This year's General Election will take place at the Grant County Civic Center on November 8. Advanced voting is available by mail, with in-person advance voting beginning October 24 at the Court House, and closing on November 7. The Grant County Civic Center will be open from 7 am until 7 pm for voting.

On August 2, the Primary Election took place at the Grant County Civic Center. There were a total of 3,708 registered voters in Grant County, and it was reported with a 38.54% turnout with 1,429 total votes casted.

For National Officers: Democrat Mark Holland,



Republican Jerry Moran, and Libertarian David Graham, are all running for the United States Senate seat.

Democrat James "Jimmy" Beard, and Republican Tracey Mann, are both running for the United States House of Representatives 1st District seat.

For State Offices: Democrat Laura Kelly David Toland, Independent Dennis Pyle and Kathleen E. Garrison, Republican Derek Schmidt and Katie Sawyer, and Libertarian Seth Cordell and Evan Laudick-Gains, are all running for the Governor and Lieutenant Governor seats.

Democrat Jeanna Repass, Republican Scott J. Schwab, and Libertarian Cullene Lang, are all running for the Secretary of State seat.

Republican Kris Kobach, and Democrat Chris Mann, are both running for the Attorney General seat.

Libertarian Steve Roberts, Democrat Lynn Rogers, and Republican Steven Johnson, are all running for the State Treasurer seat.

Democrat Kiel Corkran, and Republican Vicki Schmidt, are both running for the Commissioner of Insurance seat.

## City Tables Sunday Alcohol Sales Request

Ulysses business owner Manuel Bene Garcia spoke during the visitor's portion of the Ulysses City Council's regular meeting October 26, requesting the City Council consider creating an ordinance modifying an existing City Code, regarding alcoholic beverages.

"We are looking to create an ordinance that modifies the existing city code under chapter three for beverages to extend it to Sunday for drinking establishments - not retail," Garcia explained. "Or we propose you consider entering whatever discussions or verbage is appropriate to make that happen."

Garcia said he got the code information from the City's Website.

"This was the most recent city code available on the Website," Garcia said.

In a letter he presented to the council, his requests included:

☐ Modifying Chapter 3, Section 3-209 (c) to include "during hours of operation."

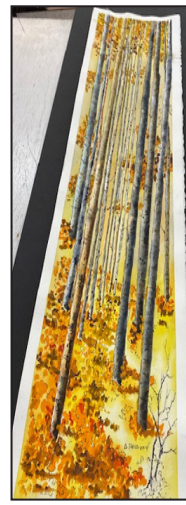

# Silver Haired Legislature Holds 40th Annual Session In Topeka

The Kansas Silver Haired Legislature held their 40th Annual Session on October 4-6 in Topeka. This was the first time in three years the SHL was able to hold an in-person Annual Session, as the 2020 and 2021 were both held in a Zoom only format. This year a Zoom-like option was also available, utilizing the Webex format at the State Capitol building. The SHL is the first organization to utilize this two-way communication format in the House of Representatives Chamber. This allowed the delegates "attending" from home to be able to watch and hear the deliberations in the House Chamber, to ask their own questions or propose possible changes, and to be able to vote on the issues as presented, at the same time and manner as the delegates in the Capitol itself. The SHL greatly appreciated the hard work of the Capitol staff that made this happen.

The high point of the three-day conference is the Wednesday activity at the State Capitol. In the morning, the SHL is divided into three committees, which review, discuss, and debate the various bills and resolutions that are presented to them. Those receiving a favorable vote are then brought before the entire body during the afternoon session, where each issue is once again discussed, debated, and ultimately voted upon. Those receiving favorable passage then progress to the Thursday morning final session for either an up or down vote, The bills and resolutions that pass are then forwarded to the Kansas Legislature during the 2023 Legislative Session, with the SHL pushing for their enactment into Kansas Law.

The six resolutions that received favorable passage this year at the Annual Session are:

1) **Resolution 4001**

– Support the Expansion of Medicaid in the State of Kansas

2) **Resolution 4002** – Continued Support and Funding for community-based Public Transportation

3) **Resolution 4003** – Support and Funding for Broadband Expansion

4) **Resolution 4004** – Support for the Legalization of the Expanded Medical Use of Cannabis

5) **Resolution 4005** – Urging the Kansas Legislature to maintain the current funding for the Kansas Senior Care Act

6) **Resolution 4006** – Supporting the request of Area Agencies on Aging to Exempt Purchases by All Area Agencies on Aging from Sales Tax.

