Signups continuing for free Wildfire Ready Neighbors program for high-risk areas

CHELAN - Through the Wildfire Ready Neighbors program, people can access experts and resources that help them understand how to reduce risk on their property through actions they can take into their own hands. This includes trimming back brush, cleaning roofs and gutters, and removing debris like leafy piles. When every property in a neighborhood takes these steps, their individual homes create a large area that is less susceptible to wildfires.

This year, 219 Chelan County residents have signed up for the program and they are halfway to their goal of 440 sign-ups..

With summer just one month away and fire season around the corner, they need more Chelan residents to take action to build community resiliency.

Why it's good to sign up for the Wildfire Ready Neighbors program and get an evaluation?

"The Wildfire Ready Neighbors program takes the confusion out of wildfire preparedness for residents and property owners. The free, customized plan you'll receive after signing up will help you understand all the proactive actions – from small to large steps – you can take to protect yourself and your neighbors from wildfire,

and a free consultation from a wildfire expert can help assess any overlooked details on your property. Wildfires don't stop at property lines, so when it comes to preparing for wildfire, we all must take action to build community resiliency." said Chelan Fire District 7 Chief Brandon

Sign-up is simple: to get a free plan, participants just visit WildfireReady.com and click 'Sign Up'. They'll be asked to provide some basic info about their property and then they'll receive a free Wildfire Ready Plan customized to their unique needs to get them started. Steps may include: Clearing gutters of

pine needles and leaves. Removing flammable materials within 5 feet of their home. Installing metal mesh panels in the openings around their home. Pruning and thinning trees and vegetation within 5 – 200 feet of the home; and many more...

Residents can also schedule a free consultation from a wildfire expert if they'd like an expert come out to assess their home and property.

For several summers, Chelan County has endured bone dry and hot conditions that create tremendous wildfire risks for communities. Last summer alone, 60 fires burned more than 36,500 acres.

and are gone to their eternal rest".

Originally established during the Civil War, Memorial Day honors the 1.17 million men and women who have $\ died \ to \ create \ and \ maintain \ the$ freedoms outlined in our great Constitution.

Kathy Seureau, Past Quartermaster for the Lake Chelan VFW presented flowers at the base of the monument offering these encouraging words, "To commemorate the virtues of our dear departed heroes who served their country in time of need, I now offer our symbolic tributes. I place this red flower to symbolize the zeal of our departed comrades who have fallen in defense of the United States of America upholding brotherhoods, truth and justice. I place this white flower as a token of the purity of affection we have for our departed comrades. May each future generation emulate the unselfish courage of all men and women who fought for freedom. I place this blue flower, from nature's bosom, which symbolizes truth and fidelity, as a token of our sincere respect for all departed comrades. This emblem of eternity bespeaks life everlasting, thus we immortalize all who gave their lives.

The wreath was brought forward by Carole Hansen and Norm Manly. Lukas and Rex Torgesen, students from Manson High School played Dueling Taps on their trumpets, a haunting tribute to the fallen.

Commander McCullough spoke again saying, "No sorrow for the loved ones left behind could dim the purpose in their souls. No weariness of march and watch could keep them from their hearts' desire. No horror of the field or sea could beat their courage down. All who stand with us today, will you not consecrate yourselves with us to emulate their sacred service that those who rest in heroes' graves may not have died in vain. Let us stand with bowed heads in solemn memory of our heroic dead."

The Lake Chelan Patriotic Singers led the crowd singing the "Star Spangled Banner" followed by the introduction of our guest speaker, Chelan County Sheriff Brian Burnett. Burnett started his career in Law Enforcement with the Chelan County Sheriff's Office in 1998. He is serving his third term as Chelan County's elected sheriff.

Sheriff Burnett stepped to the podium and began his speech by talking about the importance of Memorial Day and that so many men and women have died protecting our freedoms and that we, as civilians need to do everything we can do to protect our freedoms as well.

He then shared a story about his son, the youngest of five boys. As a young boy, he was afraid of the dark and always wanted a hall light on. As he grew, we watched him play army with oversized camo from the military surplus store. When hiking or mountain biking, he would always pack the U.S. flag and a pole so he could mount and fly the flag from the top of the mountain. It was as if he had a calling on his life to serve his country.

