

## Manson Community Council officially adds Elmira Forner to board

MANSON - The Manson Community Council meeting held Jan. 19, via ZOOM discussed or heard the following topics:

Councilman Incumbent Cindy Smith and new member Elmira Forner were both sworn in for their three-year terms after the vote was certified.

There is \$462 in the MCC treasury.

Officers for the 2021 calendar year were elected. Kari Sorenson was retained as chairman with Kathy Blum as co-chair. Elmira Forner was selected as secretary/treasurer.

A "bylaws" meeting was scheduled at Blueberry Hills on Jan. 26.

Manson School District (MSD) Superintendent Voni Walker and two staff members were in attendance and briefly summarized the EP&O (Replacement Educational

## Chelan Fire & Rescue discuss 'ladder dilemma'

CHELAN - The Chelan Fire & Rescue board of commissioners met on Wednesday, Jan. 20, at 3 p.m. via Zoom. Much of the hour-plus meeting, coming near the end, centered on repair or replacement of the ladder truck, which in either case is a costly dilemma.

The meeting began with a report from CF&R District 7 Chief Mark Donnell who stated that "it was the busiest December since incidents were recorded in 2010" noting that incidents were up 6.4 percent over 2019. He expects the same volume for 2021.

A discussion was had about the need for storm fittings on fire hydrants, at about \$200 each, especially in subdivisions like The Lookout. It was mentioned that the city of Chelan may have leverage to require the developer to purchase the necessary items. Fire Commissioner Russ Jones suggested the developer of The Lookout would be willing to comply if asked. Chief Donnell also said there were many hydrants in the fire district that currently have 5 inch fittings, but the specific size needed is 4 inch and that issue may take a while to replace. The Chief said former Chief Tim Lemon was aware of the issue.

In COVID-19 vaccine news, the chief stated that Confluence Health received 3,000 phone calls in one day regarding when vaccines would be available, where the vaccines were going to be given and

who could get vaccines. The state has installed a new "211" phone hotline so people can get their vaccine questions answered.

The ladder truck was a main topic at the meeting. It has been "diagnosed" with severe corrosion problems, but it would have to be taken off-line for a year as repairs would require that the truck be sent to St. Louis and then shipped back. The repair bill could be as much as \$250,000 on the high side with an additional \$5,000 to ship the truck back to Chelan.

A discussion was had as to whether or not it would be better to incorporate the ladder truck that is currently in Entiat or Manson when needed or to physically stage the truck at the Chelan fire station.

## Glass recycling expert: A myriad of products for 'end users'

CHELAN - Cyndy Andela, founder and President of Andela Products in Richfield Springs, New York, spoke virtually to the Lake Chelan Rotary club on Tuesday, Jan. 12 about the myriad of "end user" products for crushed, recycled glass.

Her company is known for expertise in the recycled glass markets and products as used in a variety of applications. It has also been selling machines and know how worldwide for the last 25 years.

Andela discussed the proprietary technology that produces a "friendly" crushed glass with rounded edges that is completely safe to handle. As evidence, she presented the Rotarians with a slide show that included pictures of children playing and bare feet walking in the finished material without injury.

Based on Andela's business acumen about sand and aggregate, she shared anecdotes

about what other municipalities have done to make the glass repurposing programs successful.

Rotarians at the virtual meeting agreed that the glass recycling efforts are an exciting project and discussed various measures to bring it to reality.

Cyndy is a fellow Rotarian and the immediate Past President of the Rotary Club of Richfield Springs, New York, located north of Cooperstown.

Her "Andela GP-05L System" is a popular, smaller sized machine system meant for lower volumes than large industrial applications and is perfect for small geographic areas like Lake Chelan where collections can be crushed once a week instead of daily.

Andela said that in its early stages, new bottles made from recycled glass bottles was the main use for recycled glass, but her company has been selling crushed, pulverized

glass to companies worldwide for industrial uses such as sandblasting and landscaping, utility pipe bedding and as an additive for sidewalks, cement slabs, patios and site preparation.

Andela has a degree in mechanical engineering and exclaimed the better "flow rate" of her product, being "nine-10 times better" than the flow rate of other aggregates when it comes to its end use.

Her product can also be added to mulch, giving more weed control, retention of soil moisture and even improved ripening of grapes as it reflects sunlight.