The Silver Haired Legislature gives a voice to the approximately 600,000 Senior Citizens over the age of 60 in the State of Kansas. Each county in the state is allowed a delegate to the SHL, with the five larg-

## This Week in History

### 10 YEARS AGO (Week of November 1, 2012)

Communities In Schools brought in Randy Combs the SRO officer from Lakin to Sullivan school to discuss Red Ribbon Week. Randy has been speaking at different schools for several years. He brought in visual aides to show the students what tobacco and huffing can do to your body. He reemphasized to the students the importance of saying NO to Drugs.

### 20 YEARS AGO (Week of October 31, 2002)

Five arrests have been made in what authorities suspect was a conspiracy to commit murder. It all began almost a year ago when Ulysses resident and former Dodge City resident was charged with one count of aggravated robbery, one count of aggravated battery, and one count of aggravated burglary. The other four were contacted early Tuesday morning in Ulysses and were taken to the Ulysses Police Department.

### 30 YEARS AGO (Week of November 4, 1992)

At the Senior Center on Thursday, Oct. 16, we were entertained by the Varsity Choir from the Ulysses High School. It was a top performance. Everyone enjoyed their singing and appreciated their coming to the Senior Center. Their Director, Kathi Fischer, chose a varied program. Leo Jo Lowry accompanied them on the piano.

### 40 YEARS AGO (Week of November 4, 1982)

The Movies has taken a 30-year leap forward in the past week. On Tuesday of last week, Ross B. Krantz, of Cinema Engineering Ser-

vice of Sandia Park, N.M., arrived in town. Throughout the following week, he was busy installing a Dolby Stereophonic Sound System, which Dudley described as "the Cadillac of movie sound systems." The system consists of three large speakers behind the movie screen, and a series of smaller speakers on the side walls. It insures that, when a stereophonic movie is shown at the theatre, local viewers can get the full benefit of the sound system.

### 50 YEARS AGO (Week of November 2, 1972)

Liz Phillips, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Verlan Phillips, was a Kansas University pom-pom cheerleader at the homecoming last week.

### 60 YEARS AGO (Week of November 1, 1962)

Saturday's beautiful fall weather brought a large crowd to town early and apparently there was no let up during the day. It was a busy day. Traffic was heavy on the down town streets by ten o'clock Saturday morning and continued through the day and pedestrian traffic was equally heavy in the stores. Many out of county cars were noted on the streets, and fall buying has extended to winter buying, merchants said.

### 70 YEARS AGO (Week of October 30, 1952)

Cooks at the Ulysses grade school hot lunch room were burned Monday afternoon when an explosion threw hot fruit and liquid over the kitchen. The woman were canning pears in a container covered by a lid. Somehow the lid became tightly lodged and formed what was almost a pressure cooker

of the open container. The flying lid dented the metal shield of the stove when the explosion occurred. Burns were said to be painful, though not serious.

### 80 YEARS AGO (Week of November 5, 1942)

J.E. Kyle, Grant County sheriff, who was injured several months ago in an automobile accident, was able to return to his office in the court house Monday for the first time since the accident.

### 90 YEARS AGO (Week of November 3, 1932)

Monday night when all fools were expected to cut loose and have a general good time with the ghosts and witches and in their mad scramble celebrate the 31st of October in a general topsy-turvy manner, they failed to do the damage that they have heretofore done in former years. While a few outbuildings were toppled over and some of the streets were littered with debris of various kinds, the extent of the damage was not nearly so great as formerly.

### 100 YEARS AGO (Week of November 4, 1922)

We are very sorry to say that Mr. and Mrs. Lewis lost all their household effects, clothing, and provision in a fire which started Wednesday morning in the northwest part of their house. It is supposed rats had carried matches there and got afire. The family were about two miles south picking fuel for winter when they noticed the blaze, but could not reach there in time to save anything. The neighbors responded to their needs at once and it all helps some.

## Life In The Headlights

## Election

□ Modifying Chapter 3, Section 3-213 (c) to remove the phrase "or on Sundays."

□ Modifying Chapter 3, Section 3-213 (f) to include the phrase "during hours of operation."

□ Repealing any ordinance or portions thereof that are in conflict with the suggested modifications.

□ Making the modifications in the language deemed appropriate by the relevant parties.

Garcia noted they were requesting the modifications to be done and written in whatever way was "legally appropriate". The reasoning for his requests, he added, was for Ulysses to be able to stay "economically competitive."

"The justification for allowing the sales of cereal malt beverages on Sundays is to stay economically competitive with surrounding cities and counties who have already made ordinances to modify their existing codes to basically allow on site consumption at alcoholic establishments," Garcia

3, Section 3-213 (f).

