

Council hears presentation from Leavenworth Chamber



The story of how Leavenworth became one of the major attractions in Washington State is often forgotten in the day-to-day effort to manage our success. It was only a little over a half century ago that the city was in danger of collapsing with the shut down of the Lumber mill and the pullout of the railroad.

The last two years have been trying for most of our local businesses but amazingly despite the Pandemic our tourism economy continues to function better than most expected. With all of that in mind the city council heard a presentation from the Leavenworth Chamber of Commerce about how they plan to use the lodging tax funds to promote tourism in the year ahead.

The Chamber of Commerce operates the visitor center and manages the advertising budget under contract with the city. Funds for advertising and promotion are created by Lodging Tax collected from the lodging facilities located within the city. Under state law lodging taxes must be used to promote or support tourism activities in the community where they are collected. Leavenworth

currently collects approximately \$2.3 million per year in lodging taxes. Some of those funds go to support parks and to pay off the bonds to build the Festhalle and the Amtrak Station. The Leavenworth Chamber

presented their proposed advertising budget for 2022 at the Nov. 9 Study Session. The presentation began with the Leavenworth Area Promotions group's mission statement, "Our mission is to maintain Leavenworth's long-term success through promotion and foster our community's vibrancy through tourism.

The presentation goes on to say their target market is the Pacific Northwest. What they call the "Drive Market." Their goal for 2022 is to target their advertising message toward people who can stay longer.

In 2021 the committee focused on building a new website, creating new video, revising 2020 campaigns in light of the Pandemic, and acquiring competition - namely, Leavenworth. com and VisitLeavenworth.com.

According to their report, Lodging tax receipts are expected to be up 42 percent over 2020 this year which is 25 percent above the pre-Pandemic year of 2019. This is on a reduced advertising budget of \$600,000 for 2021, down by 17 percent from 2020.

Since Lodging tax receipts for the fourth quarter of 2021 won't be available until the spring of 2022, the accuracy of the 2021 total receipts cannot be judged at this point. The fourth Quarter includes

Adventure Park Starts Construction and Faces Supply-Chain Issues

Yet, many community members still reject the park development plans, due to its uncomfortably close proximity to residential areas near the intersection of Icicle Road and US HWY. 2. "I hear it all the time walking through the streets. People see this happening saying 'how in the world did this ever get approved?" Friends of Leavenworth Chairman Duane Goehner remarked. "We are really supportive of the idea of a familyoriented activity, but its location is what has always been a sticking point for the people of the community.' Goehner notes that out of the approximately 200 people who appealed to the hearing examiner regarding the Adventure Park Conditional Use Permit, (https:// www.leavenworthecho.com/news/ adventure-park-debate-comes-peak), only a handful of people supported the idea. "All the rest were saying 'this is the stupidest idea,' 'this is dumb,' 'these are the impacts," Goehner said. "You can kind of extrapolate the number from that. From the hearing it was very clear that pretty much close to 95% of the people who were at that hearing were opposed to the Adventure Park." Sutherland thinks that the percentage of community disapproval is not nearly as high as Goehner claims.

Diane Blake Now at Helm of Washington **State Hospital** Association

On October 28th, Diane Blake, CEO of Cascade Medical (CM), became chair of Washington State Hospital Association (WSHA), whose membership of almost 100 includes every hospital in the state. She was elected by the full membership, as every hospital gets one vote.

This impressive accomplishment says a lot about Blake's leadership and vision. CM is a relatively small rural hospital compared to other vast medical entities, like past WSHA chair Bill Robertson's company, Multicare, a system of eight hospitals and numerous smaller clinics.

"There's a real spirit of collaboration," said Blake about WSHA, which differs from associations in other states that have only partial membership. "Big or small, rural or urban, we all share a mission of taking care of patients and communities."

Blake will hold the chair position for one year, though it's part of a fouryear track on the executive committee. Previously she has been the secretarytreasurer and then chair-elect (and in 2023 she'll be past chair). She will lead both the executive and general board meetings, and she'll have expanded responsibilities during the legislative session, advocating for policy and informing political leaders about issues relevant to hospitals.