She mentioned that the Lake Chelan area, with its many wineries, would benefit from not only the end product being used in its vineyards, but also as a source for the bottles to be recycled in the first place.

The Rotarians are pursuing the purchase of a \$111,000 Andela GP-05L System machine with partial funding from the

Programs & Operations) levy request scheduled for a vote in February. Manson has historically had two-year levy requests. This one covers 2020-2021. (See sidebar this edition)

Walker said the school district was doing "amazing" work mitigating the transmis-

sion of COVID-19 to the extent that other school districts in the state were requesting "best practices" from MSD. She reports no COVID-19 cases since October.

MSD is currently attending half day schedules. One group of students in the morning and another in the afternoon.

Forner said she was raised on an orchard farm near Penticton, Canada and spent 32

years as a Seattle resident. She was a state legislator and was also on the city of Kent planning commission before coming to Manson for retirement.

MCC is a panel of 5 elected volunteers who act as an advisory panel to the Chelan County Commissioners. Monthly meetings are held every third Tuesday of each month.

he said.

"On a grander scale, Chelan Fire & Rescue, along with other county fire agencies, has committed personnel to fill critical positions within the Incident Management Team operating at the Chelan-Douglas Health District," Donnell said.

Chief Donnell continued, "On the positive side, we have only had one member who tested positive and this was from a non-work related exposure and we have been able to handle the emergency call response without too much difficulty."

"Working together with Lake Chelan Health, we have been successful in delivering the first dose of vaccine to First Responders in Chelan and Douglas counties with the second dose administration starting next week," concluded Donnell.

On Monday, Jan. 25, the Washington State National Guard was expected to arrive in Chelan to help with COVID-19 vaccine duties. For more on the fire department, go to chelan.7.com. Approximately 14 persons attended the meeting virtually.

before Trump made his speech and most likely never heard it.

city of Chelan (\$50,000) and another \$50,000 from the Washington State Department of Ecology.

The club is getting a "fellow Rotarian discount" Andela said, because she is not charging for the installation, shipping, one week of training and accompanying "installation supervisor."

The Regional Port of Chelan and Douglas Counties Chief Executive Officer Jim Kuntz (brother of Wenatchee Mayor Frank Kuntz) will help support the project by advocating in favor of the Rotarian's plan to the state entity.

Lake Chelan Rotarian Julie McCoy is heading the project and said the recycling project fits in with the club's plans of producing a zero carbon footprint in the near future.

Andela said she already gave the same presentation to the Lake Chelan Wine Alliance and she has already developed an electric-free recycled glass "machine" that can be used by third-world countries to produce clean water, a precious and rare commodity in many poor nations.

That system involves a 50-gallon barrel and gravitational forces that use glass "sand" as a filter to clean fouled water into clean drinking water by merely pouring the bad water into the top and catching the filtered water when it comes out of the bottom.

Lake Chelan Rotary President Tom Tochtermann said

The entire country has been under assault by left wing radicals all summer. Today the left want us all to believe the assault on the Capitol was by out of control Trump supporters without any real investigation of what occurred by whom and for what reason. That is clearly un-American.

Seventy plus million citizens do not believe the results of this election. That is a problem. Unless something is done to address their concerns besides simply claiming they are wrong without critically examining their complaints will only result in continuing unrest.

I have heard a number of conservatives calling for an armed revolution. I do not support that.

Before we jump on the latest video showing the growing frustrations of the American people, we must find a way to get back to our roots. Roots that call for us to evaluate these emotionally charged events with objectivity and fairness.

Another suggestion was to possibly sell the existing truck on the open market, which might garner \$175,000. The repair cost was so high because it requires disassembly of the truck to get at the corrosion.

The original seller of the ladder truck is not required to fix it as the truck's warranty has expired. All firefighters, including the duty crew that was on the Zoom meeting, stated they liked the "golden motor" of the 2007-built apparatus as it was considered "the last good year" of engine construction before emission controls changed the efficiencies of the motor.

No decision was made as to the fate of the popular ladder truck. Repairing it in St. Louis might allow the vehicle an additional 20 years of service.

Another topic that was talked about briefly was a request by the city of Chelan to burn down a city building located near the Pacific Pride gas terminal. All agreed that the subsequent project would be excellent training for participating firemen.

The controlled burning would probably take place around the end of February.

