Council wrestles with decision regarding Osborn School

The City and Cascade School District have agreed to extend the decision regarding the city's option to buy the Osborn School from September 30 until December 31, 2020.

Questions remain about how the community expects the property to be developed to best benefit local residents. Discussions have suggested green space, a community center, affordable housing even parking.

The decision regarding what do about the school has consumed much of the council's time over the past few months including their annual retreat.

A motion was approved in June to evaluate the environmental hazards that may be present in the building such as lead paint or asbestos.

Department of Ecology had previously tested the soils and declared they were free of arsenic or lead. At the July 28 Council Meeting City Administrator Ana Cortez-Steiner proposed the city engage the services of the Center for Creative Land Recycling. CCLR is a national nonprofit that facilitates finding the best use of available land.

Council member Waters expressed concern that the decision should be driven by the community and that she believed the taxpayers of the Cascade School District wanted a park. She said she would prefer to work with "Parks for People," a local group.

While Mayor Florea and Council members Hessburg and Wilson supported the proposal on the basis that CCLR was simply providing a visioning process to help the community decide. Ultimately council tabled the decision.

Council has planned to discuss how to proceed on the visioning process at its August 11 meeting. As of Friday, August 7, the agenda for that meeting is to give the council two options regarding facilitation of the visioning process for the Osborn School acquisition.

Contract with CCLR for \$19,000 to facilitate the process of seeking community input or seek bids from other national firms.

The Leavenworth Residential Advisory Committee (RAC) agreed to oversee the work of CCLR at their meeting on August 4.

Affordable Housing

A lively discussion on the topic of how best to address the need for affordable housing was spurred during the Council Retreat.

While what constitutes affordable is still unclear, a number of council members expressed interest in trying to revive the Meadowlark project initiated by Upper Valley MEND in 2008.

The Meadowlark project ultimately failed. Some of the newer members of the council expressed concern that the city did not do enough to support that effort, while members who were involved at the time laid the blame at the foot of MEND for not meeting their commitments.

In any case, there was interest in seeing if there was any possibility of reviving that effort. Development Services Manager, Lilith Vespier, informed council that MEND was in the process of selling the property.

She wasn't aware of how far the negotiations had gone, but she was aware of a developer from Portland who was looking at the property for a planned unit development of approximately 90 homes.

It wasn't clear if this development was imminent and how many of the 90 units would be considered as affordable.

Leavenworth Haus, the new housing development on the North side of Safeway, has announced apartments will begin to be available as early as March of next year.

Current pricing ranges from \$965 per month for a studio to \$1,770 for a 2 bedroom-two bath unit.

UGA

Another item that came up during the Council Retreat was concern about defining the city's Urban Growth Area or UGA.

Little was said except that the city may need to take a look at this area as defined in its Comprehensive Plan.

There is some concern from Council members that the area outside the city limits of Leavenworth are growing and it may be time to examine if there is need to expand the city limits.

Development in the UGA is currently controlled by the County, yet it does have an impact on city services.

The Washington Outdoors Report

Prime time for alpine lakes fishing

Looking for a way to cool off during the heat of the summer? Head to a mountain lake and be sure to bring a rod and reel because trout fishing can be fast and furious this time of year!

According to the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife there are some 2550 lakes sitting at an elevation of over 2500 feet in our state. Most are located in the Cascade Mountain Range and while not all of them have fish in them, many do.

The primary fish you'll find in these lakes are rainbow, cutthroat and brook trout.

If you are interested in finding high lakes to fish there are two great resources available.

One is the high lakes fishing page at the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife website <https://wdfw.wa.gov/fishing/locations/high-lakes>. The other place to go is <http://northwestfishingreports.com>.

This popular website is full of fishing reports and is the creation of Mike Carey, an avid alpine lakes angler who has contributed a sizeable body of high elevation

lake reports over the years.

When it comes to mountain lakes in our state there are those you can drive to and those you hike to. As you might imagine, drive-in lakes get a good amount of pressure though frequent stockings often keeps the fishing good through the summer.

The hike-in lakes are infrequently stocked or have self-sustaining populations of fish. Generally speaking, the further you hike, the better the fishing becomes and quite often, the bigger the fish get.

