OPTIONS: City still looking at options for road repair

MONTROSE – A bid to permanently fix the Mississippi River Road just south of Montrose has come in at \$700,000.

Montrose Mayor Matt Mullins said Thursday that he received the bid from Geo Stabilization International of Minneapolis/St. Paul and reviewed it on Monday.

Mullins said there are some things in the bid that he isn't familiar with and is having it reviewed.

He said one part of the bid allows the company to charge up to \$1,200/hour for down time in the event that something would halt work on the road.

"I reviewed it Monday and I'm not familiar with some of the language in there. If it was for a building or clinic or something I would understand it, but this is different. I've sent it to Garry Seyb at Lee County Supervisors to look at," Mullins said.

He said the issue will be put in front of the Montrose City Council for discussion but nothing is being voted on.

Seyb said the county is helping the city connect the dots to groups that could provide assistance.

Mullins said he's also working with local, state and federal officials to try and find funding sources, but the city has

Director says declining enrollment and fewer teachers led to closure

FORT MADISON - Another early childhood program in the area is closing its doors.

The Carousel Preschool located and run in conjunction with Union Presbyterian Church announced Wednesday it will be closing its doors after 31 years of providing preschool services to local children.

Director Starr Kistner said there will be a farewell open house at 2 p.m. on Saturday at the preschool 719 Avenue F in Fort Madison, to recognize the efforts of the organization for the past three decades.

The closure is just another hit to the child care services in Lee County with several closures over the past year including the YMCA child care services in Donnellson.

Kistner said enrollment is down at the preschool, which didn't offer day care services, just preschool for 3- and 4-year-old children.

"We've been a preschool and not a daycare service," Kistner said. "With the (Fort Madison) school district planning expanding PreK programs at the new elementary school, our enrollment is projected to be down again."

Kistner said church officials had discussed the idea of providing day care services several years ago but decided against it due to the extensive commitments involved in caring for infants and children between infant and three years of age. The 4-year-old program was offered in the past, but was cut last year when the preschool lost the teacher and couldn't find a replacement.

Montrose still looking for answers to collapsed road

other issues at hand as well.

For the past dozen years or so heavy rains have caused, at different times, a portion of the Mississippi River Road to collapse towards the Mississippi River.

The city is in a fact-finding stage with regard to the road, but is also having to deal with very pressing concerns at the sewer plant.

Mullins said in a recent story, there are several broken pieces of equipment at the sewer plant but it's still meeting Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Agency benchmarks for water discharge into the river.

However, the repairs needed at the sewer treatment plant were estimated at \$3 million back in 2019 and Mullins fears those are 25% to 50% higher now.

The most recent collapse of the road occurred April 28, the same night as Central Lee's and Keokuk's high school proms. Mullins said after speaking with past mayors and city officials the collapses are becoming less and less severe.

"When it first collapsed it fell about 15 feet, but this last one was only two feet, so at least's it seems to be getting better," he said.

FM's Atlee killed at Normandy on D-Day scout mission

The following was provided by Shalisse Johnstun from Fort Madison High School in honor of D-Day.

"William H Atlee was an accountant from Iowa. He enlisted in the US Army on September 24, 1942, and joined the 506th Parachute Infantry Regiment, 101st Airborne Division, nicknamed the "Screaming Eagles."

As a paratrooper on D-Day, Atlee's group was scattered over a wide area. An officer ordered Atlee and another man to scout ahead. As they left the field and started to cross a sunken road, they were hit by crossfire from a group of Germans. Atlee was killed instantly." (honorstates.org)

Technician 5thClass William H. Atlee was an accountant from Iowa, born in 1914. He enlisted in the U.S. Army on September 24, 1942, and joined the 506th Parachute Infantry Regiment, 101s tAirborne Division, nicknamed the "Screaming Eagles." Atlee had the distinction of being the nephew of Clement Attlee (the American side of the family spelled the surname differently), the deputy prime minister of Winston Churchill's wartime coalition government and later Prime Minister of Great Britain. Clement Attlee was known to William as "Uncle Kermit" and while in England, the battalion commander, Lt. Col. Robert L. Wolverton, often gave William additional leave passes so that he could visit his uncle.

Atlee along with the rest of Lt. Col. Robert L. Wolverton's stick two days before the invasion.

On the evening of June 5, 1944, Atlee climbs on board C-47 'Stoy Hora' bound for Normandy.

The 506th Parachute Infantry Division. Atlee is the first man seen on the right (holding cigarette in mouth).

Like many parachute units on D-Day, Atlee and the 506th Parachute Regiment were dropped off-target. Atlee's 3rdBattalion was

scattered over a wide area. Just after the drop, Atlee and Technician 4thClass Joseph Gorenc ambushed several German soldiers on a horse and cart. In the firefight, the two troopers managed to kill the enemy unit. The two paratroopers

eventually met up with a group from the 501stled by an officer. The officer ordered Atlee and Gorenc to scout ahead. As they left the field and started to cross a sunken road in Chemins de Campagne, they were hit by crossfire from a group of German paratroopers. Atlee was killed instantly.

On the night of June 5/6, Joseph Gorenc loads onto "Stoy Hora" for his last jump in Normandy. Atlee was also a crew member on "Stoy Hora" that night.

As they flew toward France on the night of June 5/6, 1944 every member of Wolverton's stick signed war correspondent Ward Smith's notebook. Atlee was among them.

