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Possible merge with Chelan and Douglas County ports

With the Columbia River being the primary divide between Chelan and Douglas County, it's a quick drive over the bridge into East Wenatchee and Douglas County. In such close proximity, the neighboring port districts share responsibility of the closest airport for Chelan County residents, Pangborn Memorial Airport. The two port districts are toeing the idea of formulating an interlocal agreement, both at the airport and also generally, for economic purposes.

"Basically our conversations are about functionally consolidating the port districts into one regional port authority to cover two counties," said Jim Kuntz, Port of Chelan County Executive Director. "The way it would work is to call it 'functional consolidation', so this is not voter approved, it's basically approved by the two port commissions."

Representatives from both Chelan County and Douglas County - JC Baldwin, Port of Chelan County Commissioner and Mark Spurgeon, Port of Douglas County Commissioner, came along with Kuntz-have been presenting the proposal at city council meetings. The presenters came to Leavenworth's City Council on May 20, bearing informative notes on who, what, when, where and why this agreement is in the better interest of those in both counties.

"This spring, a community task force was formed to look at the long term funding implications for paying for Pangborn Memorial Airport. The airport operates on a needed subsidy every year of about \$500,000 just to pay for keeping the airport up and operating and whatever additional capital needs are have to come out of the operating budgets as well," said Kuntz.

The task force comprised of a handful of community members that serve varying roles, but all share some foundation of expertise on the topics - Wenatchee mayor, East Wenatchee mayor, county commissioners for both Chelan and Douglas, business men and women all offered perspective.

"As part of the recommendations, the task force came back and said you might want to look at some sort of

consolidation to save money and save resources, because we see long term there might be some additional taxes or levy to support the airport," said **

Despite many people flocking to Pangborn Memorial Airport for a less crammed airport experience or a way to avoid that three hour drive to SeaTac-the nearby airport has suffered from financial strain. The merging of the two ports would be a way to functional route to preserve money and resources.

"We went through and did an initial consolidation. We believe there's a half million dollars of savings of consolidating the two ports. Which goes right to the bottom line of helping Pangborn Airport and as well as doing economic development in the region," said Kuntz.

Condensing the ports into 'functional consolidation' won't cause an imbalance in decision making or possible favoring of either county - Kuntz laid out how the regional port authority would operate to keep things equitable on both sides.

"The way it would work is this, the three port commissioners from each of the counties basically serve as the elected body for the regional port authority. Each port approves their annual tax levies, the property tax levies will flow in the regional port authority," said Kuntz. "The governance is that when things come before the regional port authority, it takes four votes because you have six commissioners. But to preserve equal rights and minority votes, it takes two votes from Port of Douglas commissioners and two votes from the Port of Chelan commission ers in order for the budget to be approved and projects to be approved." In mid-June there will be a vote by both ports and if that is approved, it will take effect in January 2020. Congregating the ports seemed well receptive by both commissioners, Baldwin and Spurgeon.

"I'm really looking forward to this not only because of the Pangburn situation, but also because of the opportunity for economic development. It's very important that our ability to create an economic development is enhanced by this consolidation," said Spurgeon.

The Foundation's special projects ensure the facility has state-of-the-art equipment to help its mission in providing the highest quality of care. The previous year's tournament helped raise funds to purchase a blood gas analyzer, microscope and blood culture analyzer.

"Some of the things we've been providing and helping the hospital fund are tremendous," Adamson said of the tournament's longevity. "There's a lot of worthy causes that we do and I think that's why it's kept its momentum for 17 years."

Proceeds from this year's tournament will go toward purchasing a new state-of-the-art 3D mammogram unit for Cascade Medical. Adamson said the Foundation will contribute \$100,000 toward the mammogram machine, utilizing proceeds of the tournament, the home and garden show and other fundraiser events.

"It's just going to make a world of difference for this community to have this state-of-the-art mammogram machine," Adamson said. "I can't say enough about that. It's a wonderful thing we can provide."

For this year, the Foundation is lowering the registration fee to \$100 per player, rather than the previous \$150. Adamson explained the decision to lower the registration fee was to keep the price similar to the amount other local tournaments charge competitors.

Zeke Reister runs for council, brings plans for dialogue

Filing week for election candidates wrapped up on May 17 - several fresh faces, but well recognized names appeared on the list of hopeful residents striving for a seat on City Council.

Zeke Reister is one of the familiar faces running for the Council Member No. 7 slot.

"Who we are is a diversified community that wants a place that is still worth living in," said Reister. "So I see myself as initiating some transparency and definitely having more community meetings so the council is aware of what's out there in the community and that back and forth dialogue happens as well as promoting Leavenworth as a tourism destination."

