A hero in her eyes

RESCUED: PAW hand finds Beagle that was wandering FM for more than 10 mos.

FORT MADISON - He disqualifies himself as a hero, but the brown eyes that looked up to Sean Brown Wednesday at PAW Animal shelter told a different story.

A nine-year-old tan and white beagle mix tucked herself around the feet of Brown, a veteran employee at the P.A.W. no-kill animal shelter in Fort Madison.

Vixie, the beagle who had her tail tucked as she sat on the floor next to Brown was in the safe confines of the nokill shelter for the first time in more than 10 months.

The dog had escaped from its adopted home for no reason other than a loud train horn and too-loose collar. From there she ran, and ran, and ran, until earlier this week

Hancock County rollover claims life of Keokuk woman Sunday

• One-vehicle rollover kills Sherry Crowell of Keokuk, injures three

CARTHAGE - On April 13, 2025, at approximately 12:01 AM, Hancock County 911 dispatch received a call reporting a motor vehicle accident.

Deputies responded to the scene at 1798 East County Road 1500 in rural Carthage.

Preliminary investigation revealed that a 2016 Toyota sedan was traveling eastbound on County Road 1500 North when it left the roadway on the right side. The vehicle struck a tree and rolled several times.

The driver, Riley Cramsey, 18, of Carthage, and a male juvenile passenger in the front seat sustained serious injuries and were transported by Air Evac to a

hospital in Iowa City.

Another passenger, Desiree Houston, 18, of Hamilton, Illinois, was transported by ambulance to Carthage Memorial Hospital, where she was treated and later released.

Tragically, a fourth occupant, Sherry Lynn Sue Crowell, 22, of Keokuk, Iowa, was pronounced deceased at the scene.

An accident reconstructionist from the Illinois State Police was called in to assist with the ongoing investigation. Charges are currently pending.

School board narrows list of candidates for superintendent

FORT MADISON - The application window for the next Superintendent of Fort Madison Community School District officially closed Monday with a total of 16 applicants.

School Board President Josh Wykert said the district is pleased with the strong interest in the position and the diversity of the candidate pool, which includes educational leaders from both within Iowa and outof-state, representing Arizona, Minnesota, and South Dakota.

"The candidates bring a wide range of experience and qualifications, including varying backgrounds in school and district leadership, and hold advanced degrees in educational leadership," Wykert wrote in an email Tuesday morning.

"Seven candidates have at least five years or more of district-level leadership experience. Six candidates hold a doctoral degree. The applicant group includes 11 male candidates and five female candidates.

On Monday, the board reviewed all the applications forwarded by Grundmeyer Leader Services out of Huxley, Iowa, and selected a list of semi-finalists for the position. Wykert didn't elaborate on the number of semi-finalists that were selected to move on in the hiring process.

On Tuesday, April 22, the semi-finalists scheduled to participate in screening interviews that will be conducted virtually. Then Wednesday, April 30, finalists will be invited to Fort Madison for formal interviews and opportunities to meet with stakeholder groups and tour the district.

Wykert said the finalist interviews will be conducted in open session.

"The Board remains committed to a thorough and thoughtful selection process and looks forward to identifying a candidate who will support the district's continued growth and success," Wykert wrote.

Stakeholders will receive additional updates as the process progresses.



Passion led employee to Beagle

when Brown staked out a home that had reported seeing her and, after several attempts to catch up to the animal, made one final stakeout of a home where barriers had been put up to channel Vixie to a food bowl.

Other attempts had been derailed by shouting neighbors or insecure barriers. Live traps didn't work as the skiddish beagle was too smart for the tech.

This last time, with a phone call to the owner of a home who had posted pictures of the dog on social media, food was put out at the right time. Brown waited in the dark and Vixie came up for a meal and was reunited with a man who had been passionately hunting for her for the full 10 months.

Vixie had been adopted to a Fort Madison man with a home near the tracks and, on a walk, she wriggled free of her collar when a train came by and had to signal at a crossing. The wailing scared the dog and she was off.

"Last week a lady posted online about a beagle in her yard. I kept my expectations down, but I was pretty hopeful it was Vixie," Brown said.

"Then it was just go to the house at 8:15 p.m. and sit and watch and try to learn her routine and how she came in. Some nights she'd show up at 9 o'clock and some nights it would be 10 and it was just build a plan to get her caught."

