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Hawkins gets PUD 'Legislative Champion Award'

PUDs honor Hawkins for passing renewable hydrogen bill, hydropower tax parity issues

OLYMPIA – The Washington Public Utility Districts Association (WPUDA) recognized Sen. Brad Hawkins for his efforts and legislative leadership for PUDs throughout the state.

"I was super excited when I got the call from the PUD Association," said Hawkins, whose 12th District includes four PUDs (Chelan, Douglas, Grant and Okanogan). "PUDs provide an incredible benefit to our region with their reliable, low-cost services. Locally, our PUDs are superb stewards of public resources and top-notch organizations. I'm honored to be selected as a champion for the PUDs because standing with the PUDs is standing with the people."

Hawkins will receive the WPUDA's 2019 Legislative Champion Award during the association's Annual Conference Banquet on Dec. 5 at the Heathman Lodge in Vancouver. The award recognizes a member of the Washington State Legislature or Congress for leadership in pursuing passage of legislation beneficial to PUDs.

In the award letter from WPUDA, Executive Director George Caan wrote: "This award recognizes your strong commitment to advocating in the 2019 legislative session for policies that enhance the ability of public utility districts to serve the needs of their communities. Your leadership as prime sponsor of Senate Bill 5588, your quick introduction to add hydropower as a qualifying renewable resource in the 100% clean energy bill, and your dedication to pursuing tax parity for hydropower as the prime sponsor and staunch advocate of Senate Bill 6012 was instrumental in paving the way for good policy that supports the foundational

principles on which PUDs were created."

"During the 2019 legislative session Senator Hawkins demonstrated a commitment to advancing good public policy that supports the ability of Washington's public utility districts to meet the needs of the communities they serve. His work is truly deserving of the WPUDA 2019 Legislative Champion Award," concluded Caan.

He understands the complex issues we face and the value of hydropower in helping to reduce carbon emissions while maintaining reliable service and reasonable electric rates. 

Link Transit seeks input from Leavenworth riders

On Thursday, December 12, Link Transit is hosting an open house to gather input from Leavenworth transit riders about potential changes and improvements to Route 22 operating between Leavenworth and Wenatchee, and the Route D, operating within Leavenworth.

An open house from 4:30 - 7:30 p.m. at Leavenworth City Hall Council Chambers is scheduled as part of a process to make improvements to the service operated in Leavenworth, and between Leavenworth and Wenatchee. Any major changes to service will happen in July 2020.

Changes are being considered to the schedule of the Route 22 buses that travel through Leavenworth rather than terminating at Wilkommen Park and Ride, and the hours of operation on the Route D.

"We have heard from a number of our Leavenworth riders that the changes we made in July with the opening of the Wilkommen Park and Ride have not worked well for them. We want to try to fix this as best as possible "said Eric West, Link Transit Marketing Coordinator. Also under consideration is the addition of some express trips between Leavenworth and Wenatchee.

"We have heard over the years of a desire by some to have express service between Leavenworth and Wenatchee. Now hat we have additional resources to work with, we are exploring what express service would look like", said West.

"We really need to hear from those in the upper valley who would like to see this service implemented so we can build the best solution that will work for the most people."

Staff will present several options for input and consideration.

My name is Christopher Dodson. I have a 10-year-old rescue dog named Neva. She is in need of medical treatment. She has a large tumor on her leg, and unfortunately I'm unable to financially obtain services needed.

Funds needed for medical treatment

I live on a Social Security Disability income of \$751 a month. I applied for a Good Samaritan Grant from WSU but was denied. I contacted Neva's veterinarian and was told their compassionate care is for local Leavenworth residents only.

The receptionist at the Manson's veterinarian office suggested I contact the Wenatchee Valley Humane Society's Pet for Life Program, and there I was told they have no funds for medical issues. Because I would have to claim it as income, I'm unable to set up a Go Fund Me account. The only help offered has been euthanizing her. This at this time seems premature considering she is my emotional support animal which at present is counterproductive considering the situation.

I've learned more about God from her than any person. We are the mirror image. Dog, is to us what we are to God. And all he wants from us to love Him unconditionally too. It's hard being a good master. I have to keep the faith there's someone out there with compassion and a big heart willing to help. Thank you for your time, and I would appreciate it greatly for your prayers.



Is it too much of a stretch to call him Saint Nick?

Every year Nick Nelson gives the Wenatchee Valley the gift of a holiday light show. And this is no ordinary show. This is a lighted, animated,

musical extravaganza of 41,405 LEDs. The lights are called pixels, Nick said, and are comprised of one red. green and blue LED covered with a diffuser. "With computer control I can change the level of each red, green and blue LED, giving me over 16 million color combinations," he said.

LEDs use a lot less energy than incandescent lights, although that's not why Nick uses them. "I chose LEDs as they are the only lights available that are individually controllable," he said. "You can do animated shows with normal lights but they are typically limited to on/off and dimming."

