CHELAN - A car driven by Paul Maxey, 84, of Wenathee, was southbound on Highway 97A through the Knapps Hill Tunnel, on Sept. 16, when it crossed the centerline, and hit a northbound International truck driven by Benjamin W. Lorenz of Chelan. The truck driven by Lorenz was shoved into the tunnel wall, then came back across the lane, and struck a southbound vehicle driven by Jaxson Quast of Marysville.

Maxey and his passenger Pauline Maxey, 85, were transported by Lake Chelan Health EMS to Lake Chelan Health. Quast, his three passengers and Lorenz, were not injured in the accident.

# Two badly burned bear cubs rescued from Twenty-five Mile Fire

CHELAN - Oppressive smoke. Hazy skies. Charred trees.

Those are some side effects of the annual wildfires which serve as a dubious summer rite of passage for residents of North Central Washington. But perhaps one forgotten casualty of the annual blazes are the residents who call the forests home. A furry few of those denizens are getting a second chance as a trio of black bear cubs found locally suffered severe burns from the fires. They were brought to PAWS Wildlife Center in Lynwood this summer for rehabilitation, an effort which has proved an emotional journey for the doctors and staff.

"It's definitely a passion project for all the staff at PAWS. It's a lot of hard work," said Laura Follis, Director of Communications and Partnership at PAWS. "Especially when you see these animals in pain, who are suddenly orphaned and in terrible pain and left all alone. They would not survive on their own. We definitely feel a responsibility to step in and basically save their lives."

One bear came from the Cedar Creek wildfire near Mazama. Two of the cubs, believed to be siblings, were victims of the Twenty-five Mile wildfire fire near Chelan. They were found on August 23 and August 26 respectively from the same location by homeowners Dave and Karen Case. The

couple, who live on a 50-acre property amid state and forest land, photographed the wounded bears with their remote wildlife camera. After the Cases called the Washington Department of Fish & Wildlife, workers spent hours scouring the hillside in heat and smoke searching for the lost cubs.

A fourth bear brought to the PAWS facility was so

wounded it had to be euthanized.

PAWS began admitting black bears to their facility in 1987 and are the largest bear rehabilitation center in the Evergreen State. Since PAWS treats an averaging six bears cubs per year, having four severely burned bears come in from the wild in such short order is unprecedented.

"What we're seeing is extremely unusual," said Jennifer Convy, PAWS senior director for Wildlife. "Historically, burns have not been a common injury we've seen but we expect this may become more common and we're prepared at PAWS to admit black bears and other wild species injured

by wildfire.”

The three bears were brought to PAWS with their own paws critically burned. The treatment process is slow and arduous. Veterinarians start by debriding dead tissue on the cubs’ paw pads and clean the underlying tissue to keep it healthy from infections. Workers apply antibiotic cream to the paws to discourage infections and then place silver foam bandages over the severely infected areas. This process is repeated until the staff sees signs of tangible healing.

Once the bears are back on their feet, they’re rehab is hands off. PAWS ensures that human interaction with the animals is kept to an absolute minimum. They place

the cubs into an enclosure facility to rehabilitate with other bears. PAWS staff does not talk around the bears and only photographs them with remote cameras while the cubs sleep. The enclosure includes special guillotine doors so staff can clean the enclosure and bring in new food without the bears seeing or hearing them.

“Our goal is to keep wild animals wild,” Follis said. “The bears typically do better when they’re rehabilitated with other bears. They can wrestle with each other, learn from each other, compete for resources with each other.”

Among the food that PAWS feeds the bears is fish, apples, berries, nuts, seeds, insects, and veggies. They provide other food depending on the season and the biological

needs of the bears. The staff creatively hides the food in logs, tree branches and other areas so that the cubs must forage for their meals, as they would in the wild.

As the winter months approach, PAWS quiets the cubs’ enclosure to encourage hibernation. They reduce the bears’ food and light to mimic a den. Once the cubs emerge in the spring, the staff will continue to fatten them up for release. When the snow melts and natural food is plentiful, the furry troopers will reenter the wild after a total of 8-9 months of rehabilitation.

