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Should the election threshold change for passage of school bond tax votes?

The State Washington Constitution states that education is its paramount duty (Article IX, Sec 1). As a result, education policy and taxes have always been of significant importance in our state. You may remember that the Washington State Supreme Court issued its McCleary Decision on education funding in 2012.

This was a landmark case that required the state to significantly increase its funding for K-12 education. In response, over several budget cycles, the Legislature took steps to address this decision and the high court determined the funding had been achieved in 2018 and closed the case.

How are public schools funded and administered?

The Supreme Court's McCleary decision on education funding has significantly influenced Washington state's school funding, but the court's decision has largely overshadowed the important role that school districts play in developing local priorities, approving annual budgets, and managing their operations. School districts are actually local governments, not state agencies.

They are governed by their own locally elected school boards, and their districts are administered by their own superintendents. Washington state has 295 school districts, each with unique needs and varied priorities. Districts receive the majority of their funds from state dollars on a per-student basis along with local and federal funds.

The 295 different school districts across the state collect revenues, develop local priorities, and administer their budgets. School districts should prudently invest their taxpayer dollars (local, state, and federal) to implement their programs, negotiate sustainable contracts with their employees, and

per-student funding levels, once all sources of funds (local, state, and federal) are combined by the districts.

Overall, the per-student funding in Washington state has significantly increased. After the state's significantly increased funding for K-12 education was finalized, I voted to cap how much school districts could request in their local levies. Unfortunately, the cap that the Legislature put in place during the community voter approval for issuing bonds, which are long-term obligations. These proposals involve longer-term property tax impacts because bonds are paid back to investors over time (with interest) and could include a 25-year payback schedule.

As such, there is a higher threshold of 60 percent voter support required for approval. For the school districts that receive community support for school construction, the state provides additional support to match a portion or all of those funds through the state capital budget's School Construction and Assistance Program. While both school levies (for learning) and school bonds (for buildings) include a community vote and a property tax impact for the approving communities, the thresholds for approval are different as school levy proposals require 50% voter approval and school bond proposals require 60 percent voter approval. Legislature considers reducing voter approval for bonds In recent years, some school advocates have sought to reduce the existing 60 percent approval threshold for school construction bonds to a 50 percent simple began in the Legislature, the state reduced school levy approval from 60 percent to 50 percent where it still stands today.

The effort to do the same for school construction bonds has been active for at least the past few years. In order to make this change, since it would involve altering a provision in the Washington Constitution, both the House and Senate would need to approve the legislation by a twothirds vote and then the measure

manage their operations.

State funding to school districts is based on a "general apportionment" formula in accordance with an approved "prototypical" funding model.

The funding can vary slightly based on the characteristics of the district's student population, but it is largely based on overall enrollment. Additionally, school districts have the option of seeking local tax authorization and tax increases to supplement their federal and state funding.

These funds are in the form of "local levy dollars" authorized by a community vote and paid out of your local property tax dollars. The amount of levy funds sought can vary greatly by school district, which

McCleary reforms was lifted just a couple years later, allowing school districts to seek even more local property tax increases.

However, despite school districts requesting more funding in their levies, most communities have consistently supported the tax increases with at least 50 percent voter approval.

How are school facilities funded? School districts seek local levies to supplement their operating costs. These day-to-day costs of operating a school district include staffing, utilities, supplies, food services, and transportation fuel. Local levies are short-term taxes, lasting up to four years, and require 50 percent voter support for approval.

For building construction and

must receive a statewide voter approval of at least 50 percent.

During my service in the Senate a few years ago, the simple majority school bond measure came to the Senate floor but failed to garner the two-thirds approval needed to pass the Senate and move to the House of Representatives. There are two bills this year related to this issue. Senate Bill 5386 would lower the threshold for school bond votes from 60 percent to 55 percent, and House Bill 1226 would lower the threshold from 60 percent to 50 percent. If not approved this year, both bills will be eligible next session.

Sen. Brad Hawkins serves the 12th District, which covers much of North Central Washington.

These GOP senators voted no: Brown, Dozier, Ericksen, Hawkins, Honeyford, McCune, Muzzall, Padden, Schoesler, Wagoner, Warnick, Wilson, J, and Wilson, L.

State Senator for District 12, Brad Hawkins, had this to say exclusively to NCW Media, "House Bill 1070 was approved by the House of Representatives by a vote of 56 to 42 and the Senate by a vote of 36 to 13. I voted "no" in the Senate. My understanding is that the bill expands a law approved a couple years ago related to city council or community votes on a local sales taxes for affordable housing services," Hawkins said.

