Simply download the American Red Cross Blood Donor App, visit [RedCrossBlood.org](http://RedCrossBlood.org), call 1-800-RED CROSS (1-800-733-2767) or enable the Blood Donor Skill on any Alexa Echo device to make an appointment or for more information. All blood types are needed to ensure a reliable supply for patients. A blood donor card or driver's license or two other forms of identification are required at check-in. Individuals who are 17 years of age in most states (16 with parental consent where allowed by state law), weigh at least 110 pounds and are in generally good health may be eligible to donate blood. High school students and other donors 18 years of age and younger also have to meet certain height and weight requirements.

Blood and platelet donors can save time at their next donation by using RapidPass® to complete their pre-donation reading and health history questionnaire online, on the day of their donation, before arriving at the blood drive. ## Legislature passes affordable housing legislation

OLYMPIA - District 12 Senator Brad Hawkins and 12 other Republican senators voted against the bill HB 1070 meant to give more flexibility to local housing agencies and cities wanting to use local tax revenues to build or encourage affordable housing. They lost.

House Bill 1070 modifies allowed uses of local tax revenue for affordable housing and related services to include the acquisition and construction of affordable housing and facilities.

These GOP senators voted no: Brown, Dozier, Ericksen, Hawkins, Honeyford, McCune, Muzzall, Padden, Schoesler, Wagoner, Warnick, Wilson, J, and Wilson, L.

State Senator for District 12, Brad Hawkins, had this to say exclusively to NCW Media, "House Bill 1070 was approved by the House of Representa-

tives by a vote of 56 to 42 and the Senate by a vote of 36 to 13. I voted "no" in the Senate. My understanding is that the bill expands a law approved a couple years ago related to city council or community votes on a local sales taxes for affordable housing services," Hawkins said.

"While I'm opposed to many taxes, I do respect a

community's decision about its own local taxes and acknowledge the growing challenges in our state related to affordable housing. However, this bill expands the use of the original tax without requiring a local vote for those expanded purposes. The bill, for example, would add facilities providing housing-related services, mental-

health facilities, buildings acquisitions, and land purchases. Much of the bill actually pertains to counties with a population of at least 1.5 million, so many sections do not impact our counties in North Central Washington," said Hawkins.

"I do find it both ironic and sad that the state government continues to add regulations on land use, expand building codes, and mandate certain wage increases and then characterizes rising housing costs as a crisis. Housing costs are a result of many factors, but much of it is government's own doing. As we prepare to pull out of this COVID pandemic - due to government's past and ongoing closures of the economy - many hotels and business entities are essentially out of business. This bill would allow government

## Chelan's Emerson Village ribbon cutting scheduled for April 17

CHELAN — The Chelan Valley Housing Trust invites the community to attend a ribbon cutting ceremony for Emerson Village from 10 a.m. until noon on Saturday, April 17, to celebrate the sell-out of CVHT's first attainable home community, located at 305 North Emerson Street.

"The completion of Emerson Village is our first tangible step to provide affordable homes for our locals and support a stable workforce," begins CVHT Executive Director Mike Cooney. "Through the generosity of our community - private donors, local businesses, the Chelan Chamber of Commerce and grants from the city and county - we made this happen."

"Our ribbon cutting ceremony is a huge thank you to all the donors who helped us raise \$170,000 and to the volunteers that put in countless hours to make the dream of owning a home in the Chelan Valley a reality for local wage earners," said Cooney, former Chelan mayor.

Funded by a \$1 million construction loan from North Cascades Bank, Emerson Village was built by K&L Homes of Chelan.

According to Rachael Goldie, the trust's Executive Administrator, each of the five townhomes of Emerson Village is being purchased by a local Chelan wage earner who met the income qualification of earning up to, or slightly more than, the valley's average median income of \$52,000. The purchase price for each home was \$200,000.

"The need for attainable housing in our valley has never been higher," says Goldie.

"We helped over 80 potential buyers go through the process of filing out home buyer applications. We look forward to helping those who did not receive a home at Emerson Village to qualify for a home in our next attainable home community."