Reister wants to represent that diverse community on council. His personal roots are tied deep into the area - having been born in Leavenworth and raised in Dryden, he is well versed on the local environment and citizens that

reside here.

He wants to harness in his networking, collaboration and listening skills to steward his role on council if elected.

"I think there's a lot of talent on coun-

cil already. I think one of the reasons I'm running is, the council themselves have the power to change things. It's not an easy process, but I think there needs to be a more intentional will to listen to the community and speak those concerns more vocally when you're on council," said Reister.

His initial leap into civic participation was when he joined ranks with his neighbors to combat the overnight rentals - and the goal (the code prohibiting overnight rentals stayed in place) was achieved from that neighborhood effort.

"I did a lot of networking with the community and I got the sense that there was something people can do to control what happens in their neighborhoods," said Reister.

After seeing firsthand the positive impact that was an echo of voicing residential concerns, he realized that residents do have a say in what unfolds in the neighborhood.

Council looks ahead to summer projects and public hearings

Leavenworth City Council met for their last meeting in May and most of the meeting's agenda items focused on looking ahead of spring summer projects, summer public hearings and even an item relating to one of the most popular fall Leavenworth events. Richard DeRock had shared with the council at the May 14 study session on Link's push for a sales tax increase in order to expand Link operations for riders.

The council set a public hearing for June 25 at 6:45 p.m. to gauge how residents feel before deciding how to approach the tax sales increase as a council.

The resolution could be either in support or opposing the Link Transit Ballot, depending on what is voice by constituents at the upcoming public hearing.

"Basically you want to take in both sides of the argument and then measure your decision whether you support or not," said Joel Walinski, city administrator.

Another Link related item brought up at the council meeting to add to the June calendar - the Link Leavenworth Park and Ride will have a ribbon cutting ceremony on June 28.

Oktoberfest draws in guests far and wide and with the music setting the backdrop for the authentic Bavarian theme, Projekt Bayern requested a Special Use Permit.

The Special Use Permit allows the noise and sound levels to rise above 70 dBA but is not permitted to go above 95 dBA.

"This variance is similar to the ones that have been issued for several years," said Walinski. "The one change that we have seen is Steve (manages Oktoberfest) has a lot of monitoring and set up a complaint line so people can call in. This year they will not be having music at the Spaatz Platz on Friday evenings," said Walinski. It was later confirmed Projekt Bayern will not open Spaatz Platz at all on Fridays.

The council approved the noise permit and it was confirmed that those in charge of each venue would be constantly monitoring sound with a professional machine along with phone applications.

There is also a complaint and comment number for the third year.

After accepting a bid for Pine Street construction on May 20 to Strider Construction, the project is underway.

At the May 28 council meeting, the council approved the amendment to the Professional Services Agreement for Pacific Engineering.

The amendment included construction inspection services. According to Herb Amick, Public Works director, it is local oversight at a considerable savings.

"Strider Construction will begin there staging of equipment, surveying and that kind of activity on June 10 and we expect actual machinery in place and groundbreaking June 17 for the Pine Street construction. We want this to be nearly completed before school starts," said Mayor Farivar.

"This summer there will be no Pine Street but the result will be wonderful.'

The meeting ended on a tearful note - a clearly beloved council member and former mayor of Leavenworth, Elmer Larsen, has decided that the May 28 meeting was his last council meeting due to per-

sonal reasons. "I have enjoyed my time in the Leavenworth government serving the folks of our town my wife and I have called home for the last 35 years. Now, however I don't feel that I can give the time or the effort that that position demands," said a statement from Larsen.

Each council member shared a thoughtful sentiment about their time working with Larsen as did the Mayor Farivar, Walinski and Chantell Steiner, city clerk. All of the kind words shared by those in the audience and those behind the council desk was a nod to Larsen's positive and powerful impact during his time serving as public official.

"Council member Larsen has served over three decades on this council in one form or another. As our mayor, as a city council member, and doing things for our city unlike you see in most elected positions," said Mayor Farivar.

"I think I knocked on 700 doors (during his campaign) for Elmer Larsen and I would do it again."

Other business tended to:

Council member Sharon Waters went along during a Waste Management trip to pick up trash in Leavenworth and reminded residents to not throw away lawn clippings.

Council member Mia Bretz shared that the city pool is officially open, but unfortunately the diving board as cracked and there is no new

diving board.

■ Battle of the Bikes shared a report about their event and were featured in a national publication Pinkbike, almost doubled the donation

giving back and applauded the community for the amount of support. As for next year, the group is considering joining Bike and Juice Festival as a collaborated event.

Paulson to pursue softball at Bellevue College

Cascade High School pitcher Sarah Paulson's days in a Kodiak uniform came to an end on May 18 after the Lady Kodiaks' loss to Colville in a CTL-NEA crossover game.

However, the graduating senior's softball days are far from over as next year she will be wearing a Bellevue Bulldogs softball jersey. Paulson signed a letter of intent of play softball for Bellevue College.

The Lady Kodiaks starting pitcher described her senior season as "picture-perfect," save for the second-place finish in the District 6 tournament on May 11. Although adding another district title to the Caribou Trail League championship would have been a nice addition to her season, Paulson loves the game of softball regardless of how many trophies are in the case.

"It's always so much fun to come out to the field and play with all of the girls and be part of the Kodiak softball family again," Paulson said. "It's just more part of being part of the team being able to play with them again.'

The CHS starting pitcher, who has thrown in the circle for the last four years. While Paulson has a lifetime love fo the sport, her softball origins actually started when her parents registered her and her brother in tee ball back in her home state of New Jersey. While her brother transitioned to soccer, Paulson stayed with tee ball

and grew to live the field and the game.


While tee ball, softball and their cousin baseball are different, all three sports have the same setting of a field, infielders and outfielders and rules that involve hitting a ball with a stick.

"It's so unique, it's a ball with a stick and there's so much you can do with it," Paulson said. "It's crazy with how much detail and how much stuff you can get out of the game. How much happiness, love and intensity it brings and how many life lessons you can learn from it. You really take that from any sport. I just loved it since I was little and I just keep coming back."

After tee ball, Paulson had the option to play little league baseball, or softball and debated choosing between the two sports. She almost chose baseball to play with many of her friends, until an older girl, a softball player and someone Paulson looked up to, inspired the young athlete to choose softball and become a pitcher.

During her first years in the spot, Paulson played on travel teams where she competed in an intense and focused environment and recreation leagues where she learned fundamentals. She described middle school softball as competitive and intense, akin to the high school level.

Paulson has been a pitcher since her tee ball days where she would stand next to her father on the mound. Her arm

has been one of the weapons of the Lady Kodiaks' ball club since her freshman year. She enjoys pitching because of the pressure it puts on her, as well as the support from the infield.

"The whole team has your back and you're doing such a big job to help out everyone," Paulson added. "It's a battle every single time a batter comes up. You really have to be mentally in it. It's a lot of work, but I really like it."

Pitching can be physically demanding, especially when a player throws for seven innings,

or more if a team is playing a doubleheader. While she has endured some shoulder and back issues from her countless innings on the mound, Paulson noted that pitching can also be mentally taxing. She remembered some words of wisdom she received from one of her idols, Olympic medalist and former Chicago Bandits pitcher Jennie Finch, while attending one of her camps.

"She said 'every pitch, every time you turn around and come back on the mound, it's a new pitch and a completely whole new situation," Paulson added. "I forget about the last pitch, whether it was good or bad. I try and forget the last game, and come back and do my best that I can."

Her family moved to Leavenworth when she was an eight-grade. Being on the Lady Kodiaks ball club has allowed her to play on a highly competitive team and grow with her teammates.

"It's amazing being able to grow with the girls," she said. "We're a family and being on the softball team together and growing up next to them every single day. You can't really replicate it or describe it."

After she graduates, Paulson will play for Bellevue. She had few offers from schools, including Big Bend Community College. She added that Bellevue reached out to Cascade Head Coach Todd Gilbert regarding potential recruits from the Caribou Trail League. Paulson visited the college and fell in love with the campus and the team, and went on a recruiting camp at Bellevue. The day after her Bellevue visit, Paulson attended a camp at Wenatchee Valley College.

"I loved all of them, they're amazing, but Bellevue really stuck and that way my favorite," she added. "I'm excited to get to go play with them."

Although she would love to play softball throughout her college years and beyond, Paulson plans to focus on her education and attain an architecture degree. Her pursuit of architecture stems from her love of math. She initially thought she was going to be a mathematician, but architecture allows her to combine her love of math and science and art.

"I think it's going to be the perfect combination (of the subjects)," Paulson said. "I draw a lot of for fun and I paint. I'll draw cards. I really like drawing buildings and landscapes."

While her days as a Kodiak are finished, Paulson will cherish the memories she made with her team, including the 2018 season where Cascade captured the district title before qualifying for the 2018 state tournament. She remembered crying and hugging her teammates on the field after winning districts, then traveling to Yakima for state competition, which she said is her favorite softball memory.

"Even if we didn't do that well at state, it's just the experience of going there and getting to hang out at the team and celebrate that accomplishment," Paulson said. "Everybody was so tight."

