Ulysses business owner Manuel Bene Garcia spoke during the visitor's portion of the Ulysses City Council's regular meeting October 26, requesting the City Council consider creating an ordinance modifying an existing City Code, regarding alcoholic beverages.

ing alcoholic beverages. "We are looking to create an ordinance that modifies the existing city code under chapter three for beverages to extend it to Sunday for drinking establishments - not retail," Garcia explained. "Or we propose you consider entering whatever discussions or verbage is appropriate to make that happen."


Garcia said he got the code information from the City's Website.







## Silver Haired Legislature Holds 40th Annual Session In Topeka

The Kansas Silver Haired Legislature held their 40th Annual Session on October 4-6 in Topeka. This was the first time in three years the SHL was able to hold an in-person Annual Session, as the 2020 and 2021 were both held in a Zoom only format. This year a Zoomlike option was also available, utilizing the Webex format at the State Capitol building. The SHL is the first organization to utilize this two-way communication format in the House of Representatives Chamber. This allowed the delegates "attending" from home to be able to watch and hear the deliberations in the House Chamber, to ask their own questions or propose possible changes, and to be able to vote on the issues as presented, at the same time and manner as the delegates in the Capitol itself. The SHL greatly appreciated the hard work of the Capitol staff that made this happen.

three-day conference is the Wednesday activity at the State Capitol. In the morning, the SHL is – Continued Support and divided into three committees, which review, discuss, and debate the various bills and resolutions that are presented to them. Those receiving a favorable vote are then brought before the entire body during the afternoon session, where each issue is once again discussed, debated, and ultimately voted upon. Those receiving favorable passage then progress to the Thursday morning final session for either an up or down vote, The bills and resolutions that pass are then forwarded to the Kansas Legislature during the 2023 Legislative Session, with the SHL pushing for their enactment into Kansas Law.

The six resolutions that received favorable passage this year at the Annual Session are:

**Resolution 4001** 1)

The high point of the – Support the Expansion est counties having five of Medicaid in the State of Kansas

> 2) Resolution 4002 Funding for community-based Public Transportation

3) **Resolution 4003** - Support and Funding for Broadband Expansion **Resolution 4004** 4) – Support for the Legalization of the Expanded Medical Use of Cannabis

**Resolution 4005** 5) – Urging the Kansas Legislature to maintain the current funding for the Kansas Senior Care Act

**Resolution 4006** 6) - Supporting the request of Area Agencies on Aging to Exempt Purchases by All Area Agencies on Aging from Sales Tax.

**HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION No. 5014** A PROPOSITION to amend article 1 of the constitution of the state of Kansas by adding a new section thereto, concerning oversight by the egislature of certain executive branch actions

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Kansas, two-thirds of the members elected (or appointed) and qualified to the House of Representatives and two-thirds of the members elected (or appointed) and qualified to the Senate concurring therein:

Section 1. The following proposition to amend the constitution of he state of Kansas shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the state for their approval or rejection: Article  $\hat{1}$  of the constitution of the tate of Kansas is hereby amended by adding a new section to read as

#### *follows:* <sup>(§</sup> 17. Legislative oversight of administrative rules and regulations.

ever the legislature by law has authorized any officer or agency within the executive branch of government to adopt rules and egulations that have the force and effect of law, the legislature may rovide by law for the revocation or suspension of any such rule and egulation, or any portion thereof, upon a vote of a majority of the nembers then elected or appointed and qualified in each house.

Sec. 2. The following statement shall be printed on the ballot with he amendment as a whole

- Explanatory statement. The purpose of this amendment is to provide the legislature with oversight of state executive branch agencies and officials by providing the legislature authority to establish procedures to revoke or suspend rules and regulations
- A vote for this proposition would allow the legislature to establish procedures to revoke or suspend rules and regulations that are adopted by state executive branch agencies and officials that have the force and effect of law.

A vote against this proposition would allow state executive branch agencies and officials to continue adopting rules and regulations that have the force and effect of law without any opportunity for the legislature to directly revoke or suspend such rules and regulations.