While it’s nearly impossible for PAWS workers not to become attached to the bears, the staff makes sure proper boundaries are in place to ensure that the cubs don’t become pets. They re-

fer to the animals based on the geography where they were found.

“We don’t name the bears which is one way of keeping our focus on the fact that these are wild animals,” Follis said. “They don’t belong to us.”

Indeed, they belong to wild, and returning there will have its challenges. Nothing is guaranteed. But these lucky cubs, which Follis calls “our own Northwest smoky the bears,” act as the local faces of wildfires, provided that life can arise from the ashes.

Yesterday (Sept. 19): The cooler, wetter weather this weekend

helped decrease fire activity. Much of the firefighters’ efforts will now focus on rehab, repair, monitoring and patrol. Crews finished much of the chipping operations along the southern and northern perimeter. They will chip along the northwestern edge of the fire for the next couple of days. Four excavators

were brought in to repair dozer lines. Road crews continued to spread gravel and repair damaged roads.

The BAER Team (Burned Area Emergency Response) is on site to assess damage and develop a recommendation plan to address stabilization and other recovery issues for the

As a relative newcomer to the Manson area and having moved here permanently in 2017, I decided to become more involved in my community. I went to the school board meeting to become better informed, not knowing such a large group was attending. I arrived right at 6:00, when the meeting was to begin. At that time, the library was packed with people, mostly unmasked, though a sign at the door required masks per the governor’s mandate.

The group was told that be-cause several refused to wear masks the meeting was to take

place via Zoom. All were given the opportunity to be a part of the Zoom meeting. Those needing help logging onto the meeting, including me, were given assistance.

I did not hear or see any interactions between school board members and commu-nity members, but I did see the school superintendent tell one person she would like to meet with her and discuss the issue of masks. This was a very courte-ous interaction.

Some members of the com-munity, however, seemed very angry about the mask mandate. As we were leaving the library, several continued to present their views. In addition to giving their reasons for opposing the mask mandate, they advocated non-compliance. To an outside observer who had just arrived, this group was not courteous. Their voices were raised; they stated that the school board

should work for them or they would be voted out of office. I did not hear an response from any school board member or employee as we were exiting the room.

In contrast, the Zoom meet-ing was very respectful. Those who had signed up to speak were given the time to present their views. While in-person would have been preferable, the Zoom meeting seemed to be a good compromise to enable the school board to receive an opposing point of view.

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# Lake Chelan Health EMS earns national recognition for efforts to improve STEMI treatment in Lake Chelan Valley

CHELAN - Lake Chelan Health EMS has received the American Heart Association’s Mission: Lifeline® EMS Gold Plus Achievement Award for implementing specific quality improvement measures to treat patients who suffer severe heart attacks.

Each year, more than 250,000 people experience an ST elevation myocardial infarction (STEMI), the deadliest type of heart attack, caused by a blockage of blood flow to the heart that requires timely treatment. To prevent death, it is critical to restore blood flow as quickly as possible, either by mechanically opening the blocked vessel or by providing clot-busting medication.

The American Heart Association’s Mission: Lifeline program helps reduce barriers to prompt treatment for

heart attacks –starting from when 9-1-1 is called, to EMS transport and continuing through hospital treatment and discharge.

Optimal care for heart attack patients takes coordination between the individual hospital, EMS and healthcare system.

“EMTs and paramedics play a vital part in the system of care for those who have heart attacks,” said Tim Henry, M.D., Chair of the Mission: Lifeline Acute Coronary Syndrome Subcommittee. “Since they often are the first medical point of contact, they can save precious minutes of treatment time by activating the emergency response system that alerts hospitals to an incoming heart attack patient.”

Program participants apply for the award recognition by demonstrating how their organization has committed to improving quality care for

STEMI patients.

