School Board Meeting Includes Resolution Declaring State of Financial Emergency

The Cascade School Board held a regular board meeting on May 26th.

The first notable agenda item was a Budget Presentation by Dwight Remick, CSD Executive Director of Finance and Operations.

Remick explained that the current year budget must be adopted in July. This was an initial presentation about budgeting for the unknown of COVID-19, with an understanding that there would be a deeper dive at the next meeting, followed by work sessions.

One of the presentation slides went over the revenue projections and need to prepare for reductions.

It stated, "Given the impacts of COVID-19 on the total revenues for the State, we are being advised to plan for a 10% reduction in all other funding categories [beyond basic education]...

The overall possible reductions are projected at almost \$900,000."

The presentation went on to give many examples of proposed cuts and adjustments to equal that expected shortfall.

Impacts could be felt in staffing, staff training, administration, extracurriculars and materials and supplies.

Some adjustments have already occurred, including a hiring and spending

Remick concluded by saying, "Our budgeting projections are a crystal ball that is not just foggy but completely shattered."

There was limited discussion afterward, but board members requested a copy of the presentation to study in more detail on their own.

There were several action items related to personnel on the agenda. PD Librarian Helen Hoper's retirement after many years of service was approved. Also, the resignation of Special Ed

Chamberlain, was approved.

The Dean of Students position was disconnected from the contract with Special Education Director and added to the contract of Dean of Athletics.

The resignation of IRMS CTE/STEM and Hi Cap teacher, Aaron Hansen was approved only after four district parents spoke strongly in favor of Hansen's continuation. These parents, of children who are identified and assessed as highly capable, spoke about how Hansen had given their children depth of learning during his short tenure that hadn't occurred until this year.

Annie Schmidt spoke of how her daughter wrestled with the challenges Hansen gave her and had to do more introspective work, which Schmidt praised.

The board could not legally discuss the resignation, but only approve it.

After that approval, a

> tion of the Hi Cap program. Superintendent Tracey Beckendorf-Edou acknowledged the good work of Hansen and the district's continuing commitment to both Hi Cap and STEM.

> After policy reviews, the board passed two resolutions. Resolution 19/20-7, Emergency Waiver for Instructional Hours, needed to occur to be submitted with a packet of documentation to the state. Beckendorf-Edou explained that, unlike many other districts, "We do not need the school day waiver, because students were provided continuous learning opportunities right from the first day of school building closures. That is why we are able to end school as scheduled on June 10thrather than needing to extend our school year."

City council awards contract for water meter replacement

Correct Equipment, Inc of Redmond, Wash. was the winning bidder for installation of the cities new Advanced Metering System. The winning bid was for \$614,698.60. Not including the cost of replacement of any meter well lids. It is unclear from Council meeting minutes if the potential cost of lid replacements was explored. It depends on the number of lids that need to be replaced. The new meters do require that current cast iron and concrete lids be replaced with Polymer lids in order for the radios to be able to remotely read the meters.

The original estimates for this project were that it would cost \$900,000 to \$950,000. Six bids were received ranging from Correct Equipment's low bid of \$614,699 to \$907,656. City staff interviewed the top three proposals on May 13. Staff recommended the low bidder Correct Equipment.

The project is funded by two grants. One from a Federal WaterSMART Grant of \$300,000 and an Icicle Work Group Grant award of \$487,000. Depending on the cost of lid replacements the project could be completely funded through the two grants.

Councilwoman Sharon Waters had a few questions about the impact of the new meters on

customers. She was concerned about loss of water pressure as a result of the new meters, how the new meters would impact customer bills, security of the data being transmitted and the impact of weather on the system.

It was pointed out by the spokesperson for the installation of the meters that the meters do send out an alert if the temperature in the pit drops below 37 degrees. City **Public Works Director** Herb Amick pointed out that the pits are insulated and he actually thought getting alerts about temperature in the pits would improve the functionality of the system.

Waters was assured that it would not impact water pressure but that the improved accuracy of the meters could well result in increases to the customers' bills. Waters was also assured that the information being transmitted was encrypted and could only be read by the city staff.