The show runs 24/7 from now to New Year's Day or longer.

What about the electric bill?

The electric bill goes up for Nick and Erin Nelson but not as much as you might expect. "In Chelan County we have some of the cheapest power around," Nick said. "And even though I have a large display with thousands of lights, they don't use nearly as much power as people think. Due to the animated nature of the show, typically only a small portion of them are on at any given time."

This year's spectacular features stars suspended in the night sky, trees that ripple

with color and movement, rainbows of purple and white that wave in time to Pachelbel's Canon. The display is timed perfectly to the music, ranging from the sweet to the sentimental to the satirical (one episode features a gentle poke at Christmas commercialism with glowing green dollar signs). The entire show lasts about 20 minutes.



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

If it's December, it's time for the annual Audubon Christmas Bird Count.

The event, in its 120th year, is a census not of people but of birds.

Citizens meet on an agreed upon day with a designated compiler (or coordinator) to catalog what birds they see and in what numbers they see them in established 15mile wide circles.

Head To The Idaho Panhandle For **Bald Eagles**

If you want to see lots of bald eagles and you live in Eastern Washington the place to go this month is just across the border to Coeur d' Alene.

In 2017 a record 327 eagles were counted in and around the lake by Hugo.


So far this year, Hugo has counted 259 eagles and noted an influx of new eagle watchers as well.

Handwashing

In the restrooms of airports, movie theatres and restaurants, I'm usually the slowest handwasher there.

As I'm soaping up, humming, rub-a-dub-dubbing and rinsing, others next to me are barely wiping their hands before heading out the door.

The first week of December is National Hand Washing Awareness Week, promoting awareness of the importance of the handwashing in preventing the spread of infection.

Using an effective hand washing technique at key times during your day is absolutely the MOST effective way to reduce diarrhea, colds and viral illnesses of all kinds in yourself and your family, as well as in your community.

According to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), only 31 % of men and 65% of women wash or sanitize their hands after using a public restroom, and healthcare personnel practice hand hygiene only about half as frequently as we should. Yikes! When it comes to performing this vitally important skill to protect our health, most of us could really use an upgrade.

How should you wash your hands?

First, you have a choice between hand soap or hand gel or sanitizer. Which one is best? That depends.

Unless your hands have dirt, visible soil or grease on them, you can effectively wash or sanitize your hands using either soap and water or an alcohol-based gel or foam, as long as the alcohol gel or foam contains at least 65-70% alcohol. If your hands are dirty or greasy, washing them with soap and water is more effective than using gel or foam.

In health care settings like clinics, hospitals and nursing homes, using alcohol-based hand rubs for hand hygiene is strongly encouraged because they are more convenient to use and when used properly, they can kill bacteria more effectively and quickly than washing with soap and water.

Alcohol based hand gels are also less irritating to the skin than soap and water, which is important because health care workers need to wash their hands frequently during each shift as they care for their patients.

Do you need an antibacterial soap?


No! The key to effectively cleaning your hands is removing bacteria and viruses from their surface by using friction and then rinsing them away, not by attacking them with a chemical.

Personally, I avoid antibacterial soap because my hands break out in red, itchy welts from my allergy to triclosan, a common ingredient in liquid antibacterial soaps like Dial® and Softsoap®.

When I travel, I always pack a small squeeze bottle of shampoo with me to use instead of the industrialstrength antibacterial soaps common in airport and restaurant restrooms.

What's most important is HOW you wash your hands. You should rub the soap or alcohol gel over every surface of your hands, including your fingertips, fingernails, and between your fingers, for at least 15 seconds.

One strategy to keep you rubbing long enough is humming a catchy song that takes 15-20 seconds to complete while you rub the soap or gel around your hands in a systematic pattern, covering their tops, palms, between your fingers, fingertips and fingernails. One verse of a song like Freres Jacques, The

for Effective Handwashing:

1 or sanitize your hands Do it frequently. Wash BEFORE eating, BEFORE and AFTER caring for loved ones who are ill, AFTER using the bathroom, handling animals or pets, and sneezing or wiping your eyes or nose.

 $2^{\text{Check the label. For ef-}}$ the alcohol-based hand gel you buy and use contains at least 65-70% alcohol.

Rub your hands thor-•oughly. Make sure you are rubbing soap or gel over EVERY surface of your hands, especially all of your fingertips and fingernails.

4 Don't skimp on hand egel. Many people swipe hand gel around and that's it. Apply enough gel so that it takes about 15 seconds to dry completely.

Sing a song. Sing or •hum a song that lasts for at least 15 seconds while you wash your hands. It helps kids learn effective handwashing and keeps you (and them) from stopping too soon.

Antibacterial soap is O•not required. Effective handwashing or sanitizing depends on good technique, not on using soap that contains an antibacterial chemical.




