June 14 Flag Day

"The flag of the United States be 13 alternate stripes red and white, that the Union be 13 stars, white in a blue field, representing a new Constellation." This resolution by John Adams was adopted by the Continental Congress on June 14, 1777, placing our nation's banner in the spotlight as a respected symbol. As new states gained independence and entered the United States, the number of stars and stripes increased. However, in 1818, Congress enacted a law to restore the original 13 stripes and only include additional stars to symbolize incoming states. A century after enacting the Flag Resolution, the first Flag Day was observed on June 14, 1877. While Woodrow Wilson proclaimed a day of recognition for the banner in 1916, it wasn't until 1949 when regulators officially designated June 14 as Flag Day, a national day of observance.

MANSON - I'm very sure our veterans looking down from Heaven this Memorial Day were extremely pleased and proud to be part of Manson's Memorial Day celebration held at the American Legion Park in Manson on May 31, sponsored by the American Legion, Post 108.

Prior to the ceremony, Manson Fire Chief Arnold Baker brought Manson's new fire truck, Tower 51 and deployed it on main street, raising a huge 20'x30' American flag (purchased by the Manson Firefighters Association), 75 feet off the ground, overlooking the crowd. The weather was perfect, warm temperatures, a light breeze displaying the flag in all its glory! It was an amazing backdrop for what was to follow.

The Lake Chelan Patriotic Singers, under the direction of Steve Davis, inspired those in attendance with several patriotic songs starting at 10:45 a.m. The last song, "God Bless American" sounded like a mighty choir as the crowd joined in raising their voices.

At 11 a.m. sharp, Vice Commander Brian Strausbaugh opened the ceremony with beautiful words recognizing why we were there, to honor those individuals that paid the ultimate price, their life while serving our country. After the opening prayer by American Legion member Dana Starkweather, the Colors were ordered to be brought forward by Vice Commander Strausbaugh. Next a wreath was moved in front of the monument and 30 seconds of silence was ordered. At the same time two Manson High School students, Jonathan Sarmiento and Rex Torgesen,



played "Echo Taps" on their trumpets. Their rendition was amazing and there were many positive comments. Post 108's Adjutant, Carole Hansen shared the meaning of the red, white and blue colors on our American flag.

Vice Commander Strausbaugh introduce our guest speaker, Congresswoman Kim Schrier. Doctor Schrier represents Washington's 8th Congressional District, which includes much of King, Pierce, Kittitas, and Chelan Counties, and portions of Douglas County. She talked about our incredible veterans and her commitment to supporting veterans in Congress.

Colors were retired and a closing prayer ended the official ceremony. Congresswoman Schrier then presented a Vietnam Veteran Lapel Pin to all

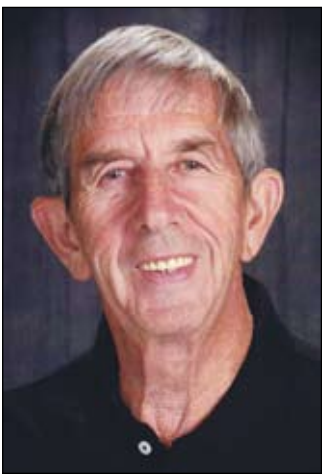

Richard N. (Dick) Goodman

Richard N. Goodman, 84, died May 25, 2021 following an extended illness. He was born March 12, 1937 in Milton-Freewater, Oregon, the youngest son of Linn and Lucille Goodman.
Dick graduated from Oroville High School in 1955 and served as Student Body President that year. He married his high school sweetheart, Wilma Stewart, in that same year. Dick and Wilma lived and worked in Oroville, Wash-

ington, until they moved to Wenatchee where Dick attended Wenatchee Valley College (WVC). After two years at WVC they took their three small children to Seattle where Dick attended Seattle Pacific University, graduating in 1965 with a teaching certificate. Dick began his long teaching career in Coulee City, Washington and continued it with tenures in Oroville, Chelan, Washington, and Wenatchee. Over his decades of teaching, he touched the lives of thousands of students. He was famous for his field trips, annual chick-hatching project and shop classes.
In 1973, Dick bought a muffler shop and gas station on South Wenatchee Avenue, Dick's Exhaust, which he ran for 17 years before he sold it and returned to teaching, his first love.

