VIPs get an early preview of new **Community Center at Lake Chelan**

Attendees tour 46,000 sq. ft. facility and hear a message of vision, imagination, persistence, and love

CHELAN - Brooke Isaak, Board vice- president of Seven Acres Foundation the non-profit organization responsible for the development of The Community Center at Lake Chelan - was first to welcome the group of "very important patrons" attending a private hard hat tour of the new 46,000 square foot facility on Saturday. Isaak said, "I like the definition of patron... people who give financial support to others, organizations, a cause, or an activity. And, of course, to a brand-new community center. So yes, you are all patrons that are very important to our mission, our vision, and our success."

Seven Acres board members gave guests attending the event private facility tours. They received a firsthand look at what will ultimately house a 10,000 sq. ft. multipurpose auditorium that will enable a variety of court configurations, including a full-size basketball court, two practice courts or three volleyball courts, four indoor pickleball courts, and a community meeting space. The center will also include an indoor children's play area, affordable office space,

workstations, a swimming pool, outdoor pickleball. sand volleyball, and more. Board President Ben Williams described the project as more than a dream. He said, "it is vision, imagination, intention, and persistence held together with immense community love and support."

Williams shared critical milestones in the development process beginning with the August 2020 purchase of a property between Chelan and Manson just off State Route 150, at 103 Big Horn Way. Since that time, Williams explained, "the project has been impacted by the pandemic, economic inflation, supply chain delays, and a noticeable increase in the community's need for the very type of center we were building. We've weathered each storm and anticipate opening this fall."

As of this month, phase one of the development is fully funded at just over \$18 million. This phase includes purchasing the property, design and engineering, site leveling, utility infrastructure, foundations, construction of the main facility, swimming pool, and framework for the gym. At the

Karl Ruether, the current District Governor of Rotary International District 5060 envisioned a Pollinator Highway from Clearwater, B.C. down to Prosser, Washington. That's the length of the District. That highway would consist of nonconnecting patches of ground filled with plants appealing to native pollinators.

Those pollinators: bees, butterflies, moths, wasps, birds, are declining in numbers due partly to a loss of habitat. They are needed for the plants that feed and sustain us all. Landowners can help by planting any size area with a diversity of plants flowering in waves from Spring to Fall.

Three different plants blooming each season will make a good basic attraction for these helpful winged workers. Nothing exotic. Native plants are best for attracting native pollinators.

Chelan City water supply upgrades

On April 18 I attended a meeting at the Chelan City Council Room to listen to the city staff's proposal to upgrade the city water system at a projected cost of \$9,000,000 dollars. The staff is proposing that a new taxing system be used to collect the funds required to put in the necessary pumping equipment and new water tank at a higher elevation. This new tank and system improvement will facilitate additional affordable housing in Chelan and the Airport water line.

What concerned me was the pushback by the Fire Department District and Hospital District based on the fear that this might impact their ability to get their fair share of the collected property tax. Neither district provided any

answers on just how much the impact would be to each district. As I understand it, the proposed new taxing area would only encompass a small portion of the City of Chelan on the East end that includes the undeveloped Apple Acres property, Chelan School District property where a new High School may be constructed in the future, and existing subdivisions that suffer low water pressure on the east end of Chelan.

Chelan needs more affordable housing for our citizens. Water lines and tanks are needed to facilitate this goal.

Listed below is an article concerning Lake Havasu, Arizona's problems as a result of delays and demands by property developers to be allowed to put in cheap sewer systems. The Arizona Department of Environmental Quality, (ADEQ) threatened to place a moratorium on all new construction until the sewer problem was fixed.

Washington has similar requirements concerning drinking water quality and the required water pressure at the place of business or an individual's home. We do not need the State of Washington getting involved when the problem can be addressed locally.

Long a Septic Tank City, Lake Havasu to Get Sewer System

Lake Havasu City prides itself on postcard-perfect weather nearly year-round, conditions that make it a growing retirement center and a prime vacation stop for winter and spring visitors.

But the thriving Colorado River community, which also boasts a transplanted London Bridge spanning a man-made river channel, is ready to shed one of its other distinctions -- that of being one of the largest U.S. cities without a sewer system.

