This is a valley wide forum and not just for Manson residents.

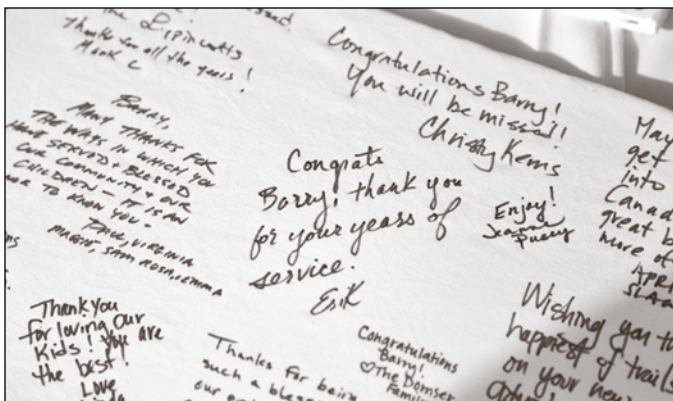

Whitmore to lead Entiat schools

Former Tiger returns to his alma mater

RITZVILLE/ENTIAT — Longtime Lind-Ritzville Athletic Director and Head Football Coach Greg Whitmore has been named Entiat School District superintendent.

Whitmore announced his selection in an email earlier this week, noting he will be leaving his post with the Lind-Ritzville School District at the end of the school year.

"It is with excitement, but some bitter sweetness, that I am letting you know that I

have accepted the position of superintendent for the Entiat School District," Whitmore

wrote. "Karen and I came to Ritzville in August of 1992 and figured we would be here 2-3 years. I blinked and just completed my 30th year."

Whitmore is a graduate of Entiat High School.

"I could not have imagined myself as the superintendent of any school," he said of Lind-Ritzville. "However, I was born in Entiat, own property in Entiat and planned to retire in Entiat and when this opportunity found me, it felt like a calling."

Whitmore said he will miss his students, athletes and the Lind-Ritzville school community as a whole.

"As always, it is the relationships that I will miss the most here... my players, the

students, staff and administrators," he said. "So, I return to my roots to be a Tiger. But there is room in my heart for both a Tiger and a Bronco."

Whitmore said he still has a lot of work to do before his departure and wanted to thank the community for being "such an important part of the Whitmore family's life."

Whitmore is replacing Miles Caples, who is retiring.

The Entiat School Board made its selection during a special meeting Tuesday, May 10.

The board there announced the selection to the Entiat school community Friday, May 13.

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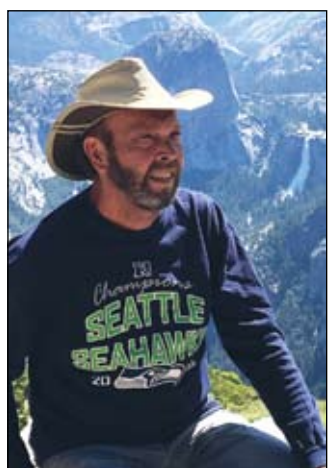
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OBITUARIES

David Spencer

September 20, 1964 - May 6, 2022 Chelan, Washington



David earned many placement medals.

David was born in Saratoga Springs, New York, to William E. "Ernie" Spencer, Jr. and Sheila Hearon. David grew up in Saratoga Springs, but also spent summers in Chadwick Beach, New Jersey. Early in David's childhood, alongside his father, brother, and sister, they planted, trimmed, and sold Christmas trees from the Spencer Christmas Tree Farms. The first Spencer Christmas Trees were sold in 1968.

It wasn't all work, speed skating was enjoyed by the family as well. As a third generation speed skater, David competed from the age of six to 15, attending meets and championship events.

He graduated from Saratoga Springs High School in 1982; served in the Navy from 1984-1988; graduated from Maria College in Albany, New York in 1993, with a degree as an Occupational Therapy Assistant. In 1998, he graduated from Connecticut Center for Massage, certified in Massage

Therapy.

David worked as a Certified Occupational Therapy Assistant, (COTA) since 1993, and traveled with his work to the states of New York, Connecticut, Tennessee, Arizona, Oregon, and Washington. He was a gifted therapist and touched many lives. Listening to the life experiences of patients and helping them recover, gave him joy and fulfillment.