Sec. 3. This resolution, if approved by two-thirds of the members lected (or appointed) and qualified to the House of Representatives and wo-thirds of the members elected (or appointed) and qualified to the Senate, shall be entered on the journals, together with the yeas and nays The secretary of state shall cause this resolution to be published as ded by law and shall have the proposed submitted to the electors of the state at the general election in the year 2022, unless a special election is called at a sooner date by concurrent resolution of the legislature, in which case it shall be submitted to the electors of the state at the special election.

An ordinance regulating public offenses within the corporate limits of the City of Ulysses Kansas; incorporating by reference the "Uniform Public Offense code for Kansas cities," 38th Edition of 2022 with regulations and repealing ordinance number 1304. This summary is certified by the city attorney to be legal, accurate and sufficient.

#### **HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION No. 5022**

A PROPOSITION to amend sections 2 and 5 of article 9 of the constitution of the state of Kansas to require that a sheriff be elected in each county for a term of four years.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Kansas, two-thirds of the members elected (or appointed) and qualified to the House of Representatives and two-thirds of the members elected (or appointed) and qualified to the Senate concurring therein: Section 1. The following proposition to amend the constitution of the state of Kansas shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the state for their approval or rejection: Sections 2 and 5 of article 9 of the constitution of the state of Kansas are hereby amended to read as follows:

**"§ 2. County and township officers.** (a) Except as provided in subsection (b), each county shall elect a sheriff for a term of four years by a majority of the qualified electors of the county voting thereon at the time of voting designated for such office pursuant to law in effect on January 11, 2022, and every four years thereafter.

(b) The provisions of subsection (a) shall not apply to a county that abolished the office of sheriff prior to January 11, 2022. Such county may restore the office of sheriff as provided by law and such restoration shall be irrevocable. A county that restores the office of sheriff shall elect a sheriff by a majority of the qualified electors of the county voting thereon for a term of four years. Such sheriff shall have such qualifications and duties as provided by law. The time of voting for the office of sheriff may be provided for by the legislature pursuant to section 18 of article 2 of this constitution.

(c) The filling of vacancies and the qualifications and duties of the office of sheriff shall be as provided by law.

(d) The legislature shall provide for such other county and township officers as may be necessary."

**"§ 5. Removal of officers.** (a) Except as provided in subsection (b), all county and township officers may be removed from office, in such manner and for such cause, as shall be prescribed by law.

(b) A county sheriff only may be involuntarily removed from office by recall election pursuant to section 3 of article 4 of this constitution or a writ of quo warranto initiated by the attorney general."

Sec. 2. The following statement shall be printed on the ballot with the amendment as a whole:

- "Explanatory statement. This amendment would preserve the right of citizens of each county that elected a county sheriff as of January 11, 2022, to continue electing the county sheriff. The amendment would also provide that a county sheriff only may be involuntarily removed from office pursuant to either a recall election or a writ of quo warranto initiated by the attorney general.
- "A vote for this proposition would preserve the right of citizens of each county that elected a county sheriff as of January 11, 2022, to continue electing the county sheriff via popular vote. The amendment would also direct that a county sheriff only may be involuntarily removed from office pursuant to either a recall election or a writ of quo warranto initiated by the attorney general."
- "A vote against this proposition would not make any changes to the constitution and would retain current law concerning the election of a sheriff and the procedures for involuntary removal of a sheriff from office.

Sec. 3. This resolution, if approved by two-thirds of the members elected (or appointed) and qualified to the House of Representatives and two-thirds of the members elected (or appointed) and qualified to the Senate, shall be entered on the journals, together with the yeas and nays. The secretary of state shall cause this resolution to be published as provided by law and shall cause the proposed amendment to be submitted to the electors of the state at the general election in November in the year 2022, unless a special election is called at a sooner date by concurrent resolution of the legislature, in which case it shall be submitted to the electors of the state at the special election.
