### Governor issues

#### Stay Home, Stay Healthy Order

OLYMPIA - On Monday, March 23, Gov. Jay Inslee spoke directly to Washingtonians to announce he will sign a state-wide order that requires everyone in the state to stay home. The order. It could be extended.

This Stay Home, Stay Healthy order is similar to orders that other governors, across the United States.

This proclamation requires every Washingtonian to stay home unless they need to pursue an essential activity; bans all gatherings for social, spiritual and recreational purposes and Closes all businesses except essential businesses.

"The less time we spend in public, the more lives we will save," Inslee said.

The proclamation states it's still safe for people to go outside as long as they remain at least six feet from each other. Grocery stores, doctor's offices and other essential businesses will remain open. People can still participate in activities such as bike rides, gardening, and dog walking — as long as they follow social distancing rules.

#### 18 cases of virus in Chelan, Douglas counties, 1 death

EAST WENATCHEE - As of Monday, March 30 there are 13 positive cases of COVID19 in Chelan County and five in Douglas County. There has been one death in Chelan County caused by the virus. Statewide total confirmed cases are 4,896, with 195 deaths. The number of individuals tested in Washington State are 65,462.

#### County Commissioners: Stop vacation rental to outsiders

WENTCHEE - On March 26 the Chelan County Commissioners sent a letter to the Chelan County Vacation Rentals Professionals asking the owners and operators of vacation rentals in Chelan County cooperate in not promoting rentals to people outside Chelan or Douglas Counties during the COVID-19 emergency. The Chelan, Manson and Leavenworth areas are popular places for visitors from the westside of the state.

The Commissioners said they are seeking many options to provide the best protection to the citizens of Chelan County from the COVID-10 pandemic and that people coming to Chelan County to avoid emergency directives and recommendations could negatively impact the public health, safety and welfare here in the county. They are also not adhering to Gov. Inslee's Proclamation 20-25 by not staying in their own home.

Should the need arise, first responders and medical personnel in Chelan and Douglas counties may need alternative housing (ie: area vacation rentals), due to their risk of exposure to COVID-19, and their daily work prompts their need to reduce the risk of exposure to their own families.

By asking the owners and operators of rentals to do this, it reduces the risk of introducing pathogens to Chelan County, where there are fewer hospital beds available per capita, than is needed, with other public facilities also in short supply on a per capita basis.

The letter was signed by Chelan County Board of Commissioners, Doug England, Bob Bugert and Kevin Overbay.

Park visitors are reminded to practice social distancing and to keep in mind that someone ill may have just touched that bench, pay station, or hand rail.

# Tiffany Gering wants to be your new Chelan County Commissioner, District 3

CHELAN - Tiffany Gering announced her candidacy for Chelan County Commissioner, District 3 last week. She currently serves as the Sales Manager and Chief Operating Officer for the Lake Chelan Chamber of Commerce and states she is affiliated with the Republican Party. NCW Media, parent company of Chelan County weekly publications Lake Chelan Mirror, The Leavenworth Echo and Cashmere Valley Record, contacted Gering for a Q&A session meant to enlighten the citizens she seeks to represent.

Here are our questions and her answers:

**NCW Media: How do you feel about lifting the moratorium on new marijuana grows – both outdoor & indoor?**

**Tiffany Gering:** Currently when marijuana growers apply to renew their license with the Washington State Liquor and Cannabis Board (WSLCB), the state grants approval even though growers are not adhering to county code. I don't foresee the moratorium being lifted until Chelan County and the Washington State Liquor and Cannabis Board can get on the same page.

With that said, I believe all businesses should have the opportunity to thrive in Chelan County as long as they abide by county

codes. When the litigation is done, the WSLCB and the county work together and the remaining growers are abiding by county code (or have closed), I see no reason for the moratorium to continue.

**NCW Media: What is the biggest issue you feel Chelan County residents face?**

**Gering:** Lack of housing. Hiring seasonal employees for businesses in Chelan County becomes an issue when there isn't enough affordable housing. But it is just one of the issues that County Commissioners are working on.

**NCW Media: Tourism and agriculture are our biggest money makers, but both industries rely heavily on so-called guest workers. Governor Inslee wants to make Washington a "sanctuary state" so how**

**will this be good – or bad – for Chelan County?**

**Gering:** I grew up in Brewster and vividly remember when Gebbers Farms had to let go over 500 illegal immigrants. While I know this was an incredibly difficult decision for Gebbers Farms, I watched as they figured out how to successfully rebuild their workforce. They did so by hiring Jamaican "guest workers" through the H-2A visa program which provides visas for qualified temporary agricultural workers. Innovative, forward thinking is the solution, not becoming a sanctuary state.

