Dual Grand Marshals Carl and Sheila Bergren Lead 60th Autumn Leaf Parade

LEAVENWORTH - Longtime locals Carl and Sheila Bergren will be seen leading the Autumn Leaf Parade as its Grand Marshals. It's fitting for the 60th anniversary of the Autumn Leaf Festival that the Bergrens share the role rather than having only one Grand Marshal, which is more customary.

Charlotte Ley, the Washington State Autumn Leaf Festival Association (ALFA) parade chair, explained that the organization wanted to honor someone from the arts community who has given back "behind the scenes." Carl and Sheila Bergren both fit that description, so the ALFA board agreed to recognize them both.

Carl Bergren, 93, was born and raised in Leavenworth, with homesteading family lines extending further back. After graduating from high school, Carl Bergren moved to California for college and enjoyed a long career as a commercial artist and graphic designer. When he and Sheila Bergren

moved back to Leavenworth in 1989, ostensibly to retire, they joined several organizations, rolled up their sleeves and got to work. Carl Bergren became a dedicated Village Art in the Park (VAIP) artist, selling his framed pen and ink sketches of Leavenworth structures, which are works of elegant precision. He served on the board for years, helping VAIP establish and fund scholarships for graduating high schoolers planning to major in art in college.

When considering Sheila Bergren's impact, the list is extensive. She helped found Friends of Northwest Hatcheries, and through that became instrumental in the success of the Wenatchee River Salmon Festival for three decades. She has volunteered over the years for Upper Valley Arts, which hosted concerts before newer venues were established, the Free Clinic run by Upper Valley MEND, Senior Meals delivered to homes, and Cascade Medical Foundation (CMF). For the latter, Sheila Bergren's golf expertise aided CMF as they held their first golf

Aromatics

As the seasons change, our immune systems must overcome a new set of variables to keep us healthy. Doctors can only do so much, and I firmly believe it is up to me to do the best I can to stay as healthy as I can.

The best way I know to stay healthy is to maintain and strengthen my immune system. And the best way I know to do that is to use kitchen herbs and spices in my cooking. They are easy to come by; they are usually reasonably priced; they have few side effects, and best of all, they make my foods tastier.

When the seasons change, and my throat starts to get scratchy, I head for the spice cabinet to make a gargle. Grandpa Truman uses a salt gargle. Regular table salt works well, and I like to use the pink salt when it is available (it can come from Utah or the Himalayan Mountains-not the curing salt pink coloring has

been added to).

Any herb and/or spice can be steeped in water to make tea and gargled. The following are essentials in my spice cabinet, and I've included some ways to use them.

Clove: Anti-viral, antiseptic, anti-fungal, and anti-bacterial. Mix a pinch of ground cloves in with jelly before making a peanut butter and jelly sandwich, or make a tea to gargle (not to drink) before bed.

Cinnamon: good for blood sugar regulation. For a change of pace, sprinkle a bit over the top of the coffee grounds before brewing, carefully not mixing in because the fine particles of the powdered cinnamon will clog the filter; just sprinkle on top.

Celery Seed: Helps with flatulence and is anti-rheumatic (helps fight rheumatism). Sprinkle on roasts; add to soups and stews.

Garlic: Anti-fungal, antiviral and anti-parasitic. Purchase local, or at the very least, American garlic.

American garlic can have some roots still attached. Chinese garlic travels so far it loses its potency. Helps fight Candida albicans and strengthens the immune system.

Mustard Seed: Anti-fungal and anti-bacterial. Add a pinch of powdered mustard to scrambled eggs, potato salads, and mac and cheese. Use when making sausage.

Oregano: Anti-viral, anti-fungal and anti-bacterial. Helps fight E.coli and Salmonella. (If your tummy is sensitive to Oregano, try Marjoram.)

Rosemary: Anti-bacterial and anti-fungal. Promotes healthy liver function. Add to chicken dishes and wild meat dishes, and works well with mushrooms.

Sage: Anti-bacterial and anti-fungal. Use to make sausage.

Thyme: Anti-bacterial and anti-fungal. Thymol is the main ingredient in many commercial mouthwashes, and thyme can be used to make homemade mouthwash.

Homemade Mouthwash and/or Gargle

- 1 Tablespoon of herb or spice
 - 1 or 2 pints of water, depending on personal taste
- Pick the spice and/or herb to be used, then heat the water to boiling. Pour over the herb and/or spice and let steep for half an hour or so to cool. Carefully drain out the solids. I let the solids fall to the bottom of the jar, then pour clear liquid out leaving the solids behind.