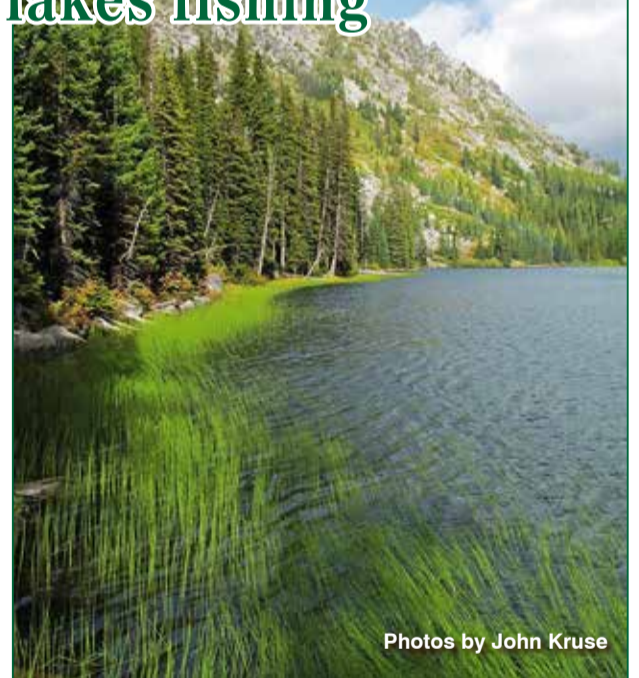
Assuming you hike in, resist the impulse to cast from the first place you reach where the trail hits the lake.

This is the place that sees more angling pressure than anywhere else. Instead, size up the body of water. Look for sunken trees or large rocks that provide cover for trout that are looking to ambush an easy meal.

The inlet and outlet streams of the lake are also good bets since both provide food sources for fish.

Lures and flies both work well for alpine trout. I strongly recommend staying away from bait.

These lakes are pristine places and discarded jars

of eggs, cartons of worms and colorful Powerbait takes away from the natural beauty found around these waters.

I also suggest releasing most of the fish you catch. A shore lunch or dinner of trout wrapped in foil and cooked over a campfire is delicious but if you are not going to eat your fish during your trip let them go.

The meat never holds up well after a multi-mile hike and many of these self-sustaining populations of trout are fragile.

With that in mind consider using lures with single barbless hooks. Spinners work quite well (Mack's Promise Keepers, Blue Fox, Mepps and Rooster Tails are all excellent choices) as are spoons such as Dardev-

les, small Krokodiles and what may well be the super weapon lure for this kind of fishing, the Acme Kastmaster.

As for fly fishing, if you brought a spinning rod use a casting bubble to get that fly out there into the lake. Dry flies like a Royal Wulff or a Parachute Adams are always good choices but so are streamers and nymphs. Just try to match the hatch and if you are there when the fish are rising, you'll likely be in business.

If you are using a fly rod look for a rock to stand on or shallow area you can wade out into so you've got enough room to cast for distance.

Another way to really get at the fish that are in the deep part of the lake is to pack in a float tube.

Several companies make lightweight ones, the lightest of them coming in at three pounds from Wilderness Lite.

Put it all together and you've got the information you need to hit the trail, head to an alpine lake, soak up some scenery, and catch some trout this summer!

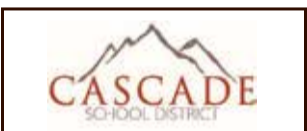

 Blue Bird, Inc. has filed a change in operations for modification of coverage under the Fresh Fruit Packing Industry National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System Waste Discharge General Permit (the general permit), in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 90.48 Revised Code of Washington, Chapter 173.226 Washington Administrative Code, and the Federal Water Pollution Control Act as amended.

This modification of coverage is for the discharge of pear hydrocooler wastewater with chlorine-based fungicides from Blue Bird, Inc. - Saunders Rd located at 9425 Saunders Rd, Peshastin, Washington. The discharge will be approximately 3000 gallons per day every 2 to 3 days to percolation pond. All discharges to be in compliance with the Department of Ecology's Water Quality Standards.

TENTATIVE DETERMINATIONS

Ecology proposes to issue this modification of coverage under the general permit to the above listed applicant to discharge to public water, subject to certain effluent limitations and special permit conditions. These determinations are tentative. A final determination will not be made until all comments received pursuant to this notice have been evaluated.

 Any person desiring to present their view to the Department of Ecology regarding this permit application may do so in writing within thirty days of the last date of publication of this notice. Comments shall be submitted to the Department of Ecology.  If the comments received indicate significant public interest in the applicability of coverage, or if useful information could be produced, thereby, the director may hold a public hearing. Ecology shall only consider issues regarding the general permit's applicability or non-applicability to the discharger when considering the need to hold a public hearing.

