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## Spreading happiness, one letter at a time

132 years - 1891-2023

CASHMERE - Happy Letters is a local nonprofit organization focused on spreading happiness and kindness to those who need it most.

Traci Pierson first began Happy Letters in 2015 at her preschool and childcare center Traci and Friends in Cashmere. She was looking for ways to teach the kids about the importance of spreading kindness and giving back.

But the seeds for Happy Letters had been planted many years before.

"I think what inspired me is my mom because she battled cancer for nine years, and in those nine years I owned a preschool, so in those nine years, we would send different letters to my mom at different times," Pierson said. "And it just made her day."

"We would do daily journals in our preschool class, and we would get to see these beautiful drawings that the kids would make, and the kids were so excited to show us the drawings or give the drawings to someone," she said.

"So that's when I thought, okay, I've seen the letters in action because of my mom," she said. "But then I'm watching these kids and seeing how excited they get about giving back to people in something that they're so proud of making. So that's when we came up with the idea. Let's do Happy Letters. And we started Happy Letters, and it's grown."

The children made letters for veterans, people in retirement homes, and cancer patients. They also sent letters as thank yous to people in the community, such as police officers, nurses, doctors, first responders, and postal employees.

In 2021, Pierson retired but saw the importance of keeping the letters going. So her husband helped her file the paperwork to make Happy Letters an official nonprofit.

"It's important to me because I have seen firsthand the excitement and love that kids put into making happy letters," Pierson said. "They know that what they're drawing is going to make someone smile. It's going to make someone's day. And I just wanted to keep that going because I saw firsthand the difference it made in the kids."

She has also seen the difference it makes for the people who receive the letters. People have emailed and called to let her know how much they mean to them.

Barb Parker and Pierson had been friends for years, in their community. So not and she was aware of Happy Letters but was not involved. That all changed about a year ago when she was diagnosed

with cancer and had to go through some intense treatment involving infusions every other week.

When Parker went in for her first infusion, Pierson dropped off some Happy Letters for her, and then every infusion after that, she dropped off more letters for Parker.

"It was important for me, you know, going through cancer treatment is quite intense. And we try to keep a positive attitude through everything we're going through, and with the help of support from our family and our friends, but to me, this was kids who chose to create these happy letters," Parker said.

"They were sharing their visions of happiness, offering words of support, and showing that they care for people only did I have my family and friends supporting me, but I had people in my community who I didn't even know supporting me."

"So being on the other side and seeing what might seem like a small act, that has such a big impact," Parker said. "That really struck a chord for me."

So when Parker was offered the opportunity to volunteer with Happy Letters, she was eager to help with anything she could and is now a board member and treasurer of the organization.

"I mean, everybody's got something different they're going through, and I really think it helps build the community," Parker said. "And it really does to me it really brought a smile. And I think that's the goal is to bring a smile to people and to help them feel that they're valued. And I think that's what Happy Letters does. It helps people in the community feel valued."

A private school in Wenatchee was the first school to adopt Happy Letters after the creation of the official nonprofit.

"And then it just started growing from there, and that's when Cashmere schools started doing them, and now I have over eight schools participating," Pierson said. "And I'm still getting phone calls, so that's great. The more people that are making happy letters, the more happy we can get out there."

"Our goal this year is to make 3,000 happy letters, and I know we are going to go over our goal of 3,000 Happy letters," Pierson said. "We sent over 700 Happy letters to Maui. And it was pretty awesome seeing how the communities came together to make these happy letters to send to Maui during the tough time that they were going through with the fires and everything."

"For Veterans Day, I'd had a goal of 800 happy letters to send out to veterans," Pierson said. "And I'm probably going to get close to 1,000 Happy letters back from all the different schools that have made happy letters to share with the veterans."

Early this year, Abbie Gundersen met her stepdaughter, who was a senior at Cashmere High School at the time, for lunch in Cashmere. She had her five-year-old daughter with her as well. She spotted coloring supplies and thought that would be a good activity to entertain her younger daughter while she was chatting with her older daughter.

When she went to grab the coloring supplies, she noticed the Happy Letters information.

