Lake Chelan Hospital Board approves pausing new hospital for Six months

CHELAN - The Lake Chelan Community Hospital and Clinics (LCCHC) Board of Commissioners voted to pause design and construction of the new hospital project for 6-months and then reevaluate finances. The Board of Commissioners held a special board meeting on Feb. 11, to discuss solutions focused on improving the hospitals overall finances and operations. The hospital has had a continued decline in revenues over the past year related to lower inpatient and outpatient volumes, physician and employee turnover, slower collections and reduced reimbursements. At this time the hospital has the funds to build the hospital; however, it does not have the funds to pay for the "mortgage" once the hospital is built.

"It is an emotional issue and we have to strip away the emotion to make a good decision" said George Rohrich.

The Board was presented with findings from a review conducted by Quorum Health Resources (QHR) at the Feb. 11, Special Board meeting. QHR is a national organization aimed at helping small rural hospitals improve financial stability through a

review, revenue cycle reimbursement and market review. After QHR's presentation, it was recommended that the hospital consider delaying hospital construction for one year. The Board tasked CEO George Rohrich in negotiating a contract with QHR for review and possible approval at the Feb. 25, 2020 Board meeting.

The Community Center at Lake Chelan finalizes new central location

Beneficial agreement for *community* reached

CHELAN-A central piece of property has been acquired for The Community Center at Lake Chelan thanks to a mutually beneficial, threeway agreement between The Lookout, Chelan Valley Housing Trust and the Seven Acres Foundation.

The new location of The Community Center at Lake Chelan is within walking distance of downtown Chelan and a short drive from the town of Manson. The property just off Highway 150 is situated below the Lookout housing development and adjacent to the current Chelan Cross Fit Gym on Bighorn Avenue. "This highly accessible property is more central to both Chelan and Manson, with easier access to utilities and buildable flat acreage. It is perfect for this project." said Seven Acres Foundation President, Ben Williams.

A two-acre portion of the land was previously earmarked as a donation from The Lookout to the Chelan Valley Housing Trust and will now be granted to the Seven Acres Foundation. This, coupled with the purchase of additional acreage from The Lookout, will enable the Seven Acres Foundation to donate five acres of land to the Chelan Valley Housing Trust in a location more suitable for affordable home development. Ken Friesen, Managing Partner at The Lookout is excited about the new development. "We are thrilled to partner with both the Housing Trust and the Seven Acres Foundation. Both organizations are working to help the community, and building community is what we are all about. We love this community and love being a part of making it better every day," said Friesen.

Each of the parties involved and more importantly, the community, is better

off thanks to this extremely rare, successful three-way negotiation. Ultimately, the Community Center will be in a great location that will better serve the community, while the Housing Trust will be in a better location with capacity for up to three times the number of housing units. "The Housing Trust is all about providing stable and secure affordable housing. and this land agreement enables us to do exactly that," said Mike Cooney, Executive Director of the Chelan Housing Trust. "We are grateful to The Lookout ownership and for the kindness of the Seven Acres Foundation. This best exemplifies how our community can work together for a win for our valley."

The Community Center at Lake Chelan will include a 25-yard competition swimming pool thanks to the Rynd family, basketball and sport courts, an auditorium with stage, public meeting areas and offices, as well as outdoor sand volleyball and pickleball courts. Plans for

the 25,000 square foot facility also include a commercial kitchen, multi-use rooms, indoor children's play areas, and a space for affordable private events.

The Seven Acres Foundation is continuing fundraising efforts for The Community Center at Lake Chelan and expects to begin construction no later than Spring of 2021. A series of events are planned for the coming months to continue educating the community and raising funds for The Community Center at Lake Chelan.

Steele, Goehner field questions, take surveys during telephonic townhall

OLYMPIA (CYBER-SPACE) - 12th District State Representatives Keith Goehner (Dryden) and Mike Steele (Chelan) held a one hour telephonic town hall meeting from here, Thursday, Feb. 27, where they explained their stances on a variety of legislative items as well as took questions from the listening audience. The two also conducted three informal polls to gauge the collective moods of those participating on the call.

NCW Media managed to get one question in to the pair via its East Wenatchee office: What would you do with the \$1.1 billion unexpected new revenue in state coffers? The first thing Rep. Steele said, was that it was an issue unfortunately out of the GOP hands because the majority Democrats will not allow a GOP proposal to use the surplus to give tax relief to Washington's property taxpayers. (See statement below)

Both men agreed that they would try to get that "extra" money back to the taxpayers that gave it to the state in the first place. In fact they held one of the three polls on the question of whether or not taxpayers would like that money ... or not. The obvious answer was yes, 86 percent thought more money in their pockets because of

lower property taxes would be a good thing.