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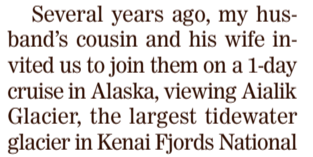

Mastering motion sickness



Several years ago, my husband's cousin and his wife invited us to join them on a 1-day cruise in Alaska, viewing Aialik Glacier, the largest tidewater glacier in Kenai Fjords National Park. Lunch was on board the ship and a lovely salmon and crab dinner at Fox Island awaited us on the way back.

We arrived at 9 am at the boat terminal through pouring rain, wind gusts that nearly knocked us over, and a temperature of 49 degrees Fahrenheit. The captain cancelled the cruise due to the weather, thank heavens. I wouldn't have enjoyed being tossed about on the boat, because I get motion sick.

Some people find acupressure helps their motion sickness. Wearing an elastic band around your wrist activates a particular pressure point, easing the nausea and discomfort. To give this medication-free approach a try, look for Sea Bands®.

Ginger can be an effective motion sickness remedy when you take 500mg to 1000mg of powdered root every 4-6 hours. Fresh ginger root, capsules of ground ginger, or small chunks of sweetened, crystallized ginger also work. My favorite form is crystallized ginger, which weighs twice as much as powdered ginger.

Weighing pieces of crystallized ginger with my little apothecary scale left over from pharmacy school, I have found the best results with chunks about the size of a full-strength aspirin tablet. Ginger ale, ginger tea, and gum don't have enough ginger to provide me reliable relief.

Dramamine® for motion sickness is a popular non-prescription remedy but watch out: it has two different formulations, the original one and a "less drowsy" formula.

The original version of Dramamine® contains dimenhydrinate, a close cousin of diphenhydramine or Benadryl®. Both dimenhydrinate and diphenhydramine can prevent motion sickness. Unfortunately, they



also make you drowsy and need to be taken frequently.

The last time I took Dramamine® was on a flight home from Orlando to Seattle. After crossing 3 time zones going westbound, I lost track of time, and it wore off right when I needed it most.

Meclizine is my reliable motion sickness remedy. You can buy it 3 ways: Bonine®, Dramamine® Less Drowsy Formula, and generic meclizine tablets. I recommend the 25mg chewable tablets of meclizine unless your doctor advises you to take the 12.5mg tablets instead.

I never leave home without my chewable meclizine for motion sickness. It's inexpensive, is available as chewable flavored tablets, and rarely causes drowsiness. Best of all, one dose lasts 24 hours!

For more relief, try adding ginger or acupressure to meclizine. Avoid combining dimenhydrinate (the original Dramamine®) with either meclizine or Benadryl® (diphenhydramine) because together, they can cause drowsiness, dry mouth, and constipation.

If meclizine or dimenhydrinate plus ginger and Sea-Bands® doesn't help you, ask your doctor about a prescription for scopolamine patches.

Scopolamine is a patch (Transderm Scop®) you wear behind your ear, each lasting for 2-3 days. Scopolamine patches are more potent at relieving motion sickness than non-prescription medicines, but they also cause more side effects.

Scopolamine can cause fatigue, blurred vision, dry mouth, constipation, and urinary retention. Talk to your medical provider about whether scopolamine would be a safe choice for you, especially if you have

constipation.

Here are 5 Tips on Mastering Motion Sickness:

- 1. Face forward.**
 If possible, sit facing forward on cars, trains, boats, and roller coasters.
- 2. Keep cool.**
 Sit where you can get fresh air or a cool breeze. I find that getting too warm always makes my motion sickness worse, so I wear layers to avoid getting overheated.
- 3. Be prepared.**
 Motion sickness medicine takes a while to work and is best taken as a preventative. You should take or apply motion-sickness remedies at least 30 minutes before experiencing the motion of a boat, car, or plane. If you take a short-acting nausea medicine like ginger or dimenhydrinate (Dramamine®), always bring another dose with you. If your outing is delayed, you can re-dose before the first one wears off. (Trust me!)
- 4. Choose meclizine.**
 When picking out motion-sickness medicine, watch out! There are two formulas of the motion sickness medicine Dramamine®, always placed side by side on the shelf. I strongly recommend getting meclizine, sold as a generic version of Bonine® or the Dramamine® Less Drowsy Formula. Meclizine is just as effective but costs less than brand name versions.
- 5. Meclizine works for dogs, too.**
 If your dog gets carsick, meclizine can help. For most dogs, the dose is 25mg once daily; if your dog is small or already takes medication, please check with your veterinarian first.

Primary election indicates Dem's may be vulnerable

It's no surprise that the incumbent governor and District Congressional Representative captured the most votes in the primary election. The question is, how strong is their performance against a single Republican challenger in the General election?