Only 5 percent of the city, mostly commercial development, has sewage disposal.

"Our population is 45,000, and we have about 25,000 septic tanks. It's the highest density in the country," said John Gall, chairman of Citizens for Clean Water.

Last month, voters overwhelmingly approved a \$463 million bond issue to build a citywide sewer system. Gall's group spent about \$40,000 in support of the measure.

City Manager Bruce Williams said the vote was crucial to the future of Lake Havasu, which averages 100 new homes per month and also is a top spring break destination for college students.

Because of the potential for groundwater contamination, the Arizona Department

of Environmental Quality (ADEQ) had threatened to place a moratorium on new septic systems and to require that homeowners buy expensive systems to remove nitrates from their waste.

Tests by the department have found high nitrate levels in Lake Havasu's groundwater, although city officials say none of the 14 drinking water wells have levels that violate federal safety standards. Health experts say excessive levels of nitrates in drinking water can cause serious illness and sometimes death.

In addition to nitrate concerns, outbreaks of fecal coliform bacteria closed several beaches and coves along the Lake Havasu section of the Colorado River to swimmers from 1994 to 1996.

Some feared Lake Havasu could become a ghost town if the sewer issue had been voted down.

"It would have depreciated home values," said Gall. "Existing septic tanks would be forced to be retrofitted. It would have cost \$20,000 per home."

Now, it will cost homeowners \$2,000 to hook up to the sewer system, which could be financed over 10 years at 4 percent interest. The system could take at least 15 years to build.

City officials estimate the average monthly sewer bill for a single-family home will be about \$40 a month for the first five years. Lake Havasu City officials said construction of the first phase of their sewer system could begin by next fall. The project will require 800 miles of sewer pipe, 75 pump stations, new regional treatment facilities with upgrades to two existing plants, and 9,700 manholes.

Phase two will complete the gym, parking lot, retaining walls, landscaping, and even the required charging stations for electric cars. But, according to Williams, "it still needs to be funded, with a gap of about \$4.5 million."

Williams appealed to the VIPs by explaining, "Our current grant applications and funding pursuits have at least \$1.2 million in the "likely to fund" category. If we can raise additional funds from private donors and other funding sources, we can "bump" \$2 million of the \$4.5 million in current grant pursuits to use for the pool and aquatic center. This is significant because most of our grants come with performance restrictions that require us to use the funds for particular project components."

"So," asked Williams, "How big is your imagination for what is possible here? How strong is your intention

Josslyn Simmons, at 5'3", has always played bigger than her frame

CHELAN- In 1975, Steven Spielberg scared the daylights out of beach bums and couch potatoes alike with his epic film which chronicled a great white shark that terrorized the citizens of the fictional Amity Island. Its special effects, iconic poster and John Williams soundtrack made millions of moviegoers remember the fierce antagonist which shared the picture's title, Jaws. From 2019-2023, the Chelan High School girls' basketball and soccer squads has featured a small but mighty player with a spirited style and homophone nickname of the Spielberg's shark. Josslyn Simmons, who stands at all of 5'3", has always played bigger than her frame.

"She goes by Jos because she's a pretty aggressive player," said Goats head basketball coach Nick Longmire. "If she feels like a player, she's defending has got too many shots off of her, she takes it up a level. Her intention is to stop the player she is guarding, but when it's kind of left unharnessed, it can get her into foul trouble and can get her on the bench."

Simmons started dribbling the ball around age five. Her father Wade coached her at home through early frustrations. As the young girl honed her budding skills, one essential aspect of the game eluded her.

"I hated shooting the ball," Simmons recalled. "I finally shot the ball, and I made it and then I think I shot the ball ever since and that's where I developed the love for the game."

One skill that Simmons didn't have to learn was aggression. In fact, controlling her intensity has proved a lifelong endeavor. Longmire and his wife Amaris, who heads Chelan's girls' soccer team, moved to the area five years ago. He became an assistant with the girls' basketball program when Simmons was an eighth grader. The two crossed paths in camps and at middle school games.

