Public hearing set to discuss Transportation Benefit District

CHELAN – The City Council for the City of Chelan will hold a public hearing on Tuesday, Dec. 12, at 6 p.m. regarding the establishment of a city-wide Transportation Benefit District (TBD).

The intended purpose of the TBD is to provide funding on an annual basis for transportation improvement projects for the operation, preservation and maintenance of the city's existing transportation improvements, facilities and programs.

It was previously discussed at the Chelan city council workshop on Nov. 8. At that meeting, city engineer Travis Denham contrasted the city's need to raise more money to address the growing list of needed street repairs against the shrinking availability of dollars to do so.

"At some point the gap between the two is going to be zero," said Denham. "That means services that we can potentially provide in the

future may be limited... the less projects we are able to accomplish; the less matching funds we have for grant opportunities."

In that meeting Community Development Director John Ajax also explained that the TBD could generate revenue with the help of an extra car tab fee added to city resident vehicle licenses and dedicated solely to transportation projects, as well as a sales tax from .01 to .03 percent (\$1 to

\$3 per \$1,000) and used by the majority of TBD jurisdictions. Together, these measures would bring in over \$1 million annually, Ajax explained.

Nearby communities have formed TBDs and find them an effective vehicle to raise needed street revenue. Pateros formed its TBD in 2018. For a city with a population of about 600 people, the annual TBD sales tax from that district is about \$40,000 annually. The City of Bridgeport with

a 2023 population of 2,153, created its TBD in 2017. It brings in about \$45,000 annually from tab fees.

The meeting will take place in City Hall's Council Chambers, located at 135 E. Johnson Ave.

Chelan City Council approves tax levy, multiple projects

CHELAN – The city council approved several consent agenda items in one motion at its regular bi-monthly meeting on Nov. 27.

Those items included the following:

2024 Property Tax Levy

Levy workshops were held on Oct. 3, Oct. 12, and Nov. 8. On Nov 14, 2023, Council instructed the Finance Director Jackie Tupling to bring forward a levy ordinance assessing a 1% increase in property taxes in addition to new construction and refunds.

The Revised Code of Washington (RCW) and Department of Revenue created the proposed ordinance authorizing the council to increase the annual property tax levy by 1% over the amount levied in the previous year. Excluding taxes on new construction, that amount was \$17,148.07. The County Assessor provides the increased amount in October of each year.

75% of Chelan property taxes are used to fund street and transportation maintenance and improvements. 25% funds general government operations and capital improvements, particularly in the parks.

The proposed property tax increase (excluding taxes on new construction) is \$17,760.89. This includes the increase on the 2023 Refund Levy. New construction is expected to raise an additional \$68,801.43 in property tax.

Lakeside Trail

The project will construct a shared-use path on the north side of SR 97A to connect the existing shared-use path on Water Street to West Woodin Avenue. The work will include parking barriers near crossings, median refuge island, marked crosswalk, sidewalks, green/pavement/bicycle intersection crossing markings, Regular Reflective Flashing Beacons (RRFB), lane width reductions, curb ramps, bicycle wayfinding signs/markings, bike lane, shared-use path, bike/pedestrian counter, access management, and illegal parking removal.

Sundance Slope Annexation

On April 26, 2022, the City Council considered a Notice of Intent to Commence Annexation submitted by Sundance Slope, LLC for one property; however, this agenda item was tabled to May 10, 2022, to allow for the addition of adjacent property.

At that May 10, 2022, meeting the council considered

Chelan School levy resolutions win board approval

CHELAN – A pair of levy resolutions won unanimous approval to appear on the Feb. 13, 2024 special election ballot by members of the Lake Chelan School District

Board of Directors at its regular meeting last Monday, Nov. 27.

Those resolutions include the four-year Replacement Educational Programs and Operations (EP&O) levy and the four-year Replacement

Capital Levy for Educational Technology and Safety Improvements levy.

The EP&O levy commencing in 2024 authorizes the collection of \$3,989,500 in 2025; collection of \$4,196,000 in 2026; collection of \$4,390,000 in 2027; and collection of \$4,553,000 in 2028.

The EP&O excess tax levy helps cover the costs of educational programs and operations.

The Technology levy commencing in 2024 authorizes the collection of \$317,641 in 2025; collection of \$333,523 in 2026; collection of \$350,200 in 2027; and collection of \$367,722 in 2028.

The Tech levy supports school facility modernization and remodeling through funding of student and teacher technology services, equipment and infrastruc-

ture, and improvements to safety and security.

The district is looking for applicants interested in writing statements for and against the measures for the Chelan, Douglas, Okanogan counties voters' pamphlets.

The deadline is Dec. 8, and the Board of Directors will address appointments at its Dec. 11 regular board meeting.