Gov. Inslee won the statewide election with a narrow 50.3% of the voters who turned out.

Other Democrats on the ballot drew 3% away from Inslee. It is unclear at this

time if that is because they are disenchanted with Inslee and the Democrats.

Schrier led the race in her bid for re-election, but she only drew 42.7% of the vote.

Republican challengers collectively captured almost 50% of vote. With clear evidence that this is a house seat that may be up for grabs in November, there is likely to be a huge push by both parties.

In the race for Lieutenant Governor the top two system will see two Democrats running against each other in the General. Denny Heck will face off against Marko Lias.

Heck essentially ran a campaign against President Trump.

Heck decided not to run for re-election to the House of Representatives and run for Lt. Governor instead.

At a time the Democrats are desperately trying to hold on to their majority in Congress it is certainly curious.

Political operatives on the west side have surmised that Heck is expecting Biden to win and tap Inslee for a cabinet position. Heck would then assume the role of Governor.

At this point it looks like the election for Chelan

County Commissioner is the only race that is still in contention.

In this point Tiffany Gering leads Brandt Cappell by 132 votes with 337 ballots left to count for the second spot on the ticket for the general election.

Voter turnout was 47% statewide and 59% in Chelan County. Detailed charts of the top election results can be found on page 5.

Primary gives Culp the nod in Republican gubernatorial race

(Facts compiled from Washington Secretary of State, Chelan County Auditor websites)

OLYMPIA – As of Friday, August 7, two term Governor Jay Inslee easily won his party's support for a third term. He will face Loren Culp, a surprise winner of the Republican primary, who defeated Tim Eyman and Joshua Freed among dozens of other rivals.

Culp's victory announcement was held in Plain, unbeknownst to local residents, but reported on by Seattle's King 5 television news on primary night.

The tally was: Inslee with 1,074,988 votes for 50.33%. Loren Culp received 370,596 votes for 17.35% of the total.

Chelan County gave a slight nod to incumbent Inslee and Attorney General candidate incumbent Bob

Ferguson. Culp, Republic (Ferry County) police chief outpolled Inslee in Okanogan, Douglas and Grant counties.

In Chelan County, Inslee received 5,095 votes to 4,527 for Culp.

In the Eighth Congressional District, Democrat incumbent Rep. Dr. Kim Schrier easily defeated all comers.

The Republican challenger is Jesse Jensen who won over Keith Swank for a place on the November ballot.

Jensen received 43,460 votes or 22.66%, Keith R. Swank got 38,556 votes or

19.74%.

In other local races and referendums of note:

Dale England and Tiffany Gering, both Republicans, will vie for the Chelan County Board of County Commissioners District 3 seat come November.

Gering staged a come from behind victory over primary night rival Brandt Cappell, who, as of Tuesday night, had a slight lead, but when the smoke cleared Friday night, Gering was victorious.

England received 41.58% (3,753 votes) for the overall primary victory followed

by Gering's 29.94% (2,703 votes) for second place. Cappell tallied 28.48% (2,571 votes) for third place.

The district includes Stehekin, Chelan, Manson, Entiat and parts of Olds Station in Wenatchee.

The Lake Chelan Community Hospital EMS renewal levy easily passed with 3,120 votes for vice1,242 against, equaling an approval rate of 71.53%.

The passage secures funding for about half of the operational costs, also allowing for replacement of outdated equipment.

The new levy amount

would be taxed at a rate of .39cents per \$1,000 of assessed property value for the next 10 years. This is up from the current rate of .31cents. The levy takes effect in 2021.

About Election Results Reporting: Results are updated when a county reports new tabulation results.

Results are certified by each county on August 18.

The Secretary of State certifies final results by August 21.

The results posted before certification are unofficial.

Are bailouts the new normal?

The amazingly strong stock market recovery coincided almost perfectly with the first major stimulus package from Congress.

Although my clients benefitted greatly from the largesse of the government over the short term, I can't help but worry about the future.

In one way, this was the perfect time for massive government bailouts, because no one was at fault for this crisis.

Yes, you can blame China, or a poor response from

our leaders, but the losers of this crisis (tourism, retail, restaurants, airlines...) were losers out of pure bad luck; it's not that they ran their businesses badly.

Similarly, Netflix, Amazon and Zoom didn't plan their business model around everyone being stuck in their homes for months – they got lucky.

So, if there was ever a time for a bailout, this was it.

On the other hand, whatever happened to having an emergency fund?

Shouldn't a profitable corporation be able to make it through a few lean months without needing taxpayers to bail them out?