He said they had a good routine of her just walking down the driveway at the home and he had a plan, and one night the neighbors were out and a gentleman noticed her and hollered at her, throwing her out of her routine.

Brown said Vixie then created a new pattern for getting to the food and he had to set up a new plan.

"We just fenced off the back so she had to come in the front and this wonderful lady worked with us very well and enabled us to catch her."

The dog is known for getting out on her own. She had been originally adopted to a home in Burlington and escaped there and was gone for six months before the shelter was alerted that she had been seen.

Des Moines County's shelter called PAW and said they had the dog and it was returned. About three weeks later, Vixie was again adopted to the man in Fort Madison.

Sandy Brown, the Director at PAW, said for the first two weeks she was reported missing, they had seen her around the area.

"We kinda knew where she was and then she would disappear and be gone for a couple weeks and someone would spot her," Brown said.

"Really, up until this lady called and posted the

picture, we hadn't seen her for about four months. Sean saw the picture and came up asking, "Is this her?! Is this her?!"

Brown said the lady who called feeds feral cats and Vixie had been helping herself to some of the food. She said Sean and the woman worked together to get Vixie back in a safe environment.

"She was awesome. She helped us every step of the way," Sean Brown said.

Sean Brown said Vixie was in surprisingly good shape when she was caught.

"She's been eating cat food, and her weight is pretty good. She had a few ticks that we took care of but, for almost 11 months of being on her own, she's in pretty good shape," he said. "We'll have to get her rabies vaccination caught up."

Brown said he has grown attached to the dog, but is more of a big dog guy. He said he considers all the dogs at the facility part of his family, until they are part of another family. And sometimes... even after that.

The man who adopted Vixie locally was also helpful at getting her back and didn't just write her off.

"It was hard on him. It wasn't like she got lost and he just forgot about her. He had been on the lookout for her, too, and it was a big relief that she has been caught," Brown said.


"Our talks with him were that he thinks she needs a better setting with a more shored-up fence. Our plan for her is someone with a good fenced-in yard and an understanding she will need some extra time to bond. But when she bonds with that person, she will stay because she knows its safe

"I'm just so relieved she's safe and sound. I don't know about a hero by any means. It's just, these dogs are family."

Lady Hounds 3rd at Timm Lamb Pen City Relays

HAWKS 5th: Ladies battle tough winds at Tuesday night relays in Fort Madison

FORT MADISON – The Fort Madison Lady Hounds captured third place in the A Division at the annual Timm Lamb Pen City Relays on a breezy Tuesday night at Richmond Stadium in Fort Madison.

The Hounds finished with 95 points behind Mt. Pleasant's 126 and winner Washington's 151. Central Lee finished 5th in Class B with 72 points.

Junior Avery Rump won the 3000-meter run going away with an 11:06.68 against some pretty stiff westerly winds. She led the pack, including perennial rival and friend Iris Dahl from Washington, by more than a minute. Dahl won the 1500 with a 5:16.25, two spots in front of the Hounds' Addison Rump at 5:24.19.

Avery Rump also ran the 800 leg of the champion Distance Medley team with Lillian Gelsthorpe (200), Mara Smith (200), Esther Gnann (400) at 4:42.22 beating Mt. Pleasant by four seconds.

"The wind really does a number on everyone. That was atrocious," she said. "But it's good to run in meets like this. It's good training and you need to know how to run in all the elements, because you don't know what the weather will be like at district or state meets," Rump said.

"I'm feeling pretty good, especially considering a lot of the meets we've been to have been smaller without many big schools and lots of runners."

To qualify for Drake this month, Rump will need to get that time down to 10:14, which could be doable, she said, in calmer weather.

"I know it has to be fast. Well under 11. I've been under 11 once this year so, honestly, I feel pretty good about where I am," she said.

The Lady Hounds' 4x800 team of McKayla Schinstock, Smith, Jordyn Marshall, and Addison Rump also captured first with a 10:28.80, a full 24 seconds ahead of the pack.

In the field events, senior Brylie Lorence took 3rd in the shot with a 41'4.75" and fourth in the discuss with a spin of 104'1".

Other top five finishes for the Lady Hounds included Olivia Buckner in the 100 at 13.35; Smith took 4th in the 200 with a 28.20 just .01 out of the top three; Schinstock had a nice finish in the 800 meters with a 2:32.41 and a 5th-place spot in the open 400 at 1:06.00. Addison Rump claimed 3rd in the 1500 at 5:24.18 and Jordyn Marshall was 5th at 5:31.89; the 4x400 of Alaina Schwerin, Avery Rump, Smith, and Esther Gnann captured 4th. And the shuttle hurdle team of Jordyn Grisham, Alexa Walz, Schwerin, and Lyla Smith finished 5th at 1:15.64.