“Lake Chelan Health EMS is honored to be recognized by the American Heart Association for our dedication to providing optimal care for heart attack patients,” said Ray Eickmeyer, Director of EMS.

# John Durham Grand Jury Indicts Lawyer Whose Firm Represented Democrats in 2016

Special prosecutor John Durham has charged Washington-based lawyer Michael Sussmann, who represented former presidential candidate Hillary Clinton and the Democratic National Committee, with lying to the FBI during Clinton's 2016 campaign. Sussmann works for the high-powered law firm Perkins Coie—which has long done legal work for the Democratic Party and top Democrats, including filing election-related lawsuits. The lawyer was indicted on a single felony count of making a false statement during a meeting with FBI General Counsel James Baker in September 2016. Prosecutors allege that Sussmann lied by denying he represented any client when he told the federal law enforcement agency about evidence that allegedly linked then-candidate Donald Trump's Trump Tower to a bank in Russia. Sussmann met with Baker to hand over papers and data files containing evidence of the alleged link between the Trump Organization and the Russian bank, which wasn't disclosed. Unconfirmed media reports

have stated that it was Alfa Bank. The indictment is the second criminal case brought by Durham since he was named by former Attorney General William Barr in 2018 to investigate officials who investigated the Trump–Russia probe. Durham, a former U.S. attorney, was asked to stay as a special counsel and continue his investigation after President Joe Biden's administration took office in January. Sussmann, the indictment alleges, didn't turn over the information as a "good citizen," but rather as an attorney representing Clinton, a technology executive, and an internet company. "Sussmann's lie was material because, among other reasons, Sussmann's false statement misled the FBI General Counsel and other FBI personnel concerning the political nature of his work and deprived the FBI of information that might have permitted it more fully to assess and uncover the origins of the relevant data and technical analysis," the indictment reads. The Epoch Times in 2019 found that Sussmann had provided the information to Baker and at least one journalist ahead of the FBI's appli-

cation for a FISA warrant to surveil former Trump campaign aide Carter Page. Perkins Coie, on behalf of the Democratic National Committee, also hired Fusion GPS, which in turn hired Christopher Steele to produce the dossier that contained since-discredited claims against the former president. About a month later, The New York Times and other news outlets reported on the FBI investigation into the alleged Alfa Bank–Trump Organization connection. The FBI said it looked into the matter, but found no connections. Trump and other former administration officials have long described the FBI investigation into his campaign as a witch hunt designed to politically wound his reelection chances. Lawyers for Sussman, a former federal prosecutor, said on Sept. 16 that their client never made false state-

ments to the FBI and that there's no evidence that the alleged falsehood affected the agency's work. "Mr. Sussmann has committed no crime," they said in a statement, according to The Associated Press. "Any prosecution here would be baseless, unprecedented, and an unwarranted deviation from the apolitical and principled way in which the Department of Justice is supposed to do its work." In 2017, Sussmann was asked by congressional investigators about his interview with Baker and testified that he passed along information on behalf of his client. When trying to access Sussmann's page on Perkins Coie's website, a "page not found" message was displayed. Representatives for Perkins Coie and Sussmann's lawyers didn't respond to requests for comment by press time.

# Florida's Monoclonal Antibody Treatments at Over 90,000 Despite HHS Efforts to Limit Supply

PUNTA GORDA, Fla.—More than 90,000 people in Florida have now received monoclonal antibody treatments across 25 state-sponsored sites. However, a disruption in services is looming due to the Biden administration giving control of distribution to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. Florida's supply will be cut in half, Gov. Ron DeSantis announced on Sept. 16. The governor said he was surprised at the HHS's "abrupt and sudden" announcement that it would be taking control of distribution. He said this took him by surprise because a week prior, on Sept. 9, the Biden administration said they were increasing monoclonal antibody distribution by 50 percent. Now the HHS, as of Sept. 13, "seized control" of the treatments, the governor said, adding that earlier in the week he received official word that Florida's shipments of the monoclonals would be reduced by 50 percent. Before, providers and infusion centers, as well as the state of Florida, would simply call AmerisourceBergen, a third-party affiliate of Regeneron, which makes the monoclonal antibodies treatment, and request whatever amount was needed. DeSantis said this new method will make it "doubly difficult" for hospitals and other providers because they will now have to go through the state to get their treatments. "They sprung this on us," DeSantis said at the Sept. 16 press conference. "They pulled the rug out from under us." The new ordering process, DeSan-

