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Beach cleanup, wildflower planting events March 25

CHELAN - "Restore the Shore" needs your help. Keep It Blue-Lake Chelan, the Lake Chelan Research Institute and the The Chelan Project from Chelan High School are teaming up to create the first annual community-wide beach cleanup Saturday, March 25, 10 a.m.-1 p.m. They also have support from Campbell's Resort, the City of Chelan, the Planning Association of Washington and Pilgrim Lake Services.

Those wishing to participate should meet at the Lakeshore Marina Parking Lot (between Lakeview Drive-In and the go carts across from Chelan Market). Please "bring your own bag", preferably reusable, because they want to minimize the environmental impact while everyone restores the beach. Students from The Chelan Project will be organizing groups to cover specific sections of beach.

Participants are asked to pick up all trash items and fragments of aquatic weeds on the beach and surrounding areas. Each fragment of milfoil can propagate into a new plant as the water comes back up this Spring. You will be preventing new milfoil growth and you will be reducing the total amount of organic carbon in near-shore environment by removing invasive plants and other organic residue.

Volunteers will bring their collected litter back to the parking lot where the City of Chelan Public Works will provide disposal bins. Volunteers can then go to Campbell's for their Keep It Blue memorabilia and refreshments, noon to 1 p.m. More information at: keepitbluelakechelan.org.

Chelan receives generous donation from Wildlife Forever: A CD3 Waterless Cleaning System

CHELAN - At the March 14 Chelan City Council meeting, the Council and community members spoke about efforts to improve water quality and cull invasive species in Lake Chelan. An aquatic gem in the middle of the Evergreen State, Lake Chelan has fallen victim to milfoil, trash and other invaders to its waters over

the past few decades. Philip Long, Lake Chelan Research Institute Executive Director and Board Chair, addressed the council about this issue, saying that the overall water quality of Lake Chelan has improved in recent years.

"We're starting our annual cycle of sampling the midline of the Lake which is supported in a significant way by the City of Chelan," Long said. "The data for dissolved oxygen from last year looks really good. We can't tell the different from the dissolved oxygen diminishing at 100 meters depth in the Wapato Basin from 2022 and 1987, so real stability in the bulk lake."

Long mentioned the first annual community wide beach cleanup event on March 25. People are invited to clean certain parts of the lake by picking up trash and collecting milfoil on sand and water.

The event starts at 10 a.m. at the City Marina parking lot and participants are asked to bring their own reuseable bags. This plan also involves planting local wildflowers to help pollinators near the

Lakeshore Marina. Continuing the dialogue of improving Lake Chelan's waters, Chelan Parks and Community Services Direc-

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Walter named permanent director of Chelan County Community Development

WENATCHEE — Deanna Walter, Chelan County assessor and interim director of Chelan County Community Development, is the new permanent director of the county's planning and building department.

Walter, who was appointed as interim director of Community Development in March 2022, will step down from her elected position on March 31 and take over the role as the department's director on April 1.

The Board of County Commissioners (BOCC) signed a contract for employment with Walter on Monday. "This past year, Deanna has brought stability and efficiencies to Community Development. She has filled six positions while prioritizing cross-training and better customer service at all levels," said Commissioner Tiffany Gering, BOCC

chairwoman. "The board has called upon her twice now to step in and lead that department at times when it needed

her leadership style the most – all while also serving as an elected official. In a time when it is difficult to hire planning professionals, much less directors, the board is fortunate that Deanna agreed to take on this position in a permanent capacity."

Serving in both capacities was not a long-term solution for Chelan County or its citizens, Walter said, "This was a very hard decision, one I did not take lightly. I loved being assessor, but I also recognize I can help Community Development, knowing the Assessor's Office is healthy," Walter said. "The Assessor's Office is efficient, it'scustomer service-driven and the employees there are a cohesive team. My decision to leave is based on my confidence that my team will thrive without me. I will work to bring these same qualities to Community Development to benefit the public we serve."

Walter's background in-

than 27 years of land use experience. She holds two bachelor's degrees, one in actuarial science from Central Washington University and another in urban and regional planning from Eastern Washington Univer-

started her land use career as a planner, first working in Kootenai County and later Spokane County. In 2002 she was hired by Chelan County Community Development as its assistant director. She left Community Development in 2005, moving to the private development sector.

•In 2009, Walter was recruited by former Assessor Russ Griffith to be the chief appraiser in the Chelan County Assessor's Office. Upon Griffith's

retirement in 2010, Walter was promoted to chief deputy of the Assessor's Office. In September 2011, she was appointed county assessor. She first won election to office in 2012; she wasmost recently re-elected to office last year.

served two terms as president of the Washington State Association of County Assessor. In that role, she worked with legislators and the Washington Department of Revenue on legislation and best practices for appraisal and program administration across the state. Over the years, she has developed an expertise in levies, which require a special analytical skillset.

pointed Walter as interim director of Community Development in February 2020 to reorganize and stabilize the department before new Director Jim Brown was hired later that year. She continued as interim assistant director until September 2020 to support the new director and onboard the new assistant director. Then, when former interim director Chris Young stepped down in March 2022, Walter was again asked to serve as interim di-

Since 2010, Community Development has had six directors or interim directors, not including Walter's two stints as interim director. This is a fact not lost on commissioners. Gering said. "These positions are difficult to fill. It's a difficult department to manage because of the many moving parts, both internal and external," Gering said. "But Community Development is not the same department it was just two years ago. The board is confident that under Deanna's continued guidance, this department is only going to continue to grow while meeting the needs of our community."

Next, the BOCC will appoint someone as a temporary inter-

im county assessor by April 1. The Republican Central Committee will then provide the names of three candidates to the BOCC, which will appoint an interim assessor from the recommendation to serve until the 2023 election is certified. People interested in running for the position can file for election May 15-19. The new assessor then will serve the remaining three years of the vacated term.

As for Walter, she sees herself in the director's position until she retires in about eight years. "I was born and raised in this valley, and I've been a part of the county family since 2002. I'm committed to the county; I've devoted many years to serving its citizens," she said. "To the community, I'd add that cultural change in an office doesn't happen overnight, but we are hoping the public sees we are a work in progress and

development, strategic planning and tourism promotion. In his overall career. Cridlebaugh has worked with hundreds of businesses, helping them become more successful.

"I'm looking forward to taking my past experience and

knowledge and work with the Board of County Commissioners and staff to make positive changes for the residents of Chelan County and our region," Cridlebaugh said. "We will be looking at what we can do as a governmental agency to enhance our business environment and attract business to the county. In October 2021, commissioners hired BERK Consulting of Seattle to assess the structure of those appointed offices under the Board of County Commissioners. Commissioners cited a need to re-evaluate the structure because of the expanding role a variety of departments were undertaking, including housing, homelessness, lands man-

development.

Among BERK's recommendations was to reconfigure the role of the county administrator position. At the time, more than a dozen unrelated programs or functions were reporting to the position. The consultant recommended an administrator position be created that focused on economic

Under the reorganization, Cridlebaugh will lead economic development efforts at the county level while overseeing the directors and managers of external programs, including Housing, Ohme Gardens, Wenatchee River Park, the Chelan County Fair and Expo Center, the Cashmere Airport and the Fire Marshal's Office.

The county administrator will focus on overseeing internal services and their directors and managers, including Facilities, Human Resources, IT, the clerk of the board, the budget director and the public information officer.

"This reorganization will create efficiencies in the way the county delivers services to our citizens while also reducing the span of control for the commissioners from 15 directors and managers down to six," Gering said. "It will also allow us to explore how to better fund some county programs. Several programs, for example, are funded heavily by grants. Part of the economic services director's job will be to identify additional revenue opportunities to save taxpayers money and build upon our local economy for the future.

Cridlebaugh added that he is excited to be undertaking the new position. "Chelan County is a wonderful place and I'm looking forward to building a new department that will have a positive impact on the people we serve," he said. "Building something new is exciting and allows you to look at things with a different lens and think outside of the box."

tor Paul Horne spoke about a generous donation from Wildlife Forever, a Minnesotabased nonprofit conservation charity, for a CD3 Waterless Cleaning System. This station, designed to help local boaters, has the ability to suck up unwanted invasive plants and store them until they can be suctioned out later.

Horne mentioned that no matter what backgrounds people come from, all can agree on the importance of clean, fresh water.

"One thing that unites pretty much everyone within this valley is the understanding the importance of the water quality to our economy and to our quality of life," Horne said. "One of the biggest threats to that quality is the spread of invasive aquatic species. They are assiduous because they can piggyback on boats and recreation boaters can inadvertently spread them from water body to water body. They essentially out-compete the native species and cause ecological damage."

The CD3 in the cleaning system stands for "clean, drain, dry and dispose". The station includes an air compressor and a wet-dry vacuum in its technology. The station will be located on a boat ramp and contains education advertising about water conservation and quality.

"We hope that this is the first of many in the area,' Horne said. "We hope that this will be adopted at other marinas around the area once we hopefully see this one getting a lot of use."

WALLEYE FISHING IS **HEATING UP**

Rusty Johnston and I got our boat onto Potholes Reservoir last week for a few hours and managed to jig up three, fat, colorful, 16-inch walleye along with several other strikes from fish we didn't manage to hook. All of us were jigging for the fish at depths of 28 to 35 feet. Lures that worked included ½ ounce blade baits as well as Mack's Lure Sonic Baitfish lures fished as a vertical jigging spoon.

Checking in with Gorge Out-

fitters Supply, owner Wendy Boyer said the walleye fishing is picking up. The fish are moving around in the waters of the Columbia below John Day Dam. Wendy has been fishing this area recently and reported catching and releasing two, sixpound walleye while trolling in 40 feet of water on her last trip. Although she caught these by trolling, Boyer says the best way to catch them right now is to jig for them in deep water. They have been using one-ounce Walleve Killer jigs (available at the store) and catching fish 80 feet deep near the bottom of the river. Boyer says she starts off with darker colored jigs but if that doesn't work, she'll try white or green colored jigs. Gorge Outfitters Supply is located in Rufus.

I also spoke with Steve Morris

near Kettle Falls. He reports the walleye fishing has been good. The fish are around 80-feet deep and Morris is catching them with one-ounce jigs fished naked with a nightcrawler. Steve also likes to use Northwest Bait Scents with Walleye TNT being the hot flavor. Steve says he'll be fishing Lake Roosevelt for walleye thru June. If you want to book a trip call Steve at 509-435-6486. Do so soon, Steve only has a few dates left available.







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Can stool softeners prevent constipation?

Q: After my knee replacement surgery, my surgeon recommended I take a stool softener for a couple of weeks to prevent constipation from my pain medicine. How does that work?

Many surgeons advise their patients to take a stool softener while taking pain medication during the first couple of weeks after surgery. They hope taking a stool softener will help you avoid the discomfort of constipation. This practice has been called into question because very little evidence proves it works.

The word laxative means "to loosen," similar to the word "relax" and "lax," which means to act loose or relaxed. A laxative works to "loosen" your bowels, relieving constipation. By encouraging the movement of stool through your intestines, a laxative can prevent or reduce the pain and pressure of constipation.

Stool softeners make your stool softer or "slippery," which makes defecation more comfortable but doesn't prevent or relieve constipation.

After you swallow it, food moves through your digestive tract, a series of tubes. In your stomach, gastric juices mix into your chewed food, which starts the process of digestion. From there, it moves as a liquid mass into your small intestine, where the absorption of vital nutrients begins.

Muscles running the length of your intestines start squeezing in a rhythm, which keeps the mass of food moving from one end to the other. To assist digestion and absorption, your intestines are lined with special cells designed to carry nutrients, medicines, and water out of your intestines into your bloodstream. What's left

The longer food stays in your intestine, the more water can be pulled out of your stool. With less water, your feces becomes smaller, harder, and more painful to eliminate.

A stool softener can draw moisture back into or lubricate the food mass to ease the discomfort of constipation. Two common stool softeners are docusate and mineral oil.

Docusate is a surfactant, much like detergent or soap. It encourages water to move into your stool. Docusate can replace some of the water your body absorbs as the stool moves through your intestine. It may occasionally cause diarrhea or stomach cramps. Unlike mineral oil, docusate doesn't interfere with the absorption of nutrients or vitamins.

Mineral oil is a liquid refined from crude oil. Unlike docusate, it lubricates the stool instead of increasing its water content. Mineral oil is colorless and odorless. The product "baby oil" is a scented version of mineral oil.

Used over a long period, mineral oil can interfere with your body's absorption of fat-soluble vitamins like vitamins A, D, E, and K. This can eventually cause a type of vitamin deficiency. Mineral oil can also cause leakage of stool from the rectum.

Accidentally inhaling mineral oil when swallowing can cause life-threatening lung irritation. Mineral oil usually stays in your intestine. However, if you take docusate and mineral oil together, mineral oil can move into your body, away from where vou need it to work.

Docusate and mineral oil are called emollients. They turn stool "mushy" but don't directly stimulate the muscles lining your intestine. ("Mush instead of Push"). Most people notice results within 2 days, but the full effect can take up to five days.

Here are 6 Tips on Using a Stool Softener Effec-

1. Stay hydrated.

Drinking enough fluids will help docusate do its job of moving water into your

2. Avoid docusate sodium if you are on a sodiumrestricted diet.

Docusate has two forms. docusate sodium, and docusate calcium. If you restrict your sodium intake, choose docusate calcium instead of docusate sodium. Docusate calcium can be hard to find, so ask a pharmacist for assistance if you don't see it on the shelf.

3. If you have trouble swallowing pills, avoid 250mg docusate capsules.

The 250g and 100mg capsules are the same prices. I recommend buying the smaller 100mg capsules because the 250mg docusate capsules are HUGE and should never be cut.

4. Never cut or bite docusate capsules.

Docusate tastes HORRI-BLE because it is a soap! Avoid biting or cutting docusate capsules unless you prefer a nasty, soapy flavor that lingers for hours. Docusate liquid and syrup taste nearly as bad. At liquid taste tests I've hosted, they rank consistently at the very bot-

5. Choose a laxative for constipation prevention or symptoms.

There is little evidence that docusate can prevent constipation. Using a nonprescription laxative like Senakot® and Dulcolax® is much more effective. Docusate is also available in combination with a laxative like senna or bisacodyl. Look for Senakot-S® and Peri-Colace®.



Navigating detours during US 2/97 and Easy Street roundabout construction

WENATCHEE - Change can be hard. Whether it's adjusting to a new job, learning a new city or having to replace your beloved old phone with a new one, figuring out how to navigate your new world can take some time.

Change is coming to the intersection of US 2/97 and Easy Street in Wenatchee, and we know it will take time for some of you to adjust.

On April 3, construction kicks off on a multi-lane roundabout at that intersection and while this project will improve safety and traffic flow, we know for some people, roundabouts can be a pretty intimidating change. The good news is the vast majority of people even those initially against it - end up seeing the benefits of a roundabout over a signalized intersection. But for many, that does take time and can be a learning curve.

The multi-lane roundabout will replace the existing traffic signal, creating a more consistent flow of traffic and while we can't promise there will be no collisions, roundabouts have been proven to reduce the severity of collisions. The project will also add improvements like transit pullouts and an extension of the Apple Capital Loop Trail to provide better options regardless of how you get around.

What to Expect

To complete the work, Easy Street will be closed from the US 2/97 and Easy St. intersection to Ohme Garden Road north of the highway and approximately 250 feet south to the Circle K and Subaru dealership accesses. The northbound State Route 285 off-ramp to eastbound US 2/97 will also be closed.

the major construction of the roundabout and is scheduled to reopen in mid-June. During construction, crews will build a temporary roundabout at the Euclid Avenue intersection to the US 2/97 eastbound on-ramp as well as a four-way stop at the intersection of Easy St. and School St. in Sunnyslope to accommodate traffic flow for the detour.

Lots of North-South Detours

If you regularly travel through the area, the thing to remember is that eastwest traffic on US 2/97 will be maintained throughout the construction of the roundabout. Any north-south traffic will be detoured. While the detour will probably seem frustrating for regular commuters, the closure allows the contractor to finish the project a lost faster than they would without it.

Here's a breakdown of how the detour will affect your travel, depending on which direction you're

headed: • Eastbound US 2/97 to slope from Cashmere or Leavenworth or you need to get to the Easy St. Park and Ride and you usually turn left onto Easy Street, you'll take the detour through the intersection and take the

Wenatchee or Orondo will require you to take the Easy Street off-ramp and take a right on Penny Rd. to Euclid and use the ramp to access eastbound US 2/97 over the Odabashian Bridge.

• Westbound US 2/97 to south Easy Street: Heading west from East Wenatchee over the Odabashian Bridge to the Penny Rd. Park & Ride, the car dealerships or the gas station, instead of taking a left at the intersection signal at Easy St., you'll take the Euclid Ave. exit, turn right and follow Penny Rd. to Easy St.

• Westbound US 2/97 to north Easy Street: If you're travelling west from East Wenatchee over the Odabashian Bridge headed to the Sunnyslope area, you'll take the off ramp to US 97A and use the US 97A/Ohme Garden Rd. roundabout to turn left onto Ohme Garden Rd. to access Easy Street.

· North Easy Street to westbound US 2/97 and SR 285: If you're heading from Sunnyslope and need to go to N. Wenatchee Ave. or west to Cashmere/Leavenworth, you will need to use Ohme Garden Rd. to the roundabout at US 97A and take a right onto southbound US 97A to the US 2/97 on ramp These closures will be in north Easy Street: If you're travel east over the Oda-you'll take Euclid Ave. to since the US 2/97 and Easy St.

north-south traffic.

· North Easy Street to EB US 2/97: When traveling from Sunnyslope east to East Wenatchee/Orondo, you'll use Ohme Garden Rd. to the US 97A/Ohme Garden Rd. roundabout and take a right to go south to Euclid Ave. then use the eastbound ramp to get on US 2/97 Odabashian Bridge.

When the roundabout opens to traffic

Again, we know this is going to be a big change for some of you. While roundabouts are designed to improve safety for drivers, pedestrians and cyclists, it may feel a little awkward at first. Here are some tips for driving through multi-lane roundabouts:

- · Yield to drivers already in the roundabout
- Do not change lanes in the roundabout
- · Never stop in the round-
- · Give trucks and oversized vehicles both lanes
- · Use your turn signal before you exit

It's important to be aware of pedestrians and bicycles in roundabouts. At the US 2/97 and Easy St. roundabout, the crosswalk ramps are set further back from vehicle traffic, allowing more time for drivers to react to people crossing before merging into or exiting the roundabout. Triangular islands between lanes of vehicle traffic provide a safe place for pedestrians to wait for traffic to go by. Be sure to be alert and work together so everyone is safe!

Bicyclists can choose to ride through the roundabout with traffic or walk their bicycles through the pedestrian crosswalks.

We're excited for this improvement to this area and while we know it'll take time to get used to, we're confident that people in the area will soon see a safer, smoother trip through this

PUD Commissioners consider draft agreement for Confluence Parkway proposal

WENATCHEE - Chelan PUD commissioners are considering a land exchange agreement with the City of Wenatchee that attempts to strike a balance between regional transportation needs and stewardship of public

The City of Wenatchee's Confluence Parkway project is a proposed 2.5-mile bypass to alleviate traffic congestion along North Wenatchee Avenue. The two-way arterial would run along the edge of Horan Natural Area and Confluence State Park,

which are owned by Chelan PUD.

The land exchange would trade a long, narrow parcel of land along the western edges of Horan Natural Area and Confluence State Park about 5 acres total owned by the PUD – for roughly equivalent property from the City.

The draft agreement includes a range of mitigations intended to address concerns brought forward by more than 1,000 public comments, and a year of due diligence. The measures include:

Noise abatement: The City will build a noise wall and earthen berms with landscaping in areas where road noise is expected to have the greatest impact.

Trail improvements: The City will reroute the Apple Capital Recreation Loop Trail away from Hawley Street and the railroad tracks for better safety and user experience. The new pedestrian bridge will be about twice as wide as the existing one.

The draft agreement also commits the City to reimburse the utility to relocate two water wells that support Confluence State Park, and replace state park staff housing that is in the path of the proposed roadway. In most cases, the city will cover the mission and distribution lines in coordination with roadway construction.

Several people spoke in favor of Confluence Parkway, citing reduced traffic accidents, improved response times for first-responders, better options for bus and bike commuters, and improvements to the Loop Trail.

Commissioners deliberated and voted March 20 on the draft agreement, which must also be approved by the Wenatchee City Council.

Chelan PUD is one of several key agencies involved in the review process. Over the next year, the project will tration and Federal Energy require approval from the Regulatory Commission.
