## Kelly Coulter Wins Teacher of the Year Award for Cascade School District

Kelly Coulter has worn many hats in the educational system of Cascade School District. "I started at Peshastin-Dryden Elementary as a long-term substitute teacher in 2011. After that I was fortunate to be hired full-time at PD as a kindergarten, first, and second grade teacher, and then I split my time teaming with Tina Richardson while we shared two roles: kindergarten teacher and intervention specialist," Coulter recalled. "Last fall I was hired to be the full-time intervention specialist at Alpine Lakes Elementary."

Coulter has been recognized for excellence in all her roles by receiving the Teacher of the Year Award for Cascade School District.

Emily Ross, principal of Coulter. "We've called a meeting to discuss a student's progress in math. The teacher is there, the counselor is there, I'm there, and Kelly is there. Everyone pulls out their information regarding student progress - papers are out, crisp manila folders line the table, and then Kelly sits down. Imagine - rolling behind her on a wagon are graphs, data charts, historical progress charts from the last five academic years of this student, and, on top of it all, her laptop, able to compile everything into digital form."

Coulter is gifted with the unique combination of rigorous data analysis skills while being able to connect meaningfully with students and coworkers. As intervention specialist, she is able to and excels at continuously looking through the lenses of small and big picture outcomes for each student.

She describes her job well. "An intervention specialist's

role is to identify students who may need additional instruction in math or reading. I work closely with grade level teachers, our English Language teacher and paraeducators to create flexible groups of students who may need a second lesson on a skill that was previously taught. We act like detectives: we find holes in students' understanding and then help fill in the gaps with targeted intervention, or reteach. The best part of the job is when the student has that aha moment when both of us see the gap that was there and we have successfully filled it."

Intervention specialists are not new to education, but they have previously been called Title Teachers or LAP (Learning Assistance Program) Teachers. "These positions are funded by federal programs," explained Coulter. While this type of support is also in the secondary schools, "There's a larger presence in K-5 schools because research shows we can make a big impact with early reading and math intervention."

Coulter's teaching style must continually adapt to her students' current needs. "Each week I prepare lessons based on a skill that was previously taught in math or reading. Normally we have groups of five to six students at a time. I have two wonderful paraeducators who help me.

"Our school district uses a research-based approach called MTSS (Multi-Tiered System of Support), and we measure the RTI (Response to Intervention). The important part of our program is ensuring students do not

## The doctor will see you now - online Video appointments now available

LEAVENWORTH – Patients can now visit with their primary care team through a computer or mobile device, thanks to a new telehealth service launched this week at Cascade Medical.

Think of telehealth as a video chat with your healthcare provider. Instead of visiting the family practice clinic in person, patients can see and talk to their provider in real-time. All patients need is an internet browser, and a device with a camera and microphone. Cascade Medical is working on a plan to accommodate those who don't have adequate technology or internet.

Cascade Medical partnered with Doxy, a telehealth company that allows patients to join the video chat with a secure, HIPAA-compliant link – no downloads or apps required. To schedule a telehealth appointment, call the Family Practice Clinic at (509) 548-5815, and a staff member will schedule the appointment and send a follow-up email with a link to join the video chat when it's time for their appointment.

Standard copay and deductibles apply; contact your insurance provider regarding coverage.

"Telehealth was already part of our long-range plan, but the immediacy of the COVID-19 pandemic spurred the need for quick action and innovation," said Clinic Medical Director, Jay Jerome.



During the pandemic, telehealth will allow patients – especially those at high risk of COVID-19 complications – to seek routine medical care safely, from the comfort of their homes.

"I know there are a lot of people out there experiencing stress, worry and loneliness right now," said Maxwell Moholy, clinical psychologist. "Teletherapy will allow people to access services to help regain a sense of control and connection."

After the threat of COVID-19 has passed, telehealth is intended to serve as a supplement, but not a replacement, to in-person care.

"Ultimately, we still want to see our patients in person, but we also want to offer flexibility and convenience when it's appropriate to do so," Dr. Jerome said.

**These services are available via telehealth:**

- Behavioral health/therapy visits with Clinical Psychologist Maxwell

- Nutritional counseling with Dietitian Katelin Limon
  - Chronic Care follow-up (hypertension or diabetes, for example)
  - Minor rashes or infections, medication review and refills
  - Hospital care follow-up
- Some visits are still offered on-site at Cascade Medical, including:**
- Acute/urgent needs
  - Suboxone treatment
  - Depo Provera injections
  - Well child visits under 15 months
  - New patient visits with medication refill needs
  - Commercial Driver's License physicals
  - Scheduled immunization appointments

**Some services are suspended through June 1:**

- Sports physicals
- Well child visits over age 15 months
- Annual, routine wellness exams, well-woman exams

miss tier one instruction, the instruction from the classroom teacher to all students. The students I teach are taught during a tier two session, a time when all students can practice and deepen understanding. After the intervention we retest to see that the skill was learned. Then we move on to the next skill. Some skills are tricky to unbundle and take more than a week to reteach, and that is what makes my job especially challenging and fun.”

Coulter works closely with students, but equally important is her partnering with teachers and administrators to improve outcomes. Colleague Tina Richardson said, “Kelly’s collaboration with staff is ongoing, and her colleagues are the better for it. Kelly’s growth mindset is unstoppable!”

“Kelly’s energy and com-

mitment are infectious,” said Kenny Renner-Singer, principal of ALPS. “Our instructional support program is two to three years ahead of where I thought we would be, thanks to Kelly’s leadership. She collaborates with teams, uses data and provides research-based instruction to struggling learners. Finally, she builds meaningful relationships with her students and advocates for their learning. For example, she attends all parent conferences and IEP meetings of her students and advocates for their learning and social/emotional health.”

In this current crisis, the impact of a six weeks absence from school on students worries Coulter. “I am extremely concerned. It is an unprecedented situation for families to be in charge of directing the learning of their children.

Teachers have done a great job pulling together packets of materials for families, and families will do the best they can with them. Each week teachers will be given new information from the state and the district about what we can offer next. I am currently spending time taking on-line classes and learning how to teach K-5 students remotely so I can support teachers and students during this transition.”

When everyone is back in school, Coulter’s perspective, drive and spirit will help students and staff through that next transition. “She understands that only together can we truly impact student learning and growth on a significant scale,” said Ross. “Kelly is a researcher, an entrepreneur and is willing to be a trailblazer. Kelly has my respect!”

## Can Old Drugs do new Tricks

Watching the press release the other day of the FDA describing medications being studied for use against coronavirus, I was intrigued when the official mentioned they were studying 2 drugs as possible treatment options, chloroquine and hydroxychloroquine.

I am personally familiar

with hydroxychloroquine, because I took it for several years to successfully treat my lupus.

Ten years ago, my upper arms and lower abdominal muscles started swelling and hurting.

When the pain got so bad I couldn't turn over in bed by myself, raise my arms

above my shoulders, or lift more than 5 pounds, I got scared. At the same time, my hands broke out in an itchy, painful rash, and my cuticles became so exquisitely tender that I could barely stand to wash my hands.

When I saw my family doctor, he explained that I

had a type of autoimmune disease called lupus and prescribed prednisone.

If I am very lucky I will NEVER, ever take that demonic medicine ever again. While I was taking the prednisone, I couldn't eat, I could barely sleep, and had several very scary "out of body" experiences. After only one week, I quit taking it and begged my doctor for something else.

He referred me to a colleague of his, a rheumatologist at Virginia Mason Hospital in Seattle, who I found out also takes care of my younger sister.

Evidently, she and I both have lupus, although she has a different type than I do. With lupus, your body attacks its own cells, creating inflammation, pain, and sometimes permanent scarring.

While some types of lupus affect blood vessels or organs, I have the dermatomyositis form, which targets your skin and muscles.

My rheumatologist started me on hydroxychloroquine, the exact same drug that the FDA is now studying for use against coronavirus.

Both hydroxychloroquine and its parent drug, chloroquine have been around since the mid-1940s, and were originally developed and marketed as alternatives to quinine to treat malaria.

Malaria is an illness caused by a parasite called plasmodium that lives on blood.

Plasmodium is transmitted from one host to another by the bite of an infected mosquito.

Although malaria used to be common in parts of the United States, today nearly all cases are acquired abroad, either in travelers returning home or recent

immigrants.

Half of the world's population is at risk of developing malaria.

In 2015 there were an estimated 214 million cases of malaria worldwide, 85% caused by the parasite Plasmodium falciparum, causing 438,000 deaths.

Malaria from P. falciparum causes infected red blood cells to stick to the sides of blood vessels, blocking oxygen delivery to your organs, and can be fatal if not treated.

Quinine was the first drug found to be helpful against malaria. A Jesuit missionary in South America heard about healing properties of the bark of the cinchona tree from the local people, and spread the word to Europe.

Native to the the Andes mountains of Peru and Ecuador, the cinchona tree was imported and cultivated in India and Indonesia to produce the drugs quinine and quinidine. While quinine treated malaria, quinidine was a heart suppressant used to control certain types of irregular heartbeat. Quinidine is rarely used today because safer heart medicines are available.

Quinine's extremely bitter taste gives a characteristic "bite" to both tonic water and vermouth, a flavored wine used in making martinis.

When Japan captured Indonesia during World War II, it cut off the source of 90% of the world's supply of quinine. Although German scientists found a replacement medication fairly quickly, called quinacrine, it eventually proved to be too toxic to be used for long

periods of time and could not prevent malaria.

With quinine still unavailable during the 1940s, the governments of both Germany and the United States each assigned task forces of scientists to discover and develop replacement anti-malarial medicines.

Ironically, although each group worked independently, they both came up with the same solution: the discovery of chloroquine and its close relative, hydroxychloroquine.

Chloroquine and hydroxychloroquine don't have just the ability to combat malaria.

The scientists who developed these medicines found that they also had potent anti-inflammatory properties, particularly helpful in easing the pain and stiffness of rheumatoid arthritis (RA).

Hydroxychloroquine continues to be frequently used for both RA and lupus, while chloroquine is reserved for treating malaria that has become resistant to other medicines.

Taking hydroxychloroquine brought my lupus under control. Let's hope that either it or its close relative chloroquine can be found useful in today's fight against the COVID-19 coronavirus.