Council approves transfer of \$20,000 to **Festhalle Fund**

As a result of cancellation of events at the Festhalle the fund will become negative by \$2753.75 as of May 26. To prevent that and recognize the ongoing problem of reduced revenues from Festhalle events. Council approved a transfer of funds of \$20,000 from the General Fund.

Beckendorf-Edou on the tremendous effort to document efforts of continuous learning at each grade level.

Resolution 19/20-8 declares a state of "Financial Emergency" for the district. This was a necessary step, given the fund balance is below what is expected. This resolution was approved.

Next the superintendent acknowledged a donation from community member Tom Clayton that went to assist vulnerable families in the district.

Also, The Chelan-Doug-

las School Retirees' Association gave a grant for hotspots for some English Learner families.

The meeting concluded with graduation updates from CHS Principal Elia Ala'ilima-Daley.

Speaking with a strong desire to make graduation as special as possible within the constraints due to CO-VID-19, Ala'ilima-Daley detailed creative touches staff are planning for seniors.

He was a jack of many trades, able to build or fix nearly anything. What he didn't know, he self taught, pouring over books and instruction manuals every time something went kaput. He and his father, and later his son. Tracv. did all the equipment repair for the farm, as well as creating many new "tools" and machines along the way.

Pilkinton Orchards was a member of Blue Bird Warehouse, where he proudly served as a board member for four years in the late 70's. When he won his first term, mom made his favorite cake and frosted "Congratulations to the New B.M". We couldn't wait for him to walk through the door and see it. He loved it, laughing and howling. He asked her how she knew he would win... she said she just did. He was a farmer through and through, and a man always happy to be using his hands. He was continually

As kids it was an adventure to go out at night during spring frost and light smudge pots and sit in the Honey Bee Trailer and drink cocoa. Once he arranged for us to take a ride in the crop duster helicopter, landing and taking off right in the orchard.

He loved fishing when he could get away, and spent many hours enjoying the outdoors with us. Trudging through Icicle Creek hunting under rocks for periwinkles (dad called them penniwinkles) the night before a fishing expedition was as fun as being on the lake.

In his younger days he was an Explorer Scout and led a troop of young Explorers in Leavenworth, teaching bow hunting and other outdoor skills. He taught Firearm Safety for many years at the Leavenworth Fish Hatchery.

He was always ready to help and support his family in every way. He delighted in his role as grandpa (papa) to Kelsey Rose

the State of Washington, DOT, and Jordan. He loved to laugh, go on picnics, and play cribbage and "Kabowski" with his kids, grandkids, and friends.

Two of his hobbies were leather and metal work. He and his wife attended Dryden Community Church, enjoying their extended family and loving support.

After mom passed, he participated in his first Bible classes, reading the Bible from front to back. And he learned to bake pies, fruit pies, lots of them. He had watched his mother and our mom bake thousands of them. He was a colon cancer survivor.

Dad was kind and sweet and cheerful, and loved to laugh, but he was no pushover. When he dug his heels in, they were set.

He lived life on his terms, sometimes to the exasperation of those around him. He was tough. He taught his children to work, be responsible and trustworthy. 

Local health providers urge patients to continue seeking care

NORTH CENTRAL WASHINGTON — Local healthcare facilities have teamed up with more than 100 hospitals across the state to urge our communities not to put their health care on pause during the COVID-19 pandemic. Clinics and healthcare centers across the state - including Cascade Medical, Confluence Health and Columbia Valley Community Health have reported abnormally low volumes of patients seeking routine medical care. At the same time, visitors to the emergency department are arriving with more severe illness, having delayed care. The educational campaign is aimed at addressing the concerns keeping people from seeking appropriate care. "We've heard that patients are afraid of contracting COVID from other patients in the hospital or that care teams won't have time to care for them if it isn't COVID-related," Washington State Hospital Association (WSHA) President & CEO Cassie Sauer said. "Health care teams are taking steps to ensure people's safety when they need to seek care - from screen-

ing to eliminating waiting rooms. Care is safe and available for you and your family. Please, don't let your health become an emergency."

Care is available by phone, video call, or in person. In-person care looks a little different now - you might see more people in masks, be asked screening questions, or have your temperature taken. All these precautions are to ensure your health and safety. Make the call to your healthcare team and let them make the call about your medical needs.