WSHA's mission is to be "the trusted voice and indispensable resource that leads, challenges and assists hospitals and health systems to improve health of the communities they serve."

WSHA has divided its strategic plan

foundation work for the site. But plans are further delayed due to supplychain issues, with two containers of coaster parts still sitting in Seattle.

After years of debates, petitions, and revised proposals, the Chelan County court finally gave Adventure Park the greenlight to continue the project on Jan. 21, 2020.

have taken residential concerns into consideration, which included changing the entrance location and closing the park at 8 p.m.

"Those elements, we feel like because of our involvement, we have made a difference," Goehner said. "Going forward, we can't remove it but we can continue to keep a watchful eye on it, to make sure that the conditions that were placed on it by the hearing examiner's decision are fulfilled."

Development Services Manager Lilith Vespier states that the construction process will address any concerns that people may have along the way.

"I think there is a lot of people who support it, I also know that there is a fair number who have quite a bit of anxiety about it. We hope through the construction process and building and operations, once they open up, that the community [and] concerns will be resolved or show themselves to have been resolved."

Sutherland describes his own optimism for the project and hopes to be finished by the fall of 2022.

The park will include an Alpine Coaster, a climbing wall, a bungee trampoline, a mining area for kids, and a lodge area, along with the addition of a Via Ferrata "iron way" type of rock climbing course.

no competition around this," Blake said. Rather, there are shared strategies and an ability to review unblinded data, so hospitals can learn from each other.

She looks forward to this next year of leadership, "To advocate and work for the needs of the whole," she said. As for a current pressing issue, Blake said, "Equity of care is near and dear to my heart."

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Biden Threatens Action Against Nicaragua After Socialist Ortega Wins Election

JACK PHILLIPS

The Biden administration threatened sanctions against Nicaragua after longtime leader Daniel Ortega secured a fourth term in an election that observers say was a sham.

In statements released by the White House, President Joe Biden said Ortega, a former Marxist guerrilla fighter, and Ortega's wife and running mate— Rosario Murillo-"orchestrated" a "pantomime election that was neither free nor fair, and most certainly not democratic."

"The arbitrary imprisonment of nearly 40 opposition figures since May, including seven potential presidential candidates, and the blocking of political parties from participation rigged the outcome well before Election Day," Biden's statement reads. "They shuttered independent media, locked up journalists and members of the private sector, and bullied civil society organizations into closing their doors."

Secretary of State Antony Blinken, meanwhile, said that the United States will use a variety of tactics to place pressure on the Ortega government.

"We will continue to use diplomacy, coordinated actions with regional allies and partners, sanctions, and visa

restrictions, as appropriate, to promote accountability for those complicit in supporting the Ortega-Murillo government's undemocratic acts," he said on Nov. 8.

Several unidentified U.S. officials

told Reuters last week that the Biden administration is already preparing sanctions against Ortega, Murillo, and other top Nicaraguan officials. And days before that, the House of Representatives, by a 387-35 vote, approved a measure that would implement more sanctions.

The Biden administration appears to be following a similar script as the Trump administration in dealing with Latin American regimes.

Former President Donald Trump placed Venezuela under significant sanctions after saying socialist leader Nicolas Maduro engaged in election fraud to keep himself in power, and the United States recognized opposition leader Juan Guaido as president of Venezuela.

Following Ortega's victory, Russian officials said they would stand behind him and told the United States to recognize the election results.

"As far as I understand, just yesterday in the evening, when the voting was over, the White House declared its refusal to recognize the election and called on other countries to do the same. We consider it inadmissible and strongly condemn such a policy," Russian Foreign Minister Sergey Lavrov said on Nov. 8, according to the TASS news agency.

Nicaragua's Supreme Electoral Council said that with nearly all the ballots counted, Ortega had won more than 75 percent of the vote. The outcome was never in doubt after his government jailed seven of the leading potential opposition candidates, clearing the field for Ortega to sweep to a fourth consecutive five-year term.