Planning has already begun on the next CVHT community project. Attendees to the ribbon cutting ceremony can view the preliminary design for this 9-acre property on Anderson Road. "While Emerson Village is a milestone, it is just the beginning," says CVHT President Tim Hollingsworth. "We learned a great deal going through the building of our first community and now that we've gotten our feet wet, we are ready to take on a much larger build on a truly

beautiful piece of property, which will bring another 35 to 40 attainable homes to the valley."

Key community leaders will participate in the Emerson Village ceremonial ribbon cutting and the trust's board members will be on hand to answer questions and give tours of one of the 2-bedroom 1.5-bath townhomes. All attendees are invited to participate in a champagne (or apple cider) toast on the common gathering area of the townhome community.

"We're providing homes for five local families today," remarked Cooney. "We're also helping 35 additional families own these homes over the next five decades because, on average, our buyers today will hold onto these homes for

seven years and then make them available to new buyers in the future."

As Emerson Village follows the land trust model - whereby the trust retains ownership of the land - each home is kept affordable into perpetuity. While this model has an income equity cap, that equity along with the savings from rental fees helps CVHT homebuyers afford a market rate home in the future.

As Goldie explains, "After only five years of ownership at Emerson Village, the home equity gain and not having to dish out apartment rent each month, puts roughly \$40,000 in our owner's pocket when they sell their home to the next CVHT buyer. When you are making \$52,000 a year, that means a whole lot."

# Should the election threshold change for passage of school bond tax votes?

The Washington State Constitution states that education is its paramount duty (Article IX, Sec 1). As a result, education policy and taxes have always been of significant importance in our state. You may remember that the Washington State Supreme Court issued its McCleary Decision on education funding in 2012.

This was a landmark case that required the state to significantly increase its funding for K-12 education. In response, over several budget cycles, the Legislature took steps to address this decision and the high court determined the funding had been achieved in 2018 and closed the case.

How are public schools funded and administered?

The Supreme Court's McCleary decision on education funding has significantly influenced Washington state's school funding, but the court's decision has largely overshadowed the important role that school districts play in developing local priorities, approving annual budgets, and managing their operations. School districts are actually local governments, not state agencies.

They are governed by their own locally elected school boards, and their districts are

administered by their own superintendents. Washington state has 295 school districts, each with unique needs and varied priorities. Districts receive the majority of their funds from state dollars on a per-student basis along with local and federal funds.

The 295 different school districts across the state collect revenues, develop local priorities, and administer their budgets. School districts should prudently invest their taxpayer dollars (local, state, and federal) to implement their programs, negotiate sustainable contracts with their employees, and manage their operations.

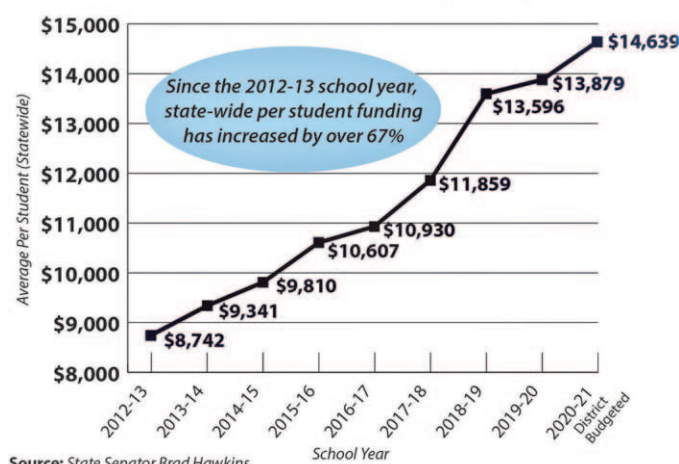
State funding to school districts is based on a "general apportionment" formula in accordance with an approved "prototypical" funding model.

The funding can vary slightly based on the characteristics of the district's student population, but it is largely based on overall enrollment. Additionally, school districts have the option of seeking local tax authorization and tax increases to supplement their federal and state funding.