Fire Chief Mark Donnell told the Lake Chelan Mirror in an

exclusive interview after the meeting, about the effects of the pandemic on Chelan firefighters, "The current Covid-19 pandemic has had a significant impact not only with emergency responses, but day-to-day operations of the Fire District. With the recognition of the severity of this virus we moved to limit public access to all of our facilities, implemented even more rigid infection control measures, moved to increase our supply of personal protective equipment, and changed our emergency response protocols to limit exposure of our personnel."

"In addition, we were required to move most of our training to either a virtual or online format which is not the best format for firefighter skills performance. All open public meetings (Commissioner meetings, etc.) were also moved to virtual format which makes conducting the business of the Fire District more challenging, but we have been able to adapt," Donnell continued.

"The biggest impact has been to the budget as the cost of implementing the online training program, virtual meeting forum, and personal protective equipment (exam gloves, gowns, N-95 respirators, etc.) has increased dramatically due to the increased demand,"

use of the Andela glass recycler could "put Chelan on the map for environmental leadership."

Andela's company currently has 20 employees and also offers custom machines for clients.

The Andela GP-05L System is capable of one to two tons per hour, or about 400 tons annually if used only once a week. It would produce a product suitable for use by the city of Chelan's Public Works Department for road paving aggregate and mulch uses as well as attracting potential purchases from area NGO's (non-governmental organizations) and other government entities.

Andela stated that the end product has no odor, other than a dirt-like smell, or unsanitary residue, because part of the recycling process involves extreme heat which kills organic materials. The recycling machine also removes plastic caps and paper labels into a separate waste container.

The finished product has no sharp edges as it is crushed and tumbled by the machine, thus allowing its use on playgrounds and other sensitive

ground areas.

The GP-05L installation would also come with technical training manuals and available Zoom meeting instructions from the installation supervisor after installation is finished. Her company also offers maintenance tips and spare parts needed after years of usage.

Chelan Mayor Bob Goedde asked about segregation of colored glass and Andela said if the desired result were to be blue or whatever, that the glass can be segregated and a run of all blue glass would generate a useful mulch product of that color for use on customized landscaping projects.

In regards to its use in the sandblasting industry, Andela stated her product does not contain "crystalline dust" and so is much safer for those who are applying it if accidentally inhaled.

"It's a way of taking local waste and utilizing it locally," Andela said.

Speaking by email after the Zoom Rotary meeting, Andela stated that she had really "enjoyed" talking to the Rotarians of Lake Chelan and was "looking forward" to visiting again, but in person, after the COVID-19 issue was solved.

symphonies, big bands and other local events.

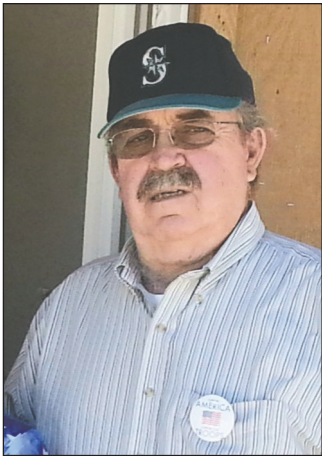

## Chelan Middle School sport seasons revamped for this spring

CHELAN - With the new guidance and requirements provided to school and non-school athletic programs both from the WIAA's "Healthy Washington Sport and Activity Guidelines" and the WA Department of Health's "Sporting Activities Covid-19 Requirements" documents, we now have a path for how we can return to athletic based activities. As it was released yesterday, high schools in the North Central Region are joining together to provide competitive opportunities for high school aged students.

Middle school athletics in the region are offered differently within every school district. For this Covid-19 school year each district is handling their middle school athletic programs differently. Some are looking to do intramurals

as they have multiple middle schools in their district while some are looking at not offering those programs this year.

With high school athletic programs being the main focal point for competitive scheduling and just simply having them happen as a priority, it poses some challenges with coordinating middle school athletic seasons. Covid-19 has already put some limitations on availability of district transportation due to hybrid learning models as well as an anticipated shortage of officials that don't feel comfortable officiating during the pandemic for this year.

Due to the size of our school district it is not feasible to put on intramural programs for our 7th and 8th grade athletic programs. Thus Chelan, Cashmere, and Cascade school districts have agreed to work together as a three team middle school league to provide middle school sport

offerings as best as we can for this school year. The proposed seasons are outlined below. It has been decided to omit the sports of basketball and wrestling for this school year only as they currently do not have a phase provided to compete in and with high school seasons being rearranged would have other potential unknown issues in scheduling.