David played soccer into his 30's, and was an avid English Premier League soccer fan. Manchester City being his team of choice. He also enjoyed golf, basketball, and football. He was a lifelong New York Giants fan, but after moving to Washington, he became a Seattle Seahawks fan. He rarely missed a Seahawk game.

Naturally talented with song, dance, and comedic timing, David was the lead singer

in a cover band in California in the late 1980's; would karaoke any chance he could, and acted in community theatre. He began performing in community productions at the age of eight, with Stepping Star Studio in Saratoga Springs, New York, performing in "The Mouse and the Cheese" (1972). He held many key roles: starring as Will Rogers in "Will Rogers Follies" in Connecticut; Phil Davis in "White Christmas", in Chelan, Washington; Father Virgil Manly Trott in "Sister Amnesia's Country Western Nunsense Jamboree", in Chelan, Washington; and his last role was as Nicely-Nicely in "Guys and Dolls", in Soap Lake, Washington, (2019). There were many productions in between.

David's theatrical experiences were enjoyed by his patients, as he would occasionally sing a song while working. He brought joy to family and

friends with phone calls as theatrical characters or the pizza delivery man.

In 2012, he met the love of his life, Tina. He quickly embraced becoming a dad to her daughter, Trista. As a family they shared love, laughter, singing, dancing, sports, travel, and creating culinary experiences, often including more family and friends.

David never knew a stranger. He was compassionate and kind. Many knew him as the therapist with his dog, Clover. Clover worked with him for 10 years.

David is survived by his wife, Tina; stepdaughter, Trista White; mother, Sheila Williams and step-father John Williams of Brielle, New Jersey; brother, Stephen Spencer (Barbie) of Broad Brook, Connecticut; sister, Catherine Spencer of Boonton, New Jersey; step-sisters: Karen Wendell of Manesquan, New

Jersey, Laura Williams (Todd) of Eugene, Oregon, and Gera-lynn Williams of Studio City, California; step-brothers: John Williams, Jr. (Jen) of Red Bank, New Jersey, and Christopher (Julie) Williams of Sedona, Arizona; niece, Hazel Spencer of Boonton, New Jersey; nephews: Michael Spencer (Michelle) of South Windsor, Connecticut, and Matthew, Myles, and Mitchell Spencer of Manchester, Connecticut.

He was preceded in death by his father, William E. "Ernie" Spencer, Jr., and a step-grandson, Waylon Charles.

Funeral services will be held at Lake Chelan Lutheran Church, 216 W. Border Patrol Using Rare ‘Parole’ Exemption to Quickly Release Tens of Thousands of Illegal Aliens Into US

DEL RIO, Texas—U.S. Border Patrol has started to use, on a mass scale, a special “parole” exemption that was previously used sparingly to allow tens of thousands of illegal immigrants to stay in the United States for at least a year, The Epoch Times has learned.

Under parole status, illegal immigrants don’t have to provide Border Patrol with evidence of credible fear for asylum and are permitted entry without any preconditions, except a quick background check in the U.S. crime database.

A Customs and Border Protection spokesman said the parole designation allows for overwhelmed Border Patrol stations to process large numbers of illegal aliens “significantly faster” and release them into the country much faster than the more involved current system—which releases an illegal alien with a notice to appear that includes a court date for their first immigration hearing.

Parole should be a “very, very boutique thing,” said Andrew Arthur, resident fellow in law and policy at Center for Immigration Studies and a retired immigration judge.

“This is the exact opposite of what Congress said. This is a misuse and abuse of that immigration authority that borders on malfeasance,” he said.

Through the 1952 Immigration and Nationality Act (INA), Congress mandated that all inadmissible and illegal aliens be detained until their status is determined, after which they are either deported or granted entry with a legal status.

Parole is an exception and, although it’s not a legal status, it permits entry on “a case-by-case basis” for “urgent humanitarian reasons or significant public benefit,” according to the INA.

The status allows foreign nationals “who may not otherwise be admissible to the country under the immigration laws” to live and work in the United States temporarily “without being formally admitted to the country and without having a set pathway to a permanent immigration status,” according to a 2020 Congressional Research Service report.

Arthur said parole should be used, for example, when a family member needs entry into the United States to donate a kidney to his brother, or if a witness to a criminal case is needed to testify. As associate general counsel in the former federal immigration

agency, he would see a handful of parole cases a year.

However, in the first seven months of this fiscal year, CBP has mass-released more than 120,600 illegal aliens under the new “Parole+ATD” category. ATD is an Alternatives to Detention program, which is acting as a workaround of the legal requirement to detain illegal aliens.

Under ATD, Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) issues the illegal alien a trackable cell phone (or sometimes an ankle bracelet) that he or she can use to check in with the agency on a regular basis.

The CBP spokesman told The Epoch Times that overwhelmed Border Patrol stations are shifting to processing more illegal aliens as parolees.

“It’s more a functionality of the processing conditions at the location where they are giving out the parole-ATD,” he said.

“It’s a functionality of: How do we deal with the people that we’re encountering and how do we keep our population low for people that we cannot Title 42 back to Mexico? That’s the underlying issue.”

The spokesman said, aside from discovering a criminal record, whether an illegal alien is paroled depends on whether detention or transport space is available, the demographic of the person, as well as if the agent thinks the person is likely to abscond.

CBP didn’t provide historical data on parole numbers, or information on the nationalities of current parolees. A Border Patrol agent in Texas told The Epoch Times, on condition of anonymity, that his station is paroling Venezuelans, Cubans, and Nicaraguans.

Border Patrol agents are currently

apprehending more than 7,000 illegal aliens on average per day along the southern border, and the Department of Homeland Security has warned agents to expect up to 18,000 per day in the coming months.

Failure to Show Up

The use of the parole category replaces the notice to report, which wasn’t a legal designation, but an ad hoc designation used heavily last year as Border Patrol stations were overwhelmed. The notice to report was a request to illegal aliens to report to their nearest ICE office within 60 days.

More than 104,000 notices to report were issued in the five months between the end of March and the end of October in 2021. Of those, 47,705 individuals failed to report to ICE by January this year, according to official data received by Sen. Ron Johnson (R-Wis.).

“It was an honor system [and] we got beat over the head with that. So they went back and they looked at the Title 8 law,” a CBP spokesman told The Epoch Times.

“One thing you can do is you can parole somebody who is coming into the United States as an arriving alien, and you can parole them for a year, so that they can take care of whatever humanitarian issue or whatever issue that they have to deal with.”

Parole status effectively kicks the can down the road to ICE, which issues a notice to appear once the illegal alien reports to the agency.

“The thing about parole is it gives them that year to go in and get that done,” the spokesman said.

If no contact is made, at the end of that year, the alien would revert back to the status he or she had upon arriving as an illegal alien and would be removable, he said.

Almost one-third of parolees released between July and December last year have failed to show up to ICE, according to Homeland Security data received by Rep. Chip Roy (R-Texas).

“Mayorkas’s DHS has refused to detain migrants—as required by law—has failed to remove innumerable people who have no right to be here, and are abusing their parole authority to continue to release tens of thousands of migrants,” Roy told The Epoch Times on May 4.

ICE’s stated priorities are such that field agents, when considering an illegal alien for removal, must obtain permission from supervisors, as well as weigh up if the individual “might

be suffering from serious physical or mental illness,” or if they have ties to the community, or family members in the United States.

The agency’s available detention space for illegal immigrants has decreased in recent years, going from 51,379 detention beds in 2018 to 30,000 currently. President Joe Biden’s fiscal year 2023 budget asks for Congress to shave a further 5,000 detention beds in ICE facilities, as well as eliminate all 2,500 family beds.

Risks of Mass Parole

Arthur said the mass use of the parole designation is “a huge vulnerability.”

“The likelihood that you are going to release somebody who poses a danger to national security is extremely high. The risk that you are releasing somebody who poses a danger to the community is extremely high,” he said.

“You can run their [fingerprints], but are you going to run their criminal record in San Pedro Sula [in Honduras]? Are you going to be able to run their activities in Yemen? The vetting is only as good as the intel, and the intel isn’t that good.

“But here’s the biggest issue. This becomes a vicious circle. Because the more people who come in, the more overwhelmed you are, the more that you release, the more people are going to come in.”

During April, Border Patrol agents released more than 40,000 illegal aliens as parolees and an additional 21,769 with a notice to appear, according to CBP statistics. That’s 15,000 more parolees released than in March and the first month the parolee number has exceeded the number of those who received a notice to appear.

An amendment published in the Federal Register that will go into effect on May 31 argues the case for parole when detention space is lacking.