tis said, would be a disruption for inpatient services, and he worries that patients will needlessly suffer. But he vowed that the state would "overcome any obstacles that HHS and the Biden administration put on them." "We will fight like hell to get these patients the treatment they need," he said. "We have a responsibility to be there for them, and that's what we are going to do." HHS two weeks ago stealthily changed its website and began making it more difficult for states like Florida, which has used the monoclonal antibodies treatments as a way to reduce hospital admissions from COVID-19. A Texas doctor sounded the alarm that HHS was taking over the distribution of the monoclonals,

as was reported by The Epoch Times on Sept. 8. The system was changed on Sept. 13 from direct ordering to an allocation model. "I'm very concerned about the Biden administration," DeSantis said at the press conference, adding that the new ordering protocol will result in a "huge disruption to services." An HHS spokesperson told The Epoch Times in an email that the transition to a model that was in place from November 2020 to February "gives health departments maximum flexibility to get mAbs where they are needed most." "HHS will now determine the weekly amount of mAb products each state and territory receives based on criteria applied equally

across all jurisdictions. This criteria includes COVID-19 case burden and mAb utilization. State and territorial health departments will subsequently identify which sites in their respective jurisdictions receive product as well as the amount each site receives," the spokesperson said. DeSantis said he is being proactive and has been in communication with GlaxoSmithKline, another maker of monoclonal antibodies treatment. He said he was looking into expanding beyond Regeneron and contracting with another supplier in order to make up for any shortage that could occur under the new HHS distribution plan. He said the results of the monoclonal antibodies are positive and that

there have been 24 consecutive days in the decline of the COVID hospital census statewide. The governor said he's pleased with the trends that are occurring and credits the vaccine and the monoclonals for the reduction in hospitalization rates. Florida hospital admission rates have decreased by 50 percent. However, Sen. Marco Rubio took to Twitter and blasted the Biden administration for the new policy. Rubio thinks the cut in monoclonal antibodies to Florida is because the state is not "handling vaccines and not forcing people to do it." "This is ridiculous. This is outrageous," Rubio said in a video on Twitter. "People see it for what it is. These people are completely out of control. This stuff needs to stop. These people are bordering on tyranny." On Sept. 16, Christina Pushaw, press secretary for DeSantis, said that Florida clinics and private providers have been ordering about 72,000 doses of monoclonal antibody treatment per week; about 36,000 doses are required weekly to supply the 25 state-sponsored sites. The HHS website calculated that, nationally, a little over 158,500 doses were available this week. HHS reports that nearly 31,000 are allocated to Florida. Rubio said he thinks the Biden administration is creating a shortage for the purposes of rationing the drug. "There is not a shortage," Rubio said on Twitter. "But they've decided they're going to start rationing it."

# Thousands of Illegal Immigrants Amass Under Bridge in Texas

DEL RIO, Texas—Thousands of illegal immigrants, mostly from Haiti, are congregating under an international bridge in Texas while they wait to be processed by Border Patrol.

The illegal immigrants are spread out over a dirt lot strewn with litter, many sitting or lying on blankets. Others stand, chatting with companions.

Some 9,000 illegal immigrants, including Haitian, Cuban, and Venezuelan nationals, are in the area, Val Verde County Sheriff Joe Frank Martinez confirmed at 3:45 p.m. local time on Sept. 16.

Five hundred more had arrived within the previous half-hour as the sheriff and the mayor of Del Rio, Texas, held a press conference near the bridge—almost within sight of the Rio Grande, which serves as the international border with Mexico.

