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Land Trust Buys Key White River Property Newly protected acreage will increase salmon habitat, reconnect river oxbow

The Chelan-Douglas Land Trust (CDLT) has purchased 40 acres on the lower White River for conservation of salmon habitat and improved public access.

The White River runs from glacial headwaters to Lake Wenatchee and provides some of the best spawning habitat for sockeye salmon - one of only two remain-

This 40-acre parcel was one of the very few unprotected properties and its protection is key to the future reconnection of a river oxbow.

An oxbow is a former main channel that has become disconnected from the river - in this case, when a nearby bridge was built many years ago. With this acquisition, CDLT is one step closer to reconnecting the oxbow to provide side-channel fish habitat that is in short supply on the lower White River. CDLT's White River Preserve now permanently protects 683 acres and over 8.6 miles of riverfront, safeguarding important fish habitat, cool clean water, and providing improved public access to the river.

Martinson, who sold the property to CDLT.

The primary source of funding for this purchase was provided by the Priest Rapids Coordinating Committee Habitat Subcommittee through Grant PUD's habitat funds.

Permanent stewardship of the property by the Land Trust is being made possible through the Tina Scull Opportunity Fund. as contributions from Terry and Suzanne

Sorom, and Bill and Mary Griffin.

The Chelan-Douglas Land Trust is a local non-profit working to conserve our land, our water, and our way of life. The Land Trust has a 33-year record of working collaboratively with property owners and communities to identify and protect the region's most

ing stocks in the Columbia Basin.

Endangered spring Chinook, endangered steelhead, and threatened bull trout also use the White River for migration, spawning and rearing.

The Chelan-Douglas Land Trust, Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife and the US Forest Service now own most of the floodplain and riverfront in the lower five miles of the White River.

The Land Trust is grateful to Robert

There's a war going on in America

The American people are at war. We are at war with each other. It is a war for the very heart and soul of what makes America different than any other country on the planet. One side of this war wants

us to believe in the uniqueness and strength of the individual. The other side wants us to believe that the individual is powerless to overcome the oppressive inequalities of our society.

One side calls us to cheer success and individual achievement. The other side calls us to demean those who are successful as privileged, manipulative or even predatory.

Make no mistake. There are real casualties in this war. While the death toll is limited. People's lives are being destroyed. The worst example is how the law is being used to crush dissent or even twist the truth to extort a "fact" that can be used to destroy an opponent.

In the last few years the war has escalated through an increasingly divisive technique of group compartmentalization. In other words, only members of the "group" can represent or discuss the concerns of that group. Critics of the groups' complaints, including critics within the affected group, are dismissed with derogatory personal attacks on their motivation not



on the challenges they posit to the groups' complaint. The result is to stifle any meaningful debate on an issue no matter how insane the groups' complaint.

This is not the American system. America is not perfect, but it was founded on noble principles of individual equality and protection from persecution by the power of the state.

Today, those noble principles are being trampled by too many of us who would give special privilege to one group or another while dismissing criticism by anyone as only based on spurious motivations not on the substance of their argument.

The American system of justice has been turned on its head. When law enforcement has turned the oppressive power of the legal system into a weapon they can use to force a questionable confession, they have violated the very foundation of our democracy.

When people, reputations and truth have been assault-

ed by the very institutions we have put in place to protect us, then we are all in danger. When any group of us believe the state cannot be trusted to protect our individual rights and freedoms, then America is lost.

The result is a growing discontent with the very concepts of individual freedom and equality.

What is left is a loss of faith that the very institutions we entrust to enforce the laws will do so with equality and fairness. And the result of that is a growing acceptance of street violence as the only way we can address our grievances.

The growing violence, from both sides of the political spectrum, is evidence of citizens increasing distrust of our legal systems ability to protect our freedom to debate tough issues in non-violent ways.

We must address the injustice being perpetrated by our legal system. No one in this country should have to lose their reputation or personal fortune to defend against a false claim. And individuals or groups who bring false or unproven charges must bear some cost for their specious claims or questionable provocations.

The media must also be held accountable. Fake news is often just incomplete, preBRNO Americans for Limited



mature or misinterpreted.

Too often though the media ignore new facts and too often spin the reports as the latest example of intolerance. Calling individual's racist, sexist or homo-phobic is just lazy journalism. Its primary purpose is to diminish the opinions of those the reporter finds socially challenged or politically out of touch.

As I work to complete this opinion. I am confronted by the horror of two mass shootings over the weekend. These events are just another example of the war going on in our country.

