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Herren enters Dist. 1 race

RETIRING: FM Fire Chief to challenge Fedler, Fraise for Supervisor seat

LEE COUNTY – The 2024 local election landscape got a little more interesting Tuesday when Fort Madison Fire Chief Joey Herren announced his candidacy for the Lee County Board of Supervisors.

Herren will be wrapping up a 27-year career with the Fort Madison Fire Department, 18 in his current role as Fire Chief. He plans to retire in April of 2025 and, if elected, would be sworn in in January.

Herren told Pen City Current Tuesday that he isn't done working and thinks he can bring a fresh look to the board as an independent on the ballot.

He will be challenging Democrat incumbent Ron



Fedler and Republican challenger Denise Fraise, the county's current Auditor. Herren, who's spent most of his life in emergency services, aside from a stint at Exide in Burlington, said that experience has exposed him to many aspects of local government critical to elected office

including finance, leadership, and collaboration.

This is the first time he's ever had his name on the ballot.

I didn't want to run in the primaries and I wasn't 100% sure. But after that, I think I want to give them a

PUBLIC LIBRARY NEWS FM library wraps up summer reading program

FORT MADISON - The Fort Madison Public Library had a great summer reading program this year thanks to many people in our community.

Thank you to United Way of the Great River Region for providing funding to help pay for performers and supplies for the summer reading program. If you have donated to United Way, thank you for helping to provide quality

summer programming for kids and adults. Additional funding for library employees and supplies was provided by the City of Fort Madison and Lee County through property tax funds. Bent Oak Books also donated a gift card to one



of our prize baskets for the adult and teen program.

In addition to providing incentives to keep reading through the summer, we hosted 39 programs, attended by almost 900 people. Programs included crafts, insects, stories, dinosaurs, a foam party and Minecraft. In addition to programs, we had 257 people register for the reading program. Together, they have read more than 140,000 hours (about 2400 hours) as of July 22. Adults can still turn in reading minutes for our prize basket drawing and kids 18 and younger can still earn prizes by reading through August 22.

1000 Books Before Kindergarten In March, we launched the 1,000 Books Before Kindergarten program. In the four months since we started, we have 45 young readers registered and, so far, they have read 1,747 books. Nine of those readers have at least hit the 100 mark and had their bookworm placed on our chart, crawling its way up to 1,000. As a reminder, this is a simple program, and a fun, free way to start your child on the path to success. Set a goal to read 1,000 books to, or with, your child before Kindergarten and then record your progress at the library or through the Beanstack app. 1,000 books may seem like a lot, but if you read one book each night, you'll reach your goal in less than

3 years. Additionally, you don't have to read 1000 different books. If your child has a favorite book, you can count it each time you read it together. Repetition is an important part of early literacy.

Children from birth to 5 years old can participate. Stop by the library front desk to register and pick up a reading log to record your first 100 books with your child. When you register, you will also get a bag to hold your library books and a free board book. For each 100 books you read, come back to the library to let us know and pick up another reading log. You can also track your reading using the Beanstack app. As you reach different milestones in the program, your child's name can be added to our 1000 Books Before Kindergarten progress chart and there are additional prizes for reaching the 250, 500 and 750 book milestones, including free books and a Rhythm and Songs kit. Entertainment Friday night is an antique tractor pull in the grandstand, followed with music by Bocephus Wayne on the stage at about 8 p.m. On Saturday evening hear music by Hearsay Band during and after the pork chop supper. The quilt auction is at 8 p.m. Saturday, followed with more music.

Friday's schedule starts with tractor games at 9 a.m. in the grandstand. A kids' pedal tractor pull is planned at 3 p.m., and an antique tractor pull at 6 p.m. in the grandstand.

Saturday begins with a pancake breakfast from 7 to 10 a.m. There will be pony pulling at 8 a.m. at the grandstand, and an antique tractor pull at 10 a.m. In the afternoon, see tractor games at noon in the grandstand, and horse plowing at 1 p.m. in the field. The antique tractor and car parade begins at 3 p.m.

Sunday begins with a pancake breakfast at 7 a.m. and worship in the country church at 8:30 a.m. There is another antique tractor pull at 9:30 a.m. and horse plowing at 1 p.m. Keith Yex and crew offer fun and games for kids at the grandstand at 1:30 p.m. before the second antique tractor and car parade at 3 p.m.

The raffle tractor is an Allis Chalmers WD. Winners of the antique tractor, handmade quilt, pedal tractor and other prizes will be announced after Sunday's parade. The 50th show history book, dedicated to Fred Buckert and outlining the origin and growth of the Western Illinois Threshers, is still available at the show.

Again this year are sessions of Bingo throughout the weekend in the large shelter house

Work continues on the 1850s circa Bolton Barn, that is being rebuilt on the grounds. The barn from rural Nauvoo was disassembled by Bolton family descendants and other volunteers

See sheep shearing, rock crushing, corn shelling and corn meal grinding, pony-powered threshing, small gas engines, quilting and rug weaving. The growing village on the 80-acre grounds includes two log cabins, a church, one-room school, a print shop, blacksmith and a post office.