"While I'm opposed to many taxes, I do respect a community's decision about its own local taxes and acknowledge the growing challenges in our state related to affordable housing. However, this bill expands the use of the original tax without requiring a local vote for those expanded purposes. The bill, for example, would add facilities providing housing-related services, mental-health facilities, buildings acquisitions, and land purchases. Much of the bill actually pertains to counties with a population of at least 1.5 million, so many sections

Based on information from the Washington Survey and Rating Bureau, Lake Wenatchee Fire and Rescue Chief Dave Walker announced the District intends to purchase property closer to Highway 2 to improve fire and emergency services

in the area. In mid-2020, the Rating Bureau advised the District that they would not be able to further improve LWFR's rating until the emergency response distance was decreased on the portion of the Stevens Pass corridor that is within the District's boundaries. After an exhaustive search, LWFR located a property that

would meet our needs and has entered into negotiation with the owners. This property already has a structure that could be used to house fire apparatus. A recent appraisal of the property and the buyer's asking price show the property would be a good investment. Lake Wenatchee Fire and Rescue recently paid off two fire engines that were purchased in 2010 and is financially in a position to begin the public process of scoping for a new facility at Station 93 and acquire the property adjacent to US 2. Chief Walker also announced that the Districts' Board of Commissioners would be discussing these topics in upcoming meetings.

do not impact our counties in North Central Washington," said Hawkins.

"I do find it both ironic and sad that the state government continues to add regulations on land use, expand building codes, and mandate certain wage increases and then characterizes rising housing costs as a crisis. Housing costs are a result of many factors, but much of it is government's own doing. As we prepare to pull out of this COVID pandemic - due to government's past and ongoing closures of the economy many hotels and business entities are essentially out of business. This bill would allow government to expand use of a tax to purchase those same buildings," Hawkins said.

"These buildings that some mental-health and housing advocates want government to purchase once contained thriving businesses prior to the government's shutdown. "There is something about that approach – government benefiting from the misfortune of businesses – that does not seem right. It also does not seem right to implement a tax under one set of conditions and then expand or adjust it without a public vote, but government does that all the time," he said.

"At some point, the tax burden on families is simply going to be too much.

I would be remiss if I did not emphasize the many tools the Legislature has provided to local governments and community organizations to help assist with local affordable housing challenges. The descriptions of the existing programs and the local flexibility available spans multiple pages," Hawkins said.

"Local governments also have the bonding authority to raise substantial funds for affordable housing, but many local governments are unwilling to put those requests to a public vote. Therefore, I support the existing laws – many of which have been approved in recent years. I hope communities can make good use of that authority to meet their local needs," concluded Hawkins.

Former Chelan Mayor Mike Cooney had this to say about House Bill 1070, which the State Senate Passed 36 to 13, mostly on partisan lines.

"I have been following "housing bills" this session and favor this use of local sales tax for affordable housing."

He continued, "Certain communities are very desirable to live in or own a second home. The result of this influx puts the "locals" in a tough spot to buy their first home. We all need to realize that home ownership is a basic human need."

He said, "Well, I could keep going, but won't. We have made nice progress and will continue to do so! One last thought, a dwelling or roof over your head is not a partisan issue," said Cooney, Executive Director, Chelan Valley Housing Trust.

Local Representative, Keith Goehner said, "I supported the bill because it allows cities and counties to develop higher density zones for additional housing opportunities. It is voluntary and redirects REET money for investment in local infrastructure enhancement. It may not work for all cities and counties but it gives local governments another tool to better utilize land and address housing shortages in a more affordable way."

Amidst all the and challenges and hardships that 2020 brought to our region, we cannot forget to celebrate one of its silver linings: people were more generous than ever! From increased contributions to our food banks and social services to recognizing our healthcare heroes, our communities helped to fill the many needs that emerged during the pandemic through charitable giving.

You might recall that in 2017, a new tax law increased the standard deduction significantly, which resulted in fewer people itemizing, leaving no real tax incentive for charitable donations.