Wilma passed away in 1983, making Dick a young widower. In 1984 he met Janice McCaffery. They married in 1985 and Dick embarked on helping to raise his second family. Dick and Janice and her two children lived in Wenatchee and Chelan, where they owned a successful bed and breakfast.
Dick and Janice spent their years together as avid high school sports fans and surrounded by a large group of friends. They were long-time members of the Free Methodist Church.
Janice passed away in 2015, making Dick a twice-over widower, but having had the great fortune to have married

two remarkable women.
Dick was a simple, humble man who loved his family, his friends and his Lord. He was a voracious reader, loved travel and exploration, and every kind of sport. He loved meeting new people and embraced their cultures, religions and opinions. He never had a harsh word for anyone. He could build a house and rebuild a carburetor. He could make a skateboard or an ice-sailing racer. He only bought one new car in his life because he knew he could keep it running forever.
In addition to his parents, he was predeceased by four brothers, one infant sister, wives Wilma Goodman and

Janice Goodman, and grandson Brandon Goodman.
He is survived by children and stepchildren Tim Goodman (Stacy) of Issaquah, Washington, Jan Hamblen (Tim) of Marysville, Washington, Jon Goodman (Cathy) of Redmond, Washington, Janelle Carlson of Wenatchee, and Jeff Carlson (Megan) of Cashmere, Washington. He leaves behind 16 grandchildren and 22 great-grandchildren.

Link fare-free service will continue

WENATCHEE - Link Transit will continue to operate all routes fare-free through at least June 2022, with the Link Board approving a pilot project at its May meeting.
The policy is intended to help attract riders back to the system, which has seen about a 25-30 percent drop in boardings since the COVID-19 pandemic began in March of 2020. Fares were suspended for all services at that time. Link has been operating several routes fare-free for a number of years. These routes account for a larger percentage of riders than routes that are not fare-free. "The three high-frequency routes we operate in the Wenatchee and East Wenatchee area typically carry about 35-40% of our total passenger counts" said Richard DeRock, Link Transit General Manager.
A number of other transit sys-

tems nationwide have recently moved towards a fare-free model, with Intercity Transit in Olympia, Washington and Kansas City, Missouri being two of the larger systems that are partially or completely fare free.
"No-cost public transportation allows everyone to access opportunities for employment, education, and medical care - which lead to better quality of life and, therefore, better health for our community", said DeRock.
Link Transit began operation in December 1991 as a fare-free system. This changed in February 2000, with the passage of Initiative 695 the prior November, and the loss of nearly 45% of funding. Fares were implemented to help retain a small portion of the service that would have been otherwise cut. Since that time, fares have been increased three times. Since 2001, annual ridership has

increased from less than 500,000 to nearly 1 million boardings (pre-pandemic).
Over the past 21 years, fares have accounted for from 3 to 6% of Link's total operating revenue. Small transit systems rarely collect in excess of 10% of their revenue from fares.
Link receives 70 - 75% of its funding through voter-approved sales tax. This initial tax was approved in September 1990 at a rate of 4/10 of 1%; and was increased in January 2020 by another 1/10 of 1% with the passage of Proposition 1 in August 2019. Beginning in January 2022, an additional 1/10 of 1% will be collected. The remainder of Link's funding comes through a variety of state and Federal grant programs, with some smaller sources being interest income and leases. Sales tax is the primary funding source for most transit systems in Washington State.

THE WASHINGTON OUTDOOR REPORT

By John Kruse, The Washington Outdoors Report

June offers lots of low-cost opportunities to fish and play on our public lands. Here's a roundup of what's available.

FREE FISHING AND PARKS PLAY - June 12th and 13th are free fishing days in Washington State where no license is required to wet a line. These are also days where no Discover Pass is required to visit a Washington State Park for the day and several state parks offer excellent fishing to include Alta Lake and Pearygin State Parks in Okanogan County, Curlew Lake State Park in Ferry County, Maryhill State Park in Klickitat County, Sun Lakes State Park south of Coulee City and Potholes State Park at Potholes Reservoir. An additional free day to visit a Washington State Park will take place June 19th, in honor of the newly approved state holiday, Juneteenth. This is the day the Emancipation Proclamation was read and enacted for black slaves in Texas in 1865, the last state to end slavery in the United States at the close of the Civil War.