The more our govern-

ment bails everyone out when a crisis hits, the more it's expected.

So, instead of responsibly planning for emergencies, the government is the emergency fund. That's just not sustainable.

But there are no easy answers.

If our businesses overprepare for disasters, they won't be as dynamic.

A tank is very resilient, you'll reach your destination no matter what.

However, a Porsche will get you there a lot faster –

but with a lot more risk.

So, do we want our businesses to be resilient like a tank, or high octane like a Porsche?

Here's another way to look at it: If I gained 50 pounds, I'd be better prepared for a famine, but less dynamic during the normal times.

Imagine a sober-minded CEO stockpiling cash for an emergency fund over the last decade while every other CEO was showering their stockholders with money through dividends and stock buybacks.

That CEO would have been fired long before this crisis made them look

smart.

Actually, even then they wouldn't look smart because everyone else got bailed out.

Right now, our economy is lean, mean and highly efficient, but also so fragile that we need bailouts every 10 years. Obviously, that's not an ideal situation.

However, if we decide to make our economy into a tank, what if China decides to be a Porsche?

For now, the bailouts will continue, and that's probably for the best.

I just hope we can find a better balance between dynamism and resilience in the future.

Fire Precaution Levels, Fire Danger Ratings Increase in Eastern Washington

OLYMPIA – Due to the extremely dry, hot weather, the Washington State Department of Natural Resources (DNR) announced today the following changes in campfire restrictions, industrial fire precaution levels (IFPL) and fire danger ratings on DNR-protected lands.

These changes come on the heels of the statewide burn ban on all DNR-protected lands signed July 28 by Commissioner of Public Lands Hilary Franz.

Effective Friday, August 7, 2020:

- Campfires in campgrounds are not allowed in Valley Fire Danger Rating Area.
- Fire danger will increase from very high to extreme in the Lower Basin Fire Danger Rating Area.
- Fire danger will increase from high to very high in the Foothills, Highlands, Lower Yakima and Upper Yakima Fire Danger Rating Areas.
- Fire danger rating remains extreme in the Valley Fire Danger Rating Area.
- Fire danger rating remains very high in the Chelan, Methow and Upper Basin Fire Danger Rating Areas.
- Fire danger rating remains high in the Kaniksu Fire Danger Rating Area.

Effective Tuesday, August 11, 2020:

- IFPL will increase to Level 3 in zones 609W and 609E.
- IFPL will increase to a Level 2 in zone 680.
- IFPL will remain Level 1 in zones 678E, 685, 687 and 688.
- IFPL will remain Level 2 in zone 675 and 678W.

- IFPL will remain Level 3 in zone 678, 684 and 686.

Burn restrictions remain in place for the following:

- Campfires in campgrounds are not allowed in Foothills, Kaniksu, Lower Basin and Upper Basin Fire Danger Rating areas.
- Small debris disposal fires (rule burning) are not allowed in Chelan, Foothills, Highlands, Kaniksu, Lower Basin, Lower Yakima, Methow, Upper Basin, Upper Yakima and Valley Fire Danger Rating Areas.
- No burning allowed (written burn permits issued by DNR are suspended) in Chelan, Foothills, Highlands, Kaniksu, Lower Basin, Lower Yakima, Methow, Upper Basin, Upper Yakima and Valley Fire Danger Rating Areas.
- Campfires may be allowed in designated campgrounds.
- Always check with local campground hosts before lighting a campfire.
- Additionally, always make sure campfires are completely out before leaving them unattended – if it's too hot to touch, it's too hot to leave.
- Counties and local jurisdictions may have additional restrictions.

Through the new app, the PUD helps ensure boaters and park users are better prepared so they can have safe and enjoyable visits, whether on shore or on the water.

Chelan PUD encourages river and lake users to always check water levels before and during river-recreation.

"Rivers are dynamic and our local conditions can change rapidly based on a number of factors, including the amount of water coming from upstream dams, power demand and weather conditions," said PUD Parks Manager Ryan

River conditions also can change regularly as hydropower output fluctuates to meet demands of the market.

Let's see how high our case count

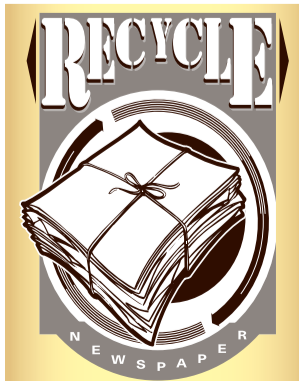
goes up in 14 days after his Non Mask Rally Party last weekend just North of Leavenworth.