These funds are in the form of "local levy dollars" authorized by a community vote and paid out of your local property tax dollars. The amount of levy

funds sought can vary greatly by school district, which also results in some variations of per-student funding levels, once all sources of funds (local, state, and federal) are combined by the districts.

Overall, the per-student funding in Washington state has significantly increased. After the state's significantly increased funding for K-12 education was finalized, I voted to cap how much school districts could request in their local levies. Unfortunately, the cap that the Legislature put in place during the McCleary reforms was lifted just a couple years later, allowing school districts to seek even more local property tax increases.

However, despite school districts requesting more funding in their levies, most communities have consistently supported the tax increases with at least 50 percent voter approval.

How are school facilities funded?

School districts seek local levies to supplement their operating costs. These day-to-day costs of operating a school district include staffing, utilities, supplies, food services, and transportation fuel. Local levies are short-term taxes, lasting up to four years, and require 50 percent voter support for approval.

For building construction and major renovations, schools

seek community voter approval for issuing bonds, which are long-term obligations. These proposals involve longer-term property tax impacts because bonds are paid back to investors over time (with interest) and could include a 25-year payback schedule.

As such, there is a higher threshold of 60 percent voter support required for approval. For the school districts that receive community support for school construction, the state provides additional support to match a portion or all of those funds through the state capital budget's School Construction and Assistance Program.

While both school levies (for learning) and school bonds (for buildings) include a community vote and a property tax impact for the approving communities, the thresholds for approval are different as school levy proposals require 50% voter approval and school bond proposals require 60 percent voter approval.

Legislature considers reducing voter approval for bonds

In recent years, some school advocates have sought to reduce the existing 60 percent approval threshold for school construction bonds to a 50 percent simple majority. In 2007, before my service began in the

Legislature, the state reduced school levy approval from 60 percent to 50 percent where it still stands today.

The effort to do the same for school construction bonds has been active for at least the past few years. In order to make this change, since it would involve altering a provision in the Washington Constitution, both the House and Senate would need to approve the legislation by a two-thirds vote and then the measure must receive a state-wide voter approval of at least 50 percent.

During my service in the Senate a few years ago, the simple majority school bond measure came to the Senate floor but failed to garner the two-thirds approval needed to pass the Senate and move to the House of Representatives. There are two bills this year related to this issue. Senate Bill 5386 would lower the threshold for school bond votes from 60 percent to 55 percent, and House Bill 1226 would lower the threshold from 60 percent to 50 percent. If not approved this year, both bills will be eligible next session.

to expand use of a tax to purchase those same buildings," Hawkins said.

"These buildings that some mental-health and housing advocates want government to purchase once contained thriving businesses prior to the government's shutdown. "There is something about that approach – government benefiting from the misfortune of businesses at no fault of the businesses – that does not seem right. It also does not seem right to implement a tax under one set of conditions and then expand or adjust it without a public vote, but government does that all the time," he said.

"At some point, the tax burden on families is simply going to be too much.

I would be remiss if I did not emphasize the many tools the Legislature has provided to local governments and community organizations to help assist with local affordable housing challenges. The descriptions of the existing programs and the local flexibility available spans multiple pages," Hawkins said.

"Local governments also have the bonding authority to raise substantial funds for affordable housing, but many local governments are unwilling to put those requests to a public vote. Therefore, I support the existing laws – many of which have been approved in recent

years. I hope communities can make good use of that authority to meet their local needs," concluded Hawkins.

Former Chelan Mayor Mike Cooney had this to say about House Bill 1070, which the State Senate Passed 36 to 13, mostly on partisan lines.

"I have been following "housing bills" this session and favor this use of local sales tax for affordable housing."

He continued, "Certain communities are very desirable to live in or own a second home. The result of this influx puts the "locals" in a tough spot to buy their first home. We all need to realize that home ownership is a basic human need."

He said, "Well, I could keep going, but won't. We have

made nice progress and will continue to do so!"

"One last thought, a dwelling or roof over your head is not a partisan issue," said Cooney, Executive Director, Chelan Valley Housing Trust.

"I supported the bill because it allows cities and counties to develop higher density zones for additional housing opportunities. It is voluntary and redirects REET money for investment in local infrastructure enhancement. It may not work for all cities and counties but it gives local governments another tool to better utilize land and address housing shortages in a more affordable way," said Rep. Keith Goehner.

hour time slots to allow for infection control practices between visits. Heritage Heights will develop a schedule for visitation times and share it with family members.

• Residents can have up to 2 people per visit per day.

• There will be a clear entry and exit for all visitation, including a route for visitors to get to indoor/outdoor locations identified for visitation.

• Visitors must comply with all rules surrounding movement throughout the community. If at any time the community staff feels that the visits are unsafe, the community has the right to suspend visitation.

• Visitation will discontinue if an outbreak occurs at any time.

"This has been a long time coming," said Amanda Ballou, CEO of Heritage Heights. "We are delighted to reopen visitation and look forward to welcoming our residents' loved ones back at the community."

## Water flow to increase in Chelan River

CHELAN –The Chelan River will flow faster and water levels will rise as Chelan PUD begins spring spill to manage Lake Chelan water levels.

Spill typically increases in early April and tapers off around the end of July, but can fluctuate at any time depending on weather conditions.

Please help Chelan PUD spread the word: Stay on trails in the upper reaches of the Chelan River and abide by “no trespassing” signs in other areas, specifically in the Chelan River Gorge.

**Changes in river flow can create hazardous conditions quickly and unpredictably, including higher water levels, fast currents, and potential entrapment.**

The Chelan Gorge is the narrow, rocky channel of the Chelan River, located in an area with limited cell phone coverage and hazardous terrain. Rescues are extremely difficult. Changes in river flow can create hazardous conditions quickly and unpredictably, including higher water levels, fast currents, and potential entrapment. Chelan PUD has posted dozens of signs warning of the no-trespass areas for public safety.

## Slidewaters, Lakeside Surf prepare to open in May

CHELAN, WA March 31, 2021— Opening day 2021 for Slidewaters Waterpark will return to its usual Saturday in May. For nearly 40 years Slidewaters has opened the Saturday before Memorial Day and after a 1-year hiatus, Slidewaters plans to return to its traditional opening day. The first day of the season will be May 29.

Lakeside Surf is preparing to open to the public on May 1. The highly anticipated opening has been pushed back multiple times; most recently delayed nearly a year due to the global pandemic. While the impact of the pandemic has delayed completion of some portions of the project, the world’s largest river wave will be ready for its first public surfers on May 1. Booking for surf sessions will open on [lakesidesurf.com](http://lakesidesurf.com) on April 7.

“We have been unbelievably blessed to be in this position of opening both our parks in May,” Owner Burke Bordner said. “The past year has not been easy, but every time we faced what felt like an unsurmountable obstacle, God pro-

vided a way. Our Team Members, guests, community, contractors, banks, lenders, and families have all been crucial in getting us to this point. We are so grateful for how God has used those around us to sustain us and this business. Now it is time to celebrate and get back to welcoming families.”

Both Slidewaters and Lakeside Surf will be following the Washington State Department of Health Guidance for water recreation facilities. This guidance includes, but is not limited to; capacity restraints, physical distancing requirements, and face covering guidelines. The Slidewaters’ COVID-19 Safety Plan is in development, but an overview of what to expect as well as answers to frequently asked questions can be found at <https://www.slidewaters.com/covid-policies>. DOH has provided guidance that allows for limited operation for Slidewaters in phase 2 or 3 of the Roadmap to Recovery, while Lakeside Surf has guidelines for operation in phase 1,2 or 3. Phase 4 guidelines have yet to be developed.

Due to the capacity restraints in both Phase 2 and 3, Slidewaters will rely on a reser-

vation system to help manage guest capacity. Reservations will be required in phase 2 and optional in phase 3. Reservations will be an additional cost on top of admission tickets to Slidewaters. You can read more about the reservations system on our COVID FAQ sheet.