"Restricting of licenses, especially if the licensee is an owner of the establishment - I don't feel is in the economic best interest of the City of Ulysses," Garcia said. "More importantly - this request is not being done in the spirit of debauchery, depravity, or bacchanal, but rather in an effort to stay economically competitive with surrounding cities who allow for the on-premise consumption of CMB beverages on Sunday. This includes Dodge City, Liberal, Lakin, Holcomb, Montezuma, and Satanta. Kingpin's has been humbled by the support (we have received from) the City and the people of Ulysses for their patronage to our establishment. Again, we make this request in good faith and with the intention of increasing the economic attractiveness of our great city."

City Attorney Lynn Koehn advised the council that a law had changed a few years ago.

"The law did change a couple of years ago to allow cities to opt in to allow Sunday sales in

thinking about entertaining it is making it during open business hours, specifically the statute states not earlier than 9 am or later than 8 pm on Sundays. There are some holidays - I think Easter is the only holiday you cannot sell alcohol - cereal malt beverages or liquor regardless of situation. Then Thanksgiving and Christmas Day, you can't do liquor but you can do cereal malt beverages."

Koehn also noted that the 9 am to 8 pm are not set hours.

"The hours are 9 am to 8 pm - you can do anything in between," he explained. "You could do from noon to 8 or noon to 6, or 9 am to 8 pm, but you can't go outside of those hours (9 am to 8 pm). It is a majority ordinance that has to be passed. It is published twice and it takes affect 61 days after because there is a protest petition period that is allowed by residents of the city that they could bring forth to protest that going in to affect. Diaz also voiced concerns on the "religious and family" aspect of the request.

"The affect and consequences it could have," he said. "We need to have our family values. I think sometimes families need breaks and sometimes those who abuse it - they would have a break on Sunday. I say that on the spiritual aspect of it and what we have seen in the past. If it was something that would be of big value, but I don't see as far as economical that one day is going to benefit us a whole lot."

City Councilman John Duran noted the topic had come up before.

"The people that sell - the liquor stores - they came in and asked us not to pass the Sunday liquor deal because they would have to hire someone to run the place and then they won't sell that much and it was going to be a Sunday," Duran said. "Like (Diaz) said, people watch that Sunday and try to keep it to the family. That was what it was

Diaz) - I don't know how much money it's going to generate."

Duran noted the bowling alley gets a lot of family on Sundays.

"That's where we were at the time when it was brought to us before - it was either have it or not have it and the request was to not have it," Duran said. "And it was because of having to hire someone and being Sunday."

City Council President Kenneth Warner said he believed the issue with opening on Sunday for the liquor stores was that if such an ordinance was passed, they would feel inclined to open in order to stay competitive.

"The issue here (for Garcia) is if I want to go to have a beer and bowl on Sunday, then I'm going to go to Satanta (for example) and they (Kingpin's and other Ulysses businesses) lose that business," Warner said.

Garcia interjected the point he was trying to make.

"The increase right now would come from the amount - the sales generated on Sunday right now is zero," he said.

Warner added that if customers left for other communities to bowl in order to have a beer, the local bowling alley would lost that revenue as well.

"People will drive the distance," he said, add-

further and bring it back for consideration.

Councilmen requested City Administrator Alan Olson to look in to the matter further and report back to them. Garcia's request was tabled until more information has been obtained.

Garcia is one of the owners of Kingpin's Bowling Alley in Ulysses, along with Helena Grewing, and Chris Osborn. He was accompanied by several other community members, including Miles Gibbons, who said he has an interest in what the commissioners decision will be. Gibbons told the commission their decision regarding the sale of alcohol on Sunday would have bearing on his decision to open another new business in Ulysses.

"Me and my brother Kristopher, who could not make the meeting tonight, are thinking about going in to a business adventure ourselves which would sell alcohol," Gibbons said. "That is a big deciding factor on whether or not we want to do this."

Gibbons said they were wanting to sell liquor on site and that the business would be a bar.

In other business, the Ulysses City Council approved updating 1316 Standard Traffic Ordinance and 1317 Uniform Public Offense Code.

sight of administrative rule and regulation, or



rules and regulations," states "Whenever the legislature by law has authorized any officer or agency within the executive branch of government to adopt rules and regulations that have the force and effect of law, the legislature may provide by law for the revocation or suspension of any such

any portion thereof, upon a vote of a majority of the members then elected or appointed and qualified in each house.

