Leavenworth city officials are ready to start more aggressively going after illegal overnight rentals in the city. At the March 14 study session, the council talked about plans to beef up their enforcement.

Leavenworth City Administrator Joel Walinski said he sat down with City Attorney Thom Graafstra and Pacific Patrol to talk about this. These rules have been in place since 1987, but there still is an educational piece that must be done, Walinski said. City Development Manager Nathan Pate will be crafting something and get it out.

"We'll be using the newsletter, website, radio, also some direct mail to contact those addresses we believe have that type of activity going on, to let them know the city is moving forward with a higher level of enforcement," Walinski said.

The other piece is a new contract with Pacific Patrol. Walinski said they would hire Pacific Patrol and provide them with the list around 25 possible illegal overnight rentals in town.

"They'll collect and put those reports together. Those will be reviewed by myself and the city attorney.

# Cold case murder investigation came together quickly

Chelan County Sheriff's Office Detective Josh Mathena started working on the 1982 Stephen E. Smith disappearance case on Jan. 5, 2017. Smith was believed deceased, but no body had been located.

After reviewing the case file, interviewing new and old witnesses, by March 5, 2017, Mathena had elicited a confession from Smith's ex-wife,

Dawn Soles of Leavenworth, that Smith was indeed killed by her then husband Bernard Swaim.

The complete investigation details are revealed in the Affidavit of Probable Cause which was submitted to Chelan County Superior Court by the Chelan County Sheriff's Office. Both Soles and

Swaim have been charged with First Degree Murder.

On July 18, 1982, Stephen's sister, Gail Lee, reported to the Chelan County Sheriff's Office that she had not seen or heard from Stephen for several days.

He had been living on N. Douglas St. in Cashmere.

Lee reported Smith had been having family problems with his ex-wife, Soles, who had later married Bernard Swaim. According to the affidavit, the dispute involved their 2-year old daughter, Crystal. At the time, Stephen Smith had full custody of Crystal, while Dawn could only visit one weekend a month, under supervision. Lee also reported that Smith's car had been located off Dead Man's Hill Road in Cashmere. Deputies checked out the vehicle

but found nothing suspicious. On July 31, 1982, Al Smith called the Sheriff's Office to report finding blood and other evidence at Stephen's house.

Al and other persons located a large amount of blood on a mattress, towel, sofa and axe handle. A broken tooth was also found. The Smith family had removed all the furniture from the house, but left the bloody towel and tooth.

The Smith family was asked to put the furniture and other items back in the house to reconstruct the scene. The axe handle, towel and tooth were

sent to the Washington State Patrol crime lab for analysis. It was human blood, type O. It also revealed the tooth was removed by breakage.

A local dentist later confirmed it was Smith's tooth. Mathena also uncovered a memo regarding Craig Milton. He reported that he was in jail with Swaim and that Swaim tried to find out where Stephen Smith was living because Swaim had put a "contract" on him.

Milton said he did not tell Swaim where Smith lived, but he claims to have told Smith's roommate, Derek Weldon about what Swaim had said. This report came in five days after Smith was reported missing.

A note submitted in 1984 said in the few week's prior to Smith's disappearance, Dawn attempted to talk Steven Noyes and Karl Christman into killing Stephen. Christman told law enforcement that his friend, Noyes, went out with Dawn a few times. During one of these dates, Christman said Dawn asked Noyes if he would help her or if he would get rid of Stephen for her.

After Stephen Smith went missing, Dawn, Crystal and Swaim all moved to Ocean Shores, where the couple worked at Sea Horse Ranch. In September of 1982, Douglas Sickman, an employee of the Sea Horse Ranch, contacted

If we hit that mark that he thinks is enforceable, we have two options. We can send them a letter with a packet of information, showing them the evidence we have. 

The preferred design was presented to the council at the March 14 meeting for approval. However, to the surprise of the council, the skaters at the meeting expressed a preference for a different design altogether.

To begin the discussion, Public Work Director Herb Amick detailed the process for selecting the design that was before the council.

"Grindline was contracted by the city to provide a design, at the recommendation of the ad hoc committee," Amick said. "They did come up with an initial design and construction estimate. We held

"At that time, the committee asked for a couple additional designs, which Grindline provided. On March 8, the ad hoc committee had a final review. Between the time they received those three designs, they took comments from the public," Amick said. "The ad hoc committee discussed it and came up with the unanimous decision to select this design as shown. Also, Grindline provided other features, which were about \$60,000.'