For Central Lee, Kamryn Cox had the top finish for the Hawks, winning the 400-meter hurdles at 1:19.65. Macy Anderson captured 2nd in the 3000-meter run with a 13:07.92. She also had a 3rd in the 1500-meter run at 5:59.16 followed by Afton Maynes in 4th at 6:34.73. Allison Gruntmeir captured 3rd in the 100-meter hurdles at 18.11.

The 4x200 team of Ava Washburn, Cox, Kaylie Peterson, and Gruntmeir captured 5th in the B Division with a 2:07.65. The Shuttle hurdle squad of Julia Fraise, Cox, Washburn, and Gruntmeir took 4th with a 1:20.69. Kylie Fortune and Gruntmeir finished 3rd in the high jump clearing 4'6".

Make Your Oral Health a Priority in the New Year Hounds lack urgency in loss to BND

FORT MADISON - The warning had gone out less than 24 hours earlier.

Fort Madison boys' soccer coach Kevin Wellman told his team after Monday's win over Fairfield that Notre Dame-West Burlington, the Bloodhounds' opponent the next night, was a team that liked to start fast and get an early lead.

Then the Nikes proved Wellman right, scoring two goals in the first 14 ½ minutes on the way to a 6-1 win over Fort Madison at the Baxter Sports Complex.

"They just played better soccer," Wellman said. "They played more urgently than we did, and that's something we got to work on at practice, something we've got to work on when we watch film. We need to have a little bit more urgency when we play everywhere in the field, urgency getting back to play defense when we're in midfield, urgency to get the ball off our foot, especially in the backfield, urgency to send the ball to the forwards.

"Urgency. That's the biggest thing."

The Bloodhounds are still trying to get into a rhythm after not playing for 13 days after their season-opening tie with Williamsburg. They got off to a slow start in the 4-0 win over Fairfield on Monday, and Wellman told them they couldn't have a similar performance against the Nikes.

"That long layoff with no game was tough," Wellman said. "We started slow last night, but I think it's still a little bit of that tonight. of just not having any games, not having very many games."

The Nikes (4-1) were always at least one step, and maybe a couple more, ahead of the Bloodhounds (1-1-1), and it showed from the beginning, as most of the

Bloodhounds finish second at Trojan Relays

TUESDAY SPORTS WRAP: Hawks move to 6-0 on the year; Larson medalist at New London dual; HTC boys nip BND; and Hounds boys fall on pitch

FAIRFIELD – The Fort Madison Bloodhounds finished second at the Trojan Relays Tuesday night in the bowl at Fairfield.

The Hounds finished with 122 points behind host Fairfield's 161. Central Lee also ran at the event and finished with 29 points for 9th place.

Julian Dear won the 100-meter dash in windy conditions with an 11.07 and anchored the 4x100 relay team which garnered 4th place with a 45.75. Kenden Bowie returned in the high jump clearing 6'6" for second place behind Fairfield's Eli Zillman. Fort Madison's Hunter Smrt was 3rd in the high jump clearing 6'0".

Mason McLey won the open 400 with a 52.61. Riley Tripp was 4th at 55.03. Tripp won the 1600 meter run with a 4:47.44. Calvin Johnson was 5th at 5:12.79. Gavin Callahan was third in the 110 hurdles at 16.03.

Dayton Lamar won the long jump clearing 21' for the first time all season. He jumped 21'0.5". Nolan Guzman was sixth with an 18'11". Caden Barnes broke 50' again in the shotput with a strong 52'4". Urijah Brooks was second with one of his best throws of the year at 48'1". Brayton Schneider continues to have a strong season in the discus with a 143'1" to win that event. Noah Krogmeier was second in the 800 meters with a 1:59.68

For Central Lee, the 4x200 relay team of Brett Cook, Blake Davis, Luke Kruse, and Brayden Wyrick raced to a 3rd place finish with a 1:37.30. Cook had a 4th-place finish in the open 800 with a 2:09.25, just half a second out of the top three. Central Lee's 4x100 team of Kruse, Evan Fogarty, Davis, and Brayden Wyrick at 46.95 took 5th. The Hawks set 17 personal records on the evening.




