## Council urged to explore options for more affordable housing

### Park Survey questions heard

CHELAN- The July 11 Chelan City Council meeting featured several local voices urging the mayor and council members to explore avenues and options for affordable housing in the valley. Norma Gallegos is the program director for Hand-in-Hand, a local immigration service. She is also an accredited representative for the Department of Justice and the Board of Immigration Appeals. Around 15 people joined Gallegos to discuss the matter. She mentioned that about 250,000 people in Washington are eligible to become citizens. Recently, during the harvest, about 25 people had previously visited with the mayor about affordable housing. She said that during COVID, immigrants were hard to find, and housing

was challenging.

"People became invisible. I didn't know where they were," Gallegos said. "People were living behind garage doors, tents and not wanting to share any information." Among the people who spoke was Jorge Lopez, who has lived in the Chelan area for more than 30 years. He shared a personal story and mentioned that the housing issue has become more prominent in recent years.

"This is a problem for ordinary people, for people who work in the orchard, who work at the apple warehouses, at the hotels and restaurants," Lopez said. "We need to look for a solution just to keep people here in Chelan locally because people contribute to the economy with the work at the hotels, at the restaurants, the orchards and we need to look for a solution for those people also." Chelan Mayor Bob Goedde and the Council were sympathetic to Gallegos and all the visitors. Goedde

said the City is aware of the issue and welcomes help in finding a solution.

"I can only imagine how difficult it might be to come in here and make a presentation before this group," Goedde said. "We do have some options and we'll discuss them down the road, but it isn't going to be quick, but we're working on it." "Right now we're like two communities working separately on it, so I hope we can find a way.

There's language barriers and cultural barriers obviously and hopefully we can get over the awkwardness of working around that and work together," Councilman Tim Hollingsworth said, "sometimes when you look at the housing situation you feel like you're pushing a rope or running in quicksand because it's a very intractable economic issue." Goedde then made a procla-

## Chelan's Ruby Theatre celebrates 109 Years of Hollywood Magic

An evening full of fun, prizes and historic cinema by Chaplin, Keaton, and early Disney accompanied by Valentina the 1919 photoplayer

CHELAN - For more than a century, the Ruby Theatre's silver screen on Woodin Avenue in Downtown Chelan, has flickered with cinematic entertainment from the early silents, the talkies, 1930s movie glamour plus more modern adventures.

"This year, we are literally rolling out the red carpet to welcome movie-goers to celebrate the anniversary of The Ruby," said local architect Larry Hibbard who owns the movie house with his wife Mary. "The 1914 theatre is on the National Register of Historic Places because of its historical architectural significance and in our hearts because of the continuing role it's played in Chelan."

"The auditorium with its horseshoe balcony, sloping floor, cast-plaster proscenium arch, and decorative

tin ceiling, is essentially as it was when it was built," explained Hibbard. "The facility has been well maintained, fitted with new comfortable seating, efficient HVAC, and digital projection. In addition, Valentina, a 104 year-old Wurlitzer photoplayer has recently been installed bringing back a forgotten piece of theatre history. The once-common, now rare, photoplayer is a self-playing one-man-band complete with keyboard, percussion, bells, pipes, and special effects that was developed to accompany silent films," Hibbard continued.

This special anniversary celebration will be an adventure with "Photo Plays" (the original term for mov-

ies) and music taking viewers back to the early days

of cinema. Valentina, the photoplayer, will rise to the occasion from the piano pit for a mini concert before retreating to accompany the silent movies.

Starting at 7 p.m. on July 30, a showing of "Gertie the Dinosaur," America's earliest animation, will launch the event. Charlie Chaplin's 1915 "The Tramp" will present Chaplin before he developed his legendary Tramp character. Buster Keaton will appear in a 1922 comedy, "The Goat" (no relation to the Chelan Goats!). The celebration will wind up with one of Walt Disney's earliest animations, "Puss in Boots," created in his first studio in Kansas.

mation for Parks & Recreation Professionals Day. The mayor personally thanked Chelan’s Parks & Recreation workers before reading a statement.

“The Council values the essential services that park,

and recreation professionals perform to provide recreational and developmental enrichment for our youth; and to ensure our parks and recreational spaces are clean, safe, inclusive, welcoming and ready to use,” he said.

Next on the agenda was to find a contract for the 2023

Parks Asphalt Preservation Project. This endeavor involved maintenance in local parks which includes asphalt crack sealing and seal coat patch repairing within the RV park, the entrance road, the basketball courts, and the go-kart tracks. Paul Horne, Parks, Recreation and Community

Services Director for Chelan, said that he hoped the project would take place during the fall when the parks have less use, but temperatures are still conducive to asphalt work. The motion passed unanimously.

