Chelan City Council awards wastewater treatment plant improvements to KRCI

McCardle, Ajax give update regarding TIA

132 years - 1891-2023

CHELAN - In a June 27 meeting, the Chelan City Council discussed many issues involving areas of improvement to infrastructure and recreation around the

Among these items was the first phase of wastewater treatment plant improvements. In a unanimous vote, the Council awarded the project bid to KRCI, LLC. The East Wenatchee company offered the lowest bid for the improvements at \$785,157, well below the \$936,000 the city had budgeted for the endeavor. The construction project involves installing city-purchased mechanical and electrical equipment as well as purchasing minor mechanical plumbing items at the wastewater treatment plant. The next motion consideration was the City's agreement with Rain for Rent, an equipment rental agency based in Arlington. Travis Denham, City engineer for the Public Works Department, provided history on the matter. In fall of 2021, the Chelan authorized RH2 Engineering to conduct an analysis of the City's water system. The analysis demonstrated the need to install a third pump at Darnell's Booster Pump Station. The

City expects the pump to be delivered in September and installed and commissioned by early October. Due to the waiting period and number of customers being served, the Public Works Department opted to have an emergency action plan especially since maximum flow demand typically occurs in late July.

This plan involved an agreement with Rain for Rent which rents trailer-mounted pumps throughout the United States. Chelan would rent the pump on layaway at a 50-perecent rate while it waits for the third pump to be officially installed. In case of an emergency, Rain for Rent could deliver the pump from Arlington in about 12 hours. Denham did not anticipate borrowing the pump longer than needed. Renting the pump would cost approximately \$33,000 if it's not needed and between \$65,000 and \$75,000 if it is

needed during that time. "The analogy that we've been using is, you can only roll the dice so many times before you lose the battle. We feel like we're really close," Denham said. "Obviously that [new] pump's going to be here in September or October, but this is just an insurance policy to get us through one more summer." All members of the Council voted for the motion.

The next topic was to finalize an agreement for the design of the Chelan Gorge Community Park. Paul Horne, Parks, Recreation and Community Services Director for

Chelan, mentioned Berger Partnership Professional Services and included two sample site master plans from other projects the firm had done. The motion for the agreement passed unanimously.

Horne continued to talk about the SCJ Alliance Professional Services Agreement for the Parks & Recreation System Master Plan Project. The agreement would provide a six-year project that would be GMA (Growth Management Act) compliant and satisfy RCO (Recreation and Conservation Office) compliance which allows the City to continue to be eligible from Grants at their providing. SCJ has a base in Wenatchee and Horne said the firm knows the Chelan area well. "We are hot to trot to finish this park's recreation system master plan," Horne said. "We'd like to get this passed while you're all on the board. Hopefully this can be a good legacy for this Council to set the direction for the parks

The motion passed unani-

Councilwoman Erin McCardle and Chelan Community Development Director John Ajax then gave an administrative update regarding the East Chelan Tax Increment Area (TIA). They mentioned that conversations took place with the junior tax districts. Two successful outreach meetings were held with Lake Chelan Health Hospital and Chelan Fire District 7. McCardle described the meetings as "collaborative" and mentioned that Fire Chief Brandon Asher said his department is good from a financial perspective.

"We clearly understand the mechanics of how the TIF works as far as no harm to the junior taxing districts," she said. While acknowledging the project as a main priority for the City, Councilman Tim Hollingsworth emphasized the importance of finding other revenue streams.

"I think the biggest way we can mitigate the financial impact on the junior districts is going to be by finding other sources besides our property tax revenue, however it is collected and so I want to urge that we not put all our eggs in this basket," he said. "I think that's part of the concern of the junior districts that it's just the scale of the project and the amount of property tax revenue that's being consumed by it."

Lake Chelan Community Center kicks off building blocks campaign to raise \$250,000 in 90 days

Local community invited to be part of building crucial elements of the Community Center

CHELAN - "I'm so proud of our community. I always felt their support growing up here. There will be a lot of lives that are going to be impacted. All ages. All demographics. We're planning and preparing to be a place for everyone."