10 States Sue Biden Over COVID-19 Vaccine Mandate for Health Care Workers

A coalition of 10 states led by Missouri's attorney general on Nov. 10 sued President Joe Biden over his administration's COVID-19 vaccine mandate for health care workers.

A federal court has blocked, for now, the administration's private employer vaccine mandate, although a stricter one focused on health care workers remains in place.

The health care worker mandate, which covers more than 17 million nurses and others, doesn't include a testing opt-out.

The coalition says the mandate is

"Vaccination requirements are matters that depends on local factors and conditions. Whatever might make sense in New York City, St Louis, or Omaha could be decidedly counterproductive and harmful in rural communities like Memphis, Missouri or McCook, Nebraska," the 58-page filing in federal court in Missouri states.

"Federalism allows states to tailor such matters in the best interests of their communities. The heavy hand of CMS's nationwide mandate does not. This court should thus set aside that rule as unlawful agency action under the Administrative Procedure Act."

The mandate is poised to exacer-

Doug Peterson, and Alaska Attorney General Treg Taylor filed the suit along with the attorneys general of Arkansas, Kansas, Iowa, Wyoming, South Dakota, North Dakota, and New Hampshire. All are Republicans.

The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Service (CMS), the agency that issued the rule, and the White House didn't immediately return requests for comment on the lawsuit.

The Biden administration asserts that the mandate will curb the transmission and spread of COVID-19, the disease caused by the CCP virus. The rule acknowledges that many health care workers have recovered from COVID-19 and have some level of immunity as a result. But, citing a Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) study that was challenged by some scientists, CMS says natural immunity isn't allowed as an

alternative to vaccination.

CDC officials have acknowledged natural immunity exists but say even those with it can benefit from vaccination. A number of health experts share the view, but a host of others say vaccination isn't necessary among the recovered.

CMS officials say the agency has the legal authority to issue a vaccine mandate through several sections of the Social Security Act, though the rule notes that CMS has never required vaccinations before.

Health care facilities that don't comply with the mandate face a series of penalties, including fines. They could be ousted from Medicare and Medicaid programs, a senior administration official told reporters on a call last week.

One official later explained why there's not a testing opt-out, a major difference between the rule and the private employer mandate.

Durham Investigation: Main 'Steele Dossier' Source Pleads Not Guilty to Lying to FBI

Federal prosecutors said Steele had relied heavily on Danchenko in order to obtain information about some of the allegations contained in the dossier.

A former Brookings Institution Russian analyst accused of providing false information in the controversial and widely discredited Steele dossier entered a plea of not guilty days after he was indicted by special prosecutor John Durham.

Igor Danchenko pleaded not guilty to five counts of making false statements to the FBI, entering his plea before Judge Anthony John Trenga in the U.S. District Court for the Eastern District of Virginia on Nov. 10, according to reporters on the scene.

After his arrest last week, Danchenko was released on a \$100,000 bond. During the Nov. 10 court hearing, Trenga ordered Danchenko to remain free on bond and scheduled a preliminary trial date of April 18, 2022.

Danchenko, 43, was charged as part of Durham's wide-ranging probe into the origins of the Trump-Russia investigation. Danchenko stands accused of lying to the FBI about claims that he provided to former UK spy Christopher Steele, who constructed the Steele dossier.

In turn, the dossier—a collection of opposition research notes that included numerous unproven claims, much of which later turned out to be falsebecame the basis for an FBI surveillance campaign into then-presidential candidate Donald Trump's campaign

and former Trump aide Carter Page, starting in October 2016. The agency, which utilized Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act (FISA) warrants to spy on Page, subsequently renewed the applications multiple times.

Steele had been hired by investigative company FusionGPS, which had in turn been hired by high-powered law firm Perkins Coie, which had retained the Democratic National Committee and then-presidential candidate Hillary Clinton as clients during the 2016 election.

Federal prosecutors said Steele had relied heavily on Danchenko in order to obtain information about some of the allegations contained in the dossier. They are accusing him of lying to federal law enforcement about the sources of information he provided to Steele, which was included in the dossier, and making five false statements to the FBI between March and November 2017.