When the Longmires became Simmons' coaches in her sophomore year, they quickly realized she possessed an overlapping strength and weakness: her passion. Often, Simmons' temper betrayed her. In soccer that spelled yellow and red cards, in basketball, foul trouble. But the coaching couple saw something in the spirited sophomore. They looked at her characteristics and helped her to harvest the best and leave the rest.

"They have always been there for me, from a freshman to a senior," Simmons said. They are very proud of me, no matter what I do, even if I'm a little too

aggressive sometimes. They love me to death, and I love them to death."

After she hurdled her sophomore season and became a junior, Simmons didn't lose her feistiness, but began owning it, rather than it owning her. If she flirted with fouls, Longmire would point to his head, silently signaling her to play smartly and manage her emotions. Longmire said these feelings, if left untamed, can appear as hotheadedness, and described Simmons' transformation as a journey.

"She's realized over the past year or two, 'Hey, if I'm out there playing with this reckless abandon and not controlling my body, I'm going to find myself not on the field or not on the court because I'm in foul trouble or I'm going to get hurt," Longmire said. "She's done a lot better job as a leader knowing when she has to turn it up under control verses that reckless abandonment where she's out of control."

At the North Central Washington Basketball Showcase held January 9 at Town Toyota Center in Wenatchee, Simmons' fire blazed fully during lessthan-ideal circumstances. The Bulldogs dominated the Goats early on. By halftime, Cashmere had more than tripled Chelan's points with a 34-11 lead. Yet Simmons' defense and attitude mirrored that of a State championship overtime period. Regardless of the scoreboard, she scrabbled for loose balls. She leapt for potential rebounds. She fiercely guarded her opponent. In all, her effort inversely reflected the 56-18 final score.

"I work my tail off even if I'm sick or if I'm hurt. I do not like it when people slack off or mess around," she said. "I'm more of the intense practice type, so I want to push myself to get better for my team to get better obviously."

The underlying burden of all prep players is the inevitable time limit. No one plays in high school forever. With her graduation approaching, Simmons has invited introspection and reflection. Hesitant to lead as a freshman, she struggled with her temper and lost her zeal for the game. Tempted to walk away, she refused to stop and persevered. She can now play calmly while remaining intense. Though her Goats career has faded to black, Simmons soccer journey will continue at Pasco's Columbia Basin Community College next fall.

"I was a little emotional my senior night and I miss high school soccer, but I know that I'm going to continue playing," she said. Renewable Hydrogen receives statewide approval

OLYMPIA - It has been exciting to read about the progress Douglas County PUD has been making toward its Wells Hydrogen Project in East Wenatchee and the possibilities of our region accessing federal funds under the Department of Energy's regional hydrogen hubs initiative. While some people in our state may just be beginning to hear about the potential benefits of renewable hydrogen, local utility officials and I have been proudly pushing the potential benefits of renewable hydrogen for several years.

In 2019, I partnered with Douglas County PUD to sponsor and pass my Senate Bill 5588 to authorize public utility districts to produce and sell renewable hydrogen. Back then, I had to educate myself and my colleagues on renewable hydrogen and how it could benefit us all. In short, hydrogen (H2) is a colorless and odorless gas that can be created from a process that uses electricity to separate hydrogen and oxygen molecules in water. I knew gaining a new "authority" for PUDs to produce and distribute hydrogen wasn't going to be easy.

I worked closely that year with Douglas County PUD because of their interest in using surplus hydropower to produce hydrogen. After months of hard work by everyone involved and lots of bipartisan support, Senate Bill 5588 eventually passed to allow for the production and sale of PUD "renewable hydrogen," which is defined as hydrogen created from an emissionsfree electricity source. The Governor signed the bill in April 2019. Fast forward a few years and following COVID delays, renewable hydrogen will soon be developed in Douglas County.

Environmental and economic benefits

This new authority will provide our hydroelectric facilities with a new way to address an ever-increasing challenge. With the expansion

of wind and solar generation across many western states, the Pacific Northwest's electric grid experiences periods of surplus power generation in the spring. During springtime snow melt, hydropower generation is abundant because of high flows in the Columbia River. Wind and solar generation are often strong in the spring as well.