As for what she will miss most during her time with Cascade, Paulson said it will be playing with her teammates, many of whom she has played with since eighth-grade.

"I'll miss being able to turn around (on the mound) and seeing my best friends behind me," she said.

Avila reflects on breaking CHS career goals record

Forward Arturo "Cholo" Avila made four of the seven goals in Cascade's shutout win over Chelan in the district semifinals on May 7. Avila's final point in the 65th minute not only boosted the Kodiaks' already healthy lead, but also brought his career goals to 67, and set a new record in CHS boys soccer history.

It was one of the many bright spots during the Kodiaks' 2019 season, which ended on May 18 in the quarterfinal of the 1A State Championships after a 3-2 loss against Lakeside. Although the season ending defeat still stings for Avila and his teammates, the junior was proud of breaking the school's career goals record and etching his name in CHS history.

"It's something I really wanted to do since I got to high school," Avila added.

Cascade Boys Soccer Co-Head Coach Pete Spiegel said it is extremely difficult to score in soccer given that the goal is a small space with a goalie, the only player on the field who can use his hands to help guard

"In my eight years of coaching I have never had a player score 20 goals in a year." Spiegel said. "Cholo has done this in each of his three years. He has a knack for finding small spaces and making defenders miss. The ball seems to be glued to Cholo's feet, and his shots knuckle. When a soccer ball is hit purely, it will have no spin. The ball then moves any which way as it makes its way toward the goal. Goalies have a heck of a time trying to determine where the ball will end up. Cholo strikes the ball like this every time."

Speigel also acknowledged

that Avila is a good person who is respectful and kind to others,

"He has a bright future in front of him," Spiegel added.

Avila has been The Kodiaks' leading scorer for the past three seasons, scoring 30 goals during his freshman year. In that season, Cascade finished in the 1A Boys Soccer State Championship semifinals, which he described as his favorite soccer memory so far. Even before he entered high school. Avila had brothers and cousins who wore a Kodiaks jersey. He not only wanted to follow in their footsteps, but achieve more success during his time at Cascade.

When it comes to soccer, Avila said his main motivation is to win, though he enjoys sharing the pitch and having fun with his teammates.

Avila has lived in Leavenworth his entire life. He started playing soccer year ago when

his dad started a local team. He noted that many of the players on the current Cascade roster also played with him during his younger days.

"We know what everyone can do," Avila said of his camaraderie with his teammates. "Since we've played together since a young age, we have pretty good

Avila noted there are several differences between playing for a club team and competing at the high school level, such as more pressure at the high school level and shorter seasons.

For Avila, being playing a forward came natural to him and it was a position he realized where he could well. When it comes to pre-game preparation, Avila said he likes to mentally prepares first, then go into the physical aspect of his game. He will focus on areas where he

Zeke Reister runs for council, brings plans for dialogue

Some Leavenworth residents who have attended council meetings have probably seen Reister, who appears pretty regularly to those biweekly Tuesday meetings.

Being an active audience member of council meetings has helped offer him insight to help guide him into the position and what issues he wants to tackle.

"I think having two million visitors here a year for this particular town, I think the impact on both downtown core, business owners, and the residents that live here has created some problems," said Reister.

"I think that's created problems and issues of quality of life for this community, I would like to see a more direct approach to addressing those problems than what's already happening."

His primary reason for running was the need to organize an outlet for a community conversation that isn't limited to three minutes or only a one way discussion since the council typically listens, but interacts minimally during public comment.

He appeared passionate about nailing down a yearly or biyearly community, council and Chamber of Commerce dialogue to serve as check-up.

"I think it's really important that there's a component somewhere that there's actually a give and take session directly with the full council and 'Chamber of Community' that would have a chance for dialogue," said Reister. "

Reister wants to have every perspective angle - the downtown core, the city officials and the residents - to be addressed in a setting where dialogue can flow, something he defined as 'Chamber of Community'.

"I think thats an important transparency piece between the council, city administration and the community at large," said Reister. "Giving updates not just to the community but the downtown business core. I understand that this is a destination resort, tourism is what we do - I don't see it as who we are."

He is looking ahead at the election with not only these plans in his back pocket, but also a love for Leavenworth and those that live in the city limits as well.

"Living in this neighborhood, inside city limits, is a huge benefit because I am ten minutes away from the nearest mountain bike trail. I just simply need to walk out my front porch of that skyline of Icicle Ridge and Tumwater Mountain. I'm grateful I live in such a beautiful place with some very amazing personalities in the community," said Reister.

Resiter is running against current sitting council member, Mia Bretz.



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
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
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