We want to provide our middle school students with some competitive opportunities this year to look forward to. We hope our middle school students will take advantage of all programs that are offered.

## Lake Chelan Health resumes therapy services

CHELAN - Lake Chelan Health is continuing visitor restrictions and is not admitting new patients to the hospital after five inpatients tested positive for COVID-19.

Therapy services, which include physical, speech and occupational therapy have resumed with guidance from the Chelan Douglas Health District (CDHD). All other services remain open and available.

All positive patients remain in isolation and separate from

non-infected patients. In collaboration with the CDHD, 98 staff were first tested for COVID-19 on Friday, January 15, and results were negative.

We will continue to follow the necessary safety precautions to protect our patients, staff, and community.

## Heritage Heights cleared of outbreak status

CHELAN - Heritage Heights has now officially been cleared of its COVID-19 outbreak status. Chelan Douglas County Health (CDHD) requires that long term care facilities which have had an outbreak allow 28 days to elapse with no new cases to consider the outbreak concluded. Heritage Heights met this milestone as of Jan. 19.

Now that the virus-free in-

terval has been accomplished and confirmed with weekly testing, people who wish to visit residents at the facility may do so, using an outdoor space.

Other conditions of the Governor's Safe Start for Long Term Care still apply. Residents are requested to practice social distancing and universal masking when out of their apartments in the facility. Entrance to the facility is restricted to essential healthcare personal only.

Non-medically necessary trips outside the building should be avoided. Communal dining is not recommended, and group activities are restricted. These conditions may change once Chelan County enters Safe Start Phase 2 or greater.

Residents and staff of Heritage Heights will receive their first vaccine dose on January 25th. Future vaccination dates are February 15th and March 8th. Immunizations will be administered by Walgreens Pharmacy Services onsite.

MANSON - This year's annual Polar Bear Swim, held at Manson Bay was canceled by the Manson Chamber of Commerce early last year because of Covid-19. This annual event, normally held the second weekend of Winterfest is one of only two fundraising events for the Lake Chelan Swim (LCS), a local non-profit organization that provides free swimming lessons and water safety for anyone in the Lake Chelan Valley. Judy Phelps, Board President for LCS and owner Hard Row to Hoe Winery has served as president from their very beginning in 2010. "We live in such a special place with an amazing, crystal clear lake, it only makes sense to keep locals and visitors safe by providing water safety training and swimming lessons," Judy said.

So how did we go from no event to holding this very successful happening that has

raised over \$26,000. It all started when Mark Elliot, General Manager at Petersen's Waterfront called Second Cup of Coffee on the radio shortly after Christmas. 

## THE WASHINGTON OUTDOORS REPORT

### Carp diem

Wondering what to do on the water this month? Due to the mild temperatures this winter many Eastern Washington lakes don't have safe ice for hardwater fishing and most anglers have their boats put away until spring. Never fear, Carpe Diem, or "seize the day", as they say and target carp in a lake or river near you!

Carp can be caught in many open bodies of water year-round. They commonly average three to five pounds in size and can reach up to 30 pounds. In Washington State no license is required to fish for the common carp, there is no minimum size requirement and no limit on how many you can keep. Why is this? Probably because they are considered a trash fish by many these days and harmful to the environment.

They grow in numbers fast and carp can take over a lake or waterway, especially shallow ones, in just a few years. As bottom feeders they often uproot shallow rooted plants and muddy up water, covering eggs and nests from more desirable game fish.

Carp didn't always have a bad reputation. In fact, they were introduced to America from Germany by the United States Fish Commission in 1876. Since that time carp have spread from coast to coast. In Europe, the common carp is still considered a fine eating fish but today in our country, most don't consider them for table fare. However, noted American angling author A.J. McClane wrote, "The carp is a good fish to eat when properly prepared. It's important to skin them and trim out the dark flesh...Carp is excellent when smoked and the roe is edible and often sold in canned form. Carp flesh is an important ingredient in making gefilte fish."

My first experience with carp was at a shallow lake near Greeley, Colorado. I was

six years old and my grandfather took me to the deserted body of water that was full of

carp. My grandpa baited my hook with canned corn, tied a couple of split-shot a couple of feet on the line above the hook, and cast it out. In short order I was wrestling with a fish far bigger than the bluegill and pumpkinseed I was used to catching and I've had a special place in my heart for carp fishing ever since.