Voters will be asked if they want to allow the legislature to establish procedures to revoke or suspend rules and regulations that are adopted by state executive branch

agencies and officials that have the force and effect of the law, or if they are against the proposition that would allow state executive branch agencies and officials to continue adopting rules and regulations that have the force and effect of law without any opportunity for the legislature to directly revoke or suspend rules and regulations.

The second amendment states it would "preserve the rights of citizens of each county that elected a county sheriff as of January 11, 2022, to continue electing the county sheriff. The amendment would also provide that a county

sheriff only may be involuntarily removed from office pursuant to either a recall election or a writ of quo warrant initiated by the attorney general.

Voters will be asked if they want to allow this proposition to preserve the rights of the citizens to possibly involuntarily remove a county sheriff from office pursuant to either a recall election or a writ of quo warrant initiated by the attorney general, or if they are against making any changes to the constitution and would retain the current law concerning the election of a sheriff and the procedures for involuntary removal of a sheriff from office.

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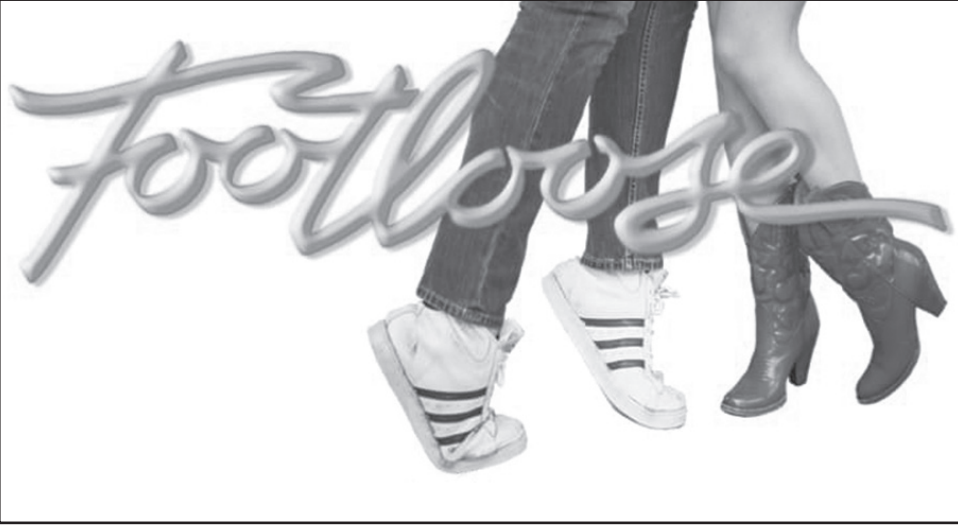
## UHS Production Footloose The Musical Coming Next Week

## HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION No. 5014

A PROPOSITION to amend article 1 of the constitution of the state of Kansas by adding a new section thereto, concerning oversight of the legislature of certain executive branch actions.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Kansas, two-thirds of the members elected (or appointed) and qualified to the House of Representatives and two-thirds of the members elected (or appointed) and qualified to the Senate concurring therein:

Section 1. The following proposition to amend the constitution of the state of Kansas shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the state for their approval or rejection: Article 1 of the constitution of the state of Kansas is hereby amended by adding a new section to read as follows:

§ 17. Legislative oversight of administrative rules and regulations.

Whenever the legislature by law has authorized any officer or agency within the executive branch of government to adopt rules and regulations that have the force and effect of law, the legislature may provide by law for the revocation or suspension of any such rule and regulation, or any portion thereof, upon a vote of a majority of the members then elected or appointed and qualified in each house."

Sec. 2. The following statement shall be printed on the ballot with the amendment as a whole:

"Explanatory statement. The purpose of this amendment is to provide the legislature with oversight of state executive branch agencies and officials by providing the legislature authority to establish procedures to revoke or suspend rules and regulations.

"A vote for this proposition would allow the legislature to establish procedures to revoke or suspend rules and regulations that are adopted by state executive branch agencies and officials that have the force and effect of law.

"A vote against this proposition would allow state executive branch agencies and officials to continue adopting rules and regulations that have the force and effect of law without any opportunity for the legislature to directly revoke or suspend such rules and regulations."

Sec. 3. This resolution, if approved by two-thirds of the members elected (or appointed) and qualified to the House of Representatives and two-thirds of the members elected (or appointed) and qualified to the Senate, shall be entered on the journals, together with the yeas and nays. The secretary of state shall cause this resolution to be published as provided by law and shall cause the proposed amendment to be submitted to the electors of the state at the general election in the year 2022, unless a special election is called at a sooner date by concurrent resolution of the legislature, in which case it shall be submitted to the electors of the state at the special election.