Donating investments (especially highly appreciated securities such as stocks) instead of cash can be a very tax-efficient way to support a charity. If you sell the stock or bonds first then donate the proceeds to charity, you will pay tax on the gain. Contributing securities you've owned for more than a year directly to the charity usually allows you to deduct the full fair market value of the stock plus pay no capital gains tax. For large donations, keep in mind that there are limits on how much can be deducted per year. The limits vary based on what was donated, but stock donations are generally limited to 30% of your adjusted gross income (AGI). AGI is your gross income before your standard or itemized deductions and, if applicable, your qualified business income deduction. If your donation is

deduction, there are few things you must keep in your records: • For any donation of \$250 or more (including contributions of cash), you must obtain and keep in your records a contemporaneous written acknowledgement from the gualified charity

from the qualified charity indicating the amount of the cash and a description of any property contributed. The acknowledgment must say whether the organization provided any goods or services in exchange for the gift and, if so, must provide a description and a good faith estimate of the value of those goods or services

If you receive any goods or services in exchange for your donation, you must reduce your deduction by the value of what you received.

For non-cash gifts in excess of \$5,000 (\$10,000 for closely held stock) you'll need an independent appraisal. You don't need an appraisal for gifts of



The Federal Government saw the importance of charitable giving in 2020 and has included provisions in the CARES Act to recognize gifts to charity in 2020 and 2021.

For your 2020 taxes, if you choose not to itemize, you will be able to deduct up to \$300 of qualified charitable donations under these tax law changes through the CARES Act. The \$300 is the same whether you file single or jointly. In 2021, the limit increases to \$600 for those who file jointly and \$300 for married filing separately. Single filers will still have the \$300 limit. Other charitable gifting rules remain unchanged, including gifting of investments and Qualified Charitable Donations (QCD) from IRAs.

direct transfer of funds from your IRA to a qualified charity. QCDs can be counted toward satisfying your annual required minimum distribution (RMD) if certain rules are met, such as transferring the funds directly from the IRA to the charity without first being distributed to you.

A QCD excludes the amount donated from taxable income, unlike regular IRA withdrawals. This type of donation does not require you to itemize and, by keeping your income lower, may reduce the impact to certain deductions or credits. While RMDs were waived for 2020 they are required again for 2021.

However you make a difference with gifting to charity, in order to claim a

exchange-traded stocks, bonds or mutual funds.

Always remember that only donations to qualified organizations are deductible. Not all non-profits are considered qualified. Qualified organizations include 501(c) (3) charities, state and local governments, and school districts. Contributions to political campaigns or gifts directly to a needy individual do not qualify.

ENTIAT – Another rock slope scaling project to address an unstable slope along US 97A begins Monday, March 29. The work will require two weeks of daytime highway closures from milepost 213.63 to 213.76, about a mile south of Entiat. Strider Construction has been awarded this project with a bid of \$309,912.

Similar to the rock scaling work completed last summer, contractor crews will remove loose, unstable rock from slopes adjacent to US 97A in an area where rock fall often reaches the highway.

To complete the work, crews will close the road between 8:15 a.m. and 5 p.m. weekdays, with openings for 15 minutes on the top of every hour to allow traffic through the work zone. These extended closures allow the contractor to complete more work, shortening the project duration, and ensures the safety of travelers.

The closures will last two weeks, and work is scheduled to be complete by 5 p.m. Monday, April 12. April 13 and 14 there will be flagger controlled traffic with delays up to 10 minutes as the contractor wraps up the project. The highway will be open during non-working hours and on weekends.

Updates for the project will be shared on WSDOT's travel alerts page.

Satan Shoes



Satan has been getting a lot of attention lately. The latest marketing ploy is advertising Satanic footwear-shoes emblazoned with Satanic imagery and apparently contain a drop of human blood. With only 666 made, they sold out in less than a minute. No surprise there.

Yes, as a Christian, seeing people glorify and rejoice in shoes dedicated to Satan disturbs me. Additionally, the pervasiveness of this one marketing campaign flooding social media feeds is also equally troubling. The last thing I want to see is a pair of ugly-looking, poorly designed Nikes, let alone ones that are for Satan