“Individuals placed in expedited removal proceedings would be eligible for consideration for parole from custody in accordance with section 212(d) (5) of the Act, if DHS determined, in the exercise of its discretion and on a case-by-case basis, that parole is warranted because, inter alia, detention is unavailable or impracticable (including situations in which continued detention would unduly impact the health or safety of individuals with special vulnerabilities),” the rule states.

Arthur said that interpretation isn’t how Congress intended parole to be used.

“You’re basically allowing the population to drive how you apply the law. That’s not how it works. The law determines how you handle the population,” he said.

The Trump administration used parole as a stop-gap measure before the “Remain in Mexico” program was implemented in January 2019, which then acted as a solution to the lack of detention space.

Remain in Mexico, or the Migration Protection Protocols, allowed for DHS to send illegal immigrants back to Mexico to await their immigration court proceedings—after which they’d either be denied entry or granted legal status in the United States. About 70,000 illegal immigrants had been enrolled in the program by the end of 2020.

Biden paused new enrollments in the program when he took office and, in June 2021, his administration axed the program altogether, despite being sued by Texas and Missouri in April 2021 to keep it in place.

The states argued that the program can’t be rescinded because it’s the only solution that meets the congressional requirement that illegal aliens must be detained until their cases are resolved.

The Supreme Court ruled in August 2021 that the program must continue, at least until the justices make a final ruling. In its deliberations, which began in April this year, the high court is addressing the mandatory detention aspect of immigration law, which may also ultimately determine if mass parole can continue.

Since November 2021, when the administration was forced to resume enrollments, 1,795 illegal aliens have been sent back to Mexico to await their cases, according to CBP data. The DHS has remained vocal about its intention to ultimately end Remain in Mexico.

Bone-building medicine, howlong do you have to take it

Q: My doctor wants me start taking a particular medication once a week to strengthen my bones. How long do I have to take it?

May is National Osteoporosis Awareness and Prevention month. Osteoporosis is a disease that causes your bones to become thinner and more likely to break. If you have osteoporosis, a simple fall can shatter a bone, causing months of painful rehabilitation and, worse, permanent disability and loss of independence. Sometimes, bones become so weak that they break spontaneously. A hip fracture can cause a fall instead of being the result of one. The vertebrae of your spine can become so frail that they collapse. Your nerves can get crushed, and your muscles can fall out of position, causing deformity and pain.

Last summer, I drove past a line of heavy equipment which was resurfacing a lane of traffic on the opposite side of the highway. The leading machine ripped into the top asphalt layer, shredding it and moving it up a conveyor belt to a waiting dump truck. Behind them, a second dump truck fed crushed asphalt into the end of a mixer, blending it with hot tar. The mixer's other end poured hot gooey asphalt into the road surface. A giant roller followed behind for the final touch.



Our bones follow a similar pattern, continuously recycling calcium, phosphorus, and other minerals that they contain. Like the machines at a highway, remix it and lay it down as a new surface, we continuously take up bone cells, then lay them back down.

Until age 35, our bone density increases every year; we are putting in more bone cells than we take out. That balance begins to shift in your mid-thirties. You begin losing about 1% of your bone mass every year.

Taking prednisone for months to years at a time increases bone density, and smoking cigarettes accelerates bone loss. Menopause triggers doubling of the rate of bone loss in most women.

How long do you need to take your bone-building medicine? It depends on how thin your bones are and whether you have a history of a fracture due to having thin bones. Bone density is measured using a DXA scan (also called a DEXA). DXA scans measure bone thickness in several critical areas to determine bone mineral density.

During a painless PET scan, low-dose X-rays penetrate the bones of your pelvis, hip, and lower spine. The results are used to calculate the bone mineral density of each area, with the lower the density, the greater the risk of fracture.

If your bone density is low, you can reduce future bone loss with treatment. You may be at an increased risk of thin bones if you are postmenopausal or have taken

pill form because of stomach or esophagus problems. So how long should you take Fosamax® or Actonel®? The answer to that is, "That depends". I suggest you and your doctor make a choice together. Five years of treatment with any bisphosphonate should be long enough if you take it as prevention and have never had a fracture.

Both alendronate (Fosamax®) and risedronate (Actonel®) help prevent hip and vertebral fractures for up to ten years, even after you stop taking them.

When you take a bisphosphonate for longer than five years, there is an increased risk of a dental emergency called osteonecrosis of the jaw.

Besides bisphosphonates, there are other bone-building medications available, including once-monthly injections. Check with your doctor about all of your medication options.