"So long story short, I discovered these happy letters, and I absolutely loved the

#### **Commissioners** flip the switch to relicense Rock **Island Dam**

WENATCHEE - Owners of motor vehicles licensed to operate on the state's highways and boat owners licensed to navigate the state's waterways are familiar with the annual ritual of tabs renewals. Some even complain about the cost. If you think that is expensive imagine for a moment what the annual tab cost would be for a hydroelectric dam?

Fortunately, dams are not relicensed annually but every 30-50 years. Rock Island Dam, 12 miles downstream from Wenatchee, has been operated by Chelan PUD for the past 68 years. Its current 40year license expires in 2028.

At their Dec. 4 meeting the Chelan PUD Board of Commissioners officially flipped the switch for Rock Island's relicensing to begin at midmonth after listening to a presentation by Hydro Licensing Manager Janel Ulrich.

Rock Island's new license will be the structure's third. The current license is referred to as a "modern" license. Ulrich explained what that means:

"In 1985, regulation was passed that increased recreation, cultural resources, stateinput, non-governmental organizations (NGOs); all the other people coming to the table for the license we have today," said Ulrich. "That makes this really interesting because we haven't seen a lot of re-licensing on modern licenses."

Also new with this relicense is the Habitat Conservation Plan (HCP) for salmon and steelhead and its adaptive management approach included in the 2004 existing license and extending through 2054 with the new license.

The HCP is a 50-year contract to ensure that Rock Island and Rocky Reach hydro projects have no net impact on mid-Columbia salmon and steelhead runs. That commitment is fulfilled by meeting acceptable juvenile and adult survival standards, producing hatchery fish, and providing funding for habitat restoration projects.

Behind the dam along the 21-mile reservoir are five recreational sites and nearly 1,000 upland acres of the Home Water Wildlife Preserve.

The license is a permit from the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) that authorizes Chelan PUD to continue generating power. The formal process takes a minimum of five years, so the PUD got the ball rolling in 2021.

The PUD held 62 outreach meetings over the past two-plus years, said Ulrich,

WENATCHEE - The latest development in Douglas County Public Utility District's \$45 million green hydrogen production project using Wells Dam resources is the decision to acquire mobile fueling capacity for its eventual distribution.

The PUD commissioners announced at their Nov. 28 meet-

ing that they have committed to purchasing a hydrogen mobile refueling system from GKN Hydrogen headquartered in Redditch, England.

GKN is a manufacturer of safe and reliable metal hydride hydrogen storage

systems for green hydrogen. "Storage is a tough nut to crack," said Douglas PUD **Public Information Officer**

"Right now, we're just gassing off the oxygen because we don't have a plan for it," said Vibbert, "but maybe in the future."

The target is the first half of 2024 to have the hydrogen production facility in operation. "As far as a public utility

producing green hydrogen, we're the first," said Vibbert, "There's other hydrogen production but it's not green."

Once the hydrogen is available then comes the fun part.

"Toyota has been generous in that they are going to give us a quantity of their Mirais to use in our fleet to loan out to other entities," said Vibbert, "so that they can become comfortable with hydrogen cars."

The Toyota Mirai is the first hydrogen fuel cell (FCV) to be mass-produced and sold commercially. The mid-size FCV delivers up to 400 miles on a tank of fuel and emits only water and has zero tailpipe emissions in the process.

Commercial long-haul trucks are ideal hydrogen power candidates.

Drivers who operate on thin

profit margins need to be able to refuel quickly and cover hundreds of miles between stops. The extra weight of heavy electric batteries is problematic where time, load limits and the pocketbook are issues.

Douglas PUD General Manager Gary Ivory told the Bridgeport city council last month that hydrogen production will help Wells Dam better utilize its resources.

"There are inefficiencies in creating energy at Wells Dam," said Ivory.

"We are going to take some of those inefficiencies and run them through our hydrogen plant and produce hydrogen for the community.'

Ivory added that the reason the utility can keep energy rates low is due to all the excess the PUD can sell outside the county.

"We plan to do that with hydrogen as well," Ivory said.

reasoning behind them, and I had just become involved with a local community initiative called Kindness Counts," Gundersen said. "And so I was kind of aware, looking and being more aware of kind things that are going on in our community. Anyway, I saw these happy letters and thought these are amazing, such a simple idea, but it can really have a huge impact."

The lunches with her older daughter were a weekly thing and her younger daughter would work on Happy Letters during the lunches. She started posting the Happy Letters on Facebook to promote the organization and then Traci reached out.

