Chelan teen, deputies injured in Chelan Saddle Club barn fire on July 17

CHELAN - A 17-year-old Chelan youth is suspected of setting fire to a barn near the Chelan Rodeo Grounds on Sunday, July 17 according to Chelan County Sheriff's Office Chief of Operations Chris Foreman. Members of the Chelan Fire and Rescue extinguished the blaze which had moved into brush and stopped it from spreading to nearby structures. The suspect received third-degree burns from the incident and was treated at Harborview Medical Center in Seattle. He has been released and is in stable condition.

After allegedly stealing a car in Chelan around 12:30 p.m., the unidentified teen was seen driving the stolen vehicle up Union Valley Road toward the fairgrounds. Foreman said when deputies arrived on the scene the youth ran into a small barn and locked himself inside. The teenager then set hay on fire as two deputies cut a door lock and forced entry inside the structure. This caused an oxygen release from the barn. An explosion occurred

and the fire knocked back the two deputies. Foreman mentioned that there were reportedly gas cans in the barn and detectives are looking into whether the teen played a part in the explosion.

"There could be potential charges based on their injuries and what ends up happening with the long term effects of that," Foreman said.

One of the deputies is still out on sick leave due to the incident.

The teen ran a short distance before surrendering to authorities and currently faces likely charges of possession of a stolen vehicle and arson.

"Our detectives are working closely with the fire marshal to make that determination," said Foreman about the charges. "Once that evidence is collected and looked at we will coordinate with the prosecutor's office for the appropriate charging."

The 20' x 20' stable had no animals in it at the time of the fire since the horses were at the owners' property. As of now there is no estimate of the loss of value to replace the structure and its items.

Chelan County actively pursuing illegal STR operations

Unpermitted operations will get a warning letter before fines are imposed

WENATCHEE - With a fully staffed Code Enforcement Unit and the review of all provisional permits now complete, Chelan County Community Development advises short-term rental owners that the county is actively pursuing

unpermitted operations.

"We are in a better position now to be able to respond to callers who have concerns about short-term rentals illegally operating in their neighborhoods," said Kirsten Ryles, manager of Community Development's Short-Term Rental Division.

"Unpermitted operators will get one warning, advising them to cease operations until they have an approved permit. If they don't, fines will be imposed."

After receiving a warning letter, people who continue to operate an unpermitted short-

term rental will be fined \$750 a day, as provided in Chelan County Code.

"We have already sent out some warning letters," Ryles said. "I highly recommend that any unpermitted, illegal short-term rentals stop - and give us a call. In some areas of the county where the short-term rental cap hasn't been met, you may be able to make the July 29 deadline for filling out an application for operating in 2023."

Community Development has issued 721 short-term

Applications for new short-term rentals are only accepted until July 29

rental permits so far to Tier 1 applicants and those opera-

tions that were grandfathered in and met short-term rental regulations. In July 2021, when Chelan County commissioners passed a new code establishing the operating standards of the county's short-term rental industry, Community Development estimated as many as 1,300 short-term rentals are operating locally.

The Chelan County Sheriff's Office now has a three-officer

Paulie could not have done it alone, though. Many sponsors, volunteers, and supporters have wholeheartedly embraced 911 Glass Rescue, and they have exceeded their year one goal of 100 tons and made this project a model for what one determined community can do to save our environment. Many more have been born, married, worked, played and been buried here. Carpenter is our name, and it was also the profession of many. . . One of my father's uncles build a livery stable by the lake on the spot where Campbell's original building still sits."

staff in its Code Enforcement Unit. The officers are charged with enforcing building and land-use regulations within the unincorporated areas of Chelan County. Ryles encourages people

who wish to make a complaint to code enforcement to use the online form on the county's website. (www.co.chelan.wa.us/community-development/pages/code-enforcement) The form should be filled out completely so officers have the details to respond. Staff will not fill out the form for the public.

"Please include your name and contact information," Ryles said. "We need verifiable complaints in order to respond. We do not respond to anonymous complaints."

Later this year, the Short-Term Rental Division expects to seek an outside

vendor to add more tools to enforce the county's short-term rental codes. A third-party contractor would allow for better monitoring of the industry in Chelan County, including providing a 24-hour complaint hotline and the reviewing of permitted operations versus unpermitted, Ryles said.

The Short-Term Rental Division is currently reviewing all new Tier 2 and Tier 3 applications; it has about 122 applications to review at this time. Applications for new short-term rentals are only accepted until July 29.