Not generating power by spilling excess water through our dams can adversely impact fish, and securing buyers for our hydropower when supply exceeds demand can be financially ineffective and challenging. Using surplus hydropower electricity (renewable hydropower) to produce "renewable hydrogen" is an exciting opportunity because it can be both environmentally and economically beneficial. If power demand is low but water flows are high, the PUD can produce hydrogen rather than just spilling the water and harming fish. Less water spilled means more financial value from the water itself. As owners of the PUDs, anything that benefits a PUD will ultimately help its customers, so it's a win-win.

Possible uses of clean

hydrogen Renewable hydrogen is a cleaner version than hydrogen produced in most parts of the world because hydropower is a non-emitting electricity source. Hydrogen can serve many purposes, but one of its uses is clean fuel for vehicles. Hydrogen-based vehicles, similar to plug-in electrics, produce zero greenhouse gas emissions. Plug-in electric vehicles, like Teslas, have a huge head start

quickly becoming primary sources of clean, low-cost electricity, we are one big step closer to creating a clean energy future.

However, there are still key sectors of our economy (such as transportation, manufacturing, and shipping) that rely on fossil fuels and need a pathway to clean energy.

Renewable Hydrogen can help all these sectors transition away from fossil fuels and into the clean energy future.

over hydrogen vehicles. It could be that hydrogen as vehicle fuel may be better suited for heavierduty commercial vehicles, like utility rigs and semi-trucks, but it certainly could have a key role in our future zero-emissions transportation system.

In 2021, two years following the passage of my Senate Bill 5588 for PUD hydrogen, I sponsored and passed Senate Bill 5000 to extend sales tax incentives to hydrogen vehicles similar to existing incentives for plug-in electric vehicles. That same session – continuing the partnership with Douglas PUD and other officials – I sponsored a transportation budget item to fund the state's first combo fast-charging electric vehicle and hydrogen fueling station. It will soon be located in East Wenatchee.

Future opportunities for local hydrogen

Creating clean fuel from our surplus hydropower and actually fueling vehicles locally will be quite exciting. If the state invests in hydrogen fueling stations at our ports, we'll be able to haul the world's best apples from Wenatchee to Seattle on zero-emissions hydrogen semitrucks, refueling at the port in just five minutes before the return trip. If the west coast continues to build fueling stations along its interstates, we'll likely be able to travel across multiple states. If the Northwest ultimately becomes a "hydrogen hub," anything is possible.

Renewable hydrogen has certainly gained incredible interest – locally and nationally – in recent years. The Washington State Legislature is now pursuing clean hydrogen expansion in earnest. We don't want to brag, but it seems like, once again, the utilities in District 12 are way ahead of the curve on clean energy. This is something to be proud of.

April to Be designated "Preserving and Protecting Local News Month" under resolution co-sponsored by Rep. Cantwell

Resolution highlights importance of local news in a functioning democracy

WASHINGTON, D.C. - U.S. Senator Maria Cantwell (D-WA) joined a group of 14 senators in introducing a resolution designating April 2023 as "Preserving and Protecting Local News Month." The resolution recognizes local news as a public good that serves an essential function in the democracy of the United States.

"Local journalism unites our communities," said Sen. Cantwell. "It is essential for the safety of our communities and for the health of our democracy. So we must recognize the importance of local journalism – and the people who work hard every day to ensure that Americans are well informed."

According to Pew Research Center, the overall employ-

ment in newspaper, television, radio, and digital newsrooms in the United States fell by 26 percent, or 30,000 jobs, from 2008-2020. More than 100 local newsrooms were forced to close during the COVID-19 pandemic, with 30 percent of local television stations reporting budget cuts and staff reductions. The resolution affirms the significance of local news in increasing civic engagement and strengthening democratic norms and practices, and acknowledges the valuable contributions of local journalism toward the maintenance of healthy and

vibrant communities.