First off, Satan is real. Satan is not an archetype or a symbol of an abstract concept of evil. No, as the Bible teaches, Satan is a real created being with a will bent on deception and destruction. The early church, the Apostles, even Christ himself all treated Satan as

one who exists and influences the world (including people) around us (Jn. 8:44, 1 Pet. 5:8). Additionally, most in the world today believe that an evil spirit is personified and again, impacts their daily lives. However, in the West, we don't believe in a real Devil. We are materialistic-rejecting any form of supernaturalism or spiritual reality-and find attributing anything to Satan as hogwash or a throwback to archaic superstitions. Yet, in our denial of Satan's existence, our modern civilized society makes us a target-rich environment. In other words, his assaults on people and his influence can easily take place, especially in a culture that doesn't even believe he is real and therefore caught

unaware. Now back to those ugly Nikes. Satan's tactics aren't about having a flashy media campaign nor does he typically come right out in the open and manifest evil. Satan is far craftier than that. His way of doing things is more subtle and more subliminal which is more insidious. In the very first appearance in the Bible in Genesis 3:1, Satan takes on the form of one of the creatures in the garden and subtly insinuates that God is holding back from Adam and Eve. In the temptation of Christ in Luke 4:1-12, we see

Satan tempting Jesus with good things, like food, safety, and popularity. We see every time that he counters Satan's temptation with the Scripture and overcomes him.

Satan disguises himself, Paul says, as an "angel of light" (2 Cor. 11:14), cloaking his evil with a façade of goodness and pleasantness. This description is contrary to Satan's popular depiction as a red-skinned imp with horns and a pointy tail or some gruesome figure of the macabre. He is attractive (not physically per se) and alluring, hence the reason why so many fall into the trap that he sets.

I am not so concerned with shoes with Satanic imagery as I am with Satan's deception and subtle influence that has been going on for many years in society at large. He has had decades in this country to influence and change a nation that once thought life was important and should be protected to now slaughtering innocent lives by the thousands by way of abortion. Compile that with the diminishment of marriage, the elevation of sexual gratification and yes, you could say that in 2021, the Devil is having a heyday.

Nevertheless, although Satan is alive and well and we are seeing the results of his influence, we must remember that he is a defeated foe. Jesus Christ has crushed the head of the Devil (Gen. 3:15) and triumphed over him by way of the cross and his resurrection. Therefore, as Martin Luther wrote in his hymn A Mighty

Fortress is Our God,

The Prince of Darkness grim, we tremble not for him; His rage we can endure, for

lo, his doom is sure, One little word shall fell him.

Sure, Satan may have shoes in his name but the resurrected Christ has crushed him with nail-pierced feet.

Can green tea help diabetes

Q: Can green tea help lower my blood sugar? I was diagnosed with diabetes last month. My sister recommended drinking green tea.

Green tea contains antioxidants. Drinking at least 3-5 cups of green tea daily has been shown to reduce the risk of cardiovascular disease, endometrial cancer, and ovarian cancer. It also may lower blood pressure, blood sugar, body weight, and body fat. What is confusing is that green tea and green tea extract also naturally contain caffeine, increasing blood pressure and heart rate in people who are sensitive to it.

Green tea contains caffeine plus another natural compound called epigallocatechin gallate (EGCG). Amounts of EGCG over 200mg daily have been associated with increased blood pressure, constipation, and rash. Higher concentrations of 800mg daily of EGCG have been associated with liver injury.

High amounts of green tea can cause depletion of folic acid from the body. Folic acid is critical in preventing a severe birth defect called spina bifida.

Green tea extracts verified with the United States Pharmacopeia (USP) must warn consumers about the potential for liver toxicity. Their labeling has to include the following statements: "Do not take on an empty stomach. Take with food. Do not use if you have a liver problem and discontinue use and consult a healthcare practitioner if you develop symptoms of liver trouble. such as abdominal pain, dark urine, or jaundice (yellowing of the skin or eyes).'



Most tea leaves are harvested from the woody plant Camellia sinensis, then carefully dried to prevent mold. Herbal teas use various parts of other plants, like chamomile and peppermint. About 20% of the teas from the leaves of Camellia sinensis are green teas.

The main difference between green and black teas is the amount of oxidation they undergo after harvesting. When the tea leaves are exposed to the air, oxidation occurs, turning them from bright green to brown, similar to an apple turning brown after cutting and exposing it to air.

Green tea is steamed or panfried right after harvesting to arrest the oxidation process before being dried. Black teas are left exposed until the oxidation process is completed, then dried and packaged. Oxidation makes tea leaves less bitter and helps develop their flavors more fully than green or white teas.

Oolong teas are the middle ground between barely oxidized green tea and fully oxidized black tea. Oolong teas can be anywhere from 5% to 90% oxidized. The less oxidation, the lighter the color of the leaves and the more subtle their flavor.

