William "Bill" Forhan March 20, 1947 - November 21, 2021 Leavenworth, Washington



William "Bill" Edward Forhan, age 74, passed away suddenly at his home in Leavenworth, WA. on Sunday, November 21, 2021.

Born on March 20, 1947, in Butte, Mont. to Rudi and Alice (Mehrens) Forhan. He attended and graduated in 1965 from Butte High School where he met his wife, Carol, as a freshman. Graduated from the University of Montana, Missoula, in 1969 with a degree in Business Administration. Bill served in the Army ROTC in college, then was stationed at the Field Artillery Training Command at Fort Sill, Okla. where he earned the rank of First Lieutenant. He was then deployed to West Germany as a battery commander with the 4th Missile Battalion, 41st Artillery Regiment during the Vietnam era.

After serving overseas, Bill became an Army Reserve Commissioned Officer at Fort Carson, Colo., while working as a CPA in Denver, Colo. From Colorado the family moved to Davenport, Iowa where he worked as Controller for ITT Company and Carlon Plastics. He then accepted a job as the controller for The Billings Gazette in Billings, Mont. In 1992, Bill became the controller for the Antelope Valley Press in Palmdale, Calif. In 2000, he and Carol became the owners of Prairie Media - NCW Media, Inc. which currently publishes The Leavenworth Echo, Cashmere Valley Record, Lake Chelan Mirror, Wenatchee Business Journal, Quad City Herald, The Sonnenschein auf Leavenworth, and The Lake Chelan Visitor Guides

Also, previously owned and published the Okanogan Valley Gazette Tribune. Bill authored his first book, The Contract: Unveiling the Healing Power of Forgiveness, in 2021, a Christian fiction story about three families and their intertwined journeys. He had begun writing a second book before his sudden passing.

Bill was an active member of his community and volunteered with numerous local organizations including Leavenworth Rotary, former president; Leavenworth Chamber of Commerce, former president; Leavenworth Christmas Lighting Festival as the character St. Nicholas; Wash. State Autumn Leaf Festival Assoc., former president and former First Gentleman with Carol as the Royal Lady of The Autumn Leaves in 2016; The Wash. Newspaper Publishers Assoc., former president; St. James Episcopal Church, member and lead musician; and the Cashmere Chamber of Commerce as a current board member. Bill was a vocal and passionate conservative, he loved God and was a man of deep faith. He taught friends and family countless card games, including his favorite game, Bridge. He shared his love for camping, fishing, hunting, and golfing with his children and grandchildren. Bill will be remembered for many things,

but our favorite memories include his appreciation of good coffee, red wine, the Denver Broncos, and his famous afternoon power naps.

Bill is survived by his wife of 54 years, Carol (Johnson) Forhan; their sons David (Britney Nielson) Forhan of Olympia, Wash., and Michael (Amber) Forhan of Bremerton, Wash; his sister Gayle (Dale) Schendzielos of Casa Grande, Ariz., his sister Diane Forhan DuBose of Murfreesboro, Tenn., and brother Ed (Cami) Forhan of Clayton, Calif.; grandchildren Myla, Ronan, Lorelai, Aydin, and Zynnia, and many cousins, nieces and nephews. Bill was preceded in death by his father Rudi and his mother Alice.

There will be a memorial service at a date to be determined in Cashmere, Wash. A private family interment is being planned for next summer. You are invited to view Bill's online tribute at www. State Supreme Court Will Decide New District Maps After Missed Deadline

The Washington State Redistricting Commission failed to submit revised Legislative and Congressional District maps by their Nov. 15 deadline. Ultimately, the final decision now will be up to the State Supreme Court to redraw the districts by April 30, 2022. The Bipartisan Redistricting

Commission was established in

1990 and meets once every 10 years after the Federal census to redraw the legislative district boundaries. They are to map out and approve boundary lines for 10 congressional districts and 49 legislative districts. The commission consists of two democratic members and two republican members to ensure a bipartisan map. This is the first time that the nonpartisan board has missed the Nov. 15 deadline.

According to the Spokesman Review, the Commission seemed to have initially made a vote on the maps before the midnight deadline. However, a statement was released on Nov. 16 that they had missed the deadline, legally requiring them to hand over the decision to the State

The school board meeting on November 22 began with a moment of silence for Andrea Sorensen and her family. Sorensen, a 2018 Cascade High School graduate, passed away recently, and her mother, Carrie Sorensen, was a past school board member.