"It's an awesome club," said Pearl. "Being an advisor for other clubs, this is a group that really has a heart to serve the community and these young men and women really embody that. They are great ambassadors not only for our school but also our community."

Columbia Valley Health Center updates Lake Chelan School Board

CHELAN - The CEO of Columbia Valley Community Health (CVCH), Manual Navarro, addressed the Nov. 27 regular meeting of the Board of Directors of Lake Chelan School District (LCS D) to update the board about what CVCH is and how it partners with the district.

Navarro, who assumed the CEO post in July 2022, said the intent of CVCH is "to provide affordable, high quality, comprehensive care to medically underserved populations regardless of their insurance status or ability to pay for services."

With respect to CVCH's connection with Chelan schools, Navarro reminded the board that his organization serves about 793 school age children or around 62 percent of LCS D students.

There are more than 1,300 Federally Qualified Health Care (FQAC) centers in the U.S. and Washington has 27, CVCH being one of those. These centers in turn run more than 2,200 different sites. CVCH alone has about three primary and nine additional ancillary sites throughout Chelan and Douglas counties.

One in 11 people in the U.S. receive their care through community health centers, said Navarro. The breakdown includes:

- One in eight children.
- One in seven racial ethnic minorities.
- One in five Medicaid beneficiaries.
- One in five uninsured persons.
- One in three people living in poverty

CVCH users own and run the organization, said Navarro. A minimum 51 percent of CVCH board members must be users of the service. More than 70 percent of current CVCH board members use its services. The roots of CVCH are that of a designated migrant health center. More than 25 percent of its patients identify as ag workers.

Navarro said the CVCH team revisited its vision: To provide the best access to whole person care for underserved individuals in North Central Washington.

Underserved can mean several things, said Navarro, including where people live, their lack of transportation, their ethnicity, a lack of understanding of the insurance health system, and language barriers.

One of the biggest misconceptions about CVCH is that it is funded through the federal government. While grant funding is available through the Bureau of Primary Care (BPHC), the health center's \$7 million base grant and other grants only provide about 19 percent of CVCH's operating budget.

"The majority of our revenue comes from the services we provide to patients," said Navarro. "We are not a free clinic; we charge for everything we do but we do make it affordable."

More than 80 percent of that revenue goes back into the organization to pay for the salaries and benefits needed to attract the high-quality care providers and support team CVCH hires.

Every year CVCH files a report with the BPHC. In 2022 that report showed that the center served 37,000 patients including:

- 5,000 with Chelan-Chelan Falls zip codes
- 36 percent pediatric
- 53 percent adults
- 11 percent geriatric

The report shows that the majority of patients sought primary medical services, 30 percent dental services, and 10 percent behavioral health, the center's fastest growing segment.

Of the patients CVCH serves, 84 percent fall below the 200 percent of federal poverty level (FPL). For a 2023 household of four, 200 percent of the FPL would be (\$18,960 + \$5,140 x 2) x 2 = \$58,200.

Navarro said poverty tends

to be viewed in a negative light as representing those who do not want to work or want to be supported by the government.

"The reality is, a family of four making less than \$60,000 a year falls into that percentage," said Navarro. "These are hard-working individuals who are really wanting to improve their lives and the lives of their families."

Navarro said health care tends to be a high-cost item so the objective of CVCH is to make it affordable to those individuals.

"One of the requirements of an FQAC is that we cannot turn away anybody for inability to pay," said Navarro. "We have to offer a sliding fee based on a person's self-claimed income so a lot of the services we provide are uncompensated."

Navarro said 16 percent of CVCH users are uninsured or do not qualify for insurance.

Last year CVCH delivered about \$48M of care through primary services. That averages about \$1,200 per patient.

Navarro said CVCH is working on ways to provide more primary care services to LCS D students on a scheduled basis following the COVID slowdown. One option the center is working on is a large mobile clinic that can be dropped at the school site to perform on-going monitoring and primary

care. CVCH is also a big supporter of the Back-to-School Fair making sure kids are well-prepared for the school year.

Local veterinarian provides invaluable service to students and local animals

CHELAN – Dr. Barbara Fehr, Chelan-based veterinarian, hosted a special event for aspiring veterinarians at her clinic, The Village Veterinarian, over the Nov. 25 and 26 weekend. This year, Barbara was pleased to host one student, Maria Ware, who is currently in her second year of study at Washington State University in a practicum capacity to assist with spay and neuter procedures for nine cats.

Students may not actively engage in performing surger-

ies until their senior year of study, though Maria was able to assist, and received tutoring in administering x-rays and attending to other extenuating issues with both cats and dogs.

The cats assisted were those of the Chelan Valley Feral Cat Project (CVFCP), a local non-profit that seeks to humanely catch feral cats, treat their health needs, and re-release them to their original homes.