The dead of winter is usually when I target carp, largely because there is little else going on in the fishing and hunting world during this time. My go-to offering is to use a nightcrawler on a bait hook, tie on two feet of leader to a swivel, and then put a sliding egg weight above the swivel. That way a carp can pick up the bait and swim away with it before it senses the weight attached to it, giving you time to get a good hookset into the bony mouth of these fish. Carp put on a good fight. They don't jump, but they do pull and run and catching a few makes for a fun day on the water.

In addition to using bait like corn, nightcrawlers or bread dough (a traditional carp offering) you can also catch them from time to time on artificial lures and even with a fly rod. Large rabbit hair streamers in natural colors can be a good bet and sight fishing for carp with a fly rod became so popular in the 1990's that some anglers started guide services catering to catching carp this way and a number of articles about this were published in fishing and fly-fishing magazines around the country.

Fly fishing for what one writer called "golden tarpon" moment may have waned as a fad but casting a line for the common carp can still be a fun affair if you are looking to tangle with a sizeable fish when few other options are available.

# Temporary snowmobile, snow bike closure in effect for certain forest lands near Washington Pass

WINTHROP - Several areas near Washington Pass, located on State Route 20 within the Methow Valley Ranger District, will be closed to snowmobile and snow bike use January 1 through June 30, in order to provide for the safety of winter recreation users. The three areas covered by the closure are referred to as Blue Lake-SR20 Hairpin Turn, Cutthroat Creek Basin, and portions of the south side of Cutthroat Peak. State Route 20 itself will remain open to over snow motorized use, along with many backcountry areas near Washington Pass that are popular with snowmobile and snow bike users.

During the winter, State Route 20 is closed by snow and is used to access Washington Pass and the surrounding areas for backcountry skiing, snowmobiling, snow biking and other activities. The closed highway provides a unique access point to high elevation, alpine terrain. "Despite the area's popularity and it being open to both motorized and non-motorized winter use, in the past different user groups could expect some level of separation due to terrain and technology limitations. Improvements in snowmobile technology and the introduction of snow bikes, which are rapidly gaining popularity, have increased potential for interactions between user

groups." said District Ranger Chris Furr. "This past summer, like many forests, we saw unprecedented levels of use as people sought solace outdoors during the pandemic. That trend is continuing, and we expect use of the Washington Pass area this winter will far exceed what we expect in a typical year. The unusually high use combined with increased potential for user group interactions is why we are doing a temporary closure to snowmobiles and snow bikes."

District Recreation Program Manager Rosemary Seifried adds that, "In addition to increased overall use, we are expecting an increase in new users who are less

familiar with the area and may have varying levels of skill with winter recreation. We enjoy seeing new users exploring their national forest, but winter conditions aren't as forgiving if accidents occur. These are avalanche prone areas and the technical terrain, back-country setting, and mix of uses in the area can create hazardous conditions with potentially serious consequences for all user groups even under the best of circumstances. The increased levels of use we are seeing in these areas further compound the risks. Even with this closure, all users recreating in the area during the winter should be aware of and prepared for travel

through avalanche prone terrain, including on State Route 20 itself."

The closure of these areas to snowmobile and snow bike use during the 2020/21 season is a temporary solution to reduce risks for skiers and other non-motorized users at these locations while continuing to provide many opportunities for snowmobiles and snow bikes in the surrounding areas. Ranger Furr emphasized that, "We have a long history of user groups working together to resolve conflicts in the Methow Valley and we will be working with those groups to find longer term solutions."

# Where to find useful information on medicines, supplements



Where can I get useful information about my medicines and supplements?

Are you looking for information on one of your prescription medicines? Need-

ing to know about which non-prescription medicine works best? Intrigued by a supplement or herbal product, but not sure whether you should try it or not?

If you look around, there is a LOT of information, but it can be overwhelming. And in today's world of "false news," how trustworthy is it? Where can you find "news you can use" about your medicines, over-the-counter remedies, food supplements, and herbal products?

Not that long ago, you would get helpful information about your new medicine from your family doctor at your appointment. The pharmacist at your neighborhood pharmacy would then explain a bit more about it when you picked up your new prescription. If you had questions about your medicine, they usually had the time to point out and explain the important things you needed to know.

