one of our compatriots.

I decided, as a former Palm Bowl alumnus, to take up the challenge. But I added a caveat that whomever lost had to wait on the other for the rest of the night with the proper surname. Mr. Fullenkamp v. Mr. Vandenberg. Mr. Fullenkamp, I bow to your keggling prowess and was happy to get drinks and snacks for you the rest of the night despite everyone begging me to stop. A bet's a bet... But that's Beside the Point.