The indictment alleges that Danchenko lied about obtaining information from Charles Dolan Jr., a Democratic public relations executive who had business ties in Russia. An attorney for Dolan told The Epoch Times last week that he's a witness in the case, and he wouldn't comment further.

Durham's team said Danchenko falsified a conversation that he claimed was the source of a salacious accusation contained in the dossier about Trump and a hotel room. According to the indictment, that allegation may have come from Dolan, who toured a hotel suite in 2016 that was once occupied by Trump. Prosecutors said that Danchenko lied when he told the FBI and Steele that the allegation came from the head of the U.S. Russian-American Chamber of Commerce.

Dolan also told Danchenko that he had obtained intelligence on Trump's campaign about alleged tensions regarding former campaign manager Paul Manafort's role from a Republican friend, according to the indictment. However, he actually based that information on public news reports. During the Nov. 10 court hearing,

prosecutors told Trenga that the next

step will be the discovery phase, noting that they hope to share materials with the defense soon. A "vast amount of classified information" needs to be reviewed as well, they said.

Last week, an attorney representing Danchenko accused Durham and his team of presenting a "false narrative" about his client.

"For the past five years, those with an agenda have sought to expose Mr. Danchenko's identity and tarnish his reputation while undermining U.S. National Security," Mark Schamel, Danchenko's attorney, said in a statement. "From the moment he was inappropriately revealed, he has been the focus of unrelenting politically motivated attacks. This latest injustice will not stand. We will expose how Mr. Danchenko has been unfairly maligned by these false allegations."

In September, Durham's team charged Michael Sussmann, a Perkins Coie attorney, of lying to the FBI when he spoke with former general counsel James Baker in order to provide him with information about Trump's campaign and claiming that wasn't doing so on behalf of Clinton's campaign. Sussmann, through his attorneys, has denied the charge.

Food Inflation Weighs on US Households as Prices Soar in October

The U.S. annual inflation rate surged in October at its fastest pace in 31 years, driven by skyrocketing food and energy prices. Staples found in kitchens across the country were more expensive, weighing on families' monthly or weekly grocery budgets.

On the protein front, beef and veal prices increased 20.1 percent yearover-year. Pork cost 14.1 percent more, while ham prices rose 7.1 percent. The cost of chicken jumped by 8.8 percent; fish and seafood by 7.5 percent; and eggs by 11.6 percent.

The fruits and vegetables index rose at an annualized rate of 3 percent. Within this category, apples cost 6.7 percent more; bananas, 2.9 percent; potatoes, 1.7 percent; and citrus fruits, 3.7 percent.

Coffee, consumed by seven in 10 Americans, cost 4.7 percent more in the 12 months ending in October. Roasted coffee prices rose by 5.6 percent, while instant rose a modest 1.2 percent.

Nearly every food item, from white bread to margarine to salad dressing, became costlier for consumers.

Eating at a local restaurant or coffee shop is just as expensive for Americans. The food away from home index was 5.3 percent higher than it was at this time in 2020.

Is Relief Coming to Supermarkets?

The Federal Reserve and White House insist that inflation is transitory, despite trending at its highest level in three decades. Could higher supermarket and restaurant prices linger into 2022?

"It looks like it's going to continue for a while," Phillip Streible, chief market strategist at Blue Line Futures, told The Epoch Times, adding that the supply chain crisis and adverse weather conditions impacting many crops are driving up food prices.

This year, the commodities market has been booming, Streible said, fueled by a broad range of factors, such as record-high fertilizer prices, tightening inventories, and output

failing to satisfy demand. Sugar is up 29 percent, wheat has rallied 27 percent, corn has gained 18 percent, and cattle has surged 18 percent.

The fertilizer crisis could trigger upward pressure on the chief staple crops such as rice and wheat. Nutrien Ltd. and Mosaic Co., two of the world's largest fertilizer producers, anticipate a prolonged price surge that could affect nearly everything on dinner plates.

The U.S. Chamber of Commerce suggested that food inflation could persist until these four factors subside: the labor shortage, supply chain disruptions, the energy crisis, and higher wages.