The number has skyrocketed in less a week, from only a couple of hundred under the bridge on Sept. 9.

Mayor Bruno Lozano confirmed that another 20,000 are on their way. “I’m deeply frustrated. The thing that I worry about is a stampede. The thing I worry about is terrorism,” Lozano said.

“This is not secure. This is not defensible,” he said, looking toward the wide open border and the number of people walking back and forth across it.

“We don’t really know who they are.”

Texas Gov. Greg Abbott said that he has directed the Texas Department of Public Safety and the Texas National Guard to “maintain their presence at and around ports of entry to deter crossings,” although it’s unclear how effective that will be in reducing numbers.

“The Biden Administration is in complete disarray and is handling the border crisis as badly as the evacuation from Afghanistan,” Abbott said in a statement Sept. 16.

Lozano said his city’s medical services are stretched thin. An illegal immigrant woman was rushed to hospital on Sept. 15 to give birth. On Sept. 16, The Epoch Times witnessed Border Patrol loading a woman into an ambulance.

Lozano blamed the Biden admin-

istration, particularly Vice President Kamala Harris, for not focusing on the U.S.–Mexico border, especially the smaller cities being affected, such as Del Rio. The number of illegal aliens currently under the bridge is almost one-third of the population of the city.

“We’re ignored. They’re prioritizing urban centers,” he said.

Sheriff Martinez confirmed that the illegal immigrants aren’t being tested for COVID-19.

“None of them are being tested for anything,” he said.

Law enforcement is adding more portable toilets under the bridge every day and drinking water stations are provided.

The illegal immigrants cross the river frequently to go back to Mexico for food and supplies.

Lozano said the system is so overwhelmed that it will likely take Border Patrol two weeks to transport the current 9,000 illegal aliens to Border Patrol facilities and process them. Those who are released often get dropped at the local Stripes gas station in Del Rio, where they wait for a bus to San Antonio.

It isn’t clear why the bulk of the Haitians cross into Del Rio, though migration patterns show that people from certain countries have favored routes into the United States.

CBP didn’t answer the phone or return voicemails or an email on Sept. 16 as the number of illegal immigrants continued to swell. No CBP represen-

tative spoke at the press conference.

“It’s completely predictable because Biden is basically inviting in illegal immigrants,” Mark Krikorian, executive director of the Center for Immigration Studies, a nonpartisan think tank that advocates for a pro-immigrant, low-immigration system, told The Epoch Times.

“This just seems to be an extreme example of what we’ve been seeing since Jan. 20, which is illegal immigrants, taking Biden up on his offer that if they manage to get into the United States, they’ll be let go.”

President Joe Biden, upon entering office, quickly overhauled the U.S. immigration system, ending construction on the border wall as well as a program that forced many asylum-seekers to wait in Mexico.

Biden administration officials also stopped using the federal government’s Title 42 authority, which was established during the COVID-19 pandemic, to expel unaccompanied minors, or illegal immigrant children.

The use of Title 42 has dropped in recent months as Democrats pressure Biden to end the authority. Officials applied it to just 44 percent of the illegal immigrant encounters in August.

The decline in federal immigration enforcement has prompted Texas authorities to fill the void. State and local law enforcement have ramped up enforcement of illegal immigrants, including in Del Rio, where the mayor has pleaded with Biden to stop releasing illegal immigrants as local condi-

tions deteriorate.

Crossing the border into the United States without proper papers is illegal, but after entering, an illegal immigrant can claim asylum, or fear of persecution if they are returned to their home country. If they do, they are often released into the United States. If they don’t, they are processed under Title 8, or federal law, typically getting a court date or told to appear at an Immigration and Customs Enforcement Office on a certain day. Most don’t end up appearing.

The CBP spokesperson told The Epoch Times that “the vast majority of single adults and many families will continue to be expelled under the CDC’s Title 42 authority, and those who cannot be expelled under Title 42 and do not have a legal basis to remain will be processed under Title 8 authorities.”