Questions came in from Leavenworth, Twisp, Ephrata, Chelan and Manson. Phyllis from Leavenworth called-in to complain about outsiders buying second and third homes and causing county property assessments to rise for those local residents that can't afford the extra taxes accusing authorities of trying to tax longtime residents out of their homes.

Fred, another caller from Leavenworth, wanted to know how some politicians could push aside the \$30 car tabs? Rep. Goehner said the state budget should "reflect the will of the people" to not allow more and more localities to add taxes to car tabs.

Bob from Chelan wanted to know when the Washington State Department of Transportation would conduct its third party efficiency study. Rep. Steele said he would be happy to work on that issue with the caller.

A caller from Twisp want-

ed to know how to protect the Methow Valley watershed and William from East Wenatchee enquired about the rise in B&O (business and occupation) taxes.

Regarding the B&O issue, Rep. Goehner stated once again that the majority rules and both he and Rep. Steele will continue to try to protect the small businesses of the state calling small business the "economic engine" of Washington.

The issue of sanctuary cities and in this case, a sanctuary state came up. Rep. Goehner said the bill is already in the Governor's Mansion awaiting his signature to make Washington a santuary state. Rep. Goehner stated he didn't understand the purpose of doing that, but again, majority rules. Perhaps the most provocative question of the night came near the end of the event when Joyce from Ephrata asked about why sex education was going to be taught to children starting in kindergarden.

Rep. Steele said he was adamantly opposed to this

concept. "We should not be teaching this in kindergarden. We want locally elected school boards to make the best decision for that district." Rep. Goehner said, "I agree with Rep. Steele." He went on to say that maybe 6th Grade would be a more appropriate grade level to start sex education.

Caller Chris from Manson wanted to know the logic behind taxing homeowners more in order to create more housing calling that just "more of a burden" on homeowners. He sugested regulating rentals that in some cases are acting as hotels with the amount of transient traffic involved. Rep. Steele said he didn't agree on more taxation and Rep. Goehner said regulations have driven up the cost of housing to the point of "diminsihing returns" for homeowners. He said he was in favor of "removing impediments" to allow more housing be built on the scarce available land in Chelan County.

"On Feb. 19, the Economic and Revenue Forecast Council (ERFC) announced a surge of \$1.1 billion in unexpected new revenue during the state's quarterly revenue forecast. In total, the state now has a \$2.4 billion budget surplus.

With taxpayer dollars continuing to come into the state at record levels, House Republicans believe the new revenue and budget surplus gives us

an opportunity to reduce state property taxes. We had House Bill 2222, which would provide property tax relief, ready to go on the first day of session, but it has not received a public hearing.

House Republicans have also recently introduced House Bill 2946 to provide \$1 billion in tax relief for Washington's working families. The legislation would uphold voters' choice for \$30 car tabs, while ensuring stable funding for roads and transit, eliminate the sales tax on prepared food items sold at grocery stores and eliminate the sales tax on certain personal necessities.

Revenues are more than sufficient to invest in critical government services and provide meaningful tax relief," stated a GOP pre-townhall statement.

The press release went on to state, "It (the Democrat state budget) does not include any plans to return some of the surplus or new revenue to you, the taxpayers. It increases spending from last year's 2019-21 operating budget from \$52.5 billion to approximately \$53.8 billion. It would only leave \$59 million in the general fund account and \$2.8 billion in the Budget Stabilization Account.

Under this proposal, spending will have increased by nearly 75 percent since 2013 and is up 20 percent over the last biennium. It is not sustainable or fiscally responsible."

WENATCHEE - It may seem pretty basic, but noone starts a construction project without a plan. That plan will include estimates on materials, time-frame, and costs. The more complex and long a project is, the greater the number of variables are present. When variables increase, so does the risk for error. In the real-world we call these planning errors "cost over-runs." Again; this is all very basic.

Thus, I am always surprised when I talk to retirement-age people who have given very little thought to how they will maintain their freedom and autonomy as they age.

Perhaps this is because we naturally recoil at the prospect that we will eventually lose our ability to make our own decisions

and achieve our preferences.

We tend to think something like: "I am my own man, I make my own decisions and I always will." But that is not reality.

The reality is that our bodies and our minds will not last forever. They will deteriorate over time. If we are honest, we see this all around us in both our extended families and our friends' families.

Ok -you will not always be able to make your own decisions. So what should you consider in choosing a 'substitute decision maker" that can step up when the time comes?

• Who will assist me when I can't help myself? • Who can I rely upon to

make sure that all my bills are paid? • Who can I rely upon to make sure my investments

are managed? • Who will help me with seasonal tasks around the house?

