

Whole-Person Migrant Services Benefit Students in the Cascade School District

The migrant education services at Cascade School District (CSD) supports migrant students and their families in multifaceted ways, enabling students to be academically successful and feel a sense of social-emotional belonging at school. This crucial work is currently provided to 42 students spread over all the grades.

Emily Ross, principal at Peshastin Dryden Elementary, oversees the program, Cynthia Reyes is the recruiter, and Jill Weil is the migrant graduation specialist.

Migrant services are federally funded, and this funding began in the 1960's and has evolved over the years. "Migrant" is defined as a family having a qualified move every three years around agriculture or fish hatchery work.

In the beginning, only about 10% of migrant students graduated from high school. Now, the national average is closer to 70%. But in CSD, that percentage has been as high as 92% recently.

The first step is to recruit families to join the program. Reyes reaches out to local families in-person usually, though that has been disrupted during the pandemic. Once enrolled, migrant students receive extra academic help and wrap-around services.

The migrant education services are distinct from the English language learner (ELL) program, but often there is overlap. Students are exited

from the ELL program once they achieve English language proficiency by testing above the state average.

"Migrant students face unique challenges," explained Weil at a recent school board meeting. "Because they move often, their education is interrupted frequently resulting in a lack of a sense of belonging and autonomy. Social-emotional learning and leadership initiatives are key to helping these students."

"A continuity of health services is problematic too. Wrapping a family with community resources often involves collaborating with outside

groups and helps these families keep students in school and engaged. Many of these factors affect graduation rates."

CSD engages migrant parents with a parent advisory council. "The parents' participation and input drive the program to support students," Ross said at the school board meeting.

There are extra needs for high school aged migrant students. Weil is instrumental in helping them

navigate these issues. She's held the migrant graduation specialist position since August 2019, though it was created one year prior.

"My job is varied because the challenges students face in school are varied," said Weil. "As an example, frequent absences are an obstacle to school success, but there are many reasons for frequent absences. I've had one student frequently absent because he had an untreated illness. I helped him connect with a Spanish-speaking general practitioner, and he got the medical treatment he needed."

"Another student was frequently absent because a family member was sick, and she was responsible for driving that family member to doctor's appointments and translating during the appointments. A combination of Upper Valley MEND and Link was helpful to the family in this case."

"During the pandemic especially, when many families were in crisis mode, some students were absent because they were in charge of caring for younger siblings while parents were at work (childcare referrals were what was needed in this case) and other students were absent because they needed full-time jobs to help their families pay bills—especially if a parent was not able to work due to closures or quarantine. I helped advocate for flexible online assignments in these cases, and often Zoomed with students on the weekends or in the evening after work to help them with assignments."

"It's tempting to assume that a student who is frequently absent doesn't care about school, but that's rarely correct! In all the above cases, once the major obstacle was addressed, students engaged and successfully completed their coursework."

Weil also helps convert transcript credits from another state or country to values in CSD's credit

system. "Transcript work requires not just figuring out what classes students have taken elsewhere, but determining whether those classes are equivalent enough to ours, in terms of content and rigor, to transfer credit," explained Weil. "I work with an impressive team at Cascade High School, many with international experience, to make these decisions."

Migrant students have assistance figuring out what post-graduation pathway is best for them. "I partner with the AVID teachers to take students on college field trips. So far, we've toured CWU, WSU, and Wenatchee Valley Technical Skills Center. I've also helped students job hunt, prepare resumes and cover letters, and practice interviews."

There's also assistance with filling out the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) and applying for scholarships.

Collaboration and support from the local and broader community enrich this program. One example is how the Immigration and Race Justice Group of Leavenworth helped fund driver's education fees for six students. Weil is also seeking another local grant to continue to cover driver's ed costs.

Additionally, Weil expressed gratitude for her counterparts in the Cashmere, Wenatchee and Okanogan districts, saying, "The North Central Washington Education Service District allows us to get together and learn from each other regularly. Since our program is comparatively new at Cascade, I've asked a lot of questions and taken a lot of advice from my veteran colleagues."

Weil, Reyes, Ross and other staff help migrant students be integrated into all aspects of student life. It's just and expected. Weil said, "Our migrant farmworkers benefit our county because they contribute to our agriculture-heavy economy."

Chelan-Douglas Health District Officers Hold Omicron Variant Press Conference

The Chelan-Douglas Health District (CDHD) Interim Health Officer Dr. James Wallace and Administrator Luke Davies held a press conference on Jan. 4, at the Town Toyota Center to speak to the public regarding the recent resurgence of the COVID-19 Omicron variant.

The press conference was the beginning of the CDHD's public campaign to address the Omicron Variant situation. Dr. Wallace said that they were not there to alarm the public, but rather to raise awareness on how quickly Omicron is spreading and to better prepare the community.

The Omicron variant was first seen in the Chelan-Douglas region on Dec. 10. Since then, Confluence Health went from a positivity rate of 7% to 20% by Dec. 27. The surge and spread in numbers of this variant means that the current timeline for Omicron to reach its peak will be much shorter

Mayor Carl J. Florea's Monthly Salary Increase

On Dec. 14, City Council approved Ordinance 1643, which was a proposed rate increase from the mayor's current \$1,500 per month to \$2,000 per month.