Gamble Sands to break ground for course, resort expansion

Expected completion summer 2025

BREWSTER - The next evolution for the Gamble Sands golf course and destination resort will involve a near-doubling in size through the addition of a second, still-unnamed 18-hole course, expanded lodging facilities, and a new restaurant.

The new project, announced in a story in GolfWeek magazine earlier this month and confirmed by Gamble Sands sources, will be built on Gebbers family agricultural land just north of the 18-hole Sands and 14-hole Quicksands courses.

David McLay Kidd, owner of DMK Golf Design in Bend, Oregon, and designer of the Sands and Quicksands courses, has once again signed on for the new undertaking. While many details remain unknown at this writing Kidd revealed that permits have been secured and construction starting points determined for work scheduled to break ground later this fall. Expected completion of the new expansion is summer 2025.

The location of the new course west of Sands Trail Road will feature the same panoramic view of the Columbia River and Cascade Mountains enjoyed by guests at the original resort.

The Gebbers family began considering a golf venture well over a decade before they

finally had the consulting and design team assembled to pull the trigger on Gamble Sands' construction in 2012.

"The plan was to start small, building the best golf possible and grow from there," said Project Manager Tory Wulf. "The worry was if the golf was good enough to bring people over and keep them coming."

That concern put to rest, Wulf said that lodging is the biggest key to the momentum the resort now has. That's why the facilities at the Inn at Gamble Sands will be expanded from its current 37 rooms to 73.

"By having on-site accommodations people are able to enjoy the property and relax," said Wulf. "The views from the Inn are special and we as locals take it for granted but the visitors really love it."

Mentored deer hunt for kids August 26-29

A unique opportunity is available for kids between 12 and 16 years of age who have never hunted for big game before but who want to go on their first deer hunt.

It's the 2nd annual Chris Christensen Memorial Youth Deer Camp, taking place August 26 through the 28 at the Sherman Creek Wildlife Area near Kettle Falls in Northeast Washington.

The deer camp and hunt are being offered by the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife in partnership with the First Hunt Foundation, Backcountry Hunters and Anglers, the Rocky Mountain Elk Founda-

tion, the Kalispell Tribe, the Inland Northwest Wildlife Council, the National Wild Turkey Federation and Vaagen Brothers Lumber.

The event is aimed towards boys and girls who have never been exposed to deer hunting and don't have a family member who can teach them about the sport. Camp actually starts the evening of August 25 when participants and their family members set up camp. The following morning at 6 a.m. deer hunting mentors will teach the kids (and their parents) the basics about deer hunting in a series of seminars covering safety, field craft, ethics, how to ask landowners for permission to hunt on their property,

recommended hunting gear, hunting tactics, tracking animals, how to properly tag a harvested animal and how to cook it as a delicious meal.

This is also a very hands-on event. Each teenager will learn the fundamentals of marksmanship and sight in a rifle. And if you don't have a rifle or ammunition don't worry, they will be provided for each teen. After learning the basics and spending some time at the range the hunt begins.

On Friday afternoon and Saturday morning, mentors who are experienced hunters will take each kid out on a doe deer hunt. Once the kid tags out on a doe, the animal will be tested for chronic wasting disease and the mentor will teach the new hunter how to butcher the animal. If the kid doesn't have success on Friday or Saturday, they get to go out again on Sunday for another chance at a doe.

The event is named after Chris Christensen. Rick Brazell, the President of the First Hunt Foundation, said, "Chris was a manager at the Sherman Creek Wildlife Area and a mentor with the First Hunt Foundation who just spent tons of his life helping kids and youth learn about the outdoors and about hunting."

Christensen served 20 years in the Army and in Vietnam in the Special Forces. After that he worked for 35 years with the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife. He passed away from cancer in May of 2021 and the deer camp was named in his honor that year.

There is no cost to attend this event for the twelve kids who are selected to go. Food is also free, to include a salmon dinner provided by the Kalispell Tribe. As for accommodations, you can pitch a tent or bring a camper or RV to the state wildlife area. The first twelve kids between 12 and 16 to apply who meet the following criteria will get to go. The criteria to attend is:

1. Age 12 - 16 (must qualify for a youth deer tag)

2. Completed Hunter Education prior to the camp
3. Purchased a hunting license
4. Cannot have successfully hunted any big game (deer, elk, moose, bear, cougar) prior to the camp
5. Does not have any close family that regularly hunts big game

This is a wonderful chance

to expose a kid to the world of big game hunting and set him or her up with the basic skills needed to do it on their own in the future. It's also a chance for parents and guardians to learn about this sport. Finally, it's a fantastic way to keep our hunting heritage alive and pass down this sport to a new generation of hunters.