"Anyone who has purchased food lately knows that food prices are rising and rising pretty sharply," noted Curtis Dubay, senior economist for the U.S. Chamber of Commerce.

In the energy sector, there has been a decline in capital expenditures and investment. In the food industry, meat-packing plants are catching up

on the backlog inventory, requiring employees to work weekends.

"They're running extra shifts on Saturdays [and] Sundays, and people aren't willing to do that for free," stated Jayson Lusk, head of the Department of Agricultural Economics at Purdue University. "That's what it took and is taking to keep workers in those plants running close to full capacity."

But food distributor Sysco Corp., which recently recorded product cost inflation of roughly 13 percent, predicts that sky-high inflation levels will moderate by the fourth quarter of the fiscal year 2022. The Houston-based company is anticipated to pass these higher costs on to its customers.

Streible is also forecasting food deflation sometime in the second quarter of 2022, citing excess inventories, an easing of the supply chain bottleneck, and less-robust demand. Some market strategists assert that the data show inflation is looking like it is less transitory.

"More worryingly, it looks less and less transitory, because the rise is mostly due to the rise in cars prices, but also the rise in food prices (where you can argue it's volatile), the rise in energy prices (which could be temporary indeed, but the fact is that we have a growing energy crisis going on across the globe right now), and most worryingly, due to the rise in rents," Ipek Ozkardeskaya, a senior analyst at Swissquote, stated in a note.

"Higher rents and higher wages are factors that will make the rise in inflation stick around for longer, and at this point, we are really moving significantly away from the Fed's 2% average inflation target."

A Thanksgiving Tax for All Americans?

These market conditions will make this year's Thanksgiving feast more expensive, as most ingredients have risen considerably.

The American Farm Bureau estimates a Thanksgiving dinner that includes a turkey and various side dishes will cost as much as 5 percent more in 2021 than in 2020. For example, turkeys weighing as much as 16 pounds will cost 25 cents per pound more this year than last. Sauces and gravies are up 1.8 percent year-over-year.

"Just the cost of metal to put cranberries into a tin can has gone up," said Curt Covington, senior director of institutional credit at AgAmerica. "It's across the board and it's going to take the supply chain well past Thanksgiving and Christmas to get back to normal."

This could result in smaller holiday gatherings, says a new survey. A FinanceBuzz poll revealed that 63 percent of Americans expect rising food costs to impact their Thanksgiving dinner. Twenty-four percent noted they might need to cut back on food because of surging prices, while 21 percent plan to have fewer guests.

And Republicans, including Rep. Elise Stefanik (R-N.Y.), are utilizing these numbers to tie multi-year high inflation figures to President Joe Biden and the Democrats.

"This is Biden's #Thanksgiving-Tax," the House GOP wrote on Twitter on Nov. 9.

Despite soaring prices, Biden said Americans would prefer this Thanksgiving to last year's.

"But the bottom line is that I think that, and anyone who would prefer, as bad as things are in terms of prices, helping hurting families now, to trade this Thanksgiving for last Thanksgiving," the president told reporters during last week's press conference at the U.N.'s climate change summit in Glasgow, Scotland.

100 Volunteers Harvest 1,000 Acres of Land for Grieving Family After Farmer's Tragic Death

More than 100 members of a tightknit Iowa farming community came together after losing one of their own to harvest the crops he left behind.

Cole Vanatta, who managed more than 2,000 acres of row crops just south of Tabor, Iowa, with his father and grandfather, sustained a farming injury on Sept. 9 and died two days later. He was 36 years old and is survived by his wife and three children.

"He and his father, Tom, 62, and his grandfather Wayne, 93, all still worked together; it's a family farm," Vanatta's brother-in-law, Daniel Morse, told The Epoch Times. "They were just getting ready for harvest, they were prepping the land, they were prepping the equipment, and the accident happened."

Explaining the accident, Morse said the trio were trimming trees to clear a path for farm machinery when a tree limb snagged.

"Something that they take for granted, they do all the time, just went incredibly wrong that day," he said.

In the wake of the tragedy, the farming community rallied together to pay their respects to Vanatta in the most fitting way, by helping to harvest the corn and soybean crops that he had tended.

