FMCSD: Activites Director Lamb rolls out new summer activity camp in FM

FORT MADISON – He may have picked the hottest week of the summer, but the rewards for the Fort Madison School District and it's families may be felt longer than the current heatwave.

Seven errors too much to overcome in Hound boys' loss

SWEEP: Bloodhounds drop 8-7, 7-4 games to BHS Monday night in Burlington

BURLINGTON - The Bloodhound baseball team is playing with a lot of underclassmen this year and, in Head Coach Albert Schinstock's second year as head coach, are still learning the game and his system.

But Schinstock still expects them to be competitive.

The Hounds (3-4 Southeast Conference, 7-11 overall) dropped a doubleheader to Burlington on the road Monday night.

Schinstock said youth and a key injury is hampering the team a little, but not enough to not be in every game.

"We are (young) but at the same time we should be really competitive," he said. "We're gonna keep battling. I wasn't expecting to lose two tonight."

In the opener, the Bloodhounds trailed by two going into the sixth inning but tied things up on a two-out Luke Hellige bloop single over second base that scored Reece Huey. Hunter Cresswell drove in Brody Cashman with a fielder's choice in the previous at-bat. Cashman singled to get on, Huey followed with a double to center. Tateum Schelich would ground out to end the threat tied at 7.

Burlington would get a run in the bottom half to break up the tie. Schelich gave up a single to start the inning to Grayhound senior Gabe Robinson, but would pick him off at first on the second pitch to Ian Mason. Mason would ground out for the second out. Christos Kantzavelos then singled and stole second and third to set up what would be the game-winning run when Caden Barnes' throw to first on a Logan Messer grounder bounced under Hellige's glove to allow Kantzavelos to score on the play.

Fort Madison wouldn't get a run in the top of the seventh going 1-2-3 to end the game.

Schelich suffered the loss, going two innings and giving up two hits and two runs, neither earned, while fanning two and walking one. Hellige got the start going four innings, surrendering six runs, three earned on six hits, while striking out three and walking two. The Hounds committed five errors in the game and outhit Burlington 10-8 in the loss.

Schinstock said those are going to happen, but surrendering scores every inning didn't help either.

"They compound an inning. We gave up a run every inning, and we still competed."

The Bloodhounds are playing without incoming freshman Owen Huffman, who has a .500 on-base percentage and anchors right field.

"Owen has been out for the past two weeks. Mike (Fuller) is doing a decent job in right field, but that takes away a .500 on-base and he's a solid fielder. That takes some options away from us," Schinstock said.

A four-run third inning spelled doom for Fort Madison in the nightcap. The Hounds held leads of 2-0 and 4-2 before giving up the big bottom of the third inning. Cresswell got Messer to ground out to start the inning, but then a walk to Josh Zahner, a single to Adrian Perez-Hall, a single to pitcher Evan Hecox, and a walk to catcher Brody Guernsey loaded the bases. Michael Kantzavelos then hit into a fielder's choice scoring Guernsey to tie things up at 4-all with two outs. A wild pitch would bring another run in before Mason single and

scored Kantzavelos for a 6-4 Grayhound lead. Stefan Berlett would come on in relief of Cresswell who was nearing 85 pitches and frustrated with the strike zone. Berlett would get a foul out to end the inning.

Schinstock said pitching hasn't been too much of a problem with Cresswell and Hellige being able to go deep into games.

"The top end isn't terrible, but when we get later in the week is where we struggle. Hunter and Luke do a good job. The second game tonight, the strike zone was tight, but it was for both teams."

Fort Madison also saw Caden Barnes behind the plate for the first time in more than a year. The senior got some work blocking some of Berlett's offspeed stuff that bounced early on.

The Hounds couldn't put anything together in the 5th through the 7th despite having a baserunner in each frame.

Cresswell went 2 2/3 giving up five hits and six runs, five earned, while fanning five and walking six. Berlett finished the game giving up two hits and one run earned on two strikeouts and three walks.

Huey, Schelich, and Hellige had the only hits for Fort Madison. Hellige connected on an RBI double down the right field line in the top of the first for the only Bloodhound RBI on the night.

