Lake Chelan School District receives a \$270,000 state grant for new learning devices

CHELAN —The Lake Chelan School District (LCSD) announces the award of \$270,000 in a Digital Equity Grant from the Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction (OSPI) for updated computers and other electronic devices.

The grant will allow students to continue using individual devices with the addition of 600 new student Google Chromebooks. It will also purchase mobile translation devices that offer real-time conversations between speakers of different languages. In addition, the grant will support classroom technology-integration coaching for teachers at the elementary level.

In a statement issued: “OSPI recognizes that not every student has access to a high speed internet connection or other learning and communicating technologies. An essential part of implementing OSPI’s educational technology standards is advocating for funds for all districts. This helps close the educational technology gaps across the state.”

“Thanks to a collaborative effort between our technology and teaching teams, this \$270,000 grant will provide our students with individual devices to enhance their learning process,” LCSD Superintendent Brad Wilson said. “Teachers will also benefit from instructional coaching that elevates the learning process. Moreover, the translation devices will empower our newcomer students, who have yet to

learn English, to engage with peers and instructors on a higher level.”

This technology upgrade is part of Superintendent Wilson’s planned 100-Day initiative to offer life changing learning experiences for all students in the district.

“It is my goal to hit-the-deck-running to make up for the lost ground of the COVID-19 pandemic and

make optimum use of the assets at hand,” Wilson added. “It is our duty to provide the best learning environment possible and this technology will help do so.”

Established in 1892, Lake Chelan School District serves 1,270 students with 97 percent of its students graduating in four years, according to data provided by OSPI.

Another attack on the ability to afford to live in the Chelan Valley

The Lake Chelan Valley, Wenatchee and the surrounding areas are beautiful, and we have been discovered. But with growth comes growing pains and negative changes. Right now, if you are a senior, low income, living on a fixed income or one of the hundreds of agricultural workers, this ‘growth’ is putting another ‘nail in the coffin’ of your ability to live in the Lake Chelan valley. It looks like this town will have a lot of beautiful homes, lovely cars on our roads and lots of storage units

for their toys. But due to the fact that most of the jobs here don’t provide the income to live here, there will be no one to work in the restaurants, stores, hotels, agricultural industries and other services that the community needs to be that town that lead us here in the first place.

This time it is a hit on one of the best thrift stores in the area – I am talking about the Lake Chelan Senior Center’s Reruns Thrift Store in Chelan Falls. Progress and the ‘great buying streak’ that the valley has seen in the last couple years has left the Reruns building with new owners that in the name of ‘progress’ are greatly increasing the rent and shrinking the space. In Reruns search for

a new affordable space, all the previously good options have all been grabbed up by persons from out of the area now wanting unrealistic rents. Being a thrift store, it is there to provide fixed or low-income residents the chance to get the things they need at a price they can afford and Reruns can’t pay boutique store rental rates.

Reruns Thrift Store opened February 7, 2011, with an all-volunteer staff. It quickly became the first place many area residents went to get the things they need at an affordable price. This is the store you can afford to go for household goods, furniture, home repair materials and much more. What will the shoppers do if it closes? With

price of gas now, driving to Wenatchee is not a practical option.... What, carry back a new couch on the Link bus?

It is not just the loss of the store, but the Reruns supports the Chelan Senior Center – a good portion of their monthly budget, approximately 80%. This loss of income will greatly affect the services that are provided by the Senior Center and that is not good for the senior residents of the valley. The majority of the Seniors that use the center are on fixed and lower incomes and need the services. And let us not forget about the jobs provided by Reruns, two ‘almost’ full-time and three part-time employees. Along with the 6 plus volunteers that willingly give their time to help things

run smoothly. This writer being one of them.

It is quite disturbing to me to see some of the ‘progress’ going on here. We all know about the housing issue, but now it is the services and affordable stores for the lower income residents that are being shoved out in the name of ‘progress’. Does every new decision have to be made in the name of the ‘all mighty dollar’? What is the plan to keep the town going if the majority of the jobs that are here don’t pay enough for the employees to live here? Who is going to do those jobs? Are some of the new residents going to come and work at one of the restaurants for minimum wage to make sure their favorite place can stay

open? I highly doubt it.

For Chelan Reruns Thrift Store, they are in the code red phase. Someone needs to step forward and help them network or share some of their good fortune and help make this a livable valley for not only the affluent and middle class but also the lower income and fixed income residents. The valley needs all income levels to live here and live here happily and affordability. It will take the entire community to get this problem solved. Come on Chelan Valley, lets fix this problem and keep the Lake Chelan Valley a place for everyone.

Thank you for supporting my sixth annual listening tour

I recently concluded the first portion of my sixth annual 12th District listening

tour. Traveling throughout our district with my staff has become an annual tradition each fall, the time of year when legislators begin planning for the upcoming legislative session.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the past two listening tours consisted primarily of remote meetings. This year’s tour included in-person meetings with remote meetings available as an option.

This year’s listening tour is split between the traditional areas of the 12th District and the new areas resulting from the recent state redistricting. The first portion of the tour took place September 13-16, with visits to Cashmere, Leavenworth, Chelan, and Wenatchee. The remaining tour will take place November 14–18 in the King and Snohomish counties portion of the new 12th District.

Past listening tours have taken me all throughout the 12th District and helped me connect with issues important to all four counties. Many of these communities, unfortunately, will no longer be within

the 12th District boundaries going forward, which is why this year’s Chelan County stops featured Cashmere, Leavenworth, Chelan, and Wenatchee. During my meetings this year, key topics included the state budget, health care, education, land use, wildfire, recreation, and more. This feedback will be very helpful for me when casting important votes in Olympia.

Hosting a listening tour each year helps prepare me for our state’s annual legislative session. Ideas shared during past listening tours have turned into successful legislative action. As examples, a suggestion by Leavenworth officials to dispose of brush and yard clippings resulted in a bill that became law in 2018. A funding

request for the Saddle Rock trail in Wenatchee became reality when it was included in the state budget two years ago, and a road-paving project to a popular fishing location in Okanogan County was recently funded. A biochar demonstration project to reduce wildfire risk was also funded, as well as significant improvements to Pinnacles Prep School. All were ideas first raised by constituents during listening tours. Besides legislative ideas, I also collect helpful comments that prepare me to make better decisions for you.

As I reflect upon discussions from this year’s listening tour and look ahead to the legislative session, I will be better prepared to represent us in the Senate. When legislators

convene at the state Capitol in January, the primary focus will be developing budgets for the 2023-2025 biennium. This two-year period runs July 1, 2023, through June 30, 2025. Legislators likely will approve all three budgets in April or May.

Your support has been terrific throughout my six years of listening tours. Whether you were able to join me this year or not, please know that my position exists to serve you. Please reach out to me anytime, either in Olympia or here at home. I always appreciate hearing your thoughts and ideas about state government. Contrary to what some people may think, listening is the most important skill any elected official can have. It certainly helps me do my job better.

Low-level flights to image 3D geology in northeastern Washington state

Includes Chelan Okanogan and Douglas counties

NORTHEASTERN WASHINGTON - Scientists with the U.S. Geological Survey and the Washington Geological Survey are partnering to image geology using airborne geophysical technology as part of the USGS Earth Mapping Resource Initiative (Earth MRI) project.

Flights began Sept.22 and will continue through November until winter weather impacts safe aircraft operation and data quality. If needed, the data collection will resume in June or July of 2023 when weather is

again favorable for surveying. Flights will be based out of assorted regional airports.

The USGS is contracting with Precision GeoSurveys and EDCON-PRJ to collect the data in 11 northeast Washington counties, including Pend Oreille, Stevens, Ferry, Okanogan, Spokane, Lincoln, Grant, Douglas, Chelan, Skagit and Whatcom.

Data collected as part of the survey is part of a national-scale effort to acquire modern high-resolution airborne magnetic and radiometric data. The survey will replace existing low-quality geophysical data, collected mostly in the 1980s, that is of limited use for geologic mapping. The new geophysical survey will use the latest technological developments that will allow scientists to

develop high-resolution three-dimensional representations of geology to depths several miles below the surface. The 3D models and maps produced from the survey will help understand the distribution of groundwater, mineral, and energy resources as well as the potential for natural hazards. Data collected as part of this effort will be made public and used by USGS in collaboration with Washington Geological Survey scientists to guide more detailed geologic mapping at local scales.

Earth MRI is a cooperative effort between the USGS, the Association of American State Geologists, and other federal, state, and private sector organizations to improve our knowledge of the geologic framework in the United States.

It's fresh fruit season - time for a peach cobbler



George L. Word (Paige Early). Her introduction described it as “a luscious standby” that “contributes to the happiness, health, and longevity of our family.” That sounded intriguing.

Her recipe included a peach filling with sliced peaches sprinkled with flour, sugar, and cinnamon. The crust was more complicated. Instead of islands of biscuit dough with peaches peeking through, the recipe required you to cut the shortening into the flour, just like a pie crust, then roll it out. Hmmm...

Because of the crust, it took longer than I expected to make and bake the cobbler, making my husband and I late for the potluck. My peach cobbler was placed at the very end of the dessert table, behind 2 other peach desserts.

Then an odd thing happened. A couple of men served themselves a small piece of my cobbler, then, a few minutes later, they returned to collect a second piece of my dessert. One guy returned for a THIRD helping. What was going on?

I had my answer when I brought the leftover half of the cobbler home with me and tried a bite.

Oh, my. WOW. Best cobbler EVER!

You might be wondering what made it so good. Was it the ripe peaches, or was it the crust? Probably some of both. It's definitely worth the extra effort of making the rolled crust. Enjoy!

FIVE GENERATION PEACH COBBLER

5 cups fresh peaches, peeled, pitted, and sliced
3 tablespoons flour

1¼ cups sugar
1 teaspoon cinnamon
4 tablespoons butter

Slice peaches into a heavy, greased baking dish, approximately 9 inches around and 3 inches deep. (I used an 11 x 7-inch rectangular glass baking dish that was 2 inches deep. It worked just fine.)

Mix together flour, sugar, and cinnamon, and sprinkle over peaches. Dot with butter.

CRUST
1 cup flour
½ teaspoon salt
2 teaspoons baking powder
1 tablespoon sugar
1/3 cup shortening. (I used butter.)
1/3 cup milk

Sift together dry ingredients. Cut in shortening until mixture resembles coarse corn meal. Pour milk in all at once, and stir with a fork. Roll dough out on a floured board until it is the size of the baking dish – it will be ¼ to ½ inch thick. Place crust on top of peaches. (I rolled my crust onto a rectangular cutting board instead of on the counter, then flipped it over into the baking dish.) Bake in a preheated 425 oven for about 30 minutes. YIELD: 6 to 8 servings.

Pentagon in ‘Potential Noncompliance’ With Law in Denying Religious Exemption Requests to Vaccine Mandate: Leaked Memo

The inspector general calls the volume and rate of religious vaccine exemption denials ‘concerning’

The Pentagon in Arlington, Va., on March 3, 2022.

The Department of Defense (DOD) has been in “potential noncompliance” with standards for reviewing and communicating denials of religious accommodation requests to the vaccine mandate, the Pentagon’s watchdog wrote to the secretary of defense in a June memo obtained by The Epoch Times.

The June 2 memo by Acting Inspector General (IG) Sean W. O’Donnell states that after reviewing dozens of complaints from service members who were denied religious accommodation, the IG’s office “found a trend of generalized assessments rather than the individualized assessment that is required by Federal law and DoD and Military Service policies.”

The purpose of the memo was to inform the secretary of defense of “potential noncompliance with standards for reviewing and documenting the denial of religious accommodation requests of Service members identified through complaints submitted to the [IG’s] office.”

“The denial memorandums we reviewed generally did not reflect an individualized analysis, demonstrating that the Senior Military Official considered the full range of facts and circumstances relevant to the particular religious accommodation request,” the memo reads.

It provided an example of such cursory treatment. An Air Force general used a one-sentence statement to deny an airman’s request: “I disapprove your request for exemption from vaccinations under the provisions of AFI 48-110, paragraph 2-6.b.3.”

The acting IG also noted that the volume and rate of denial decisions were “concerning.”

An average of 50 denials per day were processed over a 90-day period, according to the memo.

“Assuming a 10-hour work day with no breaks or attention to other matters, the average review period was about 12 minutes for each package,” it reads. “Such a review period seems insufficient to process each request in an individualized manner and still perform the duties required for their position.”

The acting IG drew attention to DOD Instruction 1300.17, titled Religious Liberty in the Military Services. Paragraph 3.2.d, which was extracted in a footnote of the memo, states that “officials charged with making recommendations or taking final action on a Service member’s request for the accommodation of religious practices will review each request individually, considering the full range of facts and circumstances relevant to the specific request. ... The means that is least restrictive to the requestor’s religious practice and that does not impede a compelling governmental interest will be determinative.”

The memo was received by Secretary of Defense Lloyd Austin who, in a Sept. 2 memo that was also obtained by The

Epoch Times, referred the matter to the undersecretary of defense for personnel and readiness “for appropriate action, in coordination with the Secretaries of the Military Departments and the DoD Office of General Counsel, as necessary and appropriate.”

“Uniform standards must be applied to all requests for medical or administrative exemption in a manner consistent with law and DoD policy, including DoD Instruction 6205.02, ‘DoD Immunization Program,’ and DoD Instruction 1300.17, ‘Religious Liberty in the Military Services,’” reads the Sept. 2 memo signed by Austin, a Biden appointee.

When contacted by The Epoch Times about the June memo, a spokesperson for the IG’s Office said via email, “The memorandum in question is Controlled Unclassified Information and will not be released at this time.”

The spokesperson didn’t dispute the authenticity of the document.

To date, the combined services have separated at least 7,476 service members over the vaccine mandate, according to the most recent publicly released figures.

As of July 11, the Air Force had approved 104 religious exemptions and administratively separated 834 service members for refusing the vaccine mandate. As of Sep. 8, the Marine Corps had approved 14 religious exemptions and separated 3,436 service members. As of Aug. 24, the Navy had approved 46 religious exemptions and separated 1,533 people. As of Sept. 1, the Army had approved 32 religious exemptions, with 1,673 separations.

‘Unethical Behavior’

Army Chief Warrant Officer Danny Erickson (a pseudonym) discovered the IG memo through a fellow member of the military last week and posted extracts of the memo on his personal website that he created to be a voice for service members who continue to battle against the military’s vaccine mandate.

Erickson, an active-duty service member for more than 20 years and a whistleblower, spoke to The Epoch Times using a pseudonym because of a fear of reprisal.

The officer’s website provides more than two dozen examples of Air Force and Navy religious accommodation request denial letters sent to service members.

“Air Force denials are almost identical, while Navy denials are an exact match,” he said. “For the last year, I’ve seen hundreds of other letters with striking similarities.

“These identical letters expose a level of corruption or unethical behavior within chains of command and leadership.

“They are clearly not looking at individual cases considering the full range of facts and circumstances relevant to specific requests for religious accommodation. They are blanket denying any religious accommodations, and

it’s happening at the highest levels. “The DOD has flat out, undeniably, broken the law concerning religious liberty, and the [secretary of defense] is fully aware of it, because of the memo dated June 2.”

What’s more, the secretary has done nothing to address the acting IG’s warning, Erickson alleged.

A Common Theme Warrants Investigation

The Epoch Times also spoke to Navy Commander Robert A. Green Jr., who was relieved from his position as an executive officer of one of the seven Maritime Expeditionary Security Squadrons within Navy Expeditionary Combat Command on Jan. 7.

“I provided evidence that the Navy was violating federal law and military regulation in how they adjudicated the standardized pre-determined denials of religious accommodation requests,” Green said.

He was relieved of his duties as an executive officer only four days after this evidence was used as the basis for a preliminary injunction granted to Navy SEALs by a federal court.

“In December 2021, I filed an internal Navy complaint against Vice Admiral John Nowell who was the chief of naval personnel and the person designated by the Navy to adjudicate all religious accommodation requests for COVID-19 products,” Green said.

His complaint pointed to Nowell’s utilization of a standard operating procedure that “streamlined the process” that his staff would take to deny all religious accommodation requests. Green noted that “one of the very first steps in the process, once they received a request, was to paste the requestor’s name into the denial template and then route the denial for review.”

“It wasn’t until one of the last steps of the process, that a staffer was finally directed to actually open the request,” he said.

Green’s complaint was formally dismissed in August.

“This is shocking because the Navy’s response came two months after the [IG’s] memo to the secretary of defense,” he said. “Claiming that they could find no evidence should have been impossible, considering a higher-level inspector general had already found that blanket denials of religious accommodations were being given to service members.”

Erickson and Green emphasized that their views don’t reflect those of the Department of Defense, the Department of the Army, or the Department of the Navy.

DOD officials and the Office of the Naval Inspector General didn’t respond to requests for comment.

Biden Admin’s New ‘Climate Cop’ Studied at CCP-Controlled University With Ties to Chinese Military

A former employee at New York’s financial regulator who once lived in China and earned a bachelor’s degree at a Chinese Communist Party-controlled university has taken an important job in the Biden administration.

The Office of the Comptroller of the Currency—a Treasury Department bureau overseeing the country’s largest banks and federal savings associations—has named Yue (Nina) Chen as the agency’s first “climate cop,” or chief climate risk officer, according to a Sept. 12 statement.

Her responsibility is to guide the bureau to “focus on the development and implementation of climate risk management frameworks for the federal banking system.”

She’ll report to Acting Comptroller Michael J. Hsu, who said in the

statement that Chen is “an asset” to the bureau, given her “background and experience in both finance and climate-related financial risk.”

Chen replaces Jonathan Fink, who assumed the responsibility in an acting capacity in March.

Tsinghua University

Chen obtained a bachelor’s degree in chemical engineering from China’s Tsinghua University in 2000 and later earned a doctorate degree at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

Tsinghua University is funded by the Chinese regime’s Ministry of Education and supervised by the State Administration of Science, Technology, and Industry for National Defense (SASTIND), a defense industry agency for the Chinese Communist Party (CCP).

According to Canberra, Australia-based think tank the Australian Stra-

tegic Policy Institute (ASPI), Tsinghua University conducts “defense research,” including in areas such as

air-to-air missiles and artificial intelligence, and the school is home to several defense-focused laboratories.

The Pentagon also highlighted Tsinghua University in a 2020 report, noting that the university has ties to the CCP’s military-civil fusion strategy, which allows the communist regime to leverage commercial technologies for military development.

The CCP controls Tsinghua University through the school’s party committee, which is headed by a Party secretary, Qiu Yong, who reminded students and teachers in a July speech about the importance of being “loyal to the Party.”

Tsinghua University, like many universities and colleges in China, has its own “United Front Work” office, which is part of the CCP’s sprawling bureaucracy headed by the United Front Work Department, a powerful Party agency.

According to a 2020 ASPI report, the department coordinates thousands of groups to carry out foreign political influence operations, suppress dissident movements, gather intelligence, and facilitate the transfer of technology to China.

The Washington Free Beacon first reported on Chen’s educational background in China.