The resolution is co-sponsored by Senators Brian Schatz (D-HI), Richard Blumenthal (D-CT), Alex Padilla (D-CA), Ed Markey (D-MA), Bob Casey (D-PA), Mark Warner (D-VA), Ben Ray Lujan (D-NM), Mazie K. Hirono (D-HI), Mark Kelly (D-AZ), Ron Wyden (D-OR), Amy Klobuchar (D-MN), Dick Durbin (D-IL), and Cory Booker (D-NJ).

The resolution has been endorsed by PEN America; Alliance for Community Media; Free Press Action; National Press Photographers Association (NPPA); Native Ameri-

can Journalists Association (NAJA); Writers Guild of America, East, AFL-CIO; Ethnic Media Services; Society of **Environmental Journalists;** Society for News Design; **Common Cause; Department** for Professional Employees, AFL-CIO; National Association of Black Journalists (NABJ); Native Public Media; Public Knowledge; Society of Professional Journalists; Theatre Communications Group; National Newspaper Association (NNA); National Writers Union (NWU); and National Association of Broadcasters (NAB).

Sen. Cantwell has long championed legislation to support local journalism. In 2021 she introduced the Local Journalism Sustainability Act, which would help financially support local news organizations through tax credits to incentivize hiring more journalists, subscriptions, and advertising from local small businesses. She plans to introduce similar legislation again in this Congress. On Thursday, April 20, Washington state's Legislature passed a similar measure with strong bipartisan support.

"It's clear that Washington D.C. isn't working for working Americans, and there is a massive disconnect between what is being discussed inside the beltway and what is affecting the lives of everyday Americans," said Rescuing the American Dream Chairman Tiffany Smiley. "We're going to talk directly to Americansespecially those most hurting in the Middle Class-about their fears, hopes and beliefs. That way, we can develop policy solutions based on their real life concerns and communicate

them in a way that is relatable and understandable. This is the way forward-this is the pathway to rescue the American Dream and preserve it for generations to come, and that's exactly what we plan on working to achieve."

Rescuing the American Dream conducted a unique, expansive survey of 2,000 registered voters across the country, and asked open ended questions directly to voters about their fears, hopes, and beliefs-and the results were eye opening.

• Americans still believe our country is the best in the world—and want to keep it that way. A vast majority of voters–71 percent–believe that the United States currently is the best country in the world. What's more–a whopping 81 percent of voters believe it is important that America remains the best country in the world.

• However, they also overwhelmingly believe we're headed in the wrong direction. 70 percent of all voters believe our country is headed in the wrong direction, clearly demonstrating that there is a major disconnect between Washington D.C. and the rest of America.

• Big government and a wildly unstable economy are primarily to blame. Voters overwhelmingly stated that the government was the biggest reason the country is on the wrong track at 34 percent – followed by the economy at 24 percent. This clearly shows that policies in Washington D.C. are failing – and 40-year high inflation and an unstable economic climate are the main drivers of Americans' pessimistic outlook.

• Voters indicated lowering costs on essential goods, making healthcare more affordable, and reducing taxes are the top three policy solutions that could benefit them. 47 percent identified lowering essential costs as their top policy solution — followed by lowering healthcare costs at 34 percent and lowering taxes at 29 percent. While families are struggling to afford groceries, fill up their gas tanks and buy essential goods, the data also shows that the healthcare system is unaffordable and unattainable for too many in our country. Addressing these issues would benefit the health and wellbeing of countless Americans across the country.

• Education remains a top priority for American families. When it comes to education, there is a strong desire to address school safety and protect our children when they are in the classroom. 58 percent of voters say making schools safe from violence is the most important educational issue, while 47 percent say it's keeping politics out of the classroom. It's clear voters want us to prioritize school safety and get back to focusing on reading, writing, and arithmetic – all necessary skills that will help them attain success in the future.

• And a vast majority of Americans believe in the value of a non-traditional education. A whopping 72 percent of Americans believe that getting a vocational education with job skills and training is a better way to get ahead in the cur-

rent job market–with only 16 percent of those surveyed who prefer a traditional college degree.

Methodology: The national survey was conducted by McLaughlin & Associates from March 29th - April 3rd, 2023 with a sample size of 2,000 registered voters. The survey has a margin of error of +/-2.2% for all registered voters nationwide and +/-2.6% for the middle class.