All teas from Camellia sinensis contain caffeine, about 50mg per cup. This compares with 90-100mg



Besides coffee and tea, there are two other plants cultivated, processed, and brewed for the stimulant effects of the caffeine they contain. Guarana and Yerba Mate contain caffeine naturally and are often added to supplements for weight control and increased energy.

Supplements have to state on their label any caffeine that has been added to their product. Like green tea, guarana and Yerba Mate also naturally contain caffeine, so their caffeine doesn't have to be listed separately as an ingredient. 5 Ways to Get the Most From

Green Tea 1. Beware of the TOTAL Caf-

feine Content. Caffeine lurks in natural com-

pounds like green tea, guarana, and verba mate. Herbal supplements must list any caffeine that has been added to their product. Caffeine in green tea can cause stomach upset, insomnia, and a racing heartbeat.

2. Brew at a Lower Temperature.

Black and oolong teas are best steeped in boiling water, but green and white teas taste bitter and grassy if brewed in water that's too hot. Brew green tea with water heated until tiny bubbles rise to the surface of your pan or glass kettle, about 175-180 degrees.

3. More is Not Always Better. One compound found in green tea extract is EGCG, which at high doses can damage your liver.

4. Avoid it if You Are Trying to Get Pregnant.

High doses of green tea or green tea extract deplete your body of folic acid, increasing the risk of severe birth defects like spina bifida.

5. Drink 3-5 cups Daily for Best Results

Most studies show that drinking 3-5 cups daily of green tea, or the equivalent in green tea extract, was necessary to experience the benefits.

The Best Opening Day Trout Lakes East Of The Cascades By John Kruse

Wondering where to go for the Lowland Lakes Trout Opener on April 24? There wasn't an opening day last year thanks to the six-week spring fishing closure imposed by Washington State at the start of the Covid pandemic. However, we can get some pretty good ideas of where to go by looking at the top lakes from the 2019 lowland lakes

opener. All of the lakes mentioned are east of the Cascade Crest and the catch data was tallied by Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife creel checkers. It's also worth noting that most of the anglers fishing lakes in Eastern Washington during the 2019 opener had to contend with high winds and in some cases. spring snow!

WILLIAMS LAKE - Located between Cheney and Sprague, this lake has two resorts and is a popular opening day destination. In 2019 anglers

caught eight fish apiece and 2.3 of these trout were kept on average. They were mainly 10-inch rainbows and cutthroat which explains the high release rate. The biggest fish checked was a 19-inch rainbow trout.

STARVATION LAKE -This Northeast Washington

lake gave up an average of 2.7 trout on the opener in 2019but wind and snow put

a damper on success as the day progressed. One of the fish caught was a huge 21-inch rainbow.

WAITTS LAKE - There were not a whole lot of people fishing this body of water on the opener but the ones that were there averaged 2.5 trout apiece. One unique thing about this lake is the fact you can catch brown trout here and the biggest one checked on the April 2019 opener was a nice 20-inch fish.

PARK LAKE – Part of the Sun Lakes located between Coulee City and Soap Lake, this lake generally receives a lot of attention during the opener and most anglers have good success here. In 2019 anglers were averaging three trout and the largest rainbow wasn't that large, measuring out at 14.3 inches. High winds made for tough fishing.

WAPATO LAKE – This lake, not far from Manson in Chelan County, is another tried and true favorite on opening day. In 2019 anglers averaged 4.5 fish each, many of them rainbows in the 13-inch range.

JAMESON LAKE - This sagebrush lined lake in Douglas County is another favored opening day destination. High winds kept anglers off the water for much of the April 2019 opener but despite that those venturing out with a rod and reel averaged 3.4 trout apiece and the fish were nice sized, averaging 13 inches.

ROWLAND LAKE - This Kittitas County lake off of Highway 14 produced well during the 2019 opener and anglers caught close to a limit each (4.8 fish average). One "large broodstock" trout was also caught but no weight or measurements was provided.

SPEARFISH LAKE – Only eight anglers were found fishing this sleeper of a lake by Dallesport during the opener but they weren't doing halfbad, averaging 3.1 trout apiece.

As for catching them? When it comes to opening day, all sorts of tactics work. You can fish Berkley PowerBait or marshmallows and worms off the bottom if it's not too weedy. If it is weedy you can cast spinners, spoons or flies from shore. If you are trolling from a boat it's hard to beat a Mack's Wedding Ring Spinner tipped with a worm behind a small dodger or pop gear. One other boat tactic that works well? Trolling a small frog colored Worden's Flatfish. It works!