The ad hoc committee had three different designs, said City Administrator Joel Walinski. The reason they selected the final design was they believed it best fit within the confines of the selected site.

The skatepark has design features for all types of skaters, beginner to advanced.

"Remember, one of the first things this city council asked for, if you build a new park, it will cover a range of skater abilities," Walinski said. "The ad hoc committee also said this design reflected a lot of the suggestions received through the outreach approach. We had a condensed outreach approach. There's no doubt about that."

With approval and moving forward, Walinski said construction could be completed this summer. That was was a factor in terms of the process selected and the approach used. The members of the ad hoc committee would be the ones making the final recommendation to the council after they reviewed it and talked with various stakeholders in the community, he said.

The design and construction does fit within the \$175,000 budget for the project. Aesthetic improve-

Councilman Elmer Larsen asked if some of the features could be added on later.

"I wouldn't say it can't happen, although Josh



(Wulfman) on the committee, said a lot of aesthetics could be achieved through painting. We heard from the community, the park should be lighted. That is an add-on," Walinski said. "I know, from the parks department, landscaping needs to be put in place. That can be an add-on."

Councilwoman Mia Bretz was part of the ad hoc committee. She said building a community skatepark this year was a valid goal.

Sickman said Dawn told him she was scared of Swaim because he had recently killed her ex-husand. She attempted to convince Sickman to kill Swaim. The case file also included several letters from Soles to Smith, including one that said, "you don't have much time left."



Wetzel had worked for the attorney representing Swaim at the time. During

a court appearance, it was mentioned that Swaim was a suspect in a homicide in Chelan County. Wetzel later asked Swaim about the homicide.

Wetzel said Swaim told her he killed his ex-wife's husband. Swaim claimed the ex-husband came at him with a shotgun and he hit him on the head with a rock and killed him. Wetzel said someone named "Pork Chop" helped him dispose of the body. Swaim told Wetzel they would never find the body and there was no chance of being charged.

Swaim told Wetzel he stayed together with Dawn for so long because she was afraid he would say something about the murder to the cops.

The affidavit also reveals that not long after moving to Ocean Shores, Dawn's mother removed Crystal, due to the poor living conditions

On Feb. 2, 2017, Methena and Sergeant Jeff Middleton contacted Swaim at his residence in Sultan. Swaim said he knew why they wanted to talk to him, because of some "crazy" Facebook posts regarding his possible involvement in the Stephen Smith missing person case.

Swaim told deputies he did not know Smith well and had only been in his house one time. He did remember a time in 1982 when he and Dawn arrived in Cashmere to pick up Crystal, when they stayed at the Dryden Cottage Motel. Mathena found it interesting his memory was so clear on this day 34 years ago.

Swaim continued to maintain his innocence. On Feb. 16, 2017, Mathena, Middleton and Sergeant Bruce Long interview Dawn Soles in Leavenworth. When asked about July, 1982, Soles admitted to being in Cashmere with Swaim.

She gave specific details on the last time she saw Smith. Soles claimed they were staying in the Cashmere Village Inn. Soles said she picked up Crystal and spent time with her. When she tried to drop Crystal off, Smith was not home, Soles said, but Weldon was. Not wanting to leave Crystal with Weldon, Soles said she left for Seattle.

According to the affidavit, Mathena felt it odd Dawn would take off for Seattle since this was the first time Smith had not been there to pick up Crystal. She also did not leave Crystal with her mother or Smith's mother, who both lived in the Cashmere area.

Soles was asked about Douglas Sickman's comments that she asked him to kill Swaim. She denied ever speaking to Sickman about this. She was also asked about Wetzel's comments. Soles did not have a comment and continued to maintain her innocence.

As they talked about the evidence pointing to a beating death at Smith's home, Soles, who had been relaxed and calm, began to cry. Mathena told Soles they had no intention of arresting her that day. Soles responded they did not have the authority to arrest her.

# **Illegal rentals:** City ready to do sting operations

"There is the initial investigation piece, which is more like our parking enforcement people. They go on the internet, do the walk by, take notes. They are certified witnesses. They've been trained in that," Walinski said. "The second piece of the contract is we are going to put in a phone line for overnight rental compliance. That will be available 24/7. Given the type of information, we might not respond to that. If there is a loud party, that is not what we are looking for."