A Deep Discount spring sale program is currently active on [slidewaters.com](http://slidewaters.com) and bookings for surf sessions open to the public on April 7 and are available on [lakesidesurf.com](http://lakesidesurf.com). Reservations for cabanas, pavilions and admissions are also available online. Phase 2 operations would require a reservation in addition to a ticket or season pass. In phase 3, admission reservations will be available to guarantee a spot for a given day, but they will not be required. If the park reaches capacity, then all guests wishing to enter will be asked to wait until the park is no longer at capacity.

## The CARES Act provision provides an incentive for everyone to give

Amidst all the and challenges and hardships that 2020 brought to our region, we cannot forget to celebrate one of its silver linings: people were more generous than ever. From increased contributions to our food banks and social services to recognizing our healthcare heroes, our communities helped to fill the many needs that emerged during the pandemic through charitable giving.

You might recall that in 2017, a new tax law increased the standard deduction significantly, which resulted in fewer people itemizing, leaving no real tax incentive for charitable donations.

The Federal Government saw the importance of charitable giving in 2020 and has included provisions in the CARES Act to recognize gifts to charity in 2020 and 2021.

For your 2020 taxes, if you choose not to itemize, you will be able to deduct up to \$300 of qualified charitable donations under these tax law changes through the CARES Act. The \$300 is the same whether you file single or jointly. In 2021, the limit increases to \$600 for those who file jointly and \$300 for married filing separately. Single filers will still have the \$300 limit. Other charitable gifting rules remain unchanged, including gifting of investments and Qualified Charitable Donations (QCD) from IRAs.

Donating investments (especially highly appreciated securities such as stocks) instead of cash can be a very

tax-efficient way to support a charity. If you sell the stock or bonds first then donate the proceeds to charity, you will pay tax on the gain. Contributing securities you’ve owned for more than a year directly to the charity usually allows you to deduct the full fair market value of the stock plus pay no capital gains tax. For large donations, keep in mind that there are limits on how much can be deducted per year. The limits vary based on what was donated, but stock donations are generally limited to 30% of your adjusted gross income (AGI). AGI is your gross income before your standard or itemized deductions and, if applicable, your qualified business income deduction. If your donation is limited, the excess will carry forward to a future year.

For those 70 ½ or older, QCDs from an IRA allow a direct transfer of funds from your IRA to a qualified charity. QCDs can be counted toward satisfying your annual re-

quired minimum distribution (RMD) if certain rules are met, such as transferring the funds directly from the IRA to the charity without first being distributed to you.

A QCD excludes the amount donated from taxable income, unlike regular IRA withdrawals. This type of donation does not require you to itemize and, by keeping your income lower, may reduce the impact to certain deductions or credits. While RMDs were waived for 2020 they are required again for 2021.

However you make a difference with gifting to charity, in order to claim a deduction, there are few things you must keep in your records:

- For any donation of \$250 or more (including contributions of cash), you must obtain and keep in your records a contemporaneous written acknowledgement from the qualified charity indicating the amount of the cash and a description of any property contributed. The acknowledgement must say whether the organization provided any goods or services in exchange for the gift and, if so, must provide a description and a good faith estimate of the value of those goods or services.

- If you receive any goods or services in exchange for your donation, you must reduce your deduction by the value of what you received.

- For non-cash gifts in excess of \$5,000 (\$10,000 for closely held stock) you’ll need an independent appraisal. You don’t need an appraisal for gifts of exchange-trad-

ed stocks, bonds or mutual funds.

Always remember that only donations to qualified organizations are deductible. Not all non-profits are considered qualified. Qualified organizations include 501(c)(3) charities, state and local governments, and school districts. Contributions to political campaigns or gifts directly to a needy individual do not qualify.

So many of our regions’ charitable organizations have struggled during the pandemic. Your contributions in 2020 and 2021 are helping them sustain operations and prepare to bring quality of life benefits once again to our communities – and that is the ultimate incentive for giving.

Executive Director, Kayla Helleison. "Giving an opportunity for youth to connect with safe people and positive programming is absolutely essential right now. Our youth

need time and space to process what they're going through and access to healthy outlets for their emotions. This collaborative program provides both."