• Who can I rely upon to take me to doctor's appointments and make medical decisions?

• Who will drive me when I can't drive myself? (For that matter, who will make the decision that I can no longer drive? (May it never be!))

Each person will have a different answer for the "who." This will depend

heavily upon the person's family relationships (close or strained), health condition (good or terminal) and financial position (wealthy or meager).

For some, their family relationships are such that they absolutely trust the decision-making capability of their children. For others, their family relationships require that rely primarily upon third parties to assist with decision making (e.g. trusted friends or professionals).

The point of all of this is to encourage you to honestly assess your plan. Do you have one? Has it been put into writing? Is that writing a legally enforceable Durable Power of Attorney? Do your future decision makers know what your preferences are? Will they be able to execute on your preferences when the time comes?

Although known more for boxing prowess than good judgment, Mike Tyson clearly understands that even the best-laid plans must survive the unexpected.

How will your plan handle a cancer diagnosis, early on-set dementia or decade long stint in a nursing home? There are myriad variables at play for every different person and the time horizon is very long (hopefully!).

The call to action is for you to soberly assess your plan. This is your life, your preferences, and your desires. It is much more important than any construction project.

Have you given your plan for future substitute-decision makers the consideration that it deserves? If not, then the time is now.

Early season trout and salmon BY JOHN KRUSE, THE WASH-

INGTON OUTDOOR REPORT

The first day of March brings a host of fishing opportunities for both salmon and trout anglers across Washington State. Here's a round-up of what's in store:

SEKIU SALMON: A special winter/spring season for hatchery Chinook salmon opens March 1 off Sekiu and

the Olympic Peninsula in Marine Area 5. This is not a day trip for most of our readers but you may well be rewarded with a limit of two hatchery fish a day averaging 5 to 10 pounds in size. Tom Burlingame is the owner of Excel Fishing Charters and expects a good season with limits being the norm rather than the exception. That's good news for Puget Sound area anglers who have struggled to land salmon so far this winter in other marine areas.

TUCANNON LAKES:

Several lakes in Southeast Washington provide some early trout options in a scenic area. Rainbow and Deer Lakes open up on March 1. The staff at The Last Resort on Tucannon Road near Pomeroy say in addition to holdover trout both lakes have been planted with lots of pan-sized rainbow trout and there are also some 50 to 100 jumbo trout that have been planted as well. Watson Lake will not be accessible due to recent flooding that damaged the road to it. Spring, Blue and Big Four

Lakes are all ice-free and open for year-round fishing.

QUINCY LAKES: Another March 1 trout opportunity opens up at the Quincy lakes between Quincy and George in Central Washington. Anglers are hoping to fish these sagebrush lined lakes under sunny skies and up to 45 percent of the anglers here come from Western Washington every year to camp, soak up some sunshine, and catch rainbow trout. Martha Lake near George

is a good place to go if you don't have a boat and success rates tend to be high the first week of March. To the north Burke Lake was over run with small perch last year and was treated with rotenone in 2019 so this won't be a good bet on the March opener. Several small walkin lakes however, receive small stockings of trout in the Quincy Lakes Wildlife Unit and Dusty Lake, a larger lake that is also a walk-in destination, offers good fishing for quality trout. This is in part because you have to work a bit to hike here and the lake is under selective regulations where no bait is allowed, only artificial lures with a single barbless hook. There is a limit of one fish over 18 inches in size.

Most anglers will likely head to Quincy Lake this year. This body of water is easily accessible by car and has a good boat launch. Better still, the Quincy Valley Chamber of Commerce will hold their annual trout derby here this year on Saturday. March 7. The event kicks off at sunrise and goes until 1 PM. The angler who turns in the biggest trout (by length) will win a guided fishing trip.

of Quincy Lake a few years ago. Cash prizes will be given to other top adult and youth anglers ranging from \$25 to \$100 and there will also be a 12-foot boat/motor package raffled off at the derby.

You can purchase tickets online (\$30 for adults/ \$15 for youth) at the events page at www.quincyvalley.org or at Quincy Hardware and Lumber, Hooked on Toys in Wenatchee and Sportsman's Warehouse in East Wenatchee. All proceeds will be benefit Quincy Valley Tourism.

COLUMBIA RIVER SPRING CHINOOK FORE-CAST: Chinook salmon may be hard to come by for anglers this spring. WDFW forecasts a run of 81,700 fish, the second lowest forecast they've predicted in recent years and just above last year's run of Springers. This number represents only 43 percent of the long-term average in terms of the number of salmon returning and Ryan Lathrop with WDFW says poor ocean conditions are to blame. Chinook fishing will be allowed from March 1 through 31 and then on Thursdays, Fridays and Saturdays in April below Bonneville Dam. Returning salmon forecasts have been off before. Here's hoping spring Chinook numbers come in better than expected.