Gargle with the tea.
 Oregano, Rosemary, Sage, and Thyme mixed together in equal parts ahead of time into an 'Italian Blend' make a very good gargle. Clove alone is a good gargle. Even a good pre-packaged tea can work to give relief to a scratchy throat and help build up the immune system.
 Tip: Over time, herb and spices lose their potency. The aromatic

odor in them is a good indicator of current potency. If I can't smell them, they probably aren't doing my immune system any good, so I get rid of them and start fresh.

Extra: When I grow, or I'm gifted extra herbs like basil or rosemary, more than I need to freeze or dry, I stick a few sprigs in vases and set them around the house to improve air quality.

National Public Lands Day:

Saturday, September 23, is National Public Lands Day. The holiday celebrates our public lands managed at both the federal and state levels, and it is free to recreate on these lands for the day (no passes or permits required). This makes it the perfect day (if you are pinching pennies) to visit a National Park, State Park, U.S. Forest Service recreation site or trailhead, National Wildlife Refuge, and select Bureau of Land Management properties that would typically charge a day-use or parking fee.

This holiday is also one where you can volunteer to be a steward of our public lands. East of the Cascades in Washington, there are a couple of events you can participate in that day. One of them is the Liberty Campground Clean Up and Maintenance Day in Liberty (near Cle Elum). The other event, being done under the supervision of the Washington Trails Association, will happen near Sprague at the Fishtrap Loop Trail, where a stone turnpike will be constructed to prevent damage to the trail by seasonal flooding. National Fishing And Hunting Day:

Saturday, September 30, is National Fishing and Hunting Day, and the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife will celebrate the occasion from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. at Camp Cowles, located at 4161 N Shore Diamond Lake Rd, Newport, WA 99156.

Kids 17 and younger are invited to attend the event with an adult, and if they do, they will be able to shoot firearms, bows, and air rifles free of charge under the supervision of WDFW staff and hunter education instructors.

There will be a number of booths and activities at this event to include:

- Conservation organization displays and information
- Door prize drawings
- Fun giveaways
- Casting practice
- Knot tying
- Fish prints
- Track plaster casting

The bottom line? If you want to introduce a kid to hunting, fishing, or shooting sports, this is a great event to attend.

Snow Geese In September:

Ten years ago, seeing a snow goose in Eastern Washington was a very rare thing. Still, migration patterns have

changed, and last winter, close to 12,000 snow geese were rafted up on Potholes Reservoir until April when they returned to their breeding grounds at Wrangell Island in Alaska.

Or did they? I was fishing at Potholes Reservoir near the sand dunes the first week of September when we came upon a flock of 20 snow geese frolicking near shore. The flock flew away as we got close, and it marked the first time I had ever seen snow geese in this area prior to mid-October.

I wanted to know whether these geese never left the reservoir this spring. I called local fishing and hunting guide Shelby Ross with Ross Outdoor Adventures, who opined they were likely early migrants (as opposed to geese that had taken up residence here) because he had not seen any geese on the lake since spring. I got the same opinion from WDFW State Waterfowl Biologist Matthew Wilson, who thinks they are early migrants, but they probably spent the summer further south than Alaska.

Record Mahi-Mahi:

Congratulations are in order to Wade La Fontaine, who was fishing for tuna off of Westport on August 25 on board the charter boat, Tunacious, captained by Keith Johnson. That's when he hooked into a dolphinfish, known as a mahi mahi in Hawaii and as a

dorado in the coastal waters around Mexico. These fish are rare off the Washington Coast, but both recreational and commercial anglers have caught a few in recent years. None, however, were as big as LaFontaine's 21-pound, 48-inch-long fish, which is a new Washington State record.

Catching Carp On Artificial Lures:

Growing up as a kid, I learned to catch carp using corn or nightcrawlers for bait, but it turns out these hard-fighting fish sometimes bite artificial lures. Fly anglers were the first to figure this out, and back in the 1990s, there were actually a few guides fishing out of flats boats in the northwest, targeting these fish with sculpin imitations at reservoirs like Banks Lake. In the last few years, I've caught carp, fair hooked in the mouth, on deep diving crankbaits and blade baits. However, my son David's ten-pound carp caught out of Potholes Reservoir this week on a lipless crankbait was a new one to me. Even though it wasn't the big bass or walleye he was hoping for, it did put up a tussle, and he had fun catching it with a most unusual offering.