Each partner group brings unique strengths to the table which will benefit the 20 teens participating in the program. The Barn, with specialized coaching support from Robin Weathersby, offers an immense amount of expertise around spring, jump, bodyweight and weight training and how these essential movement qualities can foster healthy physical development as well as set the foundation for future athletic opportunities. Only7Seconds brings adeptness around how to combat the loneliness and isolation our teens have been navigating over the past year due to the pandemic. And Thrive Chelan Valley provides decades of knowledge regarding best practice on youth programming which helps build resilience while providing opportunities for overcoming barriers.

"This effort came together because a local student, Hailee Huddleston, saw a growing need. All of a sudden, the right people were in the right place at the right time," says Erin McCardle, Co-Owner of The Barn. "It's amazing

what can happen when you bring together passionate people who are all focused on making sure the youth of our valley are healthy physically and mentally. 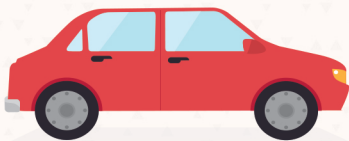

**THE WASHINGTON OUTDOORS REPORT**

Wondering where to go for the Lowland Lakes Trout Opener on April 24? There wasn't an opening day last year thanks to the six-week spring fishing closure imposed by Washington State at the start of the Covid pandemic. However, we can get some pretty good ideas of where to go by looking at the top lakes from the 2019 lowland lakes opener. All of the lakes mentioned are east of the Cascade Crest and the catch data was tallied by Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife creel checkers. It's also worth noting that most of the anglers fishing lakes in Eastern Washington during the 2019 opener had to contend with high winds and in some cases, spring snow!

**WILLIAMS LAKE** - Located between Cheney and Sprague, this lake has two resorts and is a popular opening day destination. In 2019 anglers caught eight fish apiece and 2.3 of these trout were kept on average. They were mainly 10-inch rainbows and cutthroat which explains the high release rate. The biggest fish checked was a 19-inch rainbow trout.

**STARVATION LAKE** - This Northeast Washington lake gave up an average of

2.7 trout on the opener in 2019 but wind and snow put a damper on success as the day progressed. One of the fish caught was a huge 21-inch rainbow.

**WAITTS LAKE** - There were not a whole lot of people fishing this body of water on the opener but the ones that were there averaged 2.5 trout apiece. One unique thing about this lake is the fact you can catch brown trout here and the biggest

one checked on the April 2019 opener was a nice 20-inch fish.

**PARK LAKE** - Part of the Sun Lakes located between Coulee City and Soap Lake, this lake generally receives a lot of attention during the opener and most anglers have good success here. In 2019 anglers were averaging three trout and the largest rainbow wasn't that large, measuring out at 14.3 inches. High winds made for tough

fishing.

**WAPATO LAKE** - This lake, not far from Manson in Chelan County, is another tried and true favorite on opening day. In 2019 anglers averaged 4.5 fish each, many of them rainbows in the 13-inch range.

**JAMESON LAKE** - This sagebrush lined lake in Douglas County is another favored opening day destination. High winds kept anglers off the water for much

of the April 2019 opener but despite that those venturing out with a rod and reel averaged 3.4 trout apiece and the fish were nice sized, averaging 13 inches.

**ROWLAND LAKE** - This Kittitas County lake off of Highway 14 produced well during the 2019 opener and anglers caught close to a limit each (4.8 fish average). One "large broodstock" trout was also caught but no weight or measurements was provided.

**SPEARFISH LAKE** - Only eight anglers were found fishing this sleeper of a lake by Dallesport during the opener but they weren't doing half-bad, averaging 3.1 trout apiece.

As for catching them? When it comes to opening day, all sorts of tactics work. You can fish Berkley PowerBait or marshmallows and worms off the bottom if it's not too weedy. If it is weedy you can cast spinners, spoons or flies from shore. If you are trolling from a boat it's hard to beat a Mack's Wedding Ring Spinner tipped with a worm behind a small dodger or pop gear. One other boat tactic that works well? Trolling a small frog colored Worden's Flatfish. It works!

