



## Third School Reopening Stakeholder Meeting with Focus on Transportation

Tracey Beckendorf-Edou, Cascade School District (CSD) superintendent, convened the third session of the Reopening Stakeholders' Group on July 15th over Zoom.

She first shared an update from the state that instructional hours will be allowed to include remote and hybrid education, giving the district more flexibility.

CSD expects families to have educational choices and can gauge their comfort level with each choice.

Students will be able to attend full day of in-person or morning in-person with afternoon remote (the child would be picked up before lunch by parent).

Additionally, there has been a doubling of interest in Home Link. A final choice will be the new Kodiak Virtual Academy for 6th to 12th graders, with information and registration available soon.

The superintendent iterated key points:

- 1) the schools can meet the health safety criteria,
- 2) students will be six feet apart,

thanks to swapping out tables for desks,

- 3) they will wear face coverings,
- 4) there will be sanitation of surfaces, increased hand-washing and open windows to help with ventilation.

Thus, school can resume, but it will not look like the "normal" of the past.

Parents are encouraged, at this meeting and in a district-wide letter from the superintendent, to contact their school's principals about what choice of instruction they prefer. Sometime next month, parents will have to make a firm commitment, so logistics can be worked out.

Younger children who learn remotely in the afternoon might have a different teacher for that segment because the teachers would not be expected to teach both in-class and remote at the same time.

However, this is not so different than the current model which involves regrouping occasionally.

Middle school and high school students would likely follow an A

day/B day schedule, so they would have an opportunity be with all of their teachers in-person half the time.

When the conversation switched to transportation, Tim Bentz, Transportation Director, shared the good news that most bus routes can accommodate being only half full so students are well-spaced.

There are three routes, all in the Peshastin/Dryden/Cashmere area, that tend to have filled seats.

It might be necessary to add extra routes to lower the number of riders per bus in that area.

Children will have assigned seats and fill the back of the bus first. Siblings will sit next to each other.

A few windows will be opened partway to allow for good air circulation. Bentz believes the temperature inside the bus will not drop to uncomfortable levels, at least not for the first few months.

Bentz described the bus disinfection protocols that have been in place since February.

The bus drivers disinfect the seats, backs and hand rails once

per day. The rate could increase to twice per day if necessary.

A question about how temperatures would be checked for bus riders expanded into a larger discussion about the daily temperature checks and health screenings. Hopefully, staff will be able to self-screen at home.

For students arriving at school, using a no-touch thermometer and staff asking screening questions could cause delays into entering the schools.

Beckendorf-Edou said the district purchased one walk-through style temperature checker, which might improve efficiency.

As for bus riders, parent Mary Jo Sanborn suggested children could have a visible tag on their backpack to serve as proof that parents have cleared their child as healthy and able to ride the bus.

Sam Jerome, Cascade Medical RN and Employee Health Nurse, liked the tag idea because the bus driver could assess it quickly and no one would have to touch it.

The tag could serve a second purpose of having the assigned

seat number written on it to help kids remember.

Using thermometers on the bus routes would be problematic because of the time it takes to use, the need for a second adult on every bus and also thermometers' lower accuracy in cold weather.

Parent Annie Schmidt cautioned, "A robust health check won't happen every day for busy parents, so spot checks of temperatures would be useful."

Beckendorf-Edou assured the group that there would be some level of secondary checking when children arrived off their buses.

### Alex Tsimerman - Prefers StandupAmerica Party

John was born in Detroit, Michigan on February 12, 1943, to James Alfred Lafer and Florence Buttolph Lafer.

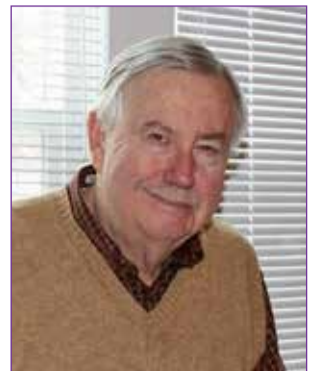

# Best treatment for athlete's foot

**Q: What is the best treatment for athlete's foot?**

If you suffer from "Athlete's Foot," you have lots of company: nearly 1 out of every 5 Americans have a fungus infecting their skin or nails, called tinea or ringworm. The tinea fungus thrives in warm, moist, and dark places, so people tend to get infections from tinea in areas that are tightly covered and sweaty.

The medical name for infection with tinea depends on which area of your body is affected. For example, if your foot is affected with tinea, it's called tinea pedis, or "athlete's foot." A tinea infection in the groin area is referred to as tinea cruris, or "jock itch."