BANKS LAKE WALLEYE FISHING IS HOT - Two friends, Brett Bostwick and Galen Presler, fishing two different parts of Banks Lake over the last week, had great success catching walleye. Both got limits of fish with the average walleye measuring 18 inches. There were bigger ones too. One walleye

caught weighed over nine pounds. One boat was fishing the lower end of the lake near Coulee City while the other was fishing near Steamboat Rock. Their shared secret to success? A Mack's Smile Blade Spindrift Walleye Rig featuring a Smile Blade and a Slow Death Hook that rotates the nightcrawler you thread onto it.

PLANNED FISH KILLS - The Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife will be holding an online meeting on Wednesday the 9th from 6 to 7 p.m. to discuss plans to use rotenone to kill undesirable fish. The waters where this may occur include Schalow Pond and Fish Lake in Okanogan County. Fish Lake has been a long time favorite for trout anglers but someone illegally introduced brown bullhead into the lake a few years ago. According to Kenneth Behen, the WDFW Warmwater Fish Program Manager, "These fish compete with and sometimes prey on stocked trout fry, rendering our trout stocking efforts ineffective."

The other proposed waterway for rotenone use is Flume Creek, northeast of Metaline Falls. Brook trout are found here, a non-native species, and biologists hope to restore native westslope cutthroat trout here after the brook trout are removed.

make the meeting, you can submit written comments to the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife until June 22nd.

CATCH AND KEEP STURGEON FISHING OPENS ON LAKE ROOSEVELT - The opportunity to actually harvest a white sturgeon is becoming increasingly rare in the Pacific Northwest but from June 12 until further notice you are allowed to keep one sturgeon a day (with an annual limit of two sturgeon) while fishing from Grand Coulee Dam to the China Bend Boat Ramp on Lake Roosevelt. You can also fish the Spokane River from the Highway 25 bridge upstream to 400-feet below Little Falls Dam, the Colville River upstream to Meyers

Fall Dam and the Kettle River upstream to Barstow Bridge.

The sturgeon must measure between 50 inches and 63 inches from the nose to the fork of the tail. The reason for this unique fishery is these sturgeon were reared in hatcheries in British Columbia and Washington and several thousand were released into the reservoir every year between 2001 and 2010. The survival rate of these fish has been much higher than anticipated, resulting in a fishery that anglers can enjoy this summer.

AMBER LAKE CLEAN UP - The Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife reports volunteers from the Spokane Fly Fishers and

Inland Empire Fly Fishing Club spruced up and spread gravel at the Amber Lake Access Area in Spokane County

last month and paid for the improvements out of their own funds.

Chris Donley, the regional fish program manager for WDFW said the agency is "Extremely grateful to these groups and volunteers for their willingness to spend their time and funds to make the fishing experience better for everyone," Amber Lake is a very popular spring, summer, and fall fly fishing lake, so the fact that members are willing to come out on a Monday - possibly taking time off to do so - to help minimize impact to the public is pretty impressive."

Amber Lake is located 12 miles southwest of Cheney. It's known for rainbow and cutthroat trout that range in size from 12 to 20+ inches.

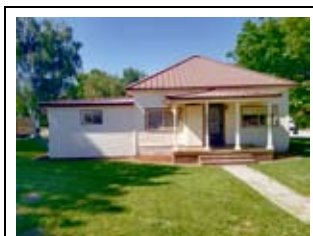

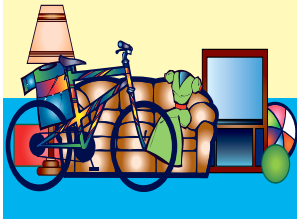

Pompeo Confirms Intense Opposition to Wuhan Lab Probe From State Department, Intelligence Bureaucracies

Former Secretary of State Mike Pompeo confirmed to The Epoch Times on June 3 that his efforts to get to the bottom of how the CCP virus—also known as the novel coronavirus—spread from China to the United States met with sustained opposition within the U.S. government.

[Officials] were explicitly told by colleagues not to explore the Wuhan Institute of Virology's gain-of-function research.