During the public comment period, parent Beth Fry shared thoughts encouraging the school board to have an open discussion and critical thinking about the risks and benefits of vaccinating young children.

The board and Beckendorf-Edou all

took turns thanking Cindy Puckett for her eight-year tenure on the school board, which concluded with this meeting. School board member Cyndi Garza appreciated how Puckett mentored her when she was new on the board. Puckett's unique perspective and heart for children and their safety were lauded.

"I've learned a lot," said Puckett. "We've made a great team."

Next, the board heard a presentation from Alpine Lakes Elementary (ALPS) principal, Kenny Renner-Singer. He began by mentioning that ALPS has had an AVID (Advancement Via Individual Determination) program for four years, following the success of the AVID programs at the high school and middle school. AVID at ALPS instills a college and career going culture, and focuses on critical reading, notetaking and organization skills.

Celebrate Christmas with the Leavenworth Village Voices

A Leavenworth Village Voices' (LVV) Christmas concert must top your itinerary this Christmas season, whether you are a long-time local or visiting Leavenworth for that quintessential Christmas experience. The 2021 concert series is even more meaningful after the cancellations of live performances and Christmas festivities last year due to COVID-19. The community choir is back, strong, and eager to perform!

LVV made excellent use of its performing hiatus last year to renew, refresh, and rebuild. New director Mindy Wall has added to the excitement of getting back together to sing this past summer. Wall is director of Cascade School District's high school and middle school programs and is an accomplished musician and mezzo-soprano. She brings fresh vision and dynamism to the group.

"Mindy is raising the bar beyond where we thought we could go," says LVV President



Richard Tabbutt. "She is finetuning our performance so we have a tighter, more polished, more professional sound." Her goal, Wall says, is to work hard in rehearsals so that choir members can have just as much fun as the audience during performances.

Wall has placed a priority on performing with only live accompaniments, a challenge accepted by LVV alto and pianist Susan Butruille. Wall and Butruille work brilliantly together, having collaborated in the school district's music program. Wall has also challenged the choir by including a cappella arrangements in this year's program.

LVV gained several new members from the community in its year off, and launched a new website with the help of the City of Leavenworth's Tourism and Hospitality Grant. The website has all the information you need about purchasing tickets, joining the choir, sponsoring the group, or applying to its student scholarship. Check it out at LeavenworthVillageVoices.org.

As if 2021 hasn't been exciting enough for the group, LVV had a rare opportunity this summer to sing in a recording session for Grammy Award-winning songwriter and producer Ryan Lewis, of Macklemore & Ryan Lewis fame. The choir contributed to about a dozen songs for a variety of artists and genres, including Macklemore, Kesha, and a true crime podcast. LVV can be heard singing back-up on the chorus of Macklemore's new single, "Next Year."

This Christmas season there are even more opportunities to catch an LVV concert. The choir added two additional concert dates to its busy performance schedule, including a Sunday matinee at the Snowy Owl Theater, Icicle Creek Center for the Arts on December 5, and a weeknight performance at Cascade High School on December 15-aimed at locals who prefer to not fight the weekend traffic. Three concerts will take place at the Leavenworth Church of the Nazarene, on December 10, 12, and 17.

In addition to its choral pieces, LVV concerts feature talented local artists, including the Bavarian Brass, Steve Morton on piano, and the LVV Women's Ensemble. An audience favorite is the tradition of closing each concert with a sing-along of Handel's "Hallelujah" chorus from "Messiah."

Like other performing arts organizations, the pandemic

has had a significant impact on LVV and its members have been working tirelessly to come back stronger than before. The choir is reaching out to sponsors and applying for grants to ensure the nonprofit organization is financially healthy and positioned to thrive for years to come. Next year, LVV will celebrate 40 years of performing: an important milestone they want to reach so future generations of singers and listeners can experience the joy of music and Christmas in Leavenworth.

This season's concert series will be festive as well as safe. All performers are vaccinated and like other indoor venues, the audience will be required to wear masks. Based on the current numbers of COVID cases in the area and guidance from healthcare authorities, choir members likely will have to be masked for performances. the audience can't see smiling faces, one can "hear" when a singer is smiling: and these singers will be!

The first two presentations for each will be made during regular PUD commission study sessions that begin at 10 a.m. in the boardroom at 327 N. Wenatchee Ave. The hearings will be at 1 p.m. during a commission business meeting at the same location.

Frazier Strutzel **Presents His New Book** "Anna Mehelich"

Frazier Strutzel is typing away on his keyboard in the middle of the night. All of a sudden, it feels as if a warm hand is tenderly placed on his shoulder. He smiles knowing that his grandmother is watching him give her story life again.