"A local farmer—a neighbor and a friend of ours-put a simple post on Facebook and said, 'Hey, we're going to get together, we're going to honor Cole one last time," said Morse, who works as a Tabor city firefighter. "They had well over 100 people show up."

The industrious group covered 1,000 acres in just two 10-to-12-hour workdays, starting on a Friday at 7 a.m. and finishing around 8 p.m. the following day.

Together, they ran more than 20 combines to harvest corn and two or three for soybeans. Morse estimated the group's efforts reaped between 30 and 40 grain carts' worth of produce in total.

Witnessing the community come together, Vanatta's grieving wife, Shannon, was overwhelmed.

"They just said, 'I got this,' and took over. It's been great," the mom of three told WLWT 5. "I'll never be able to repay people for what they're doing today, but I'll try."

It wasn't just experienced farm-

ers who got involved, Morse said. "Wives, businesses, the whole community showed up. We had food donated from local restaurants, coffee houses bringing coffee, people catering breakfast ... multiple church groups."

Some had known Vanatta, but many

had not.

"Even if they weren't able to work in the field, they came in, they helped move stuff around, they dropped food off, they moved fuel barrels," he said. "We had one person, because it was cold in the morning, just run in and get new propane bottles so we in whatever way they could."

Even Vanatta's and Morse's children helped out. Morse hopes this heartwarming experience teaches his own kids that there are "things bigger than yourself" in life.

"Their uncle passed away, and that's sad, it's horrible," he said, "but at the same point, their community showed up to help, just to show what that person meant to them."

Vanatta, according to his brother-inlaw, was a polite man who always kept his cool and would give the shirt off his back to help another. He had a talent for fixing anything with an engine.

For Vanatta, his family meant evervthing.

"He spent his whole life working the land and trying to build something for his family," Morse said, "to keep a family legacy that he had going, and pass that on to the next generation."

Morse said the farming community has been supporting its members in times of need for years.

"A lot of times it goes unrecognized," he said. "Nobody's asking for recognition ... [but] it's happening on a regular basis and it's amazing to see these small communities come together and help each other out in that way.

"I'm trying to think of the right words, but that feeling that you're doing something bigger than yourself, for no other reason than it feels like the right thing to do, is something I think that we all need to take time to remember."

Property Tax



ADA Accessible Opportunities Outdoors

Until you become physically disabled, the concept of American Disabilities Act (ADA) accessibility is a little abstract. Sure, you leave those handicap parking spots available and make room on the ADA accessible fishing platforms for those who really need them, but once you need them yourself ADA accessibility becomes a very concrete reality.

It's a reality I discovered right after breaking my leg above the ankle during a camping trip in August. For the past three months I've really come to appreciate handicap parking stalls, ramps that accommodate scooters, doors that open with a button and the kindness of strangers who will hold a door open for you (because manhandling a heavy door and maneuvering through it on crutches is a not-so-fun adventure).

The biggest thing I've missed though is experiencing time in the outdoors. When you are literally limited to walking a few yards on crutches or in a walking boot ADA accessibility in the outdoors becomes a really big deal, especially if you are an angler, hunter or person who enjoys watching wildlife.

Fortunately, the Washington Department of Wildlife, Washington State Parks

and other government organizations have made great strides to provide ADA accessible opportunities on our public lands. There are dozens of ADA accessible places in Central and Eastern Washington providing those with limited mobility access to handicap friendly fishing platforms, hunting/wildlife watching blinds, natural history sites and even a shooting range. Here's a few examples of places you can visit, many of which are found on an interactive map available

at https://wdfw.wa.gov/ accessibility/map

Fishing:

There are numerous publicly ADA accessible fishing piers, platforms or accessible bank access around Central and Eastern Washington. Some of them of interest to our readers include

• South Central Washington – I-82 Pond #6, Clear Lake, Fiorito Ponds.

• Columbia Basin – Moses Lake (North Outlet), Canal Lake, Windmill Lake, Warden Lake, Burke Lake, Banks Lake (Coulee City Marina).