The hotline is meant to be used to report illegal overnight rentals. The third piece of the contract is the surveillance, undercover piece."Those are different individuals with different training than our parking enforcement people. These folks will be coming over from Seattle," Walinski said. "They have a very good background. Most of them are ex-police, from the detective division. The other piece is, all the information collected, they are not the ones that make the decision on whether it is enforceable or not That will be reviewed by myself and Thom." Walinski said the costs are not fixed, but it does give the city the resources to do what is needed, if they do come across a property doing overnight rentals. There are resources to do the investigation and go undercover, if necessary. Prior going to court, it would come back to council to decide if it wants to spend additional dollars for legal fees. "One thing we're really hoping, and this came clear in the meeting with our attorney and Pacific Patrol, we hope to do this a couple times, go to court, to show how serious the city is about this kind of vigorous enforcement," said Mayor Cheri Kelley Farivar. "Then watch others who will be monitoring this process, fall into compliance. That is our hope. We're not saying it is going to cost us \$60,000 per year. We're hoping this is an investment in the future of compliance."

someone that is breaking the law, doing overnight rentals in the residential neighborhood, we want to be able to take the next step and do full enforcement."

There might be several cases where people do not want to come into compliance, Farivar said. At that point, they might have to come back to the council for more money. Once a residence is found to be doing overnight rentals, the city will start sending letters.

"If this is going all the way, we typically don't get a response from the property owner until the third notice. They send a notice they will appeal to the hearing examiner. To that point, those costs are relatively minor," Walinski said. "Once the hearing examiner makes the decision, they can challenge again. This is where it goes to court. Thom will make a decision and estimate on the cost. Then it will be up to the city council."

up with Pacific, then we've actually given somebody with a number to keep in their drawer. We had 175 people sign that petition (against overnight rentals) who are going to be vigilant about this and give information to the city, presumably," Farivar said.

Councilwoman Gretchen Wearne asked if other cities had done sting operations.

"Other cities usually don't expose their secret sting op-

erations. We searched for that type of information, it is not readily available. They do not want to release their secrets," said Pate.

At the council meeting that night, the council unanimously approved the new contract for Pacific Patrol regarding overnight rental enforcement.

The base cost is \$35 per hour with 4-to-8 hours per week, along with \$109 per month for the phone service. When the city gets to the point of doing the undercover work, that is where it might get expensive.

Farivar said it is very likely at least one homeowner will take it all the way. Wilson said other cities around the country will be looking at this.

Wilson said Leavenworth may become the model city for how to get rid of overnight rentals, something big and small cities are dealing with. Leavenworth Chamber Director Nancy Smith said she had an issue with Leavenworth becoming a model city.

"I hope it is not one of our goals is to be that model city on vacation rentals, because vacation rentals are huge part of Leavenworth. They are just outside your tiny city limits," Smith said. "That scares me to death because it is a giant part of what Leavenworth is and a giant part of what our guests want. We just didn't want it in the high density area. I'm not suggesting you change what you're doing."

Smith said this model will affect the rest of Leavenworth.

"A giant part of where the traveler is going, especially family travelers, is to enjoy a vacation rental. I have a great vacation rental next to my house," Smith said. "I'm not trying to suggest you do anything different. Just don't be the model city."

Farivar said becoming the model city is not their goals. Wilson said this activity is illegal, so as elected officials, they have to enforce that. Councilwoman Sharon Waters said the residents came and said enforce it and that is what they are doing.



Last week in the Icicle Creek Film Series we had a chess rock star, this week it's a regular ol' rock star -Duff McKagan of Guns 'n Roses fame.



#### HAPPY 100<sup>TH</sup> ANNIVERSARY **GIRL SCOUTS**

It all started in 1917, when Juliette Gordon Low founded the Girl Scouts of America in Georgia. Like all non-profits fundraising is an important part of a healthy organization. The girls of Mistletoe, Oklahoma needed money to fund troop activities, so they decided to sell cookies to raise money. The girls along with help from their mothers baked cookies in the high school cafeteria and sold them as a service project. Other troops took notice and they too started selling cookies, they had baked. The cookie sales got a big boost in 1922 when the "American Girl" published an article about their fundraising business plan. They also published a recipe the girls were using to make a sugar cookie. In 1933 the Girl Scout Cookie Sale became part of the entire organization. Since that time the cookies have been commercially made and is a major source of fundraising for troop activities. This event is not just about raising money, but is also a very educational program for the girls. The girls learn goal setting, decision making, money management, people skills, and business ethics. My sisters and I were all Girl Scouts, I went on to be a Senior Girl Scout, and the skills I learned in scouting have been an important part of my life. I cannot begin to tell you the number of boxes of cookie I sold or the number of boxes of cookies I have purchased. I will not go past a Girl Scout selling cookies with out purchasing as many as I can. Today 2.8 million Girl Scouts with the support of 900,000 adults are selling cookies and learning life skills that will make them great. So please support the Girl Scouts and buy cookies.