The ordinance was discussed during the council's public hearing for the Biennial Budget Modification. From the Dec. 14 Council Packet:

After finishing distributing lodging tax dollars to recipients back in November, the City of Leavenworth has \$58,000 left for community grants. The city is only accepting those from official nonprofit organizations.

This grant will replace grant application processes including the "Festival & Events," "Tourism Hospitality & Special Programs," and "Partnership Funding Agreements."

Chelan County Commissioners declare state of emergency

In response to the winter storm that brought record-breaking amounts of snow Thursday across the county, a state of has been declared in Chelan County.

A resolution declaring a disaster in Chelan County was signed Jan. 6 by Commissioner Kevin Overbay, chairman of the Board of County Commissioners. County policy allows for one of the three commissioners of Chelan County to declare a state of emergency exists after counseling with public safety officers or Chelan County Emergency Management. Commissioners Bob Bugert and Tiffany Gering will sign the formal resolution on Jan. 10 at the regularly scheduled Board of County Commissioners meeting.

The emergency declaration affords commissioners the ability to use local resources without going through the typical government bidding process for goods and services. It is also generally a prerequisite for most

state and federal recovery assistance funding.

On Thursday, Chelan County Public Works crews reported about 2 feet of snow in the Wenatchee area and as much as 4 feet in the county's higher elevations around Lake Wenatchee. The snow fell within a 24-hour period. Snow slides have been reported on Mission Creek and Olalla Canyon roads near Cashmere; Union Valley Road near Chelan; and on Mills Canyon and Entiat River roads near Entiat. Many other roads throughout the county were under hazardous conditions.

sphere and storage assets. Chelan Fruit is also a worldwide owner of SugarBee®, a top proprietary variety with a well-recognized brand.

IFC is a privately-owned institutional asset manager that partners with farmers to help maximize farm profitability through progressive farming and preventive farming techniques. Founded in 2009, IFC has family roots in agribusiness that date back to 1827. IFC applies their deep knowledge of agriculture, in-house agronomy solutions

and global relationships with farmers to unlock the value of farmland.

IFC has been a trusted, long-standing partner for Chelan Fruit for six years prior to the transaction and will continue to work with the grower base and preserve their legacy in the next phase of the business. Manson Growers: 2021 season yielded 1.2 million boxes of apples

MANSON - "Apple Capitol of the World," a moniker for Wenatchee that expands across Chelan County. Despite severe heat, supply-chain delays, and transportation issues, fruit-packing companies comment on how they have been faring since last season.

Manson Growers' Assis-

tant General Manager Jared England reports that aside from the issues from last year, that their operation was doing considerably better compared to businesses who were dealing with staffing shortages.

they have been able to have staff following the CDHD recommended COVID-19 protocols to help limit the impact. They also included on-site vaccinations for their workers.

The 2021 season yielded 1.2 million boxes, with 85% to 90% exported internationally. "That's up to 90% of our crop is sent international, either to Mexico or to Asia are our

key largest markets."

The main issue that Manson Growers has been contending with are the systemic supply-chain issues that every industry has been battling during COVID-19. England reports higher delays in Seattle ports that are delaying their Asian exports.

"The availability of containers then delays their import. Many trucks are also refusing to deliver there because of the delays they experience when they arrive," England said. "We also have key relationships with different exporters that help us leverage the bookings, and so when they do come available, we're able to get in the queue."

These delays have been

a recent development for Manson Growers, with a 5% to 10% slow down from their usual shipping pace. However, the heat damage from this season lowered their usual output.

"Luckily this season's crop is smaller than our average, and so we are able to still keep our fruit moving, but at a slower pace," England said. "There was a percentage of fruit that was left on the

trees because of sunburn or other heat related damage, that impacted the overall crop size as well. Just the normal cyclical yield that happens in tree fruit."

England states that although 2021 was a slower year, they still felt that it was a good year for their operation.

than those of previous variants. “The Delta variant took about four months to peak in our area, and Omicron should only take six weeks,” Dr. Wallace explained. “The Delta variant doubled its infection rate approximately every two weeks and in communities around the nation now, Omicron cases are doubling every 2-4 days.”

“Based on the facts that we currently know about Omicron and its rate of infection, we expect Omicron to gain momentum within our local communities in the next few weeks,” Davies said. “We should expect to see high rates of COVID infection for the month of January and into early February.”

Dr. Wallace also reported that “researchers believe Omicron may lead to more cases of reinfection in people who have already had COVID, as well as more cases of breakthrough infection for people who are fully vaccinated.”

Davies states that statewide hospitalizations may be up to or 2.7 times higher than Delta per day at the peak of Omicron in the community. Meanwhile, Confluence Health only has 156 beds for both COVID and non-COVID patients.