The two connected through Facebook and now together look for opportunities to spread happiness through Happy Letters.

"Tracy is amazing," Gundersen said. "She's the sweetest lady, and I've just loved getting to know her and work with her, and you know, just such a simple concept really, really brightens, you know, brightens people's day."

"As a mum, I want my girls to grow up, kind of looking out for maybe the classmate at school who is sad, or the kid in the playground that's getting picked on and you know, for them to be kind and for their first, thought to be, how

enjoy doing it," she said. "So I'm just grateful for people who create these organizations that allow my girls to be loving and kind to someone else they might not even know or meet."

Gundersen brought Pierson to a Kindness Counts meeting to talk about Happy Letters, and the group instantly embraced the idea.

Gene Sharratt, a member of Kindness Counts, which is a year-long initiative to recognize

and encourage kindness in North Central Washington, first met Pierson at that meeting.

"And boy, we just liked her right away, and she introduced the whole Happy Letters to our Kindness Counts group," Sharratt said. "And we were really excited about that. We thought, boy, what a perfect fit for us because we're really about recognizing, contributing, and honoring acts of kindness. We thought, boy, that is a terrific act of kindness."

Both Sharratt and his brother are Vietnam Veterans. His brother is 100% disabled and keeps a Happy Letter on the wall in his room so that he can see it every day. Sharratt said his brother adores the letter.

"So one simple letter, you know, two or three sentences, just perks him up every day," he said.

"He'll never meet the young person, of course, and that's not important," Sharratt said. "But what is important, he just realizes somebody does care about him out there and it means the world to him. Just an eight and a half by 11 piece of paper with 'I'm thinking about you, thanks for your service' just brightens his day."

"Traci's energy and her enthusiasm, of course, is so authentic that you can't help but get engaged in her work because, you know, it's so sincere for her," Sharratt said. "And, of course, that's why you want to support her. It's not about her, and she always says that 'It's not about me, it's about other people and spreading goodwill,' and we're just so enthusiastic at Kindness Counts to support her at every opportunity."

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

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


## Embracing the everlasting spirit of giving beyond the holidays





#### Goats varsity boys clinch home opener

CHELAN – The Mountain Goats varsity basketball teams hosted Ephrata on Dec. 1, and had a split decision with the Tigers when the Chelan boys won their home opener, 56-45, while the girls lost, 59-42.

The real winners at halftime during the boys' game were the Chelan varsity volleyball girls honored for bringing home their fourth consecutive state championship trophy, only the second 1A volleyball team in tournament history to do so.

#### Girls start slow

The Ephrata girls took the early first quarter lead, 18-9, and that seemed to set the tempo for the remainder of the game. The Tigers increased their lead from 9 points to 19 in the second quarter while holding Chelan down to only 4 points in the second.

Ephrata continued to lead through the third quarter and despite a 19-9 fourth quarter rally by Chelan the game was too far out of reach to close

the distance.

Sophomore Brynn Hughbanks led Chelan with 14 points, with freshman Brooklyn Foyle and sophomore Jayden Simmons each adding 7 points.

"We came out in the first couple of minutes strong offensively but had trouble containing their post," said head coach Nick Longmire. "This slowed our offense down and stalled us out."

Longmire noted that his team did a better job of playing in the lanes in the fourth quarter, creating scoring opportunities.

"Our goal is to play all four quarters with high energy this season and the results will come," said Longmire. "I'm proud of our team's resiliency.

#### Goats by 11

The Chelan Goats varsity boys did not let Ephrata out of their sights as the Tigers took a narrow one-point, 14-23 lead into the second quarter. That tenacity paid off when Chelan turned the tables on their visitors and took a one-point, 30-29 lead into the halftime locker room.

The Goats continued to build their lead in the third quarter, scoring double Ephrata's points, 18-9.

At the end of the third quarter senior Isaac Wilson was fouled on a half-court attempt which led to a Tigers' technical foul and giving the Goats five free shots at the line. Wilson made four of those to extend the Goats' lead by 10 and close the quarter, 48-38.

The two teams traded points through the fourth quarter as Chelan added to its lead to win by 11, 56-45.