Today? You may see two or three different doctors. They often don't know anything about your other doctors or your other medicines, just what they are treating you for.

Instead of using a local pharmacy, many people have medications mailed out to them by a mail-order pharmacy, saving money because they can get a 90-day supply for the same price as a 30-day supply at their local pharmacy.

Pharmacists are so busy these days they don't have much time to come out from behind the counter to advise you on non-prescription products and remedies. You can get help from a clerk or pharmacy technician, but they don't have the in-depth product knowledge that a pharmacist acquires with years of education and training.

For years, I have seen people flail around looking for accurate, USEFUL information to answer their questions about their prescription medications, non-

prescription medicines, ways to treat common issues, as well as vitamins, minerals, supplements, and herbal products. The helpful advice that your local pharmacist and family doctor used to provide is now in very short supply, and you are on your own to find out what you need to know.

I started Medication Insider.com to provide timely information that's useful and easy to understand. It's designed to give you a pharmacist to ask those questions that you were too nervous to ask, forgot to ask, or that your doctor didn't have time to explain to you. Medication Insider has a free newsletter, a blog with posts that answer common questions about medication safety, remedies, food supplements, and herbal products.

Here are some places I recommend for useful information about medicines and supplements:

1. When You Need to Identify a Pill

I find Google's search engine to be the BEST way to identify a mystery tablet or capsule. Do your pills look different than they used to? I recommend using Google to double-check whether your medications are what they are supposed to be, despite being a different color or shape.

Here's how: First, put on your reading glasses. You will probably need them (I know I do!) to decipher that teeny tiny writing on the side of the capsule or the imprint on the tablet. Enter the pill's color, shape (round, oval, square), whether it's a tablet or capsule, and any markings you find. If the medication has a slash in it that divides it in half or in quarters, you can add the word "scored" to your description. After hitting the "enter" button, you

should get at least one or two options, with a clear photo of each. Compare your mysterious pill to the pictures on the screen.

2. General Information About Medicines and Other Treatments for Medical Conditions

I like WebMD because it is timely and comprehensive. It covers medicines, remedies for common problems, and more. WebMD also sells advertising on their website, which can be distracting.

3. Food Supplements and Vitamins

The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) website at [fda.gov](http://fda.gov) offers accurate and useful consumer-oriented information about food additives, food supplements, vitamins, and minerals. It's an excellent place to find out what various vitamins and minerals do for you and what foods are good sources for them.

4. Information about Infections

Both the CDC (Centers for Disease Control and Prevention) at [cdc.gov](http://cdc.gov) and WebMD have timely, interesting, and helpful articles that explain infections like the common cold, influenza, and of course, COVID-19.

5. How Medicines Work and How to Stay Safe When Taking Them

Web MD and my blog and newsletter at [TheMedicationInsider.com](http://TheMedicationInsider.com) have articles on remedies, medicines, and supplements.

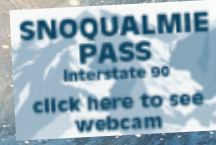

# 5 tips to protect seniors from financial scams right now

(STATEPOINT) - Social isolation among seniors is not only linked to numerous negative health consequences like depression and cardiovascular disease, but it's also a primary contributing factor in financial exploitation and scams. Estimated to affect one in 10 older adults and cost billions annually, the threat of elder financial fraud is pervasive, and especially so right now.

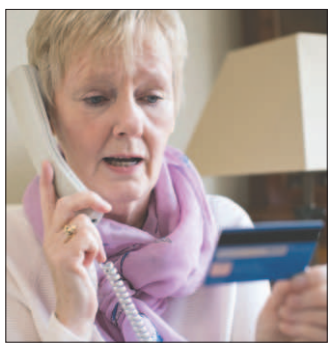

percent) acknowledging that older people are very or somewhat susceptible to becoming a victim. When asked about their peers, the poll found that 47 percent of all seniors knew someone who had already fallen victim to a scam. "The results indicate what most of us want -- the ability to age relatively unaffected from the realities associated with aging," says Dr. Marti DeLiema, a gerontologist and consultant for Wells Fargo's Aging Client Services. "The problem is that when someone doesn't feel they're at risk, they're unlikely to take precaution."

To better protect seniors from elder financial fraud and abuse, consider these tips from Wells Fargo:
