American Legion 'Teacher Grant' 2021 winners

MANSON - In early January the Manson American Legion, Post 108 sponsored a "Teacher Grant" program, offering four \$250 Grants available to all teachers in the Manson School District. This funding could be used for anything that would benefit students. This was a great opportunity to secure items not included in the school's budget.

The process to apply for a grant was kept simple. Teachers were directed to complete a one-page application and include a 250 word or less paper explaining how the funding would be used and the number of students who would benefit.

Due date for Grant applications was January 29. From there Post 108's Teacher Grant Committee reviewed applications. There was a total of seven applications covering grades Pre-K-10. Committee member and Post 108 Chaplain John Swenson said, "This was a very difficult assignment as all grant applications were worthy of consideration. We did our best to rank applications and come up with the top four. We felt the remaining three should also be considered for funding."

At Post 108's February meeting members were brought up to speed on the "Teacher Grant" program. A discussion

followed and finally a motion was made and seconded to fund the three additional Grant application at \$250 each. The vote was 100% in favor!

Teachers receiving a \$250 grant included:

Carman Fretwell, Resource Room – Grade level Pre-K-5. Funding to purchase games, activities and fidgets that students would be willing to work for. These items are costly but necessary to encourage, motivate and support student learning in the special education and possibly the general education setting.

Samantha Lovelace, Life Science and Biology - Grade 8 and 10. Funding for dissecting kits for 20 students. Currently there are only eight incomplete kits and students



need to share, some just get to watch.

Brittany Sivertson, Manson School District Preschool (dual language)- Grade level- Preschool. Funding will be used to purchase quality books in Spanish to build the preschool library. A landmark report titled "Becoming a Nation of Readers" concluded that "the single most important activity for building knowledge for their eventual success in reading is reading aloud to children." These books will go toward helping countless future Manson preschoolers be successful in school.

Three governments, one parking problem

CHELAN - Lake Chelan School District Superintendent Barry DePaoli came before the Chelan City Council Tuesday, Feb. 9 to discuss his dislike of boats and trailers parking on school property five months out of the year. "We want to be good stewards with the community, but some people are leaving their boats in the school parking lot the entire summer from May until September," DePaoli said. The longtime schools boss said it wouldn't be an issue if there were to be daily use for certain sections of the lot, but not all 90 spaces. He estimated that two designated sections could yield about 55 slots for locals and tourists. Chelan City Councilman Tim Hollingsworth said, "The Chelan PUD (Public Utility District) needs to be involved," because the source of the high school parking lot dilemma is lack of parking at the lake boat ramp. That area only has room for about a dozen cars and boats. DePaoli said the school needs the parking for sports and summer school activities and he really didn't want to cause issues by closing it down completely. He would like a resolution by May 1

DePaoli made the remarks quickly (half an hour) as he had to attend his own school board meeting, which unfortunately, started at 6 p.m., just like the City Council meeting, on Tuesdays.

The simultaneous meetings were the subject of complaints by citizens and news media in the past as it would be impossible to attend both. Neither the school nor the city wanted to change their schedules to accommodate anyone. Local media must choose between the two meetings or have staffers attend both, which is a non-starter for skeleton staffs.

Superintendent DePaoli said some people even park their RV's in the high school lot and that he was also concerned about liability claims if accidents occur on school property.

Chelan City Clerk Peri Gallucci said insurance for the lot

Manson for \$10 a day, but all agreed that that would be too far away to accommodate tourists and locals alike because of the distance involved in getting people back to the ramp in Chelan.

A suggestion was made that perhaps colored windshield stickers could be bought by locals or those purchasing parking passes for the season so any parking enforcement officer would see the stickers and not give out tickets to those who have paid the fees.

Councilman Hollingsworth suggested the use of parking meters with the proceeds split between the school and the city

House 'Wealth Tax' bill 'punishment' for success states Sen. Hawkins

OLYMPIA - A rehash of an old Democrat Party idea has come back to the state capitol for a vote. So far it is only in the House, but Senator Brad Hawkins (R-East Wenatchee) is ready with an answer if it ever comes to the state Senate.

"Improving the equity of Washington state's tax code by creating the Washington state wealth tax and taxing extraordinary financial intangible assets — House Bill 1406, was introduced by Rep. Noel Frame (D-Seattle) January 27.

Hawkins stated, in an exclusive interview with NCW Media, that "HB 1406 is a new proposal this year, so I don't know how far it will advance. If it does advance, it will probably be one of the final bills of the session and part of the

overall budget package. Since it is a House of Representatives' bill, there hasn't been much talk of it yet in the Senate," Hawkins said.