Asked about revelations in a June 3 Vanity Fair report that key officials deep within the State Department sought to keep the public from knowing that U.S. funds had supported gain-of-function research at China's Wuhan Institute of Virology (WIV), Pompeo described a "contentious battle." That research, which focused on techniques for reconfiguring naturally occurring viruses to make them more virulent and transmissible to humans, was partially funded as far back as 2012 with U.S. tax dollars through the National Institutes

of Health and a nonprofit foundation known as the EcoHealth Alliance.

The Vanity Fair analysis "found that conflicts of interest, stemming in part from large government grants supporting controversial virology research, hampered the U.S. investigation into COVID-19's origin at every step."

"In one State Department meeting, officials seeking to demand transparency from the Chinese government say they were explicitly told by colleagues not to explore the Wuhan Institute of Virology's gain-of-function research, because it would bring unwelcome attention to U.S. government funding of it," the article reads.

China has insisted since the virus first appeared in late 2019 that it had spread from bats to humans via an open-air meat market in Wuhan. Some government and public health officials, private sector scientists, and investigative journalists, however, have said since early in 2020 that there's substantial evidence that the virus spread somehow from the WIV.

Then-President Donald Trump and Pompeo, as well as Sen. Tom Cotton (R-Ark.), publicly noted the existence of such evidence in April 2020 and called on Chinese officials to allow independent investigators to access the WIV and its records. China refused to do so.

After the November 2020 election, Pompeo pushed

within the State Department and the Trump administration for public release of as much evidence as possible.

He issued a Jan. 15 statement that includes a significant disclosure, that WIV researchers appeared to have suffered virus symptoms months before the disease spread throughout China and to other countries, including the United States.

The statement also notes the gain-of-function research taking place at WIV and asks whether U.S. funding may have been diverted to secret Chinese military projects at the WIV.

But even getting that statement out was a struggle, Pompeo told The Epoch Times on June 3.

"I became aware at the end of 2020 that we now had an increased level of confidence in the datapoints that supported what we put out in the middle of January. The clock was clearly running, and I was fighting very hard inside the State Department and even more broadly," he said.

A major roadblock was the fact that significant portions of the evidence were held by intelligence agencies that opposed their public release.

"There were places outside of the State Department that owned the dataset inside the intelligence community, so we were banging away to get them to give us as much space to write as much as we possi-

bly could," Pompeo said.

"We were drafting language that protected classified things that needed to be protected but we wanted to make sure that we got this information out in the public space."

The former secretary of state said he viewed it as important at the time, and continues today to say that the American people should know all the facts, and the Chinese government should be held accountable if the virus did escape from the WIV.

"There were two reasons for that. One, it was a matter of transparency and, two, we

wanted the Chinese Communist Party to have to explain what we knew as well, so we had a very high degree of certainty around what we did," Pompeo said. "The statement was very carefully crafted, but it is unambiguous about what it said."

A former senior State Department official with direct knowledge of these matters, who spoke on background, told The Epoch Times that Pompeo made clear to everybody involved in the State Department's investigation of the source of the virus that they were to pursue facts wherever they led.

When told of internal opposition to the effort, the former senior official said that Pompeo responded with a salty aphorism reflective of his Army career.

"He said, 'Screw them and tell them the secretary of state said do it.' And he also said something that's very, very important. He said: 'I don't care what conclusion you guys dig out. It may be something we like to hear, politically, or something we don't like to hear, but I want the truth.' That was exactly the attitude throughout the whole investigation this group was doing."

Biden Orders Ban on 59 Chinese Defense and Tech Firms

WASHINGTON—President Joe Biden signed an executive order on June 3, amending a Trump-era ban that prohibits U.S. investors from investing in Chinese military companies. The new order expands the previous prohibition list by adding more Chinese defense and surveillance technology firms.

The order also moves the authority of selecting targeted companies to the Treasury Department from the Defense Department.

Biden's order expands the scope of the national emergency declared by then-President Donald Trump last year and bans more companies involved in "the development or use of Chinese surveillance technology to facilitate repression or serious human rights abuse."

The order "prohibits United States persons from engaging in the purchase or sale of any publicly traded securities" of 59 entities listed in the annex of the executive order.

Blacklisted companies include telecoms equipment maker Huawei, video surveillance manufacturer Hikvision, aerospace firm Aviation Industry Corp. of China, and state-run mobile operators China Mobile and China Telecom.

