Could the Woodin Avenue Bridge become a 2-way bridge again?

Traffic analysis to be conducted

CHELAN- During the April 25 Chelan City Council meeting, Mayor Bob Goedde and the council discussed the traffic situation on the Woodin Avenue Bridge. Jake Youngren, Public Works Director for the City of Chelan, proposed the RH2 Engineering Inc. Traffic Analysis Task Authorization No. 19-2023. Youngren mentioned three main tasks of the traffic analysis.

"The first task is essentially to estimate the level of service if the Woodin Avenue Bridge were a two-way in operation and then also evaluate what operational benefits and impacts that operation might have on immediate adjacent intersections," Youngren said.

Youngren talked about the numerous data collection collected through different busy intersections throughout the city. Before any other action would be taken, he wanted to see what two-way traffic would look like on the Woodin Avenue Bridge.

"The next two are tied to develop seasonal peaking factors essentially," Youngren said of the following tasks. "We see a fluctuation in traffic and we want to better understand that

and actually see what those seasonal peaking factors look like so we can plan better for the future."

The councilmembers expressed concerned with not having enough time to discuss the matter with each other. Youngren emphasized that the first task of the analysis was separated from the next two tasks. Mayor Goedde

mentioned listening to KOZI radio a few years ago, and the station's "question of the day" that particular instance was whether the Woodin Avenue Bridge should be two-way. Goedde recalled that over 400 listeners responded and the majority agreed that traffic on the bridge should go in both directions. "I think we owe it to the community if they are

that upset over the situation to at least look at the project. We have to consider the traffic as Manson continues to grow and The Lookout continues to grow. I think we need to know where we're at and try to figure out what to do after that," he said. "I would like to see it. I think the community

Students get introduction to medical fields, health sciences



CHELAN - Wednesday, April 19 was not just another typical morning for Columbia Valley Community Health (CVCH) and Lake Chelan Health (LCH) Emergency Medical Staff (EMS). The Chelan Community Education and Health Care Partnership started last year under the leadership of CVCH resident physicians and their involvement with the Chelan High School (CHS) Med Club under Seth Manthey. This year the partnership expanded to include Morgen Owings Elementary (MOE) 5th graders to inspire and introduce students, at an early age, to the medical field and health sciences. The partnership between CVCH, LCH/EMS, CHS and MOE brought out over 80 kids to take part in a variety of activities. Students were split into two large groups between CVCH and LCH. Resident physicians John Leatherman, Matt Acosta and with the help of med club students Greer Bainbridge, Pablo Mendez, Joey Hurtado, Danika Dietrich, Natalie Vasquez, Leslie Mendez, Yareli Cardenas, Mariana Cortes, Ashley Hernandez, Many Cazarez and MaKenzie Griggs led a study and dissection of a cow eyeball. At Lake Chelan Health, Ray Eickmeyer, Director of EMS, (pictured above left) and Mistaya Johnston, Rich Vincent, Christina Eickmeyer, Craig Vivian, Katya Gayda and Taylor Morrow provided three activity stations that included learning about EKG and heart function, hands-on CPR, and an intro to LCH ambulances and the field of EMT's and Paramedics. Through the Chelan Community Education and Health Care Partnership, the goal is to inspire more local students to go into healthcare fields. The Lake Chelan Health and Wellness Foundation (The LCHWF) is a strong community partner in supporting health and wellness initiatives in the Valley. The LCHWF donated just over \$800 to cover costs and supplies which include cow eyeballs and pig hearts for dissection. Students learned that they could apply to the LCHWF for college scholarships when they are high school seniors. Turning one home into eight

Thanks to CVHT, Coy Habich and Nickel Bros. Moving

CHELAN - In the early hours of Wednesday morning, (April 26) local businessman and builder Coy Habich was busy supervising the moving of his recently acquired historic two-story home through 12 blocks of downtown Chelan. The home's destination is 729 E. Wapato Ave. where Habich will convert the home into two housing units, one being a low-cost rental.

"This is an exciting day," exclaimed Habich. "We want to get this done before the

streets get busy with the morning commute."

The old house and its property, located at 141 E. Nixon Ave., had been purchased by Charlie and Debbie Guildner for the purpose of enabling Chelan Valley Housing Trust to build six townhomes. Named Emerson Harbour, this new development will include a mix of 2- and 3-bedroom attached townhouses, all of which are priced affordably for homeownership to local wage-earners.

Originally, the existing house was to be donated to the fire department for a controlled burn. It was then that Habich stepped in to save the old Anderson house. Thus, the moving of one old historic home and the new CVHT development will yield a total

of 8 affordable housing units added to Chelan's housing inventory.

Chelan Valley Housing Trust feels fortunate to team up with folks such as Habich and Nickel Bros. House Moving to preserve a home while at the same time helping to meet the community's affordable housing needs. The organization is committed to continuing to work with developers and other community partners to create additional affordable housing options in the years to come.

would like to see some studies on this, on all the traffic coming in from North Shore through Chelan.” The motion was moved and seconded.

Another motion consideration was for the Chelan Youth Baseball League Facility Use Agreement. Paul Horne, Park, Recreation and Community Services Director for the City of Chelan, spoke about the importance of the ballfields to the community. Earlier, during the citizen comments section of the meeting, Travis Sweeney, a resident of Chelan for over 50 years, addressed the Council about maintaining a public area for youth and their families to enjoy recreation. “I’ve been a player, I’ve been a coach, I’ve been a tournament director, and I now have the glorious task of being a parent,” Sweeney said. “I’m a parent watching the youth of Chelan cut their teeth on these fields for over six years. These fields are important to us. Our youth needs these fields to keep them engaged and let them just be kids.”

The Council thanked

Those wishing to leave the valley must travel further into Chelan and go over the Dan Gordon Bridge.

Sweeney for using the fields and Horne echoed his sentiments. Both men emphasized the need to maintain the quality of the fields. “This proposal formalizes the use of those fields by Chelan Youth Baseball. They’ve been using them for many years,” Horne said. “This just ensures that they have their insurance in place, and we have their schedules

in line so that we can avoid conflicts with other uses.” The motioned passed.

John Ajax, City of Chelan Community Development Director, also addressed the Council concerning ordinance No. 2023-1608 Emergency Moratorium on Applications for Boundary Line Adjustments. “Currently boundary line adjustments are administra-

tively approved and there are potential inconsistencies in the code regulations that would allow the circumventing of our subdivision code,” Ajax said. “We want to enact this moratorium to allow staff the time to update that code.” Ajax mention that there was public hearing approaching 60 days from the date of the meeting. The motion passed.

However lofty the need that the City of Chelan has, taking funds away from three important, and may I remind ‘voter approved’ services for improved living here (hospital, fire service and EMS services), is absolutely not the right way to solve the problems in the City of Chelan.

EMS, the fire department, and the new hospital have built their long-range planning on receiving these taxing funds. With the budget cut, obviously, the three (all health and safety related organizations we rely on) will have to cut back on services, benefits and programs. That means cutbacks to three things we depend on in the most traumatic times of our lives.

Everyone should be outraged by the reckless move of the Chelan City Council. A plan that was the best kept secret and behind our backs will affect everyone drastically! Just because Olympia says you can, does not mean it is the best thing to do.

I don’t know exactly how to help the needs in Chelan, but what I do know is don’t take away my say, by taking my voter approved taxing districts and moving those funds somewhere else. And certainly not in a secret way, as it appears you are doing it!

House passes Rep. Schrier’s bipartisan bill to support rural communities and improve emergency services

WASHINGTON, DC - The United States House of Representatives passed Congresswoman Kim Schrier’s, M.D. (WA-08) bipartisan bill aimed at improving emergency services in rural communities on April 26. The Advanced, Local Emergency Response Telecommunications (ALERT)

Parity Act, which was introduced with Congressman Bill Johnson (OH-06), passed the House by a roll call vote of 422-1.

“I am thrilled that the House just passed the ALERT Parity Act. Far too often, rural communities are left behind and do not have the proper resources they deserve, like emergency services. The

8th district is nearly 10,000 square miles and many of my constituents who live in these rural areas do not have the consistent ability to make emergency 911 calls and receive emergency alerts. As a doctor, I know how crucial time is in a medical emergency, as just a few minutes can make an immense difference,” said Rep. Schrier.

“This bill directs the FCC to create a regulatory framework that will allow satellites to provide service in emergency situations. This will significantly improve the care rural Washingtonians receive in crucial situations like medical emergencies and natural disasters. I am happy that these bipartisan relationships I have built in Congress are

carrying on through a shift in party leadership so that even in the minority, I can continue to deliver for the people of the 8th District.”

The ALERT Parity Act requires the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) to adopt rules for satellite communications providers who want to deliver emergency connectivity service in

remote and rural areas and those areas where communications infrastructure has been damaged or destroyed. This means that the FCC will be able to give satellite communications providers the necessary certainty they need so that they can provide consumers with access to emergency services when it is otherwise unavailable.