The exemplary work of Dr. Fehr and her visiting student over the weekend included engaging in challenging dual procedures in attending to one particularly challenged

and young female cat. Thanks to the expertise and patience of Dr. Fehr and her visiting student, the female they saw underwent both being spayed and receiving treatment for a naval hernia in one seamless surgery.

Dr. Fehr, solo veterinarian at her practice, hopes to soon recruit an aspiring veterinarian post-graduation to assist her, as veterinarians are few, and it is often a challenge to recruit these highly-skilled individuals to small towns for work.

Barbara has been seeking an additional veterinarian to

work with her at her practice now for over 10 years, and was excited to offer an opportunity to veterinary students to receive a direct experience in assisting in procedures with animals in need.

April Leaf, director of the Chelan Valley Feral Cat Project, is currently in training to assist Dr. Fehr with spay and neuter surgeries. Dr. Fehr is the primary provider for these services for the CVFCP.

April shares, “Every time I am there I learn something new and cannot believe how intricate and involved the surgeries are... thank you to

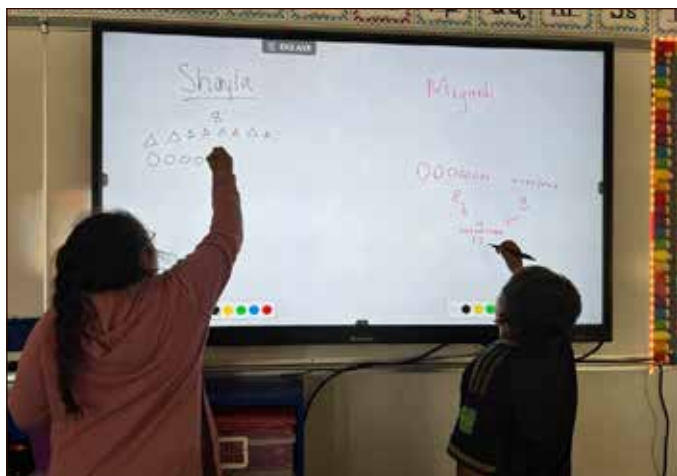

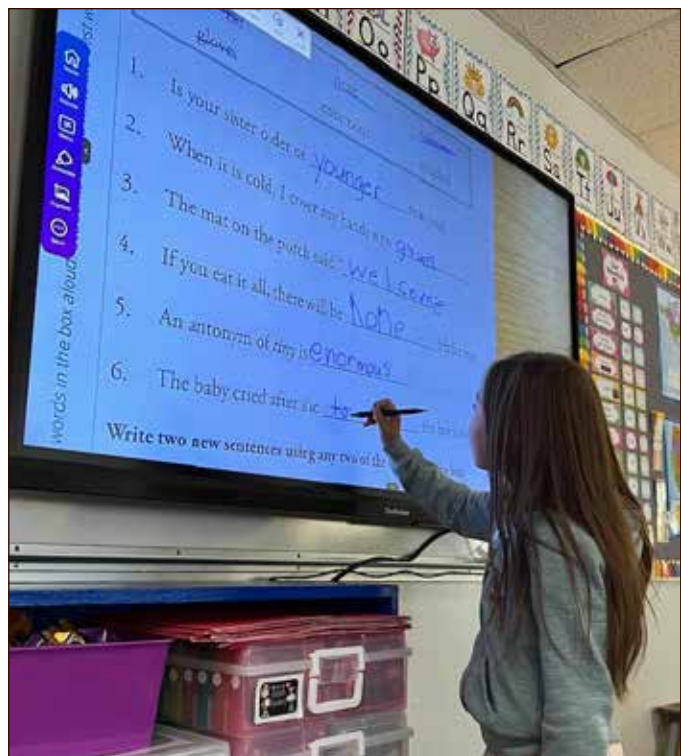

Touchscreen installations provide students and teachers new ways to interact with content

CHELAN – The Lake Chelan School District (LCSD) recently began a new installation of Touchscreens in district classrooms with the aim of enhancing student learning and visibility of instruction materials. The district began this installation during the 2022-2023 school year, with 26 Touchscreens currently installed or waiting to be.

Over 20 LCSD classrooms

are currently benefiting from this new technology, with a goal of eventually having new Touchscreens installed in as many classrooms as possible.

These screens have been installed to replace the prior projector technology commonly used in classrooms. The lifespan of the screens vary, though the LCSD hopes to see them in use for over 10 years before needing replacement.

These Touchscreens provide a host of benefits to students

and teachers. With these additions, students are allowed opportunities to give interactive presentations and engage with content with more ease, as well as providing increased visibility of diagrams and text over that of an image projected onto a whiteboard.

Additionally, teachers are enabled to not only write over what is displayed, but have additional opportunities to save and refer back to diagrams and notes using only one swipe.

Touchscreens installed at Morgan Owings Elementary have been made lowerable to a height accessible for younger students.