• North Central Washington – Pearrygin Lake, Bonaparte Lake, Roses Lake, Rock Island Ponds, Leavenworth National Fish Hatchery, Beebe Springs (juvenile only).

• Northeast Washington – Badger Lake, West Medical Lake, Liberty Lake, Big Meadow Lake, Lake Ellen, Canyon Creek.

Hunting/Wildlife Watching:

• The McNary National Wildlife Refuge has three blinds for waterfowl hunting or viewing that can be reserved in advance.

• In Grant County ADA accessible duck hunting blinds are reservable through WDFW at Rocky Ford Creek north of Moses Lake and the Frenchman Regulated Access Area off of Frenchman's Wasteway.

• Grant County PUD also has a hunting/wildlife viewing blind available with a dog door at the Buckshot Recreation Area off the Columbia River near Mattawa.

• The Sunnyside Wildlife Area has two new blinds in South Central Washington available on a first-come, first-serve basis with disabled hunters having priority.

• The Oak Creek Wildlife Area has an ADA accessible viewing platform allowing you to see elk up close during the winter.

History/Natural History:

• Columbia Hills State Park has an ADA accessible Native American petroglyph exhibit display at Horsethief Lake.

• Fort Simcoe and Sacajawea State Parks as well as Olmstead Place Historical State Park and the Steptoe Battlefield State Park Heritage Site all have ADA Accessible trails allowing you to soak in the history of these places.

• Palouse Falls State Park has ADA accessible viewing platforms and paths to take in the views of the waterfall

State Parks

• Just about all of Washington's State Parks with campgrounds have ADA accessible restrooms and many have ADA accessible trails, campsites and picnic areas as well.

Shooting Range:

• The new Sheep Creek Company Road Shooting Range in the Wenas Wildlife Area has ADA facilities.

If you suffer from a permanent disability, you may be eligible for disability status that allows you to purchase a discounted fishing and/or hunting license. 



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Kids, Covid, and the Vaccine – Why I'm Vaccinating My Children



Why should kids get the covid vaccine?

I have asked myself this question not only as a mom of two boys ages 8 & 11, but as a family doctor. My husband and I will be vaccinating our children at the first opportunity. Why? There are many reasons, but for us this decision boils down to keeping our kids healthy and doing our part to help society. Allow me to explain.

Kids are quite contagious when they get covid, even if the child doesn't get that sick himself. Child covid vaccine protects everyone, such as grandma at Thanksgiving,

their teacher in the classroom. coaches, friends, soccer neighbors, siblings too young to get the vaccine, etc.

Because the Delta variant is so highly contagious, more kids are getting covid infection. There have already been more than 8,300 children hospitalized with covid, and 1 in 12 children have lingering symptoms lasting longer than three months. Some kids get severe complications such as Multisystem Inflammatory Syndrome in Children (MISC-C), inflammation of the heart (myocarditis) and strokes. Those complications are bad enough, but death is even worse. About 700 kids in the US have died of covid so far. It is now one of the top 10 leading causes of death for this age group.

I need to be very clear on this part - the risk of the vaccine making our children sick is very low, and the benefits are very high. No, I don't know the long-term consequences of the

covid vaccine, but here's what I do know:

· Vaccines have literally saved millions of lives over the past 100 years.

• They are the cheapest, most effective tools we have for disease prevention.

· Covid vaccines have gone through rigorous testing, and been given to 7+ billion people world-wide, proving their safety and efficacy.

• After vaccination, some people still get covid infection, but rarely serious enough to need hospitalization or have long term effects.


We all want society to get back to normal. As I mentioned, kids are vectors, and the sooner we stop the spread of infection, the sooner we can all have a normal life again. I miss social outings, shopping without masks, smiles, parties, hugs, crowded events, mingling ... don't you? And I want my kids to be in school - widespread vaccination helps keep schools open.