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Border Crisis Contributed to Botched Response to Uvalde School Massacre: Report

UVALDE, Texas—The school in which 19 children and two teachers were massacred on May 24, had been in lockdown four times in the month prior to the shooting, said Uvalde Mayor Don McLaughlin.

Schools in the whole district had been in lockdown mode 47 times since February due to the border crisis spilling into the city, which is a smuggling corridor from the U.S.-Mexico border to San Antonio, a recent Texas House of Representatives report stated.

Ninety percent of the lockdowns were due to law enforcement chases of suspected smuggling vehicles through Uvalde and subsequent bailouts—where the driver crashes or stops the vehicle and occupants jump out and scatter from law enforcement, the report said.

The sheer increase in bailouts over the past 18 months and the subsequent lockdowns “contributed to a diminished sense of vigilance about responding to security alerts,” the Texas House report states.

“The series of bailout-related alerts led teachers and administrators to respond to all alerts with less urgency—when they heard the sound of an alert, many assumed that it was another bailout.”

We’re 30 days from school starting and we’re having pursuits come through. We’re having bailouts—we had one this morning in Uvalde.

Kenneth Mueller, director of student services for the Uvalde Consolidated Independent School District (CISD) testified to the committee that parents became so concerned about the number of bailouts occurring near the elementary-school campuses that they offered to hire off-duty police to supplement the Uvalde CISD police presence.

Two months after the deadly massacre at Robb Elementary School, the school district is preparing for the beginning of a new year. But the Texas House review of law enforcement’s response to the May 24 shooting revealed a series of alarming failures by first responders. As a result, parents aren’t ready to send their kids back to a district they say is unsafe and where security problems remain unremedied.

“We’re 30 days from school starting and we’re having pursuits come through. We’re having bailouts—we had one this morning in Uvalde,” McLaughlin told The Epoch Times on July 12.

“And what’s going to happen when we have a bailout right by school and it has to go into lockdown? How much panic is there going to be? How much trauma is that going to cause these kids? A ton.”

Parents of children who were slain in the shooting have told the mayor they’re considering homeschooling their other children.

“I said I understand, but I can promise you from the city’s standpoint, we will do everything that we can to make sure your kids are safe,” McLaughlin said he told concerned parents.

The mayor has requested additional

state troopers to be deployed to Uvalde for the first two weeks of the school year.

When asked if he thought some sort of “lockdown fatigue” existed at schools prior to the massacre, McLaughlin said, “I would think there would be, but I can’t speak for the school district.”

Tom Homan, former acting director of Immigration and Customs Enforcement and Heritage Foundation fellow, said local communities are having to “bear the cost” of the escalating border crisis.

“Mass illegal migration was a contributing factor in the tragedy in Uvalde, and no one has said a word about it. That’s simply unacceptable,” Homan said in a statement.

The Uvalde district school board is proposing to delay the start of school until after Labor Day, instead of the original date in mid-August.

FBI Opened Inquiry Into NIH Funding of Wuhan Lab, Emails Show

The FBI launched an inquiry into the National Institutes of Health’s funding of bat research at the Wuhan Institute of Virology, newly released emails show.

The interest from the top U.S. domestic investigative agency adds to the international scrutiny of the Wuhan facility, which houses one of China’s highest-level biosecurity labs and has been considered a possible source of the COVID-19 pandemic.

“In preparation for our call on Tuesday, Erik [Stemmy] (cc’d) has provided responses to your initial questions below (also attached),” Ashley Sanders, an investigation officer at the National Institutes of Health’s (NIH) division of program integrity, wrote in an email dated May 22, 2020, with the subject “Grant Questions – FBI Inquiry,” and directed to FBI agent David Miller.

The email was obtained by government transparency watchdog Judicial Watch through a Freedom of Information Act lawsuit, which

sought records of communications, contracts, and agreements with the Wuhan Institute of Virology (WIV).

The scope of the inquiry is unclear because the rest of the email correspondence, five pages in total, is entirely redacted. But the name of the email attachment “SF 424 A110964-06 (received date 11/05/2018),” corresponds to the NIH grant “Understanding the Risk of Bat Coronavirus Emergence.”

The project in question is headed by Peter Daszak of EcoHealth Alliance, which funneled money to the lab in Wuhan. From 2014 to 2019, the New York nonprofit received six yearly grants totaling \$3,748,715 from the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases under the NIH to fund the project, which was expected to end in 2026.

