Cascade Medical Center Reports no positive Coronavirus tests

As of Friday March 20 Cascade Medical Media spokesperson Rachel Hansen said the hospital had conducted 44 tests for the COVID-19 virus. Eighteen of the tests were negative and the remaining results are pending.

The hospital is conducting tests for the virus but recommends individuals who have symptoms call the state Department of Health Hot-Line at 1-800-525-0127 before arriving. Symptoms include cough, fever or shortness of breath. A link to the state Department of Health guidelines for testing can be found on our website or on the hospital's website Cascademedical.org.

Patients with symptoms of concern are treated as follows: If they need medical care, we will treat them in a way that reduces exposure. If they arrive unannounced, they will don a yellow procedural mask and be directed to Triage for further evaluation.

For patients who meet testing criteria, but aren't sick enough to require an ER visit or admission, the hospital will collect a sample and send it to an off-site lab. The cost of the test is \$135, billed as an outpatient lab. Patients should check with their insurance provider regarding coverage of COVID-19 testing. The hospital also advises patients to check the hospital website for FAQ (Frequently Asked Questions) regarding testing and insurance coverage.

Hansen reports that CMC has implemented the following policies during this current health emergency.

General patients and visitors:

- All patients and vendors are being screened upon arrival.
- We've restricted visitation to Acute Care.
- Upper Valley M.E.N.D. Free Clinic, senior exercise classes, diabetes group visits and Basic Life Support classes have been canceled.
- We've published a web page dedicated to COVID-19, with answers to Frequently Asked Questions and informational guides for those who are sick and isolating at home.
- Non-urgent services have been suspended, including mammography, physical therapy, speech therapy and occupational therapy. Patients are advised to call ahead for all other appointments.
- Our bilingual insurance navigators are offering phone appointments for people who are uninsured and want

to enroll in health insurance through Washington State Healthplan Finder. They're offering a special enrollment period through April 8.

- We have reached out to Upper Valley M.E.N.D., Leavenworth Chamber, Cascade School District, Leavenworth Senior Center, Mountain Meadows and other partner agencies to offer guidance and public education.

Staff:

- All staff are being screened upon arrival, with daily temperature checks
- All non-COVID work-related travel has been suspended. This includes education, conferences, and non-COVID related meetings.
- Like other school districts in the state, Cascade School District has arranged for care for children ages 4 and up for health workers, first responders and other vulnerable populations who have no other child-care options.
- We've implemented a "return to work" policy for staff who are ill for whatever reason, in alignment with CDC recommendations.
- We've also implemented several personal protection equipment procedures to protect staff from exposure, also in alignment with CDC recommendations. We are also coordinating with our EMS, fire and law enforcement partners regarding response.
- PPE (Personal protective equipment) that has been identified as "restricted availability" from our vendors - N-95, duckbill masks and disposable gowns - has been isolated to a single locked location, with a sign-out process to conserve supplies. We are following CDC PPE conservation guidelines, so our supply lasts as long as possible.

Other actions:

- We've activated a unified command system with Chelan County fire districts 3, 6 and Lake Wenatchee, as well as Chelan County Emergency Management and Chelan-Douglas Public Health. This group meets weekly to share information, and coordinate plans, supplies and resources.

Upcoming plans:

- We're working on a plan to launch telehealth for some services; we will announce more details next week.
- We are also working to expand the number of ED and Acute Care beds.

Chelan PUD will not disconnect late payers

WENATCHEE - Chelan County PUD is taking more steps to help customer-owners manage financial and social impacts from the COVID-19 pandemic. General Manager Steve Wright announced Thursday that there will be no power, water or sewer service disconnects and that late payment fees also will be waived until further notice.

Chelan PUD's first priority is to keep delivering essential utility services, Wright said. That effort supports the work by other community leaders and public health experts to protect the community and help lower the risks faced by all.

Specific steps include:

- Offering options to customer-owners who need help paying their utility bill. Most important is for customers to call Chelan PUD as soon as possible to work out arrangements. PUD staff is available weekdays during business hours by phone at (509) 661-8002 and email at customerhelp@chelanpud.org. (PUD offices closed to the public March 13 to protect customers and staff.)
- Emphasizing social distancing by offering drop box, phone and online bill payment. Customers can leave pay-

ments in drop boxes by the front doors at our offices and in the back parking lot at the Wenatchee headquarters. You can pay your PUD bill by phone at (509) 661-8729 or pay it online by going to chelanpud.org under "My PUD Services" on the home page choose "pay my bill" to follow the instructions to pay online. That's also the place to go paperless by signing up to get your PUD bill by email with our Powerpay program.