"While I certainly want everyone to pay their fair share of taxes, this one seems to be targeted toward a few people as almost a punishment for their success. Personally, I think people like Bill Gates, Jeff Bezos, the founder of Starbucks, or anyone else who is this fortunate has worked incredibly hard for their earnings, took gigantic risks, made big sacrifices throughout their business careers, and have employed a tremendous number of people in the process," continued Hawkins.

"They happen to also be very sincere in their efforts to support others with generous foundations and personal giving. This bill seems like an effort to extract money from a handful of very successful people to fund more growth in government.

To me, that sends the wrong message," he said. "While state revenues have

taken a modest hit during the COVID pandemic, our state economy is holding steady

despite efforts to keep our economy closed. Personally, rather than implementing creative new taxes to significantly grow the budget, I would favor using our \$2 billion budget stabilization account reserves and making modest adjustments to balance the budget rather than more tax increases and continued spending," said Hawkins.

"I'm not sure Washington State can keep this up if the economy and state revenues dip again due to COVID or if our state or country experiences a non-COVID recession in the future. So as much as I would like to keep an open mind about everything, I am concerned about the message this bill sends and the way it might chase off a few people from Washington, people who are among our state's most incredible success stories," Hawkins concluded.

Tom Olson, Washington resident and political commentator. stated on the USA Votes chat site that the Seattle Democrats' tax bill is: "(1) Confiscatory and punitive, (2) hasn't worked elsewhere, (3) expensive and difficult to administer, (4) will be easily circumvented by the 'rich' simply changing domiciles from Washington. Perhaps this should be retitled 'Texas-Florida stimulus act?"

Fact Check: COVID19 policies and the vaccine

A conversation on current events

I opened my email this morning to read an article by none other than the New York Times regarding the wisdom of "coronavirus absolutism." Their lead on the article is:

"In a public health emergency, absolutism is a very tempting response: People should cease all behavior that creates additional risk.

That instinct led to calls for gay men to stop having sex during the AIDS crisis. It has also spurred campaigns for teen abstinence, to reduce sexually transmitted diseases and pregnancies. And to fight obesity, people have been drawn to fads like the elimination of trans fats or carbohydrates.

These days, there is a new absolutist health fad: the discouragement — or even prohibition — of any behavior that seems to increase the risk of coronavirus infection, even minutely."

The NYT article goes on to question the effectiveness of wearing masks outdoors. making the point that "Worldwide scientists have not documented any instances of outdoor transmission unless



obtaining his goal of 25 cases per 100,000 population.

The current official position of most of the Health Care industry and the government is that we must continue to wear masks and self-isolate until the bulk of our society is vaccinated against the virus. In words just coined by the NYT we must continue to follow the practice of coronavirus absolutism. Any information that runs contrary or critical of that position must be crushed. It must be declared unscientific and a commitment to accept more deaths as the inevitable result of non-compliance.

There are of course other voices in this battle. One such voice is Dr. Simone Gold. Gold is a board certified, emergency room doctor and attorney. Dr. Gold is a Chicago Medical School graduate with a Stanford University Law School Degree. She completed her residency at Stony Brook University Hospital in New York. She has written a book on her fight against the medical cancel culture titled, I Do Not Consent. She founded an organization named, America's Frontline Doctors. You can find more information on her organization at AFDLS.com. Dr. Gold takes exception to the current policies of how best to address treatment of COVID19. She believes decisions about how best to treat a patient with COVID should be left to the patient's individual physician. Dr. Gold does say that it is blatantly false to say there are no effective treatments for COVID patients. She is highly suspicious of the "vaccines" which she describes as Experimental



Biological Agents.

It should come as no surprise that for her opposition to the official positions of the Medical establishment Dr. Gold has been severely punished. She has been fired by two of the hospitals where she practiced medicine for 20 years. The reason was she prescribed Hydroxychloroquine for the treatment of COVID patients.

Dr. Gold clearly states it is a lie to say there are no treatments for COVID19. Hydroxychloroquine and Ivermectin have both been shown to be effective treatments. Hydroxychloroquine has been an FDA approved drug for 65 years. In much of the World it does not even require a prescription. It is available over the counter. Many will remember that President Trump was treated with these drugs when he tested positive and recovered quickly. Before you dismiss Dr. Gold as a crackpot non-conformist you might want to hear her position on COVID and the medical professions response. Dr. Gold says that the way the government and medical agencies have responded to this virus is nothing short of a crime against humanity. She points out that there is a physician in the Netherlands that is bringing a lawsuit in the

Hague claiming just that.

Dr. Gold says the worst thing about the current disinformation about COVID19 is the level of fear that has been spread across the country and the globe about this virus. The fact is what are the chances that if you contract the disease you will die? She says, if you are under 20 your survive ability is 99.97%; for 20 - 49 year olds the survive ability is 99.98%; 50 – 69 is 99.5%; over 70 your survival rate approaches 95% with no treatment. The dirty little secret here according to Dr. Simone is that if you take early treatment the symptoms are mild and you

it was rushed through too quickly and not adequately tested. She points out that a previous COVID vaccine was developed for SARs-1, which is 78% similar to COVID19. They are both "COVID" viruses. To date there are 7 identified COVID viruses according to Dr. Gold, none of which have an effective vaccine. She includes the common cold in the list of COVID type viruses. The SARS-1 vaccine was never released after animal testing found it didn't work.

Dr. Gold raises two concerns about the current vaccine. The first is she has a concern about the vaccines effect on human reproduction. She points out that two doctors in Europe have raised concerns about how the drug impacts the placenta. This issue is not totally clear. Even Dr. Gold admits that it is one of those questions that we don't know what we don't know yet. The CDC says there is no risk although they admit that they have detected some cell modification on the outside lining of the placenta. The new vaccines make it appear as though you are permanently infected with COVID19 and no one is sure about how that will affect future pregnancies.

USDA offers farm loans for underserved, beginning farmers

WENATCHEE - The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) reminds producers that FSA offers farm ownership and farm operating loans to underserved applicants as well as beginning farmers and ranchers. Underserved or beginning farmers and ranchers who cannot obtain commercial credit from a bank can apply for FSA direct or guaranteed loans.

"Farming and ranching is a capital-intensive business and FSA is committed to helping producers start and maintain their agricultural operations," said Jon Wyss, FSA State Executive Director in Washington State. "FSA loans are designed to make sure that everyone has access to credit

including underserved and beginning farmers and ranchers. Last year, FSA in Washington obligated \$35.7 million in loans to underserved borrowers and beginning farmers and ranchers.'

USDA defines underserved applicants as a group whose members have been subjected to racial, ethnic or gender prejudice because of their identity as members of the group without regard to their individual qualities. For farm loan program purposes, underserved groups are American Indians or Alaskan Natives, Asians, Blacks or African Americans, Native Hawaiians or other Pacific Islanders, Hispanics, and women.

In order to qualify as a beginning farmer, the individual or entity must meet the eligibility requirements outlined for direct or guaranteed loans. Additionally, individuals and all entity members must have operated a farm for less than 10 years. Applicants must materially or substantially participate in the operation. For farm ownership purposes, the applicant must not own a farm greater than 30 percent of the average size farm in the county at the time of application. All direct farm ownership applicants must have participated in the business operations of a farm for at least three years out of the last 10 years prior to the date the application is submitted to FSA. Substitutions for as much as the full three years of experience may be made based on education, business management experience, military experience, participation with a qualified mentor, and farm management experience as a hired laborer. Your local FSA office will be able to provide more details on acceptable substitutions.

If the applicant is an entity, all members must be related by blood or marriage and all entity members must be eligible beginning farmers. At least one of the members must have three years or more experience in the business operations of a farm prior to the date the application is submitted.

Direct loans are made to applicants by FSA. Guaranteed loans are made by lending institutions who arrange for FSA to guarantee the loan. FSA can guarantee up to 95 percent of the loss of principal and interest on a loan. The FSA guarantee allows lenders

to make agricultural credit available to producers who do not meet the lender's normal underwriting criteria.

The direct and guaranteed loan program offers two types of loans: farm ownership loans and farm operating loans.

Farm ownership loan funds may be used to purchase or enlarge a farm or ranch; purchase easements or rights of way needed in the farm's operation; build or improve buildings such as a dwelling or barn; promote soil and water conservation and development; and pay closing costs.

Farm operating loan funds may be used to purchase livestock, poultry, farm equipment, fertilizer, and other materials necessary to operate a farm. Operating loan funds can also be used for

family living expenses; refinancing debts under certain conditions; paying salaries for hired farm laborers; installing or improving water systems for home, livestock or irrigation use; and other similar improvements.

Repayment terms for direct operating loans are scheduled from one to seven years. Financing for direct farm ownership loans cannot exceed 40 years. Interest rates for direct loans are set periodically according to the government's cost of borrowing. Guaranteed loan terms and interest rates are set by the lender.

