New School Record for 800m set by Lauren Muscutt

At the track and field State Championship, the two Cascade High School (CHS) seniors, Lauren Muscutt and Owen Bard, came away with impressive end-of-career performances in all of their events.

Muscutt dominated the 800m race, winning the prelim by over 3.5 seconds and winning the final in 2:15.46, over a second ahead of the next competitor in a race where a second is significant. That 2:15 also set a new CHS record, about a second faster than the prior record set by Erin Mullins in 2017.

When asked about her path to success, Muscutt said, "It's been a long journey to get there. It wasn't always easy to train, but I'm glad I stuck with it and was able to finish my career on such a positive note. I wanted to set a school record, and it feels great to have accomplished that goal."

The 800m final went off at a fast pace, enabling half of the finishers to accomplish personal records. Muscutt relied on her power and speed to win by utilizing a long kick. "My strategy was to let someone else lead and then pass and go as fast as I could at the final 250. All I really wanted to do was run as hard as I could."

Muscutt also competed in the mile, where she PR'ed with a 5:11, earning fourth overall. "That was the race that hurt the most, that I was most dreading, and I will miss the least. I did better than I thought I would, which was awesome," she said.

Muscutt and three freshmen,



3.5 seconds. Head coach Bill Davies and coach Carl Haberberger knew they had a great chance if the first three runners could get Muscutt, anchoring, close to the other teams. The freshmen showed their talent by doing just that, including handing off to Muscutt in the lead in the prelim.

Over the course of the Championship, Muscutt had to race well five times, which is challenging for any athlete. "It's kind of stressful," she said. "I try to eat well and get rest, but both of these things are tough for me. Each day, I force-feed myself breakfast because I feel like I'm going to throw up."

Track long distance coach Eric Wulfman has worked with Muscutt for several years. "Watching Lauren's progression from a talented but unsure freshman to state champion has been extremely satisfying," he said. "Genetics are just part of the puzzle. Her willingness to do the extra work is the mark of a true champion."

Muscutt is excited for what's next, including a summer of relaxed running, hanging out with friends and continuing her job making pizza at Blewett Brewery. Come fall, she'll be heading to the University of Hawaii at Manoa. "I do not plan to run there. I'm excited to find new passions," she said. Owen Bard, a top cross country

Owen Bard, a top cross country runner, came out for track for his senior year for the first time. Coach Wulfman explained, "Owen very successfully ran cross country and track in middle school. In high school he ran cross country but, in the spring, played soccer until this year. He ran well and made constant improvements all season." set two PRs of 4:38 and 10:11 for the mile and two-mile races, respectively. Before the two-mile race, he had about the tenth fastest time. So, during the race, he had to make several strategic moves to come away with seventh overall.

Bard looks forward to attending the University of Washington in the fall.

Looking back, Muscutt reflected on the important team aspect of track, which is perhaps less apparent than in other sports. "Everyone that I meet in this sport, regardless of their team, feels like a community," she said. "Track and field is all about working hard together even when we compete against one another. My coaches have been so supportive and positive, even when I was grumpy."

Recap of the Annual 2022 Chumstick Wildfire Stewardship Coalition meeting

The 2022 Annual CWSC Leavenworth Town Meeting was held on May 31, with the sole purpose of educating the community with progress made towards wildfire prevention for the summer of 2022.

Entities that presented during this meeting included Chelan County Fire District #3 (CCFD#3), the Cascadia Conservation District, the City of Leavenworth, Chelan County Natural Resources, Chelan County PUD, the Washington State Department of Natural Resources (DNR), and the U.S. Forest Service. There was also a guest appearance from Chelan County Commissioner Bob Bugert, who talked more in-depth on a proposed lumber mill for Chelan County.

CWSC Director Barbara Carrillo and Chairman John Callahan introduced their organization's key mission to inform landowners of wildfire resiliency and the Chumstick Remote Water Tank Storage Project, a collaborative project with CCFD#3 to increase the local water supply. This would involve the installation of 10k gallon underground tanks, which would result in quicker fire suppression and would involve the cooperation with private property owners.

CCFD#3 Chief Dave Nalle and firefighter Jessica Campbell recapped the events of the debris cleaning and chipping events, resulting in 196 volunteered hours on the project for a total of 26 homes. They both addressed hazardous fuel reduction and retrofitting homes to withstand future wildfires.

Cascadia Conservation District

Icicle Fund's 2022 Grants are a Watershed Moment for Nonprofits

North Central Washington would be a very different place without the Icicle Fund, which was founded in 1998 by Harriet Bullitt. Forty-five million dollars has been distributed to over 100 nonprofit organizations in Chelan, Douglas, Okanogan and Grant Counties over the years.

Beyond financial support, it's about the intention that Bullitt built into Icicle Fund. The aim has always been to support work in the interconnected areas of the arts, the environment, and cultural and natural history.

As explained on Icicle Fund's website, "A sense of place is central to the Fund's mission. It is this belief that strong connections of people to place are built and nurtured through artistic expression, imagination, understanding of the past, experience in nature, and care for wildlife and natural landscapes."

Christine Morgan, Icicle Fund executive director, explained, "Icicle Fund is just one part of the ecosystem of regional organizations that uplift our communities."

The parable of the long spoons, chosen by Bullitt, serves as a guiding principle for Icicle Fund. The parable reflects how a challenge—trying and failing to feed oneself with an overly long spoon—can be overcome and turned into opportunity through community and innovation—by using the long spoons to feed each other instead.

Bullitt considered the parable emblematic of Icicle Fund's work. "We take it seriously, both internally and externally," said Morgan.

Icicle Fund turns the parable of the long spoons into action through a variety of grant opportunities for nonprofits, including annual community support grants.

In 2021, Icicle Fund awarded \$2.3 million to the region, and this year that amount is about \$2 million so far. A new change to the community support grant program is that funding is unrestricted. This gives nonprofits the flexibility to put the money where it will make the most meaningful impact and allows them to pivot, if necessary, in unpredictable times.

Unrestricted giving sounds less complex, Morgan said, but it's actually more so because there needs to be greater understanding of each organization and its mission, capacity and methodology. It requires trust.

Additionally, Icicle Fund reached out to some smaller/underserved nonprofits to raise awareness of available grants and advise them through the application process, which was streamlined to remove a few steps and simplify grant reporting. This year ten organizations applied for and received funding for the first time.

Through a partnership with the Community Foundation of North Central Washington, Icicle Fund also offered strategic consulting grants in 2021.

Sustainable NCW

Some organizations, such as Sustainable NCW, received both types of funding. "The support via the strategic planning grant helped us to focus in on our top priorities," said executive director, Jana Fischback. "By surveying key stakeholders, we could move forward with confidence that we were working on the right projects, the Waste Wizard, our new online recycling search tool, and our Idle Free Zones campaign at local schools. The Icicle Fund's support has helped us work on not just those but also our other events, like our Earth Day Fair at Pybus, discussion groups, film screenings and free community classes."

"Unrestricted funds help cover things that aren't glamorous," said Fischback. "Business sponsors and community members are more eager to donate toward specific programs. But we also need funds to keep the proverbial lights on and pay for the things like rent, insurance, software, and other technology. This helps us spend more time working directly on our mission of promoting a culture of environmental stewardship and social sustainability, rather than spending time on fundraising. We don't have to carefully track each dollar but are trusted to use the funds as needed, which saves me time on grant writing and reporting."

Using Waste Wizard, people can look up anything they're looking to get rid of, whether that be to recycle it, donate it, or figure out a way to reuse it. "This tool is comprehensive, with hundreds of materials listed. It includes photos of the items, synonyms when items have different names, and lists every place that takes the item." Translation into Spanish is also available.

NCW Arts Alliance (NCWArts)

NCWArts, a new nonprofit that will serve Chelan and Douglas Counties, is gaining momentum quickly thanks to Icicle Fund support through both

representative Patrick Haggerty gave a quick overview of the organization's mission statement and then switched to the next presenter.

City of Leavenworth Building Official Mark Barnes presented the city's Wildland-Urban Interface Building Standards (WUIBS) and was required to adopt the state's overall WUIBS code. Barnes stated that 9-10 single-family residences have already been built to these new standards, including new additions such as stormwater control and converting gutters into metal gutters so that fire can't travel up the siding of the home.

Chelan County Natural Resources introduced Hannah Pygot as their key speaker, who gave an overview of some fish passage improvements and stream restoration, culvert replacements, bridge installation, instream complexity projects, debris removal, along with wildfire hazard mitigation projects they have been working on. They also reported on weed control with Reed Canary Grass and that water quantity and groundwater levels have increased due to a slower release of water.

Justin Gelb was the chief representative for the U.S. Forest Service and presented the \$14 mil. Central Washington Initiative which was split in the following projects: \$1.6 mil. for the Upper Peshastin fuel treatment work, \$2.5 mil. for the Good Neighbor Authority (GNA) projects, planning and implementation projects for the Heritage contracts, and stand projects for the Chumstick area. Gelb also stated that his organization used part of the funds from the infrastructure bill to hire 12 new members to the Forest organization.

Chelan PUD spokeswoman Rachel Hansen summarized some clean-up

grants. "Without the strategic consulting grant, we would not be here today," said Kmbris Bond, board chair and local artist. "The business plan that we created with the consultant's help is substantial and comprehensive, mapping out a path for success.'

Bond and the other allvolunteer board members were then able to apply for and receive \$35,000, the largest community support grant that Icicle Fund allocated this year. "The unrestricted grant is wonderfully respectful of the dynamic nature of a newly formed organization. This will allow the Arts Alliance to grow in response to community needs while supporting the work that goes into that growth. It will help us get started with hiring help, building a brand, and beginning to perform the services of connecting artists

projects her organization had been working on, which include eliminating growing branches near power lines, removed roughly 5,000 hazardous trees, more frequent inspections, applying fire retardant on phones, converted 34 poles into steel poles, and increased the sensitivity on their fire safety outage management system.

The system would be located within Lake Wenatchee, Plain, and Stevens Pass areas due to

how vulnerable those areas are to wildfires. Hansen reported that she does not expect for these systems to be used, with the last report made back in 2014.

Disturbance ecologist Garrett Meigs had presented the DNR's 20-year Forest Health Strategic Plan, overviewing all the goals and strategies for wildfire mitigation and future treatments to be used by 2037. lead lives of faith, learning, and service. Bugert also shared some news about an approved contract with SE Consulting for a supply analysis for a proposed Chelan County lumber mill.

Chelan County Commissioners signed off on a countywide burn ban on May 31, that will be held in place from June through September.

Open burning within unincorporated areas

within Chelan County are strictly prohibited, along with recreational campfires, fireworks, and burning trash or burn barrels.

The following are also restricted during this time:

Burning yard waste, such as leaves, grass, brush and other yard trimmings is prohibited.

Burning to clear land of trees, stumps, shrubbery, or other natural vegetation is prohibited. Residents may still have

campfires so long as the fire is in an approved pit or area.

Restricted open flame devices, meaning using devices liable to start a fire in moderate fire hazard areas.

Portable fireplaces are allowed so long as they're on noncombustible surfaces and burn only natural wood products.

Moderate travel restrictions are also in effect, meaning motorists can't operate vehicles off the roadway.

Food will stick to your teeth and tongue without saliva's moisture, dramatically increasing plaque formation, tooth decay, and gum inflammation.

When your gums get too dry, they tend to shrink and become more sensitive. This can significantly affect the fit and comfort of dentures. The dryness

1.Ask your doctor or pharmacist.

2. Avoid chewing or smoking tobacco.

The nicotine in tobacco can interfere with saliva production.

3. Avoid chewing gum or hard candy sweetened with sugar.

Sugar encourages bacteria in your mouth to produce more acid, which attacks your teeth and gums. Switching to a sugar-free gum or mint containing xylitol will decrease your risk of caries.

4. Take extra good care of your teeth.

Brush and floss twice a day with a very soft toothbrush to reduce damage to your mouth. See your dentist regularly for cleanings and follow-ups.

5.Try an over-the-counter saliva substitute.

Saliva substitutes come as sprays, gels, and even small discs that you stick inside your mouth where baseball players put chewing tobacco. Over 80% of my pharmacist colleagues recommend Biotene® dry mouth relief spray and Biotene® Oral Balance clear gel.

6.Ask your dentist or doctor for a prescription-only saliva stimulant.

City discusses water for Ski Hill Drive and Cemetery plotting

The City of Leavenworth had a brief discussion on Ski Hill's current water needs that would require an additional water reservoir in preparation for future development and wildfire threats. The council contemplated also the implementation of pre-lined burial plots to increase the number of available plots.

The meeting began with the absence of Lilith Vespier and Mayor Carl J. Florea, resulting in Mayor Pro Tempore Anne Hessburg stepping in.

Chelan County Corporal Monika Haynes gave a brief public safety report and listed Leavenworth as the third highest area for Chelan County call-ins.

After brief clarification on the minutes, the council proceeded into the public hearing portion on the Upper Ski Hill Water Association Water System Consolidation Feasibility Study (or water feasibility study). This study highlights a possible water connection that could be made between the Upper Ski Hill Water Association and the City's water facilities, with additional upgrades that would need to be made to the Association's water system.

Tom Wachholder reminded council that this period would only be for discussion, and also reported that this study was conducted by Gray & Osborne, with funding from a \$30k Department of Health Grant.

The elevation for Ski Hill Drive homes is currently above the city's service areas and if coupled with a possible development boom without the development of a new

Miller illustrated that future construction could prove difficult since it would have to be done on private property.

Linda Collleson asked if the improvements would be considered after the city fixes their distribution issues. Wachholder said they would focus on the city's current needs before starting this project.

Public comment section closed and transitioned to the next action item regarding cross connection control. offering an alternative monetary penalty rather than shutting a tenant's water off.

Councilmember Sharon Waters asked if people knew of the backflow testing, and Wachholder said they could send communication to those who need to test. Christie Voos reassured that people could learn more on the city's website.

Aurilio asked if there have backflow instances, been

Wachholder said not they know of but they had low chlorine levels which suggested one might have.

There is a charge for getting the backflow preventers tested. Steiner said the city used to contract certain testers, but it was a huge cumbersome issue and changed the procedure to have the owners hire and schedule the testing. The change in the ordinance passed unanimously.

The next item was Ordinance 1655 pertaining to excavations in the city's right of way. The changes included corrections in language and added a requirement for a maintenance bond for contractors, this was passed unanimously.

The last discussion item on the agenda was a review of the cemetery plan for platting out the additional space at the city cemetery. Staff is currently reviewing platting section C of the cemetery. The platted area at the cemetery is down to three adult-sized plots remaining.

One option staff discussed with the council was to contract with an engineering company to plat the vault locations and install pre-lined burial sites at determined locations within section C. Pre-plating and installing liners would improve the efficiency of the grave site layout and reduce the human error element of digging individual graves one at a time.

adult lot is \$650, the cost to pursue a liner program would increase the price of a burial site purchase to \$1500 and the pre-liners.

Councilmember Zeke Reister urns. Since this was merely a discussion item, the council agreed to talk about this issue further and then transitioned into council reports.

reservoir, the area could be facing issues with insufficient water pressure.

Here is an excerpt from the study regarding additional reservoirs:

"A new Zone 3 would serve connections between 1,300 -1.400 feet while a new Zone 4 would serve connections above 1,400 feet. These new zones would be established concurrently with proposed development, and additional information on these proposed projects is provided in the City's Water System Plan (WSP).²

Wachholder stated that the city would need \$6.4 million to start the project, which would also need to compete with the competing water needs for the city and would be ineligible for a grant since they did not have current water issues and could defer to a loan as an option for project funding.

Wachholder introduced Gray & Osborne Civil Engineer Adam Miller to answer any questions the council had. Councilmember Marco Aurilio stated that water will most likely be a big issue in the Ski Hill area due to it being in a prime wildfire location and the potential density growth in that area.

Miller reassured Aurilio that Zone 3 would provide the services that Aurilio described and would maintain adequate water pressure with the installation of larger pipes and additional hydrants.

Councilmember Jason Lundgren asked if it was the landowners on Ski Hill Drive that approached the city or if it was the other way around due to the potential growth factor, to which Wachholder replied that correspondence began back in 2019 or prior.

Finance Director Chantell Steiner explained that in the study they conducted back then, Leavenworth would have had the highest rate increases due to the Association's