The Treasury Department will continue to update the list

of these Chinese entities. The selection will be determined by the Treasury secretary in consultation with the secretary of state and, if deemed appropriate, the Defense secretary, according to a White House factsheet.

The ban list doesn't mention subsidiaries of these companies as the list is "intentionally targeted and scoped," according to the factsheet.

The Trump administration targeted 44 Chinese military companies and intended to include publicly traded subsidiaries that were "50 percent or more owned" or "determined to be controlled" by those companies.

The new order, however, shrinks the scope of the ban by excluding subsidiaries.

The investment prohibitions will take effect on Aug. 2, but investors are permitted to make trades to divest their holding until June 3, 2022.

Sen. Marco Rubio (R-Fla.) raised concerns about Biden's move to shift the authority to the Treasury Department. "We know for a fact that Wall Street is helping to finance the Chinese Communist Party's effort to weaken and ultimately replace American leadership," Rubio said in a statement.

"While the administration updated the Trump-era policy in important ways, I am very concerned that President Biden's Treasury Department is too closely aligned with Wall

Street to take the actions necessary to prevent American savings from being used to fund the Chinese Communist Party."

In his final weeks in office, Trump took swift action to ban investments in Chinese military companies, in an effort to curb Beijing's access to lucrative U.S. capital markets.

Trump's order aimed to curb U.S. pension and retirement fund investments in companies that support the Chinese Communist Party (CCP). Many of these companies are publicly traded on stock exchanges around the world and are tracked by major indexes such as MSCI and FTSE.

The American Securities Association (ASA), which represents regional Main Street financial services companies, welcomed the new executive order.

"ASA strongly supports today's action by the Biden Administration to prioritize America's economic and national security interests by continuing the previous Administration's crackdown on Communist China's infiltration of the U.S. capital markets," ASA CEO Chris Iacovella said in a statement.

"For far too long, the CCP has taken advantage of regulatory loopholes to fund its military rise, a cyber army that attacks us, 're-education camps' used to perpetrate crimes against humanity on its own citizens, the use of slave labor in violation of international law, and its new position as the world's leading polluter."



Google Reassigns Diversity Staffer Who Said Jews Have 'Insatiable Appetite for War and Killing'

Google has reassigned a top diversity officer after critics noted he wrote years ago that Jews have an "insatiable appetite for war and killing," the company said on June 2.

Kamau Bobb has been removed from Google's diversity team, a spokesperson told The Epoch Times in an email. Bobb was the company's global lead for diversity strategy and research.

Roughly a decade before joining Google in 2018, Bobb wrote on his blog about how he would feel if he were Jewish.

"If I were a Jew I would be concerned about my insatiable appetite for war and killing in defense of myself," he wrote. "Self-defense is undoubtedly an instinct, but I would be afraid of my increasing insensitivity to the suffering [of] others."

Bobb reportedly sent an apology letter to colleagues at Google, writing in part: "What was intended as a critique of particular military action fed into anti-Semitic tropes and prejudice. I think we can all agree, there is no easy solution to this situation. But that's beside the point. The way I expressed my views on that conflict [was] hurtful."

Jewish groups had called for

Bobb's firing.

"Google must fire this anti-Semite," the Simon Wiesenthal Center, a Jewish human rights group, said in a tweet.

The Coalition of Jewish Values wrote to Google CEO Sundar Pichai to urge him to immediately replace Bobb, indicating an apology was not sufficient.

Yaakov Menken, managing director of the coalition, told The Epoch Times that people can change their views, and perhaps the uproar over the old remarks could lead to a change in Bobb.

"We definitely believe people can change their views, and maybe this is waking him up to the fact that he imbibed anti-Semitic poison and that can be cured. But having him in a research position places him where he can do very little harm; being diversity lead was in a position where he could do tremendous damage to the very fabric, the very ideal of diversity," he said.

Google's spokesperson told The Epoch Times that company officials "unequivocally condemn the past writings by a member of our diversity team that are causing deep offense and pain to members of our Jewish community."

"These writings are unquestionably hurtful. The author acknowledges this and has apologized. He will no longer be part of our diversity team going forward and will focus on his STEM work," the spokesperson said.

"This has come at a time where we've seen an alarming increase in anti-Semitic attacks. Anti-Semitism is a vile prejudice that has given rise to unfathomable acts. It has no place in society and we stand with our Jewish community in condemning it."