Regarding these additions, LCSD Superintendent, Bradley Wilson, shares, "We believe we have developed a solid model for learning technology integration. We don't jump at new fads, but once devices prove to be effective we do make plans to implement starting with volunteers and growing

from there. This ensures that classrooms with the new technology have users eager to try it and willing to learn. This empowers teachers to learn from each other and learn alongside their students."

The initial Touchscreen installations were funded from A Digital Equity grant that the LCSD was awarded last

year. The district continues to utilize technology levy funds to insure continued installations.

Goats defense sparks victory at Brewster basketball opener

BREWSTER –When the Lake Chelan High School boys' varsity basketball team opened its season at Brewster on Tuesday, Nov. 28, the Goats

decided to take their game to the frequently formidable Bears rather than wait for the Bears to do the same to them.

What the Goats brought was an aggressive, smothering defense that caught their

hosts unprepared, frequently trapping the Bears' ball handlers in double-man coverage where attempts to pass were difficult, turnovers frequent, and points converted. The result: a 16-3 first quarter lead for Chelan that set the tempo for the remainder of the game as Brewster tried to climb out of a 13-point hole to stay in contention.

Led by nine first-quarter points from senior Ryan Rainville the Goats maintained their trapping defense on the ball handler and forced the Bears to take more long-range, low-percentage shots as Chelan slowly extended its lead.

"We got off to a sloppy and weak start," said Bears' head coach Michael Taylor. "Chelan put up good pressure and

double-teamed our guards when they went to bad spots. They continued this throughout the game, and it plagued us all night."

At halftime the Goats led by nine, 27-18. For the first four minutes of the third quarter Chelan's defensive wall held Brewster scoreless before a Bears' free-throw broke the ice. By that time Chelan led by nearly double the Bears' points, 34-19. When the buzzer sounded the Goats were up by 17, 52-35.

"The team played with great energy, hustle, and were very unselfish," said Chelan head coach Tony Callero in praise of the Goats' overall defensive efforts.

The combined output of game high-scorer Rainville with 21 points and junior

teammate Kellen Reinhart with 14, equaled the 35 by the entire Bears' team.

The two Goats also pulled down 23 combined rebounds, 15 by Reinhart and eight by Rainville. Both teams had

good height with four Bears players standing 6'3" or taller and Chelan with four at 6'2" or better.

"We did not rebound well on

a revised 10% annexation petition with additional adjacent property owners to be included in the annexation.

On June 13, 2023, the council approved a resolution setting a public hearing date of Aug. 8, 2023, after receiving formal certification of the 60% petition from the Chelan County Assessor on May 11, 2023. Official notice of the public hearing was published in the Chelan Mirror on July 26 and August 2, 2023. Notice was posted in three locations within the general annexation area.

On August 8, 2023, a public hearing was held and that resolution was adopted.

Staff requested that the council approve an ordinance for the Sundance Slope Annexation. Following the public hearing on August 8, 2023, staff submitted a Notice of Intention to the Chelan County Boundary Review Board (CCBRB), accompanied by the necessary fee, on Sept. 7, 2023. Since more than 45 days have passed after this submission and no one filed a petition for review, the CCBRB did not assume

jurisdiction to review the annexation. Per state RCW, if the CCBRB does not act within 45 days, the annexation is automatically approved by statute. All procedural steps required for approval have been completed, making the enactment of the Ordinance viable. Once approved, the annexation must be reported to various local agencies and the Chelan County Assessor. The annexation details, along with population data gathered from a census, will be forwarded to the Washington State Office of Financial Management.

Imagine Downtown Chelan

The council also discussed seven project design configuration options for Imagine Downtown Chelan described as the transformational strategy adopted by Historic Downtown Seattle Association (HDCA). Council actions included:

- No. 1: Advance the Imagine Chelan Project design with 12’, 14’, or 16’ foot wide sidewalks. Council approved 14’ sidewalks.
- No. 2: Advance the design with 45 or 60 degree angle

parking angles. The council voted to maintain the existing configuration for on-street parking and direct parking lots to be designed in the most efficient configuration possible.

- No. 3: Advance the design with 9’, 9.5’, or 10’ wide parking stalls. The council approved 9.5’ wide parking stalls.
- No. 4: Include or exclude a crosswalk on the 200 block of Woodin Avenue in the design. The council voted to exclude a crosswalk.
- No. 5: Include or exclude the proposed public parking lot improvements on the north side of the 100 block of Woodin Avenue in the design. The council voted to include.
- No. 6: Include or exclude new restrooms and common space improvements adjacent to Columbia Street North of Woodin Avenue in the design. The council voted to include.
- No. 7: Include or exclude the proposed public parking lot improvements on the south side of the 200 block of Woodin Avenue in the design. The council voted to include.