There are indications that a number of single adults are being allowed to remain in the country, particularly foreign nationals whose nations have been granted a special type of protection called Temporary Protected Status by U.S. authorities.

One Haitian man, a single male who crossed with some 350 other illegal immigrants to Del Rio from Mexico in July, spoke to The Epoch Times after entering the United States. About a month later, he texted to say he’d made it to Boston and was fine.

A Cuban man in his late-20s, Eduardo, told The Epoch Times this week at a gas station in Del Rio that he was

waiting to be picked up by his parents, who live in Houston. He said he traveled from Panama through Central America before making it through Mexico to reach Del Rio, walking most of the time.

“There’s no freedom in Cuba,” said Eduardo, who had been dropped at the gas station by Border Patrol.

The United States recorded more than 208,000 illegal immigrant arrests at the border in August, one of the highest months on record. Under the Biden administration, the country is on pace to set records for the highest number of fiscal year and calendar year encounters.

The administration would have known about the large groups of immigrants that are now in Del Rio, Jaeson Jones, CEO of Omni Intelligence, told The Epoch Times.

U.S. intelligence programs monitor Central America to detect large groups forming, said Jones, a former Texas Department of Public Safety intelligence and counterterrorism captain, who worked closely with Border Patrol.

“No one in the federal government has acknowledged what was coming, stated that this was happening, nor did they do anything to mitigate it, because this should have been stopped. This is a large caravan of people that wasn’t stopped,” he said.

“To me, this just is more validation of the level of failure of leadership within the current administration.”

## Los Angeles County to Mandate COVID-19 Vaccine Passports: Officials

Los Angeles County, the most populous county in the United States, announced on Sept. 15 it would require proof of COVID-19 vaccination at bars, nightclubs, breweries, lounges, and related businesses.

The order will also require vaccine proof or a negative COVID-19 test for large outdoor events, including Los Angeles Rams, Chargers, and Dodgers games, said County Public Health Director Dr. Barbara Ferrer to the Board of Supervisors. Would-be customers will have to have at least one vaccine dose by Oct. 7 and be fully vaccinated by Nov. 4, she said.

“This is a reasonable path forward that will position us to be better able to break the cycle of surges,” Ferrer told the board. “This modified health officer order aligns with the continued need to reduce risk of

transmission and increase vaccination coverage.”

Los Angeles officials, she said, now believe that vaccine passport systems “are now a very important strategy for quickly raising vaccination coverage across our county and ending the pandemic.”

Other than Los Angeles, New York

City on Sept. 13 officially implemented its vaccine passport system for restaurants, bars, gyms, and other facilities. Businesses that don’t comply or violate the city ordinances can face fines, said New York City Mayor Bill de Blasio.

In California, San Francisco in August also rolled out a vaccine passport mandate for similar establishments. Provinces in Canada as well as France, Switzerland, Israel, and a number of other countries have mandated that people show proof of vaccination to enter restaurants, gyms, bars, and related businesses, which has drawn protests in Europe.

Thousands of protesters took to the streets of New York City on Sept. 13, calling for the city to end its mandate.

“You should have a right to choose whatever you do with your body,” Ricardo Alexander, a public school math and physics teacher, told the rally.

While officials who endorse vaccine passports say they are necessary to reduce the spread of COVID-19, the disease caused by the CCP (Chinese Communist Party) virus, questions have been raised about whether such systems would be discriminatory.

Some Republican governors, including Florida Gov. Ron DeSantis, have signed bills or issued orders to prohibit businesses or local governments from using vaccine passes.

The Electronic Freedom Foundation nonprofit, in a lengthy post last month, stated that government officials around the world have made grave errors when rolling out passport systems, noting that “imposing such systems on the world will lock out hundreds of millions of people” from key services, including travel and obtaining visas.

“These new trust-based systems,

if implemented in a way that automatically disqualifies people who received genuine vaccinations, will cause dire effects for years to come. It sets up a world where certain people can move about easily, and those who have already had a hard time with visas will experience another wall to climb,” the foundation stated.