"I wanted to tell her story," Strutzel said. "She accomplished so much."

For over 13 years, Strutzel has been writing and rewriting the story of his Slovenien grandmother Anna Mehelich (originally spelled Mihelich)

They Found" will encapsulate the geological landscape of the region, the beginning of indigenous civilization, the fur trade, tribal wars, and goldrush settlers.

"People say 'where do you get all this stuff," he jokes and says "I just make it up. That's not true, but it's an easy answer.

Initially, the book was meant to be based on Wenatchee Valley history. He concluded

and her sisters as they trek across the American west.

"She was held in high esteem by her daughter-in-laws and the rest of the community of Monitor in the 40s. I remember alot of people had a lot of respect for her in Monitor and Wenatchee, and Cashmere."

The Mehelich family first arrived in New York before subsequently leaving for Northern Minnesota, moving to Butte, Montana in 1890, and then settled in Monitor, Washington in 1907.

"All immigrants I think, no matter what area of the world they come here from, probably can associate with alot of what went on in 1880s-90s, early 1900s, to become a part of what is now America."

His book also captures the early history of Minnesota iron-mining and Wenatchee orchard businesses in the early 20th century, with a particular focus on the Strutzel Orchard.

"Even though she was limited with her English, she ended up being the largest apple orchard owner from 1929-1939," Strutzel remarked. "The old saying was 'the men who won the west,' but in my opinion it was the women who won the west. They're the ones who did the work, the work that counted for the civilization."

LONG LAKE TROUT FISHING

I received a unique invitation last week to go trout fishing at a lake that doesn't get a whole lot of press. The body of water in question is Long Lake, also known as Spokane Lake, an 18-mile reservoir northwest of Spokane bordered by Long Lake Dam and Nine Mile Falls Dam.

The crew at Mack's Lure extended this invite to me and going on the trip was the President and CEO himself, Bob Schmidt. Our guide was going to be Steve Morris, the owner of SJM Guide Service. Also coming along was Mack's Pro-Staffer Eric Magnuson, who hails from Spokane and Justin Wolff, a fellow outdoors media professional who is the host and producer of Angler West TV.

We all met at the boat ramp at the south end of the reservoir at 8 AM on a morning that greeted us with a mix of snow and rain. Morris explained we'd be traveling ten miles up lake in his open boat to get

to where the majority of the trout are located at this time of year and I was very glad I was wearing a thick jacket and sweater underneath my rain gear

The lower part of the reservoir was lined with a mix of full-time residential homes and summer cabins but opened up to a more pastoral and wooded setting as we reached the fishing grounds. Morris explained the trout we were after were fast growing, sterile triploid rainbow trout that had been planted in the lake. Morris further explained we would be fishing close to the surface and he expected the fishing to be fast and furious, even with just three rods out.

Morris had two rods on downriggers on each side of the boat and the third was in the back of the boat going a little deeper with lead core line. Morris maintained a trolling speed of 1.8 to 2.2 MPH.

Our guide's prediction of hot fishing on this cold morning was spot on. The lures were being bit within minutes of being put into the water and several strikes occurred before

we could even get the rods into the rod holders. Within 90 minutes we had 18 healthy rainbow trout in the boat and had probably ten more fish on that came off before we could net them. The fish were all bright and measured 13 to 17 inches.

We were exclusively using lures and tackle from Mack's Lure. The hot color? According to Morris, any color at all works this time of year here as long as its orange. Everything we used caught trout but what worked best was an orange Pee Wee Wiggle Hoochie with a plastic bill that gave it great action similar to a crankbait. This lure was fished behind a 4.4inch dodger on a short two-foot leader. hooks were modified on the lure for a shorter strike distance and tipped with orange died shoe peg corn. A Mack's Lure Flashlight Troll, consisting of two large mylar blades and beads, was used as a lightweight attractor. This set up on the lead core line not only caught lots of trout but also the biggest trout of the day.

I was definitely impressed by the quality of this little-known

trout fishery. Morris told me he'll be guiding on Long Lake into mid-December, at which point dropping water levels will prevent anyone from using the boat launches on the reservoir. After that SJM Guide Service will be offering winter trips for trout and kokanee on nearby Lake Roosevelt, that huge impoundment of the Columbia River known for the large size and quantity of both species caught during the winter months.