Charles Destres, a local farmer, discovered Atlee's body a day later. Destres covered the body with a blanket and took Atlee's helmet to a U.S. Army graves registration unit. The unit prepared Atlee's body for burial with other troopers who had been killed in action. Atlee, SSgt. Paul Simrell, and 1stSgt. Jim Shirley, three friends from the same battalion, lay together in the field where they had been killed.

Awards: Purple Heart

William was born on October 20, 1914 to John Cox and Marjorie Atlee. His father and his grandfather were the President of Lee County Savings Bank. They lived in the mansion on the corner of 9th and E. (903 E).

William was married twice, the second time to Eunice Spurgeon on Oct. 18, 1938, in Keokuk. They had a daughter named Penelope (Penny) Jane born on November 24, 1939.

William was killed in action on June 6, 1944 in Normandy, France. He is buried in the American Cemetery in France.

Through it's Smart Home Program, dozens of customized high-tech "smart homes" have been built throughout the country for catastrophically injured service members. These homes, created primarily for those who are now triple-and quadruple-amputees as a result of IED explosions, have specialized features run off of iPads to allow these heroes to lead as independent a life as possible. Through it's Fallen First Responder Home Program, the Foundation pays off the mortgages for the families of law enforcement officers and firefighters killed in the line of duty who leave behind young children. The Foundation's goal is to ensure stability and

security to these families facing sudden tragic loss. Through it's Gold Star Family Home Program, the Foundation honors the legacy of those who have made the ultimate sacrifice while serving our country by providing the surviving spouses and young children with mortgage-free homes.

Tunnel to Towers is dedicated to the memory of FDNY hero, and father of five, Stephen Siller, who lost his life on 9/11. Stephen, who was off-duty when the first plane hit, drove to his Brooklyn firehouse and retrieved over 60 pounds of his gear, then sought the quickest route to the World Trade Center. Finding the Brooklyn Battery Tunnel blocked, in a supreme act of heroism, Stephen ran about three miles with that gear, to the Twin Towers, where he perished.

Stephen's six much-older brothers and sisters, who had raised him after Stephen was orphaned at age 10, subsequently established the Tunnel to Towers Foundation in his honor. It's signature event is it's Annual Tunnel to Towers 5K Run/Walk held in New York City the last September of the month. The event, which draws 25,000 participants from all over the world, follows in Stephen's heroic footsteps on 9/11.

Fishing picking up as waters start to recede from spring flooding

DES MOINES - The following is the fishing report from the Department of Natural Resources for southeast Iowa lakes, ponds and rivers.

Big Hollow Lake

Water temperature is in the upper 70s. Water is clear. Bluegill - Good: Work the shallow flats and around the jetties to find some of the last males on the nests. Then work the trees and brush in about 6 feet of water. Largemouth Bass - Good: Soft plastics rigged weedless and attached to a strong line work best in this lake with abundant flooded woody habitat.

Lake Belva Deer Water temperature is in the mid 70s. Water clarity remains decent at just under 4 feet. Curly-leaf pondweed beds are still thick. Black Crappie - Fair: Found almost no crappies in shallow by the end of last week. Find crappies in 10 to 12 feet of water by vertically jigging or slow drift trolling. Bluegill - Good: Some bluegills are still on beds; concentrate your efforts along the outer edges of the curly-leaf pondweed beds. Largemouth Bass -Fair: Mostly males running the edges of the weed beds and guarding nests. Most females were are t in deeper water or over the mounds recovering from the spawn. Redear Sunfish - Good: Some nice-sized redears are still on the beds. Try fishing near the bottom or bounce jigs just off the bottom to entice the bite.

Lake Darling

Water temperature is 75 degrees. Water clarity is good at 38 inches. Just a hint of green color. Black Crappie - Fair: Crappies have returned to the deeper (10-12 feet) habitat: the rock piles down by the dam, the big brush piles along the south side, etc. Anglers are vertical jigging for them. Bluegill - Good: Bluegills are still on the nest in some areas of the lake, but more and more are moving to the rock piles and other habitat in 5-8 feet of water. Largemouth Bass - Good: Find where the wind is blowing into the

rocks and you should find the bass. Most, but not all spawning nests are finished. Mostly males being caught; females are still out deep for the post-spawn. Lake Geode

Water temperature is 77 degrees. Water clarity is good at a little over 6 feet.

Water has a green hint to it. Black Crappie - Slow: A few crappies are still in shallow; look for them in the tree falls along the shoreline. Most have headed out to deeper water for the summer. Bluegill - Good: Still some active beds in the shallow bays. Most of the bigger bluegills are just under 8-inches. Largemouth Bass - Good: Bass are15to 16-inches. They are concentrated around the tree falls along the shore. While the water willows are coming back, they haven't established a weed line yet. Lost Grove Lake

Water temperature was 75 degrees earlier this week. Water clarity is good at about 5 feet. Black Crappie - Slow: Find crappie in the trees in 14-16 feet of water. Vertical jigging and moving around is the best method to find them. Bluegill - Good: Still some active beds in the shallows; more and more anglers are starting to work deeper water by vertically jigging or drift-trolling. Largemouth Bass - Fair: Still a few males on the nest. It's time to start working the edges of the weed beds and the middepth (6 to 10 feet) rock piles and brush.

Skunk River (Rose Hill to Coppock)

The Skunk River has spent most of this week getting back to about 2/3 bank full.