Tinea organisms infect your feet by finding blisters or cracks in the skin between your toes. Taking good care of your feet and keeping the skin on your feet intact helps prevent you from becoming infected with tinea.

All fungus needs moisture to thrive. Keeping your feet as dry as possible will discourage its growth and lower its ability to infect you. If possible, wear sandals with open toes to encourage air circulation to your feet and reduce sweating. Sunlight shining on your skin also helps retard the growth of tinea fungus.

Some other key strategies to help keep your feet as dry as possible include avoiding tight shoes and frequently changing your socks. Some people wear running socks designed to wick moisture away and reduce friction that can create blisters. Putting powder on your feet before you put on your socks can also help absorb moisture.

Which remedy should you use for your athlete's foot? There are several products to choose from that don't require a prescription. My personal recommendation is terbinafine 1% gel, also known as Lami-



sil AT&E gel.

Terbinafine is also available as a cream, but I recommend using gel because it is less moisturizing than the cream. Less moisture on your skin is a good thing when treating a fungal infection like tinea.

When selecting an antifungal product from the pharmacy shelf, be careful to LOOK at the label to ensure you are getting the medication you want.

My husband has been fighting "athlete's foot" for decades, applying a non-prescription antifungal lotion on his feet every night. Every time he thinks he's purchasing the same brand, he somehow ends up with different medicine.

The original formulation of Lamisil A contains terbinafine. Today the company that owns the Lamisil A brand sells products containing different antifungal agents under the same name. Lamisil AF cream contains clotrimazole, Lamisil AF powder aerosol contains miconazole, and Lamisil Ultra cream contains butenafine.

It's the same with the Desenex brand of antifungal medicines. Although the original Desenex formulations contains undecylenate, Desenex cream contains clotrimazole, and Desenex foot powder contains miconazole.

**Here are 5 Tips on Treating Athlete's Foot:**

1. Keep your feet as dry as possible. Fungus loves warm, moist, and dark places. Always dry carefully between your toes after bathing or swimming, avoid tight shoes, and change your socks frequently, twice daily, if possible. Wearing sandals instead of shoes whenever possible also helps keep your feet dry.
2. Sterilize your socks. Use cotton socks and

wash them in HOT water. Tinea can live in your socks. Laundering your socks with scalding water reduces the likelihood of tinea fungus reinfecting your feet.

3. Use an antifungal gel, lotion, cream consistently for at least 2 weeks.

Apply your antifungal treatment twice a day for a minimum of two weeks, or until your symptoms are completely gone.

4. Use antifungal powders for maintenance, not for cure.

Don't use antifungal powder to treat an active infection because it's not powerful enough alone to eradicate the fungus. If your symptoms don't completely resolve in 2 weeks, keep treating your feet twice a day.

5. Treat an additional 2 weeks after your symptoms disappear.

Once your symptoms go away, continue treatment twice a day for another two weeks. This is very important because it helps the fungus get completely shed out of your skin. If you leave tinea fungus on the surface of your feet, they can start multiplying, and you'll be right back where you started.

6. Keep your foot fungus from coming back with a maintenance regimen.

Once your "athlete's foot" symptoms resolve and you've treated it for an additional 2 weeks, switch to a maintenance program to keep it from coming back. Using an antifungal foot powder or spray powder 1-2 times a day helps to control moisture, which helps prevent future infections.

**Waterfall Walks**

The heat of the summer has finally made an appearance making this a great time to hike a trail to a cold and refreshing waterfall. Looking for suggestions? Here's a few:

**Rainbow Falls**

Rainbow Falls near Stehekin in the North Cascades National Park Complex is a must visit destination if you are in this area. From the trailhead it's only a ¼-mile round trip walk to enjoy the mist from the 312-foot waterfall. There is one catch though, the normal shuttle bus operated by the National Park Service in Stehekin is not running this year so you'll have to hike or bicycle here from the boat landing.