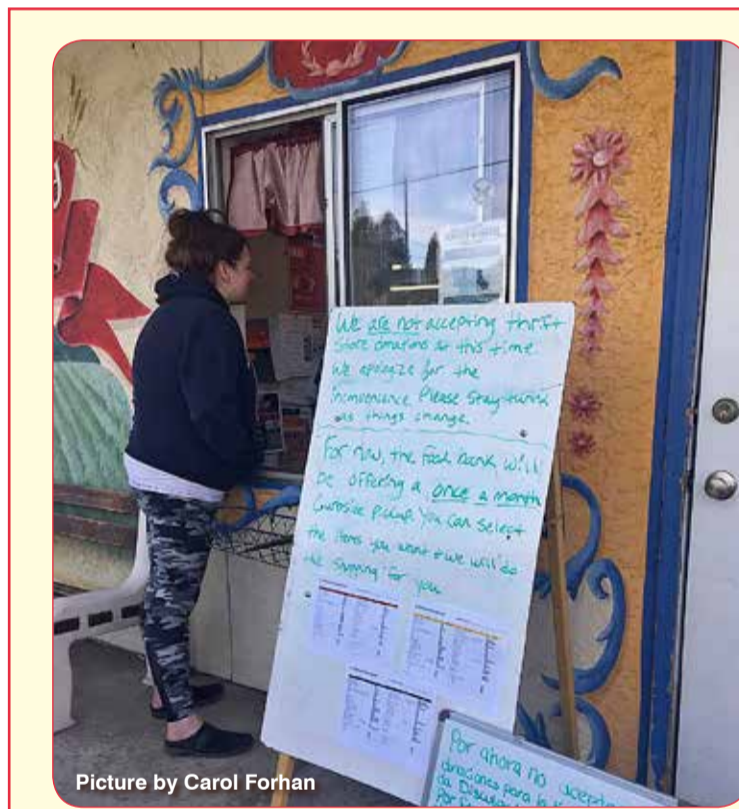
Tips for helping customers stay

Four CHS Students Qualify for Technology Students Association Nationals via Remote Competition

The coronavirus pandemic has caused upheaval in everyone's lives, and not least impacted are students of the Cascade School District. The first cancellations, music concerts, sports, school visitors and school-affiliated trips, quickly escalated to closing of all the buildings for six weeks. The district has put great effort into continuing meals for students by offering lunch sack pick ups at six locations daily. High school staff are working to ensure all seniors

are able to complete their course work for graduation. Teachers had one weekend to come up with plans for six weeks' worth of work students could do from home.

Almost all school activities were left with a void. Technology Student Association (TSA) served as one lucky exception. TSA students at Cascade High School (CHS) and Icicle River Middle School (IRMS) prepared all school year for the state competition, which was scheduled for March 18-21 in SeaTac. Teachers

of the original TSA conference was disappointing, but not a surprise.

Tremberth said, "I was excited that it would be held remotely. It was ambitious for the Washington TSA Board to make that decision, but it was also awesome and inspiring. What better way to show our students that we can be adaptable and resilient to change than to take on such a challenge? Many students in TSA are very comfortable with technology. Therefore, they are the group to step up to the challenge."

Quentin Farrell, a CHS freshman competing for his third year, gave his thoughts on why the WTSA conference wasn't just canceled.

"The organizers were semi-prepared, because some events were already early entry. They realized

that actually a majority of events could be done that way," he said "Also, the state officers spend a year preparing for the conference, so they didn't want to waste all that effort."

To suddenly convert a live competition to a remote one required decisive action and work at every level. The couple hundred judges and volunteers overseeing about sixty events were still critical, but their tasks changed, since they would not be in the same room as the competitors. "On our end, we had to first secure a location, on-site, for the students to compete together remotely with live-streaming and fast wi-fi," explained Tremberth.

"This was going to be the IRMS Library. With school closures, the IRMS and Cascade TSA members now had to be independent and

compete on their own from home."

On March 18th, trying to be careful of social distancing, Farrell and his teammates Anthony Villalobos, Haakon Scheibler and Evan Butruille made a five-minute, one-take video showcasing their board game for the Board Game Design event. They submitted the video along with twenty-five pages of documentation, including a log of the creation process, schematics of parts and the rules booklet. The following day, Farrell competed with Scheibler in an online Coding event test. Then, joined by Villalobos, the boys solved multiple online capture-the-flag scenarios for the 24-hour Cybersecurity event. It was a mental marathon for these and other TSA members.

On March 21st, teammates watched the award ceremony, live-streamed via Facebook, and the Board Game Design team was the only local team to win an award, earning second place and a chance to attend TSA Nationals, scheduled for Nashville in the end of June.

This big success also marks Farrell's third time qualifying for Nationals, and Scheibler's second time.

Farrell, as the chief game designer, put in over a hundred hours preparing their board game, entitled "Napo-

leonic Wars." It's a territory-conquering, deck-building game ranging over a map of Europe during the Napoleonic Era.

"One of the biggest challenges was making the rules perfect," said Farrell. "And figuring out how to make the physical items. Like, how are we going to make the board and box stickers or mark the tokens or construct the game box? A lot of things were up in the air, which can be stressful until you solve it." Villalobos created about fifty original pieces of art for the game, and Scheibler, the team's historian, helped ensure the game had historical legitimacy.

The other cause for celebration was for Tremberth, who has accepted the honor of joining the WTSA Board of Directors as an Advisor Board Representative. She'll attend Board meetings throughout the year and oversee a number of events at next year's state conference.

In the meantime, the four CHS students and one of the advisors might get to fly to Nashville in a few months. When asked about the likelihood of TSA Nationals actually occurring, Farrell was optimistic. He said, speaking as a true techie, "I'm about 55% sure it will happen, 25% sure it will be remote and 20% think it will be canceled."

On Wednesday, March 11, the World Health Organization declared the novel coronavirus officially named COVID-19 a global pandemic, the first since the H1N1 outbreak in 2009.

On Friday, March 13, President Donald Trump designated COVID-19 a national emergency and on that same day Washington Governor Jay Inslee, who issued a state of emergency on Feb. 29, called for a statewide closure of schools.

So, here we are.

The seasonal influenza outbreaks that can be credited with taking many more lives than COVID-19 has so far, are fought with flu vaccines developed and available that, depending on how accurately health officials match the remedy to the strain, offer various degrees of immunity.

There is no such option for COVID-19 as of this writing.

Researchers predict it may be 18 months or longer before an approved vaccine is available.

territory for us it is most certainly not for our species, as a brief review of only the 10 worst pandemics of human history, disregarding the countless lesser ones, shows. We have survived worse.

The appearance of a virulent flu strain in four of the above 10 pandemics makes a strong case for getting an annual flu vaccination.

If there is an upside to our present crisis, it is that this latest challenge serves as a refresher course in pre-

paredness and a magnifier of loopholes in our response network.

While the U.S. ranks highest among 195 countries surveyed by the Global Health Security Index with a score of 83.5 out of a perfect 100 for health security and related capabilities, it's never good enough.

The next nine countries ranked by score include:

3. Netherlands
4. Australia
5. Canada
6. Thailand
7. Sweden
8. Denmark
9. South Korea

While March with its moderate weather did not come in like a lion this year it will be remembered as one in medical circles both locally and worldwide.

The uncertainty of what lies ahead is troubling and measures being taken to prepare for what that might be are working a hardship on families and businesses alike.

But as in many times past, the world will again be looking to the extraordinary American innovation and resiliency to lead the way out of the present crisis. So:

Be patient.

Shelter and entertain in place.

Practice clean habits.

Use common sense.

Communicate electronically.

Be proactive, not reactive.

Observe and learn.

Get the facts.

Demand the truth.

As Mr. Rogers would counsel if he were here: Look for the Helpers.

And as the late seafood king Ivar Haglund famously said: Keep clam.

Elected officials of Chelan, Douglas counties give Coronavirus advice

Dear residents of Chelan and Douglas counties,