There is an antique gas station, two large museum buildings, and two renovated TP& W depots. Many of the buildings have histories of their own, being moved onto the grounds from the region. A flea market fills the northeast end of the grounds during the show.

Fun for kids includes a petting zoo, hands-on corn shelling, playground at the school yard, the pedal pull on Friday afternoon, and old time games at the grandstand on Sunday.

Camping hook-ups of 20 and 30 amps are available. Golf carts/ATVs are not rented on the grounds, but are allowed. Owners must register their vehicles, and pay a \$20 fee at the headquarters building upon arrival at the show.

A \$5 commemorative button allows admission for all three days to those 12 years and older. Children under 12 are admitted free. Buttons are now on sale at



Harnetiaux Farm Store just east of Hamilton and are sold at the gate during the show.

To find the Western Illinois Threshers Show, turn north at the signs in Hamilton, IL, at North 19th Street, and continue on the blacktop two miles north. Parking is free.

improved due to their age and poor condition. According to the

Trustees, they have been working with an engineer and intend to improve the infrastructure, but they have no scope of work, estimate, or plan to pay for the necessary upgrades. The Trustees would like to remove the section of the proposed agreement that states the purchaser shall replace water mains, internal water service pipes, shut-off valves, and faulty connections to the subdivision's common mains and premise service lines by the end of the said Water Purchase Agreement, which is June 30, 2027. City Administrator Mandsager feels it is important to leave the deadline in the agreement.

The Subdivision Trustees are also suggesting a billing rate of 130% for the term of the new agreement rather than the proposed 150%, which is included in the new agreement.

City Administrator Mandsager recommended keeping the rate at 150% which is what the City is currently being charged by Burlington and is common practice for other cities in Iowa. Crowner said he would be willing to consider a stepped rate. There was no interest in reducing the rate by any other council members.

third choice," he said.

"I am kind of independent. I've never declared a left party or a right party. There's probably good on both sides and I'm kind of a run-in-the-middle kind of guy."

Herren said the parties are so polarized now that having someone in the middle providers voters a fresh option outside of the current political climate.

"The way the parties are right now it seems they are way separated. I don't see things that way, I see it in the middle. That's why I'm independent," he said.

He said communication is one of his top priorities and politicians today aren't very good at it.

"They counter so extreme to one another, and they can't talk to each other. Communication, you can ask my guys, sometimes we forget to communicate - to sit down and talk things through," he said.

One of the issues that stands out to Herren is the current lawsuit the board of supervisors has voted to file against the City of Fort Madison over 302nd Avenue near the P.O.R.T. trail.

"I would never have voted to sue people that voted me into office," he said.

Herren said Fraise jumping parties from Democrat to Republican to run, and then Fedler changing his mind at the last minute to seek another term, points to the sporadic nature of the current political system.

"That's also why I'm kind of in the middle here," he said. "I think there needs to be a change. Someone on that board that understands emergency services better. I don't think we have that."

He said communication is paramount to getting to the right decisions as a city department head, and that goes for elected officials as well.

"I like to solve problems by digging into them. I've been through the bad part of Fort Madison's budget when I first became chief. We learned to multi-task and put on different hats to make the budget work," Herren said.

He said when he took over the fire department in 2006, staff was cut to 13 full-time and he had to cut EMS services because he didn't have the people to do it. The community got upset with that change and the city put 5-man shifts back in place.

"I've been through the bad budget thing and I think the county is getting ready to go through the same thing, so my experience there can be helpful in the process," he said. "Going through those tough times will bring some ideas to the table. I'm not sure I'll have answers for everything. I will dig into it and try to find the best outcome."

Herren said he's been following county board meetings, and it seems as though the board isn't

day fire operations. He said wearing different hats is not new to him.

"I do that now," he said. "I'm the maintenance man, oversee the building department, I do vacant property inspections and rentals. How many hats do you want me to tell you I wear?"

He said that gives him name recognition and exposure to more moving parts in the city than in the county.

"We have water, sewer, roads, public safety. I get to see it all, and they way we've done it the last 10 or 15 years is we have staff meetings once a week and we all kind of help each other. We run it as a team. I've learned so much about water, sewer, streets and roads having conversations with these other department heads. We work a lot together."

Herren said he doesn't really have a feel for how his independent candidacy will impact the District 1 race. Fraise and Fedler both have decades

of service to the county and he's had close to three decades within the City of Fort Madison.

"I don't know, I've talked to a lot of people and I really don't know how this will all shake out."

The general election takes place on Nov. 5 with absentee voting beginning on Oct. 16. The first day to file an absentee ballot request with the county auditor is Aug. 27. Monday, Oct. 21 at 5 p.m. is the deadline to request an absentee ballot be mailed. In-person absentee voting deadlines Monday, Nov. 4.