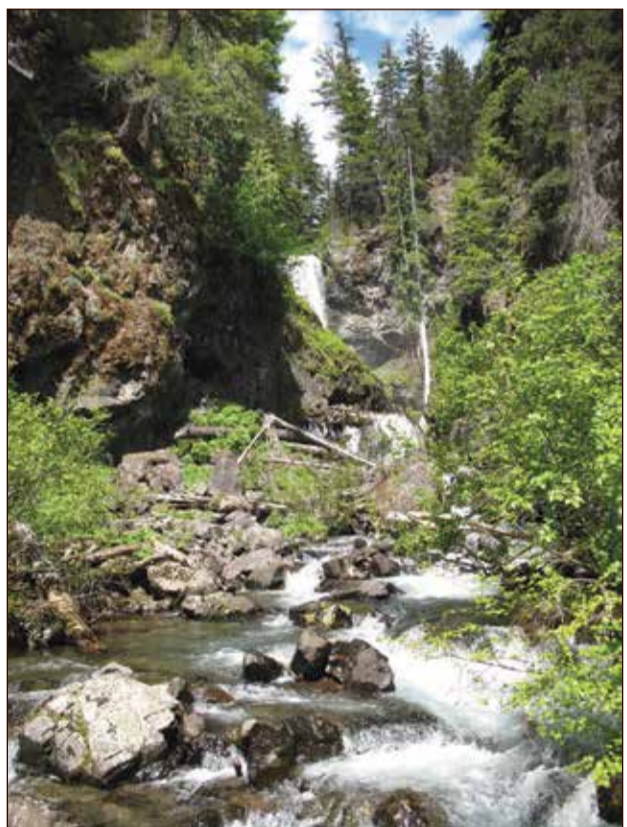
**Silver Falls**

Silver Falls is another great option located west of Entiat in Chelan County. Drive 29.5 miles up the Entiat River Road to reach the trailhead. From there you'll have a relatively steep climb of 600 feet for about a mile to reach the top of the falls. The total trail distance is 1.7 miles making this a favorite for families.

**Douglas Falls**

Douglas Falls can be reached from Douglas Falls Grange Park, a DNR managed property near Colville. A 1.5-mile loop hike which includes travel over a suspension bridge will give you good views of this picturesque waterfall.

**Rodney and Hardy Falls**

Rodney and Hardy Falls don't get the respect they should. You can reach them through a 2.5-mile hike from Beacon Rock State Park in the Columbia River gorge. The 600-foot elevation gain on a hot day will let you truly enjoy the 50-foot waterfalls you'll find here.

**Palouse Falls**

Finally, you can't talk about waterfalls in Eastern Washington without mentioning Palouse Falls. Located north of Lyons Ferry you can take in views at the State Park here of a dramatic 198-foot drop as the Palouse River spills into a basalt basin below. No hike is required for this view but there are also trails taking you towards the top of the falls. If you go this way be sure to stay

on the main path and don't get too close to the cliffs. Several people have fallen from the edge with tragic results.

**Lake Wenatchee Sockeye**

An unexpectedly strong return of sockeye salmon up the Columbia River this summer (over 330,000 fish as of July 14th) has a lot of anglers wondering if and when the popular Lake Wenatchee sockeye fishery will open up this year.

Checking in with WDFW Biologist Travis Maitland I learned he is, "Cautiously optimistic that there will be enough fish for a modest fishery at the lake. Modest meaning 30 to 40 thousand salmon which would be 7 to 17 thousand over and above the spawn-

ing escapement goal of 23,000."

If this forecast holds true, Maitland anticipates the daily limit would be 2 to 4 fish and the season could start as early as the last week of July but probably the first week of August since the run is a bit late this year.

**Okanogan Limited Entry Deer Hunts**

Eighteen special limited entry deer tags will be issued this summer allowing six bowhunters, six muzzleloader hunters and six modern firearms hunters the opportunity to harvest deer in the 6,000-acre Charles and Mary Eder Unit of the Scotch Creek State Wildlife Area in September and October. Located in Okanogan County, this wildlife area is known for having a healthy amount of both mule and white-tailed deer. The deadline to apply is August 14th and winners, randomly drawn, will be announced at the end of August. You can apply online through the WDFW website or through the WDFW North Central Regional Office in Ephrata.

Picking the whole tree will be much harder. Yet, the stock market is acting like we've already picked it, packaged it, and sent it off to the grocery store.

**Bull:** The stock market is a forward-looking beast.

The moment there's a widely available vaccine, we

can get back to normal.

Even if "normal" is two years away, the end is in sight.

So, why not be invested in stocks?

**Bear:** Yes, the stock market is looking ahead, but the future is hard to predict – and the stock market isn't always right.

We are far from "normal," and I don't think we're getting back there anytime soon.

If this recovery stopped right now, this would be the second worst recession of all

time (after the Great Depression).

If we can claw back to 90% of our previous economic glory by the end of the year, that might sound like a victory.

But, that implies a 10% recession, which would be the 2nd worst of all time.

As a comparison, during the Financial Crisis in 2008, the economy only fell 4.3%.

So, we have a deep hole to dig ourselves out of.

**Bull:** But we are already digging, and the stock market can see that.

In addition, trillions of dollars were tossed at this problem, and trillions more may come.

