# BOS to mull suit against FM

**MONDAY:** Possible action on 302nd Avenue drainage issue on agenda again

BY CHUCK VANDENBERG

LEE COUNTY – Lee County Supervisors are moving forward with action against the City of Fort Madison with regard to problems on 302nd Avenue where the county claims the city's PORT trail has caused drainage issues.

The county met in closed session earlier this year to discuss imminent legal action, and the topic, with possible legal action against the city, is again on the agenda for Monday's meeting.

The county and the city have a 28E agreement which

would require the city to restore the drainage system that was there previously and relocate the trail if a compromise on the drainage problems can't be found.

The county and city agreed to an easement for the P.O.R.T. trail to be constructed on the county right of way, with assurances that the city would maintain the trail and construction wouldn't cause any damage to other county property.

County officials have offered to allow the city to take possession of the street where they claim damage is being done, but city officials have balked at that sugges-

### Police investigating Thursday assault in Old Settler's Park

FORT MADISON – Fort Madison Police are investigating an assault that took place at Old Settlers Park Thursday evening.

According to information from the Fort Madison Police Department, a fight occurred at about 5 p.m. in the park among approximately eight people, one who brandished a pistol.

Fort Madison Police Chief Mark Rohloff said witnesses reported they observed one of the subjects was on the ground being punched by another. It also appeared that assailant had a black pistol in his hand and pointed it at the one on the ground.

A video of the incident has been provided to police and officers con-

### Hamilton Police rescue 65-year-old man from river

HAMILTON - Hamilton Police Department Chief of Police Mike Boley reports that at approximately 5 a.m. on today's date, a call was received in reference to a citizen that had been missing overnight in the flood waters near the Spring Island Campground.

It was reported that the 65-year-old Hamilton resident had last been seen or heard from at approximately 8 p.m. on Friday by a relative who he had been kayaking with in the flood waters of the Mississippi River. The individuals had been attempting to access a camp site at the campground, but got separated, and one subject never arrived to the agreed upon destination.

A search-and-rescue operation was then put into place in an attempt to locate the missing man.

At approximately 9 a.m., a Hamilton Police Department officer was utilizing a kayak to search the area and located the missing subject partially submerged in the flood waters. The Warsaw Fire Department then assisted the Hamilton Police Department in getting the subject back to land where he was able to be treated by Hancock County EMS.

Hamilton Police Chief Micheal Bolev said investigation is considered closed and thanked those who assisted with rescuing the subject.

Assisting the Hamilton Police Department in the rescue were the Warsaw Fire Department, Hancock County Sheriff's Office, Hancock County EMS, Hancock County Dispatch and 911, Keokuk Fire Department, and the Keokuk Volunteer Emergency Corps.

The name of the man rescued was not released by Hamilton Police.




### BRENDA M. DICKENSON

### Capitalism suffocating under pressure of greed

about the bag and just ship it ourselves.

This guy at the counter had his earbuds in and was talking on the phone while taking his sweet time helping the person in front of us. No conversation between the customer and the agent, just the agent talking to whomever was more important on his phone.

After 15 minutes he told the customer in front of us, he was all set and sent him on his way, only asked us "wathcha need" and told Tay she would not make her flight. He said we could catch a standby and maybe get out by 5 or 6 p.m. We were there at 10 a.m.

Tay was trying to make a shift at her job and we should have left sooner. We admit that, but there was time to catch that flight and that airline had absolutely no sense of urgency in helping one passenger. There wasn't anyone behind her and there was nothing else pressing on this agent other than whomever was on the phone in his ear.

We left, drove back to Fort Madison from St. Louis, and booked another flight at 5 p.m. on Friday. I got two more days with my kid, but lost about \$400 in airline charges. The previous Sunday, she was to fly out of Knoxville, but that flight was delayed, delayed, and delayed again, then canceled. They offered her a hotel stay and flight out the next day into Newark, not LaGuardia. She roadtripped home with me and we booked the Wednesday crapshow out of St. Louis.

Traveling is almost not worth the effort anymore. Gas prices are prohibitive, the airline industry is a disaster. We found an article from June of this year that said the air traffic control industry is 3,000 employees short – 3,000. Heard of any close calls lately? Been to an airport and seen the flashing "DELAY" and "CANCELED" indicators all over the boards?

If the market is going to create difficulties in getting from point A to point B and it's because highly profitable corporations won't react appropriately to the minimum wage established under the pandemic, but the government, people are not going to want to go back to work.

The only way this works is for profit margins to reflect living wages that include health insurance and retirement benefits.

Companies are going to have to see that employees are, as they always have been, the triggering resource to your profitability. Without them, you're gonna get market slammed. In the meantime, the employees you do have are overworked, feel underpaid, under appreciated, and are certainly underperforming.

I ran businesses for 20 years. I'm not speaking out of turn. I got out of the business because I saw the quality of employees diminishing due to poor parenting at home. Throw a pandemic in there where everyone

got paid for staying at home, and got paid well I might add, and you've got a serious problem.

Retail is getting bad because good employees are staying home. These are the low wage positions that won't hold up to people's demand for their to wait on me now. Not once did it enter his mind, as the main point of contact for that sale, that his team cost their employer money that night.

I really try to keep this weekly commentary lighter and put a smile on people's faces when I can, but I'm frightened by where this country is headed. We are not the shining beacon on the hill. Conservatives will know what that means. And we stopped asking what we can do for our country. Liberals will know what that means.

Some industries are starting to react and have abandoned minimum wage positions in favor of what the market is demanding. But those same companies are holding their profit margins by simply reducing the number of people on a shift. I sat in a drive thru two weeks ago for more than 10 minutes. I pulled around only to be told that they were behind and were doing the best they can. I said I'm sure you are, but here's the good news, you don't have to wait on me anymore. And I drove home.

That's not being mean to that employee. I've been there and done that. He knew and I doubt very seriously he cared. I was right. He didn't have

Somebody has to take the first step. To sacrifice for the greater good. In lieu of that we can expect more debates like the one we had a couple weeks ago where we shake our heads and let them fall where our chins sit on our chest. Wondering how the mighty have fallen.

# Supervisors to vote on \$1.1 million budget change

tion

Supervisor Tom Schulz met with the city council at a regular meeting in May to try to explain the county's position. Schulz is a former Fort Madison City Councilman who was on the council when the plans were drawn up for the P.O.R.T. trail expansion up 15th Street to Rodeo Park.

Drainage issues started near Gethsemane Cemetery where storm water was running onto 302nd Avenue and causing damage to the roadway. City officials contend that the county signed off on the engineering plans for the trail.

Fort Madison Public Works Director Mark Bousselot said the city has taken steps to improve drainage along the roadway between the cemetery and the trail.

Lee County Attorney Ross Braden sent letters to city officials in February and again in May discussing the drainage issue and possible remedies of law available to the county under the 28E.

The May letter also informed the city of the county's intent to file a claim in North Lee County District Court to enforce the 28E. The letter also outlined a possible annexation of 302nd Avenue in lieu of any legal action.

Monday's agenda item in front of the Supervisors includes discussion and possible action.

Other agenda items include:

- a public hearing and vote on FY 25 budget amendment moving the total 2025 fiscal year budget to \$44.5 million from \$43.4 million. Increases included a \$6,000 increase in the sheriff's department, \$210,000 in the IT department, \$230,000 in the Ambulance department, and \$670,000 in non-departmental expenses.
- consider recommendations on county-owned Newberry Center in Fort Madison from the county's Building Study Committee. The county discussed raising the rent charged to UFCW Local 617 from the current rate of \$400.