As is my practice, I am going to share my thoughts with you on our current pandemic. But the pandemic I am going to address is not COVID-19. You are going to get a bit of a respite on that one.

I am talking about a pandemic that has been with us a lot longer, inflicting untold damage on individuals and entire communities. It brings death and destruction in its path. And there is not now, nor will there ever be, a vaccine. I am talking about the ingrained and institutionalized racism that continues to plague our great nation.

The latest casualties are George Floyd and Ahmaud Arbery, their families, and their communities. It is a rampant disease, often existing silently just beneath the

It is far more widespread than any of us want to believe. We want to believe that it is isolated. We want to believe that it is restricted to the south. We want to believe it is restricted to large cities. *Certainly, it is not a problem* for us, is it?

In truth, this is a disease in which all of us who are white are carriers. We all spread it, most often unwittingly, (I would hope), but at times very blatantly. I can't imagine what it would be like every time you walk or jog in public to be accompanied by fear.

Every time you are pulled over by a policeman to wonder if this might be the end. Every time you are in a store to have extra eyes following your every move.

It is so far from my experience, that I have a hard time comprehending that anyone would have to live this way. But those who are people of color, do. But over and over and over again, we see individuals and communities of color paying the price, while we pretend it isn't really our problem.

Years ago, I bought my dream car, a classic jetblack 1985 Jeep CJ7 hardtop. Moist earth greeted us as we cruised by rows of tall stalks of corn alternating with lush fields of bushy soybeans.

Saturday afternoon was magic, but Sunday morning was a nightmare. When I woke up, my nose was stuffed up nose, and my eves itched like fire.

What could have set off my allergies? The only thing I'm allergic to is ragweed, and we drove past corn and soybeans.

I hate to tell you, honey, but we definitely drove past ragweed yesterday. I saw TONS of it growing thick in the ditches by the sides of the road.

Aaargh!

If you need to soothe the discomfort of itchy eyes from allergies gone wild, you'll find several eye drops available without a prescription. How do you choose the best one?

Lubricating eye drops can ease the burning and help relieve dryness. Systane®, GenTeal®, or Refresh® help reduce the isand in your eyes feeling



by flushing pesky pollens away, but can't shut down vour allergic reaction once

it starts. Decongestant eye drops help your eyes look less red or bloodshot by shrinking the blood vessels in the whites of your eyes. They can help reduce puffiness around your eyelids but don't help reduce allergic reactions.

Naphazoline is the only decongestant eye drop available without a prescription. Sold as Naphcon, it's also available combined with an antihistamine, such as Visine-A® and Naphcon-A® ("A" means antihistamine). Eye drops containing naphazoline can cause trigger dry eyes and aggravate certain types of glaucoma, threatening your vision. Because of this risk, avoid using naphazoline eye drops for more than 3 days at a time. If you have glaucoma, you should avoid using naphazoline eye drops completely.

Antihistamine eye drops help reverse eye itching and swelling from allergies. Pheniramine maleate is an antihistamine available in both Visine-A® and Naphcon-A® eye drops. Because these eye drops also contain the decongestant naphazoline, they should only be used for 3-5 days at a time.

The most effective eye

drops to use when allergies strike is ketotifen. Ketotifen works both by helping prevent an allergic reaction and by calming it down once it starts.

When you encounter something you are allergic to, it triggers a chain reaction leading to redness, swelling, and itching. This reaction is triggered by a chemical called histamine. Your body stores histamine in specialized cells called mast cells. When it recognizes pollen or cat dander as something you are allergic to, these mast cells open up and release histamine into your bloodstream, creating the misery

of an allergic reaction. Medicines called mast cell stabilizers BLOCK this chain reaction from getting started because they keep histamine locked up inside vour mast cells. Ketotifen and olopatadine are mast cell stabilizers used in eye drops. Thanks to them, I can drive past ditches full of blooming ragweed without suffering the next day, because they can keep histamine safely inside my mast cells.