LICENSE FEE IN-CREASE? The Washington Dept. of Fish and Wildlife is facing a 26-million-dollar budget shortfall this year. Governor Jay Inslee proposed giving the agency just 15 million dollars and have angler and hunter license fee increases make up the rest. Fortunately, both the House (with a 24 million dollar proposed budget) and Senate (with a 21 million dollar proposed budget) realized that license fee increases were not the way to go this year. It remains to be seen what the final budget will be for this long under funded agency but things are looking better than they were when the Governor unveiled his initial budget.

Solving the confusion between sulfa, sulfate and sulfites

One Saturday morning, 55-year-old Sara stalked up to our pharmacy counter, a brown prescription vial in her hand and a look that could blister paint on a wall 10 feet away. "I can't take this stuff, it has Sulfa in it, it says so right on the label! I've told you, I'm deathly allergic to sulfa. I could have died!"

"Sara, you're not in any danger. See? This medicine is a sulf-ATE, not a sul-FA. They sound quite similar, but don't worry, they're not the same thing at all.

This medicine contains a sulfate, which means that part of it contains a salt that has some sulfur in it. The salt part isn't an active part of the medicine; it's just the way it's made. Even people who are allergic to sulfa drugs can take medicines like this without any trouble.

I can't guarantee that you won't have a reaction to this medicine, Sara, but if you do, it will be the OTHER part of your medicine that'll be the trouble, not the salt part of it."

When someone reports they are allergic to sulfa, it usually means that they've had an allergic reaction to an antibiotic containing sulfa. Sulfacontaining antibiotics are called sulfonamides because they contain a specific cluster of sulfur, oxygen, nitrogen and hydrogen molecules called a sulfonamide moiety. It's the shape of that entire cluster that triggers the reaction, not the fact that it contains sulfur.

There are three general types of these sulfonamide compounds, each with a different chemical structure. Sulfa antibiotics make up one type of them.

notice a red, raised itchy rash. The rash can progress into a serious, even life-threatening reaction affecting deeper layers of the skin and affecting other organs. Anyone who has had a severe or life-threatening reaction to any medication, not just sulfamethoxazole, should always let their doctor and pharmacist know, because people who have experienced a serious allergic reaction to one medicine are more likely to react to others.

Another type of reaction that is confused with an allergic reaction to sulfa is sensitivity to sulfites, which can cause trouble breathing in sensitive people. Sulfites are preservatives used in foods, wines and some medicines like eye drops. Sulfites were once widely used on fruits and vegetables to combat bacteria, but are now restricted. The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) requires any foods, wines or medicines containing sulfites to disclose it on the label.

> Here are 4 Key Facts About Taking Sulfa Drugs, Sulfates and Sulfites:

1. Sulfates and sulfites are chemically different from sulfa drugs.

Being allergic to sulfa antibiotics doesn't mean that you will react to sulfates or sulfites.

2. Sulfa antibiotics have several different names.

Trimethoprim-sulfamethoxazole is the sulfa antibiotic most used in the United States, a name too long to say easily or fit onto a prescription label. Watch out for the names Bactrim®, Septra®. co-trimoxazole and the abbreviations TMP-SMX or SMX-TMP. 3 .If you develop a rash, call your doctor right away Sulfa antibiotics can trigger a rash that can turn into a life-threatening allergic reaction called Stevens-Johnson syndrome. Stevens-Johnson starts out as a full-body rash, can eventually cause your skin to peel completely off, and progress to organ failure and even death.

It's true that people allergic to sulfonamide antibiotics are more likely to experience allergic reactions to other types of sulfonamide medicines, but that's only because they also tend to react more often to different medicines and chemicals like in soaps and foods, not because of any direct cross-sensitivity or cross-reaction with the other sulfonamides.

Only about 3% of the general population has a true allergy to "sulfa drugs", or sulfonamide antibiotics. If you are one of them, you should definitely avoid the sulfa antibiotic sulfamethoxazole and anything that contains it, like the antibiotic combination trimethoprim-sulfamethoxazole. With 11 syllables to pronounce and spell, trimethoprim-sulfamethoxazole is often referred to by its older brand names Bactrim®, Septra® or abbreviated as TMP-SMX or SMX-TMP.

People experiencing an allergic reaction to a sulfonamide antibiotic often

4. If you have asthma, avoid sulfite preservatives.

People with asthma are more likely to react to sulfites, which are preservatives commonly found in foods, wines and in some eye drops. The FDA requires foods or medicines preserved with sulfites to show that on their labeling, to allow you to avoid them more easily.