**NCW Media: Selling ads on the radio and working at the chamber are great jobs, but what can you bring to the table in regard to understanding complex issues like housing, hydropower, and other infrastructure?**

**Gering:** As a Sales Manager, I worked with small businesses throughout Chelan County. Being successful in Sales, means that I know how to listen to people, hear their issues, consider options to solve the problems and execute a plan of action. At the Chamber, I am the Chief Operating Officer. I deal with financial issues, day to day operations, handle issues, as well as helping to impact economic development through Chamber events and creative marketing strategies. My business degree affords me the skills to work with the \$40 million budgets that Commission-

ers manage, knowledge to learn all aspects of an issue and the managerial skills to work with staff and committees.

I am not a politician. I am a problem solver, a communicator and most importantly, a listener. A Commissioner must be able to hear both sides of an issue, do the research, understand the impact and then make a decision that best suits the county now and in the future. I have no agenda except to help make Chelan County a good place to live, work and play. The taxpayers are my boss and the only promises I will make is to listen to the constituents, to research and educate myself and to help find sensible solutions on issues that face our county.

I have been told that I am a tenacious leader. I am not afraid of tough issues. There is definitely a lot to learn but I'm not afraid of a learning curve, in fact, I rather enjoy it. Over the last couple of months, I have immersed myself in the issues the County Commissioners are working on and I am ready for the challenge.

**NCW Media: What gave you the confidence to run for office?**

**Gering:** When a friend first mentioned the position, I was unsure. So unsure that I decided to start sitting in session, going to board meetings and shadowing the Commissioners. Before I committed, I wanted to be sure that I would 1. Like the position and 2. Not only be

capable but excel. Once I had done my due diligence, I had the confidence to take next steps.

**NCW Media: Please tell the readers a little about yourself, hobbies, church, family, passions, travel, etc.**

**Gering:** I grew up in Brewster, just 30 miles from Lake Chelan. After graduating from Seattle Pacific University and living in Los Angeles for a couple of years, I realized that living close to my family was my first priority. That is when I made the decision to move home.

I was welcomed into the community immediately. I was part of the Chelan Business Association before it morphed into the Historic Downtown Chelan Association. I have been a Rotarian for over 10 years and served on the board as treasurer. Currently I am on the Rotary scholarship committee and am helping spruce up the Teen Center with Thrive.

My travels include a mission trip to Mexico with my church, chaperoning high school students on a trip to South Korea for the Rotary International Convention and a trip to Kenya with Me to We and Lake Chelan Rotary. I have also travelled for fun ... to Mexico, the Caribbean, Canada (of course), Dominican Republic, Dubai and many of the states. 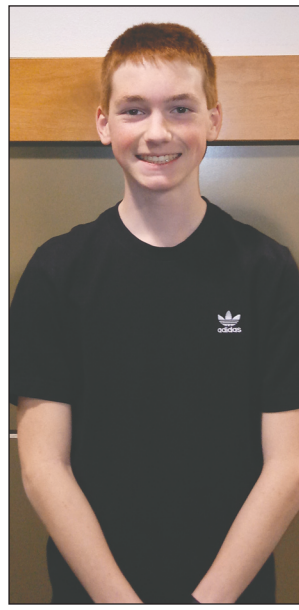

## Some good news for 35 local high school seniors

WENATCHEE - The innovative public-private partnership known as the Washington State Opportunity Scholarship (WSOS) announced its newest cohort of 750 Scholars from across the state recently - 500 of these are current high school seniors, 250 are current college freshman or sophomores.

In total 137 local high school seniors submitted applications (3,402 applications statewide) for the WSOS scholarship toward the Science, Technology, Engineering, or Math (STEM) baccalaureate program at the Washington college or university of their choice - 35 local students were selected

to receive the award, combined these awards totaled up to \$787,500.00.

This cohort of scholarship recipients represents the ninth since WSOS was first created in 2011. Supporting STEM education across the state is critical to Washington's future economy. Every region in Washington continues to grapple with a shortage of students graduating with the STEM degrees and training needed to meet employer demand. The unique model of private sector investment from companies like Microsoft and Boeing, matched dollar-for-dollar by the state of Washington is helping fill the gap.

The scholarship provides up to \$22,500, over five years, in financial aid along with innovative student support

services designed to reduce barriers for low- and middle-income students to pursue a high-demand STEM, or health care degree, and launch a career in Washington State.

This year's applicant pool represents the most competitive yet as the number of scholarships offered this year was reduced. In 2015, a generous donor enabled WSOS to increase the number of scholars selected to as many as 1,850 for four years. The last of these large cohorts was selected in 2019. This year, WSOS returned

to a cohort of 750 scholars.

Locally, the Apple STEM Network and the North Central Educational Services District, partnered with dozens of high school counselors, educators, administrators, and community partners to support and encourage students to submit their applications. These champions have a tremendous impact as they ensure that students in rural districts are aware of this opportunity.