Horne then spoke about his department’s progress on the Parks, Recreation and Open Space (PROS) Plan survey questions. Chris Overdorf from SCJ Alliance also helped Horne during the meeting. Among the proposed questions in the survey were: What makes Chelan a great place to live or visit? Which of the following would you be willing to fund with your tax dollars? What are the reasons your household uses Chelan parks? What are unique characteristics or values of the City of Chelan that you love?

“Ultimately what we’re trying to do is to capture the community’s desired quality of life

and what they want to see out of their parks and rec system,” Horne said.

The Council discussed various ways to distribute the survey including sending it with utility bills, bringing it to schools and going into the

parks themselves to hand it out. Eventually, the City wants to build a public skate park and the Council said its location would have a big impact on the community in general and the parks system specifically.

During the Council comments portion of the meeting, councilman Mark Ericks reiterated the importance of finding affordable housing for residents of the valley.

“My whole family was middle European immigrants, and I know their struggles were not unlike the struggles of the current generation that have moved here,” Ericks said. “I think the difference though is that economy is a more difficult hurdle to tackle now, especially in home ownership and for housing. I think we have an obligation to help where we can and how we can.”

CHELAN - Framing is underway at Chelan Valley Housing Trust's (CVHT) Iowa Street development thanks in no small part to our Chelan County Commissioners. CVHT is building two three-bedroom, two-bath homes on Iowa Street in South Chelan for local wage earners making 120% area median income or less.

The Chelan County Commissioners granted funding from the Cascade Public Infrastructure Fund for the housing trust to purchase the property. The homes are being built by K & L Homes with financing from North Cascades Bank. The homes will be finished by Fall 2023.

**Planting fake grass.** Plastic grass offers none of the life-giving benefits of real grass - such as oxygen production, carbon sequestration, urban heat dissipation, or air pollution reduction. Real grass offers all these benefits, and it is easier on feet and paws. Also, real grass is a natural air conditioner.

**Forgetting the "right plant, right place" rule.** This is the "Golden Rule" of backyarding, but it's more than just knowing which plants will thrive in sunny spots versus shaded areas. Selecting the right plants for your micro-climate and lifestyle will result in a living landscape that requires minimal upkeep on your part while offering maximum environmental benefits.

**Not treating your yard like part of the connected ecosystem.** Your yard links with other community green spaces to provide food and shelter for pollinators, such as birds, bees, butterflies, bats, and other creatures. Support pollinators and wildlife by planting a healthy balance of grasses, flowers, shrubs, and trees that thrive in your yard's conditions and bloom at different times throughout the year.

**Not utilizing community green spaces.** Think of community parks, dog parks, green belts, and school yards as an expansion of your own backyard square footage. # Pangborn Festival of Flight attracts many on a sunny summer day

EAST WENATCHEE—"One of the biggest parts of owning airplanes is washing bugs."

Shane Mahoney smiled as he wiped away unwanted insects from his silver 1957 Piper Tri-Pacer. The Auburn resident's sparkling prize fit well with the dozens of planes perched on the tarmac during Pangborn's Festival of Flight Saturday July 8 hosted by the City of East Wenatchee and Pangborn Memorial Airport. The annual event serves simultaneously as showcase and lesson.

"I think aviation in general is a really important piece of our infrastructure," Mahoney said. "We can't just do trucks. We can't just do trains. We can't just do boats. Infrastructure in terms on transportation is a real complex thing. I think it's a huge part of the infrastructure that is really underutilized."

Mahoney is a member of the Puget Sound Antique Airplane Club, a group of private owners of small historic planes who tour the region in the spirit of barnstorming of the 1920s. The annual event allows the public inside the aviation world where every pilot has a plane, and every plane carries a story. The same holds true for Mahoney, who has owned his Piper for 20 years. He inherited his love for aircraft from his father John in Detroit Lakes, MN. When Mahoney was six, his father passed away never having flown with his son. Despite that early loss, Mahoney always keeps a clear flight path in his mind which still soars 62 years later.

"I was always into aviation from that inspiration," he said. "That's why it's so important to

inspire the young kids."

Yet Mahoney's personal take-off came decades after that initial childhood motivation. He worked for many years as an engineer at Boeing. During that time, he took a few flying lessons, but didn't buy a plane until age 48, then subsequently earned his pilot's license. Mahoney joked that he owns 2½ planes since one will never be finished during his lifetime.