"When we had good momentum going, we had some good comments, some good features for all skill levels. It seemed like it was really meeting the need," Leeds said. "However, when you had a conference call with Grindline, most of us did not get to see the moon-boot design. This (current design) is actually quite dangerous. I can't think of a design quite like that."

Because the bowl opens up to the street area, Leeds said there would be a lot of collisions and safety issues.

"Because there is an ad hoc committee with two skaters on it, I was ready to come up here and be a cheerleader and say let's do this, but that is not the right park for us," Leeds said. "We need to go back to the original design, not the peanut, but the moon-boot. This isn't what the skaters want."

Ad hoc committee member Josh Wulfman said the process was shortened. He said after their Friday meeting, there was not enough time to get everyone's opinion. Of the people he talked to, there was a split between the two designs

to learn to skate. Austin Pruce said he liked the moon-boot design.

"The previous design would cater to one or two skaters who would take over the whole park. It wouldn't allow beginners time to skate," Pruce said.

Farivar said it seems they need to revise the design. Walinski said if they are going to stop, they need to get more comments.

"If you select the design being recommended here tonight, then four weeks from now when we put the new design up, these folks will be happy and we'll get a different group in here that say we prefer this," Walinski said. "I think, if you are going to change the design, I think you need to take a breath, put it on hold and go through a process that includes the skaters here tonight and the other skaters, but also the mom's and dad's with the like tikes that skate. You have to give everybody a chance. Stop the process, don't just push ahead."

The original design presented to the group which garnered the most positive comments was the closed bowl design, a different shape of bowl with a lot of street fea-

"I will lean either way with the majority. The majority now favors the moon-boot design. I would recommend we look at the moon-boot as being our final design," Wulfman said.

Local skater Stone Parker said the moon-boot design provides more separation between the bowl and street area.

"This design combines the two and eliminates the nonsafe stuff. The moon-boot has been tested. It works for a variety of people, including beginning. The rest of the park is almost the same. My recommendation is for the moonboot bowl," Parker said.

Another local boarder, Kevin Fiel, said they have one chance to do this.

"If we're going to do it, let's do it correct. The design we had at the meeting before, I felt we all left and we're pretty confident with the idea of it. To see this now, it is just too soon. Let's rethink this, even if it means a skatepark does not get built this summer. This design is not accepted by skateboarders," Fiel said.

Mia Abbot talked about the two different types of skaters, the street skaters and the transition or bowl skaters.

"With the closed design, either the peanut or the moonboot, there is a space for that type of skateboarder. And in the street section, a space for that type of skateboarder. By opening this space, you're not giving justice to the two types of skateboarders," Abbot said.

Cari Heneth said the moonboot design is what everyone wants. Shawn Clark said he's skated a moon-boot design many times and it was good for new skaters. Jesse Baker suggested the nearby pump track is a good place for kids

tures, Walinski said. Councilman Elmer Larsen suggested posting the moon-boot design as the preferred, then get comments for a couple weeks.

Farivar said they heard from the group there has not been sufficient time. Parker said everyone from the ad hoc group was there and had changed their minds on the design, preferring the moonboot.

"The way city government works, the committee needs to reconsider the recommendation in whatever form it takes. The most efficient method is to hand it back to the ad hoc committee. You have a meeting, discuss this calmly after you've had a chance to think about it," Farivar said. "Then, make the determination if you want to reopen this, that you want to move ahead with the moon-boot design. Grindline has a part in this also. To change it, you have to get back to Grindline. We understand your position, but government works really slow."

The ad hoc committee will be taking more comments. Farivar suggested to the skaters they make their positions known to representatives of the committee. Councilwoman Margaret Neighbors said this does not have to take a terrible long time. They can't begin construction right how anyway, Neighbors said.

"We have the potential to make this construction season, but you must be efficient in your planning to make this happen. I really hope you'll speak to the committee members and make your feelings known. If you wish to change the design, that is the way to do it," Farivar said.