Every day, I am working in a strained health care system directly due to covid. Hospital beds and staff are diverted taking care of covid patients. This has led to shortages of healthcare for other conditions, making it difficult for me to get my patients the treatments they need. sometimes for life threatening conditions. In blunt terms, if your dad is having a heart attack, there may not be a bed for him, a staffed cath lab, or nurse to take care of him. If Covid is placing less strain on our system, there will be more ability to get your family members the emergent and routine care they may need. Getting my kids vaccinated is doing my part to relieve the strain on our health care system.

story short Long vaccines save lives. Period.

Who's to Blame?

Nearly everything picked up by a toddler or puppy seems to end up in their mouth. With powerful narcotics, sucking or swallowing pills or patches can trigger a tragedy. Vacuuming floors where you may have dropped a pill and sealing up used patches by folding them together before disposal can help ensure a safe holiday season.

from gathering together during the holidays. Thanksgiving, Christmas, Hanukkah, and New Year's Eve were celebrated in isolation. For many, it was a stressful and lonely holiday season.

With effective vaccines against COVID freely available this year, many Americans are looking forward to spending time around the holidays together, in person. When hosting friends and family, is your house safe enough for little ones and pets?

If you have ever dropped a pill on the floor, did you eventually find it? Standing in my kitchen last week, I saw a vitamin D capsule bounce off the counter. After nearly 15 minutes of careful searching. I still haven't found it!

 $Unfortunately, small \, children$ and pets can find these "lost" pills on the floor. When your family gets together for the holidays, are your children, grandchildren, and pets safe from accidentally ingesting a potentially dangerous dose of prescription medicine?

Many Americans take at least one prescription medicine. A survey done in 2008-2009 reported that 9 out of every 10 Americans took at least 1 prescription medicine within the previous month. In addition, 31% of all Americans reported taking at least 2 prescription medicines, and 11% took 5 or more prescriptions every day.

Unfortunately, it only takes 1 or 2 pills to trigger a tragedy. Most pain and heart medicines are designed for full-size adults. not inquisitive toddlers or small pets. Little children and powerful medications don't mix well, whether they discover single ones on the floor or open a pill bottle sitting on a table.

I love pillboxes. They help me remember to take my medicines. I can always check mine to determine whether I sure. Many people keep them in plain sight to remind them to take their pills. Unfortunately, they are easily opened.

A pillbox can create an irresistible challenge for curious and quick toddlers and one without a happy ending.

Child-resistant tops have saved many lives, but they are a hassle for older adults to open. As we age, our grip strength declines, and we may suffer from arthritis in our hands or wrists.

Every prescription medicine refill comes with a brand-new bottle and lid. This ensures that the child-resistant top doesn't become worn enough to become too easy to open. Dispensing prescriptions with child-resistant lids is strongly encouraged; you must request easy-open tops instead if you don't want them.

Many older adults modify lids on medicine vials or household chemical bottles to make them easier to open and close. When patients bring in their medicines to review, I often see prescription bottles with newer labels but much older lids. The lids were transferred from old bottles to new ones to keep them easier to open. Other prescription vials may have tops that are barely attached.

Child-resistant lids on medicines and household chemicals are designed to slow children down long enough to be discovered before they can swallow the contents.

My late mother-in-law saw nothing wrong with "recycling" her old pill bottles with childresistant tops into the toy box for her grandchildren to play with. As a young pharmacist and new parent, I'd sort through the toy box to gather up those pill bottles before letting my daughter Maureen play.

Medicines designed for adults weighing over 150 pounds are hazardous to a 30pound child or pet, finding them

Here are 3 Ways to **Help Prevent Accidental Ingestion of Prescription Medicines:**

1. Put pillboxes away when small children visit.

Moving them out of reach or locking them up is more effective than keeping track of grandchildren when your family visits.

Remove all 2. prescription medicine bottles from easy reach, especially pain pills and vials with "easy-open" tops.

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3. Lock up or carefully dispose of pain pills and patches.

Teenagers report getting narcotic pain pills from family and friends' medicine cabinets. Locking away pain medicine, especially narcotic or opioid medication like Vicodin® or oxycodone, can prevent tragedy.

If a patch contains a pain medicine like fentanyl, the FDA recommends flushing it instead of leaving it in your trash for a child or pet to "discover."