The initial response is to blame President Trump, but let's be clear. There is plenty of blame to go around for our countries failure to address the issues of uncontrolled, illegal immigration.

More importantly, it appears that social media may

be playing a part in this epidemic of violence. Our vaunted social media is unaccountable for supporting all kinds of anti-social behavior that traditional media cannot publish. That must end. They claim that they are simply providing a way for people to express themselves. They claim they do not actually publish anything. But by allowing anonymous postings calling for people who espouse hateful and violent messages they are supporting the violence.

It is time for all of us to call a truce. It is time we quit calling people we disagree with racist, sexist, homophobes, communists, and other derogatory terms that do nothing to bring clarity to the issues that confront us.

It is time we returned to debates that make our country greater not more combative.

How to Deal with Diaper Rash

Last week I traveled to Weimar, Germany to help my daughter Maureen with cooking, cleaning and laundry as she settled in with Amalia, her new baby and my very first grandchild.

Germany was suffering from a heat wave with daily temperatures soaring into the mid-90s, making her 4th floor flat without any air conditioning brutally HOT.

While changing Amalia's bamboo-cotton diapers on the third day of my visit, I noticed she was getting a diaper rash.

Armed with some euros and my extremely limited German, I walked to the town market early the next morning to find something to treat diaper rash. The products I could find were all labelled in German, but luckily the names of the ingredients were familiar enough that I was able to purchase something with the stuff I was looking for, and fixed Amalia's diaper rash.

Diaper rash is the most common skin problem experienced by infants and babies up to two years old, and is caused by irritation of the sensitive skin in the diaper/genital area.

Also called diaper dermatitis, diaper rash is triggered both by physical contact with urine and feces which contain irritating substances like proteolytic enzymes and bile salts, and from chafing caused by wet cloth rubbing against the skin.

Diaper dermatitis is not the

only possible cause of a bright red baby bottom because a yeast infection can also occur in the diaper area. Moisture, warmth, and darkness all encourage yeast organisms to multiply out of control, causing skin redness, burning and itching.

Although your baby can have both at the same time, a simple way to tell the difference between a yeast infection and diaper dermatitis is the pattern of skin irritation. If the red skin in the diaper area does not extend into the creases of the legs, it is diaper dermatitis, because a yeast infection inflames the skin all the way down into the leg creases.

This is an important distinction, because while diaper dermatitis can be successfully treated at home, a yeast infection usually requires medical attention to heal.

The best strategy to prevent and treat diaper dermatitis is to protect the skin against both moisture and irritants.

During their first eight months of life, an infant urinates about 8 times a day and poops 3-6 times a day, and each time it happens their sensitive skin is exposed to moisture and irritating proteolytic enzymes and bile salts.

You can protect a baby's skin from irritation and chafing from excess moisture by choosing a good wicking material for diapers, avoiding using tight plastic diaper covers, and by changing diapers frequently.

The best way to protect baby's diaper area from irritants is to cover it with a layer of stiff cream or ointment to create a barrier between their sensitive skin and any urine or feces. This product is called a barrier cream or ointment and is stiffer or thicker than most hand creams.

A good barrier cream or ointment needs to be thick enough to protect against irritating substances but not trap excess moisture next to the skin. It should withstand being easily rinsed away when moisture or urine hits it and be able to be applied easily, even over broken or irritated skin.

The most common ingredients used in barrier creams are petrolatum, lanolin, and zinc oxide. Petrolatum, known as Vaseline[®] and petroleum jelly protects against moisture and irritants.

Lanolin is protective and healing, but sticky and smells like wet wool. Zinc oxide is a white powder that absorbs excess moisture while it protects. Other ingredients used include herbs like chamomile, calendula or tea tree oil to soothe irritated skin.

Here are 5 Tips on Dealing with Diaper Rash:

Avoid perfumed baby • wipes. The diaper area is easily irritated by perfumes



and alcohol, especially in the first 6 months of life. Use unscented wipes instead or soft cloths spritzed with water from a spray bottle.

2. Avoid cortisone and hy-drocortisone creams or ointments. Non-prescription hydrocortisone creams will decrease redness but also increase the risk of a yeast infection. .

• Don't "scrub off" all of • the barrier cream with each diaper change. Wipe off just the top layer while keeping a thin layer of barrier cream on the skin, then reapply a generous layer over it.

Choose a barrier cream 4 • with zinc oxide as one of the first 3 ingredients. Zinc oxide protects while also wicking moisture away from skin.

Seek medical attention **J** • *if needed*. If your baby's diaper rash worsens, or isn't dramatically improved within seven days, seek medical advice.