The FBI inquiry had focused on at least two of the grants, in 2014 and 2019, respectively, the email subject line suggests.

The 2014 grant aimed to “understand what factors increase the risk of the next CoV emerging in people

by studying CoV diversity in a critical zoonotic reservoir (bats), at sites of high risk for emergence (wildlife markets) in an emerging disease hotspot (China),” according to the project description. Specifically, the researchers would assess the coronavirus spillover potential, develop predictive models of bat coronavirus emergence risk, and use virus infection experiments as well as “reverse genetics” to test the virus’s transmission between species.

In the project summary for the 2019 grant, EcoHealth stated that it had found that “bats in southern China harbor an extraordinary diversity of SARSr-CoVs,” and some of those viruses can “infect humanized mouse models causing SARS-like illness, and evade available therapies or vaccines.”

Recently disclosed documents show that, under one grant, the WIV had conducted an experiment that resulted in a more potent version of a bat coronavirus.

In the project that took place under the fifth grant, from June 2018 to

May 2019, the researchers infected two groups of laboratory mice, one of which with a modified version of a bat coronavirus already existing in nature, and another with the original virus.

Those infected with the modified version became sicker, Lawrence Tabak, at the time a principal deputy di-

rector at the NIH, wrote in a letter in response to a congressional inquiry.

The experiment appears to fit the definition of gain-of-function research regardless of its intentions, according to some experts.

The FBI declined to comment to The Epoch Times.

Arizona GOP Offers \$50,000 Reward for Evidence of Vote Buying

The Republican Party of Arizona (RPAZ) will offer up to two \$50,000 rewards for information leading to the arrest and conviction of anyone suspected of “vote-buying” in the statewide primary on Aug. 2.

“There is historical precedent of vote-buying fraud, which ultimately led to secret ballot laws. Unfortunately, the movement towards mass mail-in voting completely undoes secret ballot reform,” the RPAZ said in a July 20 letter.

“Mail-in ballots are not secret—once a person has a ballot in their home, they can easily show it to

anyone, including bad actors.”

The letter says the act of vote-buying happens when someone completes a mail-in ballot in front of a vote-buyer. If the voter then gives the buyer the completed ballot and signed ballot return envelope, the party considers that vote-buying.

And it can take many forms—including an offer of money, goods, or services in exchange for votes.

Transparency International, a global coalition against corruption, says vote-buying signifies a “systemic lack of political integrity that weakens the trust citizens have

in their elected representatives and limits their ability to speak up freely and safely against corruption.”

“Election integrity is of paramount importance. We know from the movie ‘2,000 Mules’ by Dinesh D’Souza that there was significant ballot trafficking during the 2020 presidential election.

“We suspect that the primary source of the trafficked ballots was vote-buying,” the Republican letter added.

The party specifically desires information or evidence of Arizona state election law violations that lead to a conviction before Dec. 31, 2022.

It asks people to contact Vote-BuyingReward@azgop.org. to learn more about, or report, vote-buying.

The RPAZ did not immediately respond to The Epoch Times requesting comment.

Arizona Rep. Mark Finchem, a Republican and a candidate for Arizona secretary of state, said he supports offering rewards that help to ferret out voter fraud in Arizona.

“I fully support the move to offer a reward for the criminal act of buying ballots,” Finchem told The Epoch Times. “That behavior is illegal under Arizona Revised Statutes and should be punished.

“Much like many crime tip lines,

this is another means for people who want legal, legitimate, and secure elections to help make them so.”

Arizona has prosecuted at least nine cases of voter fraud following the 2020 election.

Two Arizona women recently were found guilty of ballot harvesting, a practice once used by both parties to boost voter turnout.

Guillermina Fuentes, 66, the former mayor of San Luis, Arizona, and Alma Juarez, pleaded guilty to felony ballot abuse stemming from an illegal ballot collection operation in the 2020 primary.

Their sentencing will take place on Sept. 1.

A Republican-sponsored bill to make ballot drop boxes illegal failed in Arizona’s Senate in May.

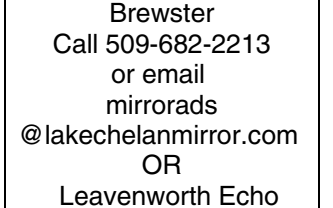

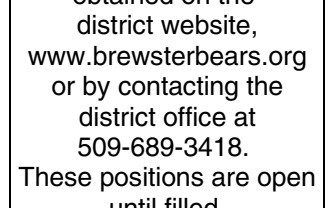