Ketotifen and olopatadine have other effects than keeping histamine safe inside your mast cells. They also work as antihistamines to prevent and relieve allergic reactions. Once sold as the prescription drug Zatidor®, ketotifen is also available as Alaway® brand eye drops. Prescription-strength olopatadine (Pataday®) is now available without a prescription.

Here are 4 Tips on Using

Eye Drops for Allergies: 1. Avoid naphazoline eye

Decongestant eye drops don't address the allergic reaction and only reduce redness. Limit your use of naphazoline eye drops to three days at a time, and avoid it entirely if you have glaucoma.

2. Choose ketotifen (Zatidor®) or olopatadine (Pataday®) eye drops for best results.

Ketotifen and olopatadine work both as antihistamines and mast cell stabilizers to relieve itchy eyes. They are also safe to use in children as young as 2 or 3 years old.

3. Use only one drop in

Any more than one drop at a time will just run out and be wasted. Wait a bit before giving yourself another dose.

4. Keep it clean.

Always wash your hands first and avoid touching the tip of the dropper directly to your eye or to any other surface.

Tournamentfishing and humble pie

My fishing partner, Rusty Johnston, and I always considered ourselves to be very good bass anglers. At least, we did until we decided to dip our toes into the world of tournament fishing.

Every September there is an event at Potholes Reservoir called the "Old Fart's Bass Tournament" where at least one of the two anglers in the boat has to be over 40 years old. The rules are simple. Fish for eight hours and weigh in the five heaviest bass from each boat by 3 p.m. All the bass are released after the weigh-in.

Our first foray into tournament fishing didn't go well. We weighed in a fivefish limit but altogether they only weighed three pounds. Yikes! We've fished this annual tournament five times. Our heaviest bag was a five-fish limit weighing 14 ½ pounds. Not bad but not anywhere near a paycheck when the winners routinely weigh in 20 to 25-pound limits.

We've learned a few things along the way. First off, your boat and motor matters. Rusty owns a 1994 16-foot aluminum boat with a 40 HP outboard motor. Top speed? About 29 MPH. The competition? They primarily fish out of 17 to 20-foot bass boats with outboards ranging from 90 HP all the way to 200 HP and they can top out at nearly 60 MPH. When it comes to getting to the hot spot at first light, we don't stand a chance.

Then there's the issue of staying on the hot spot.

Many new bass boats have power poles mounted on the stern that can anchor a boat in shallow waters of less than 10-feet. Other's have trolling motors with a feature called Spot Lock that keeps the boat in place. If you are fishing a piece of structure like an underwater hump you can lock yourself in at the top and fish the slopes where the fish often hang out. As for us? We have an old anchor and a rope. It works but we tend to float away several yards from where the anchor drops, meaning our positioning (and ability to target the fish) is not as exact.

Something else we've found is the need for a modern fishfinder with a GPS plotter and map. We have a basic fishfinder that shows us the bottom and fish but it doesn't have a GPS plotter. During one tournament, we drifted over a habitat box at the bottom of the lake. These boxes provide cover for bait fish and bass are attracted to these boxes too. We picked up a decent bass as we drifted over the box but with no GPS, we couldn't find that box again despite trying to do so for ½ an hour. At about that time a modern bass boat roared in. Using a way point the anglers had previously marked with their GPS, they went right to that habitat box. In 15 minutes, the anglers on board reeled in five good bass and sped off to the weigh-in site. That was the moment

we realized it was time to upgrade! We can't afford to buy a new boat or motor but we are upgrading to a modern fishfinder. We've ordered a new Lowrance Hook Reveal 7 that has incredible sonar with the ability to see not only what's below with incredible clarity but also a side sonar feature to see

what's on either side of the boat. This Lowrance unit also has a GPS plotter and a Navionics map with topographic information for 11,000 lakes to include Potholes Reservoir. Better still, it's all displayed on a 7-inch color screen and is very easy to use.

We'll spend the summer using this to mark the humps and habitat boxes around the lake that hold fish in the fall. We are also fishing a new event; the Berkley Big Bass Tournament taking place October 3rd at Potholes Reservoir. With our new Lowrance and a little luck, we might finally take home a paycheck. Then, we can go back to believing we are as good of anglers as we once thought we were! I'll let you know how it goes.