**Can green tea help diabetes**

**Q:** Can green tea help lower my blood sugar? I was diagnosed with diabetes last month. My sister recommended drinking green tea.

Green tea contains antioxidants. Drinking at least 3-5 cups of green tea daily has been shown to reduce the risk of cardiovascular disease, endometrial cancer, and ovarian cancer. It also may lower blood pressure, blood sugar, body



weight, and body fat. What is confusing is that green tea and green tea extract also naturally contain caffeine, increasing blood pressure and heart rate in people who are sensitive to it.

Green tea contains caffeine plus another natural compound called epigallocatechin gallate (EGCG). Amounts of EGCG over 200mg daily have been associated with increased blood pressure, constipation, and rash. Higher concentrations of 800mg daily of EGCG have been associated with liver injury.

High amounts of green tea can cause depletion of folic acid from the body. Folic acid is critical in preventing a severe birth defect called spina bifida.

Green tea extracts verified with the United States Pharmacopeia (USP) must warn consumers about the potential for liver toxicity. Their labeling has to include the following statements: "Do not take on an empty stomach. Take with food. Do not use if you have a liver problem and discontinue use and consult a health-care practitioner if you develop symptoms of liver trouble, such as abdominal

pain, dark urine, or jaundice (yellowing of the skin or eyes)."

Most tea leaves are harvested from the woody plant Camellia sinensis, then carefully dried to prevent mold. Herbal teas use various parts of other plants, like chamomile and peppermint. About 20% of the teas from the leaves of Camellia sinensis are green teas.

The main difference between green and black teas is the amount of oxidation they undergo after harvesting. When the tea leaves are exposed to the air, oxidation occurs, turning them from bright green to brown, similar to an apple turning brown after cutting and exposing it to air.

Green tea is steamed or pan-fried right after harvesting to arrest the oxidation process before being dried. Black teas are left exposed until the oxidation process is completed, then dried and packaged. Oxidation makes tea leaves less bitter and helps develop their flavors more fully than green or white teas.

Oolong teas are the middle ground between barely oxidized green tea and fully oxidized black tea. Oolong teas can be anywhere from 5% to 90% oxidized. The less oxidation, the lighter the color of the leaves and the more subtle their flavor.

All teas from Camellia sin-

ensis contain caffeine, about 50mg per cup. This compares with 90-100mg of caffeine in a cup of coffee. When green tea is concentrated in an extract, it retains its caffeine content. The label on green tea extract and supplements containing it won't state the total amount of caffeine present because green tea naturally contains caffeine.

Besides coffee and tea, there are two other plants cultivated, processed, and brewed for the stimulant effects of the caffeine they contain. Guarana and Yerba Mate contain caffeine naturally and are often added to supplements for weight control and increased energy.

Supplements have to state on their label any caffeine that has been added to their product. Like green tea, guarana and Yerba Mate also naturally contain caffeine, so their caffeine doesn't have to be listed separately as an ingredient.

**5 Ways to Get the Most From Green Tea**

**1. Beware of the TOTAL Caffeine Content.**

Caffeine lurks in natural compounds like green tea, guarana, and yerba mate. Herbal supplements must list any caffeine that has been added to their product. Caffeine in green tea can cause stomach upset, insomnia, and a racing heartbeat.

**2. Brew at a Lower Temperature.**

Black and oolong teas are best steeped in boiling water, but green and white teas taste bitter and grassy if brewed in water that's too hot. Brew green tea with water heated until tiny bubbles rise to the surface of your pan or glass kettle, about 175-180 degrees.

**3. More is Not Always Better.**

One compound found in green tea extract is EGCG, which at high doses can damage your liver.

**4. Avoid it if You Are Trying to Get Pregnant.**

High doses of green tea or green tea extract deplete your body of folic acid, increasing the risk of severe birth defects like spina bifida.

**5. Drink 3-5 cups Daily for Best Results.**

Most studies show that drinking 3-5 cups daily of green tea, or the equivalent in green tea extract, was necessary to experience the benefits.