“These sort[s] of projections will put our hospitals beyond capacity and put a tremendous strain on Confluence Health, Lake Chelan Health, Cascade Medical, and our federally

qualified health centers, Columbia Valley Community Health (CVCH), Family Health Centers, potentially forcing hard choices by medical providers,” Davies said, who later added:

“This comes at a time when our healthcare system [is] already short-staffed and our healthcare workers are exhausted dealing with pandemic conditions for two years.”

“Omicron is a fast-moving, highly infectious variant that’s unlike any we’ve seen in the past two years of the pandemic,” Dr. Wallace said. “While this variant appears to be slightly less severe as measured by overall mortality rates and overall hospitalizations, it moves very quickly, and we are going to see everyone becoming sick around the same time.”

They stated that the incoming Omicron wave will lead to even more staffing shortages, which may leave businesses no choice but to shut down, along with creating a greater strain on public infrastructure such as hospitals, our schools and area utilities.

The Chelan-Douglas Health District stated the following regarding school operations throughout the area: “We anticipate that there will be staffing issues or community spread that may cause school closures in the next few weeks.”

The CDHD encourages the community to get vaccinated and to social distance, along with prioritizing the use of N-95 masks and surgical masks

over cloth or bandana masks. If you do wear a cloth mask, make sure to wash it every day and to use a filter within the cloth mask.

“If folks have stopped wearing masks, now is the time to start [again]. If folks have not worn masks thus far, I strongly encourage folks to start,” Dr. Wallace states.

CDHD will also provide masks and at-home tests once they become available. The Department of Health is distributing close to one million at-home tests to local health jurisdictions over the next few weeks.

“We will be working to distribute those through different community partners. They [are] also going to be distributing a significant number through schools and healthcare providers as well.”

They stated again that getting vaccinated and getting the booster is the best defense, but its effectiveness will wane over time. The FDA has fully approved the Pfizer vaccine for 12-15 year-olds and is in the review process of updating their recommendation of shortening the booster wait time from 6 months to 5 months from the primary second dose.

“Now is the time to schedule an appointment for your booster,” Davies said. “If you need to get vaccinated, you can sign up on the Chelan-Douglas Health District website or work with a number of our providers who are operating within our local pharmacies.”

They also suggest getting

a flu shot so that people do not further increase hospital capacity.

In addition, the CDHD will work to implement a new Emergency Operation Center (EOC) and Triage Center, located in Olds Station in the following week. Those who have trouble breathing, and if nearby hospitals reach maximum capacity, may be directed towards the EOC. More information will be sent out once it is made available.

The CDHD will work in conjunction with Columbia Valley Health (CVCH) and Chelan County Fire District #1 on building the EOC and Triage Center. The EOC will also include the assistance of Wenatchee Valley College, which will help handle COVID testing and triage duties.

Updated CDC guidelines state that people who have tested positive for COVID-19 should stay home for five days, regardless of vaccination status.

“If you do not have symptoms or your symptoms are resolving after five days, you can leave your house but should continue to wear a mask in public places as per the Washington mandate,” Davies states.

They also recommend that those exposed to someone positive and are unvaccinated, or vaccinated over 6 months ago, should stay home for five days and wear a mask around others, and to get tested on the 5th day.

The original CDC guideline for a 10-day quarantine will

stay in place for congregant settings like food-processing facilities, warehouses, homeless shelters, correctional facilities, transitional housing, temporary worker housing, schools and childcare, factories, and institutions for higher education.

“We are in a precarious point of the COVID pandemic, but I want to stress that this is also a time of opportunity,” Davies said. “We as a community can choose to come together quickly and work towards lessening the strain of Omicron on our families, each other, and our healthcare system.”

Recommendations on slowing the transmission of Omicron include the following:

- If tested positive, stay home for 5 days.
- If you feel symptoms and can’t get tested, quarantine and assume you have Omicron
- If symptoms are less severe, still follow through with isolation.
- If you are high-risk or immuno-compromised, do your best to protect yourself.
- Wear a mask in public places and when socializing with people outside of your household.

Categories for additional funding include Heads in Beds, which will be used for promotional activities or events that help increase hotel accommodation (marketing, promotion, volunteer support), and Operational Support, which summarizes the purpose of funding and how it can be used to “attract tourism, sportsmanship, cultural exchanges, and/or promotion of our city.”

Use of funds can include operations, maintenance, capital investments, staffing,

and insurance. The grant money will be prioritized to those who have a diverse array of funding already established

The minimum amount grant request is \$4,000, and maximum grant amount being \$10,000. Grant funding will be used in 2022 and can be extended if needed.

If you are dreaming about an outdoors adventure, the aisles of these shows are great places to roam. This year there are a couple of date changes for some annual shows and a couple of cancellations too.

CENTRAL WASHINGTON SHOWS - Starting off with the cancellations, both the Central Washington Sportsmen's Show in Yakima and the Wenatchee Valley Sportsmen's Show at the Town Toyota Center have been cancelled this year due to covid related issues.

Fortunately, the Tri-Cities Sportsmen's Show will be taking place at the Hapo Center in Pasco. The dates for this popular regional show are January 21st through the 23rd. In addition to seminars, exhibitors and lots of activities for the kids the feature attraction will be the All Star Stunt Dogs who will be performing all sorts of high energy tricks.