Kelen Reinhart led Chelan with 15 points. Wilson and Luca Faletto added 12 apiece. Ephrata's Hans Roberts turned in a strong first half, scoring all of his 11 points during that period.

"Dom Solorza came off the bench and did an excellent defensive job on Hans Roberts," said head coach Tony Callero. "Our balanced scoring and active defense was great, and it got better as the game went on."

CHELAN - The Chelan girls varsity basketball team opened its Caribou Trail League season with a 56-27

road win over Quincy, 56-27,

By halftime the Quincy lead was 34-19 as head coach Tony Callero had to bench three Chelan starters with two fouls each. The Jacks took full advantage of the foul opportunities to sink 8 of 12 free throw shots in the second quarter.

Behind Isaac Wilson's eight points the Goats rallied in the third quarter to outscore Quincy, 14-13, but that would be their only surge as the Jacks responded to control the

final quarter. "The fourth quarter was much like the second," reported Chelan AD Even Reister. "Quincy lived at the free throw line and grabbed seven offensive rebounds. The 21-11 scoring advantage for the Jackrabbits sealed the game."

Wilson led Chelan with 18 points, including four baskets from three-point range, while sophomore Luca Faletto added 14.

Quincy's returning CTL MVP, 6'7" Aidan Bews, scored 21 points. Fellow first team All-CTL players sophomore Pierce Bierlink and senior Julian Ibarra added 21 and 13 respectively.

"They have a good team with three returning players who all averaged over 20 a game last season," said Callero. "They have size and experience and after dropping two games on the road to start the season, they gave great effort."

People who take prescription blood thinners like Coumadin® (warfarin), Pradaxa®, Xarelto<sup>®</sup>, Eliquis<sup>®</sup>, or Plavix<sup>®</sup> (clopidogrel) need to be especially cautious. To reduce stomach irritation and the risk of developing a bleeding ulcer, you should ALWAYS take any NSAID, either with a full glass of water or other beverage or with food.

Triprolidine dries up a runny nose and decreases sneezing without causing much drowsiness. It was a favorite remedy of surgeons who didn't want their noses to drip into their surgical masks when leaning over patients during procedures.

We buy Actifed these days as Aprodine®. Luckily, it is available again. Ask your pharmacist if they can order Aprodine® for you, as it needs to be purchased "behind the counter" because it contains pseudoephedrine.

Mucinex Night Shift® O•Cold and Flu for multisymptom relief at night. My husband loved the original version of Nyquilv. It contained pseudoephedrine for stuffy nose and sinus pressure, acetaminophen for fever and aches, dextromethorphan for cough, the antihistamine doxylamine for runny nose, sneezing and to help him sleep, all in green or red flavors containing 25% alcohol.

In 2006, pseudoephedrine was restricted, and Nyquil'®s

formula was updated. They replaced the decongestant with phenylephrine and decreased the alcohol content to 10%. We switched to Nyquil® Cold and Flu because it did not contain phenylephrine as its decongestant.

Some people feel "hung over" in the morning after taking Nyquil®. That's most likely due to the antihistamine doxylamine, also found in Unisom®, a popular nonprescription sleep aid.

## The Washington Outdoors Report

#### The Christmas bird count

The Audubon Society's annual Christmas Bird Count gets underway December 14th and continues through January 5th, 2024.

The Christmas Bird Count was started by the newly formed Audubon Society in 1900 and called the Christmas Bird Census.

The counts took place in 25 different areas, primarily in the Northeastern United States but also west to Pacific Grove, California and north to Toronto, Canada.

The 27 bird watchers participating in this first bird count tallied a total of 90 different species.

Today, tens of thousands of birding enthusiasts venture out across the nation (and beyond) for the annual Christmas Bird Count.

This citizen survey of birds over time has cataloged declines in some species, improving numbers in others, and migration changes.

The counts occur on a single designated day in an established circle. Each circle has a diameter of 15 miles and a compiler sets up a day, time and location for volunteers to meet before venturing out into the circle in their area.

The results of the survey are then given to the compiler who submits them to the Audubon Society.

Some of the trends in Washington State over the last fifty years include an increase in American Kestrel numbers. Also known as a sparrow hawk, this species has seen a nearly three percent increase per year.

On the opposite end, the American Band-tailed Pigeon has declined some 2.6 percent a year during this same timeframe.