Also, gas prices are low, interest rates are low, and there's pent-up demand from the millions of people who've been stuck in their homes eagerly waiting to go buy stuff.

Once we move beyond the

virus, the economy is set to explode.

**Bear:** Yes, there's historical levels of money floating around the economy. But, how long can that last?

Oktoberfest was just cancelled in Leavenworth. That's still 3 months away!

I fear our weak economy may last much longer than the government's willingness (or ability) to cut huge checks.

More importantly, printing money and going into debt isn't "real."

True economic growth is built on consumers spending and businesses investing.

But, who's going to spend and invest aggressively after taking a big economic punch, and when things could be shut down again at any moment?

**Bull:** Let's assume you're right, and we suffer a major recession and a long, slow recovery.

Can't the stock market continue to grow?

Remember, the stock market isn't exactly the same thing as the economy.

The stock market is made up of the biggest companies in the world; companies that can actually benefit from the little guys getting crushed.

In other words, as smaller businesses fail because of a bad economy, the Amazon's, Chipotles, and Home Depots of the world survive and take a bigger piece of the pie, even if the pie is smaller.

**Bear:** If the little guy is getting crushed, eventually, it will "trickle up." Consumers make up 2/3rds of the US economy.

If consumers aren't consuming, how profitable can even the biggest businesses be?

**Bull:** Well, the companies in the S&P 500 earn half

their revenues from outside America.

While Americans are the "best" consumers, 95% of the world's consumers live outside America.

So, even if the American economy is weak, stocks can be strong.

**Bear:** If the US economy falters, the world economy will follow.

As the saying goes, when America sneezes, the world gets sick.

At least for the moment, the stock market can celebrate in the face of a weak economy – but it can't last forever.

Oh, by the way, the Phase One trade deal with China is effectively dead, and there is an election in a few months.

**Bull:** Okay, I'm convinced. Sell everything.

MANSON – Dale England, candidate for Chelan County Commissioner District 3, brother of longtime Chelan County Commissioner Doug England, replied to several questions asked by NCW Media. He is competing against Brandt Cappell and Tiffany Gering for the position.

The field will be narrowed to two candidates after the Tuesday, August 4 primary.

**NCW Media: What immediate actions would you take to safely reopen Leavenworth and (city of) Chelan so tourist money can once again flow?**

**Dale England:** All businesses must have a plan to safely open. Working with the Chelan

Douglas Health District, we could create a generic opening plan that businesses could adjust to fit their situation. By advocating for more local control from Olympia, Chelan County businesses could determine their best avenue to open safely as soon as possible.

**NCW: As commissioner, will you have any money at your disposal to bailout companies that are or have already, gone under?**

**DE:** Unfortunately, there is no budgeted County money to save these businesses. The County is currently using available Federal money to help in certain situations. Chelan County and the Port District are combining funds to extend the benefits to our citizens. As more money becomes available it will

be distributed, but businesses will continue to struggle until they can open and function at full capacity. Even when fully open many will struggle to survive, which is why the county needs to continue to lobby Olympia for local control and to work with the health district to create a safe re-opening plan.

**NCW: What is the biggest difference between you, Tiffany Gering and Brandt Cappell?**

**DE:** My lifetime of professional and service experience is what sets me apart. I have started 2 successful businesses in Chelan County. This required a strategic plan and a budget that had to be followed. These businesses have given me invaluable leadership and planning experience. I also worked

for nearly three decades at the

Chelan County Sheriff's Office. That time gave me a unique perspective of public safety and what it takes to be prepared for emergencies. Much of my life has been spent working in and managing orchards. I also served on the foundation committee that planned the Law Enforcement Memorial. To accomplish this many people from different backgrounds had to work together. The time spent with my businesses, owning and managing farms, and serving on community boards and organization has given me unique experience in finances, agriculture, tourism and security.

**NCW: Will you maintain the marijuana growing moratorium for the county?**

**DE:** I think the current commission has basically settled this issue. As new projects were brought forward, I would evaluate each case by its merits.

with talk of new taxes coming from Olympia, we can not continue to go to the taxpayers and ask for more. The commission will have tough budgeting decisions to make. However, we can form a county budget based on the priorities that are important to our county without asking for more from our citizens.

**NCW: Anything else to add?**

**BC:** While we are focused on the current pandemic and economic distress resulting from the shutdown, there are many other issues that are affecting the everyday lives of the citizens of Chelan County. My promise to you is to be open and available to all of those I represent. Although some might claim this is a part-time position, I believe that the \$100,000 salary of your tax dollars demands my full attention. My full time job will be to serve and advocate for you. I look forward to earning your vote in the August primary.