Both ALPS and PD have benefited from participating in the Youth Art Initiative (supported by the Methow Arts Alliance and Icicle Fund), which brings artists in residency to the schools weekly to work with students. Artists Amber Zimmerman and Laurie Smart teach at ALPS and PD, respectively.

Outdoor learning has been especially embraced during COVID. ALES students get outside when they do field days with Wenatchee River Institute (which has been in partnership with the district for years), for classroom activities including writing, art and nature walks, and during lunch and recess. "Some of the best social learning happens at recess," said Renner-Singer, also citing the benefits of relationshipbuilding and exercise.

Under personnel, the school board approved hires and resignations, including the hire of ALPS bilingual secretary, Jocelyn Silva. With this hire, the district now has a bilingual secretary at every school, which greatly improves the opportunities for engagement with Spanish-speaking families.

During policy review there was a brief discussion about the first reading of Policy and Procedure 6580, Continuity of Operations Plan. Beckendorf-Edou explained that the district already has an emergency operation plan. This new plan, required by the state, would

process for a timely and orderly return to normal. Teresa Disher, district facilities director, gave an update about the school meals now that weather is turning colder. Students continue to eat outside entirely at the elementary schools, which have been given six tall propane heaters each to use at lunch time under the covered areas. The heat source is high, so there's no risk to students getting hurt. The heaters are stored in an outbuilding and will be used on days when the temperature is between 10 and 40°F. Six-foot-high tarp fencing will be added to ³/₄ of the sides to help with insulation from wind and precipitation. IRMS and CHS do not have heaters because students can spread out more both inside their large cafeterias and outside, so there's a daily option for students to warm up.

"The highest COVID danger is during meals and through athletics," said Beckendorf-Edou. "With outdoor eating, we've had zero spread." If the winter temperatures require students to come inside, the lunch logistics will change, and schools are planning for that scenario.

choosing IRMS, which was given high marks for compliance with USDA standards, excellent documentation, and the auditors were impressed with the scratch cooking emphasized by food services director Colin Levi.

Disher shared an update about an issue with water rights in Dryden, where the district has the varsity softball fields. Water rights may be denied in the future due to a compliance problem of the PUD with the Department of Ecology. The school district is one of several water rights holders affected who have agreements with the PUD. There's a two-year timeframe to figure out a solution, and Disher plans to look through older documentation, since the district used to have a school in Dryden, that will hopefully allow for a continuation of irrigation of those softball fields.

For the good of the order, Beckendorf-Edou shared that the PD/ALPS PTO, partnering with Mike West Realty, distributed 36 bags of warm winter clothing to students in need recently. Also, the school board members, superintendent and soonto-be-sworn-in new member Mike Worden all attended the Washington State School **Directors Association (WSSDA)** conference in Bellevue, which is an opportunity to learn and collaborate. Trey Ising, school board chair, was again selected to serve as chair of the WSSDA resolution committee.

Hawkins said. "North Central Washington has a long, proud history of cooperative work across the two counties."

"I know it makes the district slightly more competitive, but I think it is at the loss of keeping the communities together." Moore said.

"I think one of the most disappointing things I heard in the press conference following the release of the maps was that there's basically been a trade where Republicans got to draw Eastern Washington and the democratic commissioners got to draw Western Washington," Moore said.

"I think that really violates the spirit of a bipartisan commission in which politics should stay out of electoral politics, that we should stay out of districting/ redistricting process."

One of the goals of the Commission was to keep the Yakama Nation intact and to retain what they call a minority/ majority district in Yakima. The Commission hoped to elevate the voting representation of People of Color (POC) in each district by drawing regions that are balanced in POC populace.

According to Crosscut, many have criticized this decision as inconsistent with the Voting Rights Act, failing to figure in the population of the voting-age Latino population rather than the total Latino population in Yakima. Republicans also raised questions as to whether racially motivated districting decisions violate the Equal Protection Act.

Moore feels that the new map does not agree with the Commission's own goals. "It didn't seem like it met those criteria and some of the information that has come out afterwards around the Yakima valley region seems to point to not meeting both the recommendations or the hope of having, districts of minority/ majority districts and building better cohesion for tribal communities."

Moore added that the Colville Confederated tribe had advocated for their districts not to change and that they were okay with the split.

The State Supreme Court has three options. They can either approve the final map that redistricting commissioners tried to finalize; make adjustment to the proposed map; or open the process up for public comments and start all over again.

"I think not being able to develop communities that were in the best interest of the people rather than in the best interests of the parties is a loss for all of us," Moore concluded. "I think we could and should do better."