These are the words of Brooke Isaak, vice-president of the Seven Acres Foundation Board and Marketing Committee Chair, responsible for sharing the story and enlisting support for the allnew 46,000-square-foot Lake Chelan Community Center. Isaak grew up in Manson and understands how people unite to support a community endeavor. "It can be so powerful," said Isaak. "Each person is important. We're all like individual building blocks that, when connected, create something bigger and more rewarding than any of us can be or do alone."

Initially conceived in 2018, The Community Center project moved slowly during the land acquisition and prepara-





tion stages. Pandemic and supply chain issues challenged progress from 2019 thru 2021. But work continued, and contributors put more and more building blocks methodically

into place. The city of Chelan building permit was issued in January of 2022, and for the last 18

months, stepby-step, the building has quickly emerged. Anyone traveling between Chelan and Manson on Highway 150 can't help but notice the progress.

Phase one of the project, constructed in three phases, is more than 68% complete. And thanks to grants, foundations, and generous contributions from people with a heart for

the Lake Chelan community, phase one has been fully funded. According to Isaak, "it's time to rally together and add even more building blocks in the form of local donors."

Phase two funding will provide BUILDING the necessary furnishings, and finish the gymnasium, parking lot, and landscap-

ing. Phase one and two combined are now 83% funded and 53% complete. Isaak is asking community members to choose the way that's best for them to support the next development phase. A favorite for many people is an engravable stone paver beginning at \$250.

Board member Kyle Plew -

a native of Chelan - expressed the outreach for support this way. "Everyone should have an opportunity to participate in, and benefit from, the resources of our valley. No matter what. I'd definitely invite people to be part of that."

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Driver seriously injured in semi truck rollover

On June 30 at 2:45 p.m. an auto accident was reported in Orondo two miles up McNeil Canyon Road. On arrival firefighters found a semi and trailer through the guardrail and over a steep embankment. Both the semi tractor and trailer were ripped apart with a load of apples spilling down the canyon. The driver of the semi was extricated from the vehicle and transported to Lake Chelan Health with serious injuries. Fire units on scene secured the vehicle that had an environmental spill and arching electrical components. McNeil Canyon Road was closed for a short time and was also closed at a later time when the semi and trailer were pulled from the canyon. Summer Chinook Season Curtailed

The Oregon and Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife announced fishing for adult summer chinook from the mouth of the Columbia River to Priest Rapids Dam was closed on July 1. The reason why? It's because the run is tracking significantly below pre-season expectations. As of June 28, only 52, 572 adult summer Chinook salmon had crossed Bonneville Dam. That's about 12,000 fish less than last year's run at this time and 6500 fish less than the ten-year average.

However, fishing for sockeye salmon, hatchery steelhead and jack Chinook salmon remains open from the Astoria-Megler Bridge upstream to the Hwy 395 Bridge in Pasco. The daily adult bag limit is two adult salmonids (only one may be a hatchery steelhead) and five hatchery

jack salmon. All sockeye salmon are considered adults. The fall Chinook run on this portion of the Columbia River is still scheduled to open on August 1.

The Wenatchee Salmon Derby

The 10th annual Pete Flohr Memorial Wenatchee Salmon Derby takes place on the Columbia River between Rock Island Dam and Wells Dam on July 14 and 15. There will be over \$7500in cash and prizes given away this year to include a cash prize for the biggest salmon weighed in and for the team who weighs in the heaviest limit of salmon on their boat. There is a mandatory skippers meeting at 6 p.m. on July 13 at the Eagles Aerie in Wenatchee. Weigh-ins will take place both derby days at Beebe Bridge State Park and at Hooked on Toys in Wenatchee. The awards ceremony will commence on Saturday July 15 at 5 p.m. at the Wenatchee Eagles Aerie. Proceeds from the event benefit the Washington state chapter of the Coastal Conservation Association. A reminder - No Fireworks on Public Lands

Fireworks are illegal to use in many places east of the Cascade mountains due to high fire danger and that includes public lands throughout the state such as state parks, national parks, U.S. Forest Service lands as well as property managed by the Bureau of Land Management in both Washington and Oregon. With wildfires already starting in several locations in Chelan, Douglas, and Grant Counties, fireworks bans can help reduce the risk of additional fires starting at this time of year.



You could have seen the movie The Sting, starring Paul Newman and Robert Redford. Its soundtrack introduced rag-

Joplin's musical genius. 1974 the Food and Drug Administration approved ibuprofen as a prescription medicine to treat mild to moderate pain

and inflammation. Acetaminophen eases headaches and fever, but ibuprofen is more effective for muscle aches and inflammation. In 1974, doctors could prescribe ibuprofen instead of aspirin for muscle aches, arthritis pain and swelling, and menstrual cramps.

Aspirin and ibuprofen are non-steroidal anti-inflammatory medications or NSAIDs. Ibuprofen is less irritating to the stomach than aspirin, which gives better pain relief and fewer side effects.

One decade later, facing the expiration of its patent, ibuprofen's manufacturer applied to the FDA for approval to sell it without a prescription. In addition to the 400mg, 600mg, and 800mg tablets of prescriptiononly Motrin®, in 1984, the FDA approved ibuprofen as Motrin-IB® 200mg tablets, available over the counter (OTC).

Years later, naproxen followed the same path: first as a prescription-only anti-inflammatory, then approved for OTC use as Aleve®. The main options for pain relief by mouth without a prescription today include aspirin, acetaminophen, ibuprofen, and naproxen.

Where were you in 1974?



Non-prescription doses of naproxen or ibuprofen are much safer than aspirin and more effective than acetaminophen in relieving muscle pain, menstrual cramps, and toothache.

Although taking an NSAID is usually safe for easing fever and muscle aches, it can be dangerous for people with certain medical conditions like heart failure.

Eighty-two-year-old Diana takes a water pill daily for her heart failure, preventing fluid from building up in her lungs.

Last month, Diana started taking ibuprofen (Advil®) for a sinus headache. She continued her medications, but the ibuprofen in the Advil® triggered fluid retention. She ended up in the hospital with trouble breathing from fluid in her lungs and swelling in her hands and feet.

NSAIDs can also spell trouble for people with kidney problems, like diabetics. Taking ibuprofen or naproxen by prescription or OTC can trigger kidney damage, especially if you get dehydrated. Excessive sweating or suffering from vomiting or diarrhea can cause dehydration. Taking NSAIDs when your body is low on fluids can seriously harm your kidneys.

People who have had a bleeding ulcer should also avoid taking NSAIDs like ibuprofen and naproxen. These medicines interfere with maintaining the protective gel layer that lines your stomach, protecting it from the acids you secrete to digest your food. Taking ibuprofen or naproxen erodes the gel lining of your stomach, making it thinner, which puts you at risk for stomach pain or bleeding.

When taken at the beginning of menstrual flow, just one dose of ibuprofen or naproxen can head off debilitating abdominal cramps. One dose of an NSAID right before a tooth extraction can avoid suffering from swollen 'chipmunk cheeks" afterward.

Do you make frequent trips to the bathroom at night? One intriguing side effect of NSAIDs is reducing the frequency of urination. You only need a small dose: one 200mg ibuprofen tablet or Advil® Dual Action tablet at bedtime is enough to make a difference.

Here are 5 Tips to Help Keep Yourself Safe When Taking NSAIDs:

1. Keep vourself hydrated.

Even young, healthy people can suffer severe kidney damage if they become dehydrated while taking an NSAID medicine. NSAIDs interfere with your body's safety net for your kidneys when you get low on

2. Ask your doctor first.

Most people can take low doses of ibuprofen or naproxen without harm. However, NSAIDs can aggravate and accelerate kidney problems. If you have diabetes, take Tylenol® (acetaminophen) for aches and pains instead of an NSAID, and consult your doctor before taking ibuprofen or naproxen.

3. Protect your heart.

If you have congestive heart failure, also called CHF, avoid taking any medicine that includes an NSAID. By causing sodium and water retention, ibuprofen and naproxen counteract the beneficial effects of water pills that help to keep fluid out of your lungs and reduce swelling in your hands

4. Watch your blood pressure.

NSAIDs often cause your blood pressure to rise. They can interfere with how medicines keep your blood pressure in a normal range.

5. Don't double up.

It's surprisingly easy to take two NSAIDs at the same time. That's because the prescription strengths have different brand names than the OTC versions of the same medicines. Not realizing that you are taking two drugs with the same ingredient puts you at risk for overdose and side effects like stomach pain, bleeding, kidney and heart problems.

Outdoor power equipment helps weather a storm or power outage

Be prepared and keep safety in mind, says the Outdoor Power Equipment *Institute*

Summer storm season is nearly here, but having the right outdoor power equipment on hand year-round is important, says the Outdoor Power Equipment Institute (OPEI), which advises home and business owners to think ahead before foul weather or a power outage disrupts life. "It's important to be prepared year-round given any season can be storm season. We see more people investing in portable and whole house generators and having other outdoor power equipment on hand such as chainsaws and water pumps to mitigate any damage from felled trees and water damage and floods," says Kris Kiser, President & CEO of OPEI, an international trade association representing manufacturers and suppliers of outdoor power equipment, small engines, battery power systems, portable generators, utility and personal transport vehicles, and golf cars. He notes that outdoor power equipment is becoming faster, lighter, more efficient, and more technologically advanced. "There's a power source for every need

get ready for inclement weather, homeowners should identify which equipment is needed. Chainsaws or pole saws can trim limbs and shrubs ahead of a storm and handle clearing. String trimmers, pruners and chainsaws can also remove combustible material from around your home, making it less vulnerable to wildfires. A portable generator will power key appliances and charge cell phones when utilities go down. Before an outage, plan where the generator will be set up (never in a home or garage, and always away from your home and any air intake) and determine how to secure it if needed. Buy and install a carbon monoxide detector, too. Get outdoor-rated extension cords for portable generators and consider adding an approved cover to your generator for rainy weather. A whole house generator can keep the lights and appliances on and running. Water pumps can help get water and muck out of basements and homes. Be sure you know how to operate the pump. Never pump substances that your equipment is not designed to cope with. Pay attention to avoid overheating and follow all safety precautions. A utility type vehicle can transport people and supplies quickly in an emergency. Keep the vehicle stable and drive

slowly. Do not turn mid-slope or while on a hill. Consider taking a safety course. Always read the directions provided by outdoor power equipment manufacturers and be sure to follow all manufacturer's safety and usage recommendations before you need it, not waiting until an emergency. Practice how to operate equipment. Save a digital copy of the owner's manual on your computer if possible, so it can easily be consulted in the future. Make sure to have the right fuel on hand and charge batteries ahead of an outage. Gasoline-powered equipment uses E10 or less fuel and most manufacturers recommend adding a fuel stabilizer. Fuel that is more than 30 days old may phase separate and cause running problems, so it's important to purchase fuel just ahead of a storm. Store fuel safely and only use an approved fuel container. One of the most important things operators can do for safety is to pay attention to energy levels and health. Preparation for bad weather, a power outage and storm cleanup can be taxing on the body and the spirit. Do not operate power equipment when tired or overly fatigued. Drink plenty of water and take regular breaks. Always use safety equipment like chaps, gloves, eye protection or hearing protection.

Washington State Health Care Authority releases first month of Apple Health (Medicaid) renewal data and urges Washingtonians to update their information

OLYMPIA - The Washington State Health Care Authority (HCA), in partnership with the Washington Health Benefit Exchange (Exchange) and the Department of Social and Health Services (DSHS), released initial data from May 2023, the first month of Apple Health (Medicaid) renewals.

During the COVID-19 pandemic, Apple Health clients did not need to provide renewal information to maintain their health care coverage. With the ending of the public health emergency, federal law requires states to resume eligibility verification over the next vear.