Burlington was led by Messer at the plate. He went 2-for-4 with a run scored and an RBI. Hecox got the win going five innings, allowing four hits and four runs, one earned, while striking out nine Bloodhounds and walking four.

Burlington improves to 5-5 in the conference and 8-10 overall with the sweep.

Fort Madison travels to Muscatine on Wednesday and then hosts Burlington on Thursday before traveling to Keokuk on Friday.

Lady Hounds take one from No. 12 Burlington

DOUBLEHEADER SPLIT: Helmick throws 2-hit gem as Hounds take opener of doubleheader Monday

BURLINGTON – The Fort Madison Bloodhounds walked away from Monday night's doubleheader split with Burlington feeling pretty good about the night.

Not only did senior Lauryn Helmick hand the Grayhounds their first Southeast Conference loss of the year, and did it on the road, but junior Brylie Lorence hit her first homer of the year that proved to be the game-one winner.

Lorence hit a low flyball deep to right center that cleared the yellow fencetop in a hurry for a two-run homer. The hit came with one out on a full-count. Lorence rounded the bases with a big smile on her face and was mobbed at home by the Fort Madison girls.

The homer came after Helmick scored on a fielder's choice by Alivia Holmes after the Bloodhounds opened the game with back-to-back walks off Burlington starter Kylee Hill, who took the loss. Hill just missed tying the game in the bottom of the seventh when her towering fly to left center was caught high by the Lady Hounds' Taylor Johnson at the fence near the foul pole down the left field line.

Burlington scored their only run of the game in the bottom of the first inning when Ava Fawcett scored tagging from third on a fly to center off the bat of Mady Taeger that Olivia Buckner tracked down on the run.

Fort Madison got some solid defense in the outfield with several catches on the run and up against the fence. Johnson caught a short fly to left center on her knees sliding toward center in the bottom of the third inning.

Helmick's line was one of the best of her season, allowing just two hits to the potent Grayhound offense. She struck out four and walked five surrendering just the one earned run.

She worked out of two bases-loaded scenarios, including a third-out strikeout of Hill on a rise ball in the bottom of the second.

Elle Ruble went 2-for-3 with a run scored, and Elizabeth Tanner was 2-for-3 at the plate to lead Fort Madison on offense. Helmick and Lorence had the other hits for the Hounds. Burlington got hits from Fawcett and Ava Brandenburg.

The Grayhounds regrouped and shut down Fort Madison in the nightcap with a nice breeze blowing out at Wagner Field.

The 11-1 affair lasted just 5 ½ innings as the 10-run rule was invoked when Fort Madison couldn't pick up another run in the top half. Lorence followed a Grayhound error that put Ruble on with a one-out single. Johnson would then

slap a single into center scoring Ruble and leaving two runners on, but Tanner would ground into a 4-3 double play to end the game.

Burlington would put up a big six-run fourth inning where Fort Madison committed three errors for an 11-0 lead going into the fifth. Hill belted her first homer of the year on a 1-2 offering from Fort Madison's Emma Snaadt in the bottom of the third.

Burlington outhit the Hounds just 10-8



in the nightcap. Buckner went 2-for-2 at the plate. Ruble, Holmes, Lorence, Johnson, Tanner, and Kylie Lumino all had hits for the Hounds.

Fort Madison (4-5, 6-10) hosts Davenport North in a doubleheader Wednesday at Baxter Sports Complex and then Burlington (9-1, 13-4) comes into town for a single game Thursday. They travel to the Linn-Mar/Alburnett tourney on Friday in Marion.

The Last-Dollar Scholarship is a state-funded program for Iowans who are new high school graduates starting college full-time or adult learners starting college at least part-time, have

applied for all other available aid, and plan to earn a credential for a job identified by the State of Iowa as high-demand.

Part of the State of Iowa's Future Ready Iowa initiative, the goal is to build Iowa's talent pipeline by boosting education beyond a high school diploma to give students the skills that employers are seeking.

"The Last-Dollar Scholar-

ship provides huge relief for Iowa families trying to cover the cost of college," said SCC West Burlington Campus Admissions Coordinator Dana Chrisman. "It brings earning a college degree within their reach."

People interested in the program must complete their SCC application for admission and the free application for federal student aid (FAF-SA) by July 15. B