"Currently, my son is in the Army Ranger Program and received the top award, Soldier of the Cycle for his 22-week AIT Infantry Training. Number one out of 165 soldiers. Out of all the things to be proud of, even with all of his outstanding awards or recognitions, the one I'm most proud of is the day he sent pictures home of his army uniform with his name, Burnett, on it along with his "Dog Tags", said Burnett. "I've waited all my life for this and now it's official." He was called to serve and had a vision and he has stepped up to answer that call as so many of our fallen heroes have done to protect our freedoms.

American Legion "Appreciation Certificates" were presented to Manson Fire Chief Arnold Baker and Chelan County Sheriff Brian Burnett. The



State officials aren't sharing much about dead wolves found in Stevens county

Four wolves were found dead in Stevens County this winter in Northeast Washington but officials with the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife are saying very little about the incident. The wolves were discovered by two Stevens County Sheriff's Deputies on February 18 while they were patrolling the area of Churchill Mine Road a few miles south of the Canada border on snowmobiles. The deputies examined and photographed the animals and noted seeing no blood or bullet holes. They reported their findings to WDFW that day.

The wolves are part of the Wedge Pack and roam a territory where wolves have attacked livestock in the past. These attacks have injured or killed cattle, primarily calves and have led to lethal wolf removals from WDFW, the latest removal occurring

about these dead wolves until the end of May. In fact, the incident was not even mentioned in the latest monthly wolf update from the agency which incorrectly stated only one wolf was known to have been killed so far in 2022.

However, that changed May 26 when Eli Francovich, writing for the Spokesman Review, broke this story open after the Kettle Range Conservation Group issued a press release about the incident.

Chris Bachman, the Wildlife and Wildlands Director for the Kettle Range Conservation Group, stated, "WDFW is often criticized for its lack of transparency around wolf management. This is simple opacity. Four gray wolves reported killed and three

months have passed without any information related to this event being shared with the public." Bachman went on to say, "I understand WDFW likely has an investigation ongoing, but why not engage the public and try to garner information? Three months have passed, what is happening to bring the perpetrators to justice?

Bachman believes the wolves were poisoned. He told me he came to this conclusion after an assessment of the case by several experts, including a retired U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service investigator. An interview with Bachman about this incident is scheduled to air the weekend of June 11-12 on the Northwestern Outdoors Radio network.

WDFW did issue the following statement as this story came to light, "The Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife is aware of and actively investigating dead wolves found in Stevens County. Because this incident is under active investigation by law enforcement, no further information is being provided at this time. Please report any information about the death or harassment of wolves to the WDFW Enforcement Hotline at 1-877-933-9847."

I contacted Julia Smith, the Wolf Policy Lead for WDFW, as to why information wasn't released earlier. She defended the lack of transparency stating, "Often, in order to avoid jeopardizing an active investigation, information is not released in order to prevent evidence destruction, protect officer safety, and ensure a case isn't compromised. We want to collect enough information such that a solid case can be referred to a prosecutor. Without sufficient evidence, a conviction cannot be made.

A similar case unfolded in 2021 in Northeast Oregon and Oregon State Police investigators, after several months, did announce a reward for information leading to a conviction in the case in the sum of \$50,000 that was donated by various environmental and conservation organizations. I asked Smith why no similar rewards had been offered or pleas made to the public for help.

Smith replied, "Although we welcome and appreciate rewards being offered, offering a reward in itself isn't a compelling reason to make an investigation public. I've spent almost a decade working on wolves, and I cannot provide a single example of a monetary award leading to the conviction of a wolf poacher. The cash reward in Oregon has not resulted in any arrests to date. Typically, we get to the stage of offering rewards for information when there are no avenues of investigation remaining for law enforcement.

From my experience, the only thing that leads to convictions is evidence, and the only thing that leads to evidence is a sound investigation. WDFW chose to withhold information in this case to put law enforcement in the best position possible to carry out their investigation. We all want to see poachers brought to justice."

Free fishing and public lands entry

On a lighter note, June 11-12 are free fishing days in Washington, where no license is required to fish or harvest shellfish though all other rules apply. June 11 is also National Outdoors Day and no entry fee or user pass is required to park at developed National Forest or BLM sites or to enter State Parks, Department of Natural Resources Sites or state Fish and Wildlife Areas for the day. Camping fees are still required for overnight