More than 2.3 million Washington State residents are covered by Apple Health. The state is engaging in extensive outreach efforts to make sure Apple Health clients update their eligibility information to avoid losing coverage they might still be eligible for.

"Our goal is that every Washingtonian who is eli-

gible for Apple Health stays on Apple Health," said Sue Birch, HCA executive director. "We urge people to make sure their information is up to date. If you have a friend or family member on Apple Health, please encourage them to reach out to us and update their information."

After extensive outreach, in the month of May, HCA conducted eligibility reviews for 230,000 clients.

· HCA automatically renewed coverage for about half of those clients using available information from DSHS programs like the Supplemental **Nutrition Assistance Program** (SNAP) and cash assistance programs, employment and income data, and other available data sources.

• HCA, the Exchange, DSHS, managed care organizations, providers, and many other community partners have actively assisted clients through multiple outreach opportunities to help people to update their information and maintain Apple Health coverage.

· Roughly 116,000 people,

representing approximately 5 percent of the overall Apple Health covered population, were disenrolled from coverage due to various reasons: About 83,000 people were disenrolled after automatic eligibility checks were completed and the person did not respond to multiple requests to update their information. Clients are given at least 45 days to complete a renewal. This is a large initial proportion, but it is consistent with expectations. Disenrollment numbers are expected to decrease over the next 12 months, likely meaning that many people who needed Apple Health during the pandemic have regained employer-sponsored insurance or found coverage through Washington Healthplanfinder or now qualified for Medicare.

coverage is terminated for not renewing, they have a 90-day reconsideration period, which allows them to reenroll and return to coverage. If they are determined eligible for Apple Health, their coverage

will be reinstated back to the day they were disenrolled, leading to no gap in coverage. Clients who miss their 90-day reconsideration period can still reapply for coverage at any time.

HCA and the Exchange will work with clients who are no longer eligible for Apple Health to ensure they are provided information on how to enroll for other affordable coverage options through the Washington Healthplanfinder. If they are over 65, they will receive information about applying for programs that help pay for Medicare.

HCA, DSHS, and the Exchange are taking proactive steps to ensure eligible individuals are not terminated from coverage due to procedural reasons, including:

 Spreading renewals out If an Apple Health client's over 12 months, which provides time to run a smooth process and prevent systems from getting backlogged. This reduces burden not only on individuals and families, but also on state eligibility systems. Taking the time to do the process correctly will ensure those eligible for continued coverage do not experience a gap in care and those no longer eligible can transition to other sources of coverage.

 Partnering with managed care plans and using data available from the United States Postal Service to update people's contact information so that they receive the renewal forms.

 Enhanced outreach using text messages, phone calls, social media, radio and TV ads to clients who have not completed a renewal prior to coverage termination.

· HCA's volunteer ambassador program was launched within communities to help people stay informed on renewal processes. This adds to a robust network of Washington Healthplanfinder's navigators and brokers who assist people across the state in obtaining and maintaining coverage.

· Maximizing the use of data sources, such as income information from the Employment Security Department, and renewing individuals based on their eligibility for other programs, such as SNAP and Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF). This helps reduce the need for some individuals to fill out and return a renewal form.

"We want to ensure all Washingtonians stay covered, whether it is a new qualified health plan, Apple Health, or employer sponsored," said Ingrid Ulrey, CEO at Washington Health Benefit Exchange powering Washington Healthplanfinder. "For those who are now above income eligibility, they will have the opportunity to enroll in high-value, lowcost Cascade Care plans, now available for as low as \$10 or less per month."

Apple Health clients and Washington Healthplanfinder customers are encouraged to update their contact information to ensure they receive their renewal notice over the next year to maintain their health coverage. Enrollment data will be published monthly at www.hca.wa.gov/phe.

Newhouse stops Biden Administration from banning gas stoves

Gas appliances are at the center American households. They power our stoves, furnaces, water heaters, and fireplaces. Approximately 187 million Americans use natural gas because it is affordable, reliable, and safe. It is time for the federal government to stop overregulating our lives and focus on creating solutions that will actually benefit the American people and our energy future.