New USDA projects funded to support the Washington tree fruit industry

Members of the Tree Fruit Extension team have been working hard to secure federal funding for challenges facing the industry. They are part of national teams and represent \$16.9 million in total federal support from the USDA Specialty Crop Research Initiative. The three projects will focus on precision crop load management, fying effective solutions that improve the resiliency of the tree fruit industry in the future. You can read more about each below.

Precision Crop Load Management for Apples Project Director - Terrance Robinson, Cornell University

Optimizing fruit numbers within a narrow, economically optimum range is currently imprecisely done by pruning, chemical thinning and remedial hand thinning which is very expensive. We have previously developed ideas and tactics to precisely control crop load by calculating the optimum fruit number per tree, manually counting buds, flowers and fruits and by using ning, and lastly to guide human workers when hand thinning to maximize crop value.

Comprehensive fire blight management systems for the United States. Project Director – George Sundin, Michigan State University Other PIs - Tianna DuPont and Karina Gallardo, Washington State University

fire blight research and extension scientists from across the nation will be working together to develop novel and effective management strategies. The goal is to develop a comprehensive strategy for effective fire blight management optimizing shoot and blossom blight management, understanding and managing the systemic phase of fire blight, developing a prebreeding line of fire blight resistant varieties, providing economic analysis, and a nationally coordinated outreach program. The team will use innovative techniques, for example, they will use advanced transcriptomics to study the most effective use of defense elicitors. National coordination will multiply efforts, to more quickly find effective strategies. For example, products tested in multiple regions with diverse environmental conditions will provide indepth information to dissect variable efficacy and model the most effective use and timings. Demonstration trials will provide answers to longstanding questions to grower questions from cutting blight to defense elicitors.

Cost-Effective Management of Food Safety Risks Project Director - Michelle Danyluk, University of Florida Other PIs – Faith Critzer and Troy Peters, Washington

State University This work will provide the fresh produce industry with tools to effectively manage food safety risks while making the most efficient use of available resources. We will identify the important factors (and their uncertainties) that drive risk and are candidates for interventions. Key sources of uncertainty will be addressed by empirical data collection and analysis. The immediate outcome of this research will be integrated, publicly available decision analysis tools to aid in pathogen control on produce that supports decision-making by all stakeholders. This will support increased transparency and collaboration among federal partners, industry, and consumer groups. We will model costeffectiveness ratios of possible interventions, taking into account the preventable incidence of illness and economic costs of disease, as well as the costs and benefits to industry. Since different stakeholders consider different aspects of the costs and benefits of interventions, evaluations will be presented from different perspectives, including societal and industry perspectives and the results will be available at different levels of aggregation. The framework will provide opportunities to evaluate produce safety regulatory policies using the most recent scientific data. Critzer and Peters will contribute to work in preharvest water, postharvest handling, and outreach activities with others representing the tree fruit industry on the stakeholder advisory board. NORTH CENTRAL WASH-INGTON - Travis Dawson at Sportsman's Warehouse in East Wenatchee says Fish Lake in Chelan County is giving up numerous perch under the ice and while they are not big there are a few nice sized trout being caught there as well. Lake Chelan is fishing well for Kokanee right now. Anglers have been catching most of them around 25 Mile Creek State Park. Rufus Woods Reservoir is fishing very good for triploids but expect crowded boat launches if you go, because the word has gotten out about this winter fishery for big rainbows.

NORTHEAST WASHING-TON - Freddie Giannecchini at Clark's All-Sports in Colville says boaters fishing on Lake Roosevelt have done better than shore anglers lately for walleye but even out of the boat, walleye catches have been moderate as best. Some of the ice-fishing lakes have been giving up trout and perch though many anglers are close mouthed as to which ones they are fishing. However, it is no secret Curlew Lake is fishing very well for perch right now under the ice. A variety

¹/₂-1 cup, shredded or sliced cheese

Mix the tuna and sauerkraut together in a mixing bowl. You can add less sauerkraut if you prefer, but it helps to the tuna stick together.

Add just enough mayonnaise to help the tuna bind together. This will depend on how well you drain the tuna and sauerkraut, because you want the tuna/sauerkraut mixture damp but not wet.

Warm the tortilla on a griddle or flat pan, both sides.

Spoon the tuna mixture on half of the tortilla, leaving about a ¹/₂ inch border around the edges. You can make them thicker or thinner by how thick your tuna laver is.

Sprinkle the grated cheese

you like.

Fold the other tortilla half back over the tuna and cheese half

Grill, weighing down the tortilla with a flat-bottomed pan. I use the top of a double boiler pan.

Flip over to grill the cheese side last, then take off the heat and let it cool before cutting into wedges. When eating, beware, they often drip!