While distinct, Mahoney's story shares some airspace with his fellow plane owners, especially members of the PSAAC. They took great pleasure in welcoming the many visitors to their little corner of the tarmac to tell their planes' tale. In addition to privately owned craft, several helicopters and other planes from the military and

emergency services were on display for close observation.

The plane patrons, many donning inflatable airplane hats, had plenty to observe from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. on the sunny summer Saturday. Three players from the Wenatchee AppleSox, along with mascot Coyote, strolled around the tarmac which drew the attention of many youngsters. In a larger hanger toward the entrance, over a dozen organizations held displays. Included among these were the local Cubs Scouts, the Army National Guard and Pangborn Composite Squadron's Civil Air Patrol. Event goers could also snag from a table free used airplane related books.

The festivities began in earnest on Friday, July 7 with the

inaugural 1940's Big Band Dinner & Dance. The avian gala included food, a silent auction, and the Wenatchee Big Band. Proceeds from the event helped support the Spirit of Wenatchee's Aviation Scholarship. Ridgeline Aviation, RH2, C&O Nursery, ALSC Architects, Davis Arneil Law Firm, Ardurra Ogden Murphy Wallace Attorneys, and Peoples Bank provided sponsorships.

Mike Werner and Theresa White are also members of PSAAC. They own a N3N-3 called Jack, named for the comic strip character that flew fictional flights through printed pages for 40 years. A previous owner slapped a decal of the cartoon on the plane's starboard side. Produced in January of 1941, two years into World War II, Jack entered into Navy Service at the Pensacola Navy Air Station in April of that year. The

Navy then lent it to the United States Department of Commerce for use in war training at Naval Air Station Glenview in Illinois for use in a civilian pilot training program.

After serving the country, Jack helped the nation in a different fashion in 1946: as a crop duster. Once retired from that task, the plane changed hands a few times before Werner purchased it. Heading for Twisp after the event with the PSAAC, Werner appreciated Pangborn's atmosphere and to be the steward of a historic plane.

"This is a great town. It's a great spot. It's a unique place being down in a bit of a bowl," Werner said. "I treat myself as a caretaker of the airplane, not so much an owner. I like to take it to venues where people can see it and ask questions and get a little more appreciation for an airplane."



## THE WASHINGTON OUTDOORS REPORT

### Fishing reports and elk conservation

#### Fishing Reports

The coho salmon are biting in Puget Sound, especially in Marine Area 10 near Seattle where creel checkers found anglers were averaging more than one salmon apiece last weekend. A few Chinook salmon are being caught as well there but better Chinook catches were observed in the Strait of Juan de Fuca.

Heading to Westport the Charter Boat Association is holding its annual derby and daily winners have been hauling in Chinook up to 21 pounds (after being gutted and gilled) as well as some very nice lingcod weighing up to 33 pounds. The coho salmon, as expected, are much smaller this early in the season. As of last week, the largest one weighed in was

pushing seven pounds.

Checking in with Gorge Outfitters Supply in Rufus, Kylie reports the shad fishing has tailed off.

Anglers are trying for wall-eye and sockeye in this area of the Columbia River Gorge but she hasn't gotten much feedback and overall, things are a little slow right now.

On the Upper Columbia River Mike Roth with Team Take Down Guide Service says the

Brewster pool was fishing well the first week it was open but it's been more of a struggle in recent days. The number of fish over the dams are good but colder than normal water temperatures could be causing the fish to move through the river much faster than normal. Roth also fished near Rocky Reach Dam a few nights ago and caught a couple of Chinook but no sockeye.

As of July 12, 69,000 summer Chinook had passed through Bonneville Dam, below ex-

pectations, but more than 310,000 sockeye have traveled upstream past the dam, well above the preseason forecast. [www.teamtakedownguideservice.com](http://www.teamtakedownguideservice.com).

If you are looking for sockeye outside the Columbia River a good bet right now would be Baker Lake. Brianna Bruce, the owner of Livin' Life Adventures, was out with clients when it opened on the July 8 and reports the fishing was lights out. Brianna said, "We had to go through a bunch of fish to finally land our 12, the guys had a hard time keeping them hooked, but we still got it done at 7:40 a.m. Another amazing Baker Lake opener." Better still, this wasn't just a good opener, Baker Lake has been fishing good all week long and as of July 11, there were over 19,150 sockeye salmon in the lake.
