Almost \$8,000 raised by bell ringers

CHELAN - "I'm always amazed how giving, caring and generous people are that live in our community," said Julie Mc-Coy, Red Kettle Campaign Chairperson. As the annual Salvation Army Red Kettle Campaign closed on Christmas Eve, businesses, organizations, churches, and individuals from our community had staffed over 100 shifts at the Kettle.

Ringing of the bells took place at Chelan Safeway, Manson Red Apple, and the Chelan Post Office, raising almost \$8,000 for Chelan Valley Hope. Proceeds will help those in need this Holiday Season, providing emergency shelter, food and gas vouchers, warm clothing, assistance with among other things. All proceeds from the Kettle will stay right here in our Valley.



As always, our community was exceedingly generous. Organizations and businesses that volunteered to staff the Red Kettle included Starbucks, the VFW. American Legion, Manson Kiwanis, the Eagles, Wells Fargo Bank, Chase Bank, the Rotary Club, the Realtors' Association, and the Roots School. Livingstone Church, Lake Chelan United Methodist Church, Real Life Church, St. Francis Catholic Church,

and North Shore Bible Church also provided volunteer ringers, with North Shore Bible Church staffing a whopping 20 shifts and supplying a much-utilized list of back-up ringers. On Wednesday afternoon last week, in only four hours, ringers outside at the Chelan Post Office (from Starbucks and Rotary) brought in over \$300. And the final day of ringing at

NCW Pet Cremation opens in Okanogan

GLENN GRAVES, NORTH CENTRAL WA Pet Cremation

OKANOGAN - Back in 2006 the Okanogan County Crematory became the first facility to offer cremation services for people at a crematory north of Wenatchee. North Central WA Pet Cremation is now the first facility in the area to offer pet cremation. Up till now people had to take or have their pets sent to Wenatchee or even further away in order to be cremated.

NCW Pet Cremation uses an entirely separate crematory retort, which is similar to the one used for people, but smaller in size. The pet crematory is located in an entirely new and separate wing of the crematory building at 557 Cold Springs Road outside of Okanogan. The Crematory building is located on a homestead

ranch that was founded by my great-grandfather over 100 years ago where my family still resides.

I started working at the local funeral home as a summertime job setting headstones and mowing the cemetery grass after graduating Okanogan High School back in 1999. After graduated college and becoming licensed as a Funeral Director in 2005 my responsibilities grew and the following year I built the first local crematory in

Working for the Precht-Harrison-Nearents Chapel in Okanogan and operating the Okanogan County Crematory over the years, I heard stories from families I met with who wanted to get their pets cremated. Until now, we were unable to accommodate their requests because pet cremation requires dedicated equipment that is only used for pets. We now have that specialized equipment available to serve the pub-

We work through our local veterinary clinics where we offer pickup from the vets, cremation of the pet and return of the cremated remains to the vet clinic for pick up by the family. We also offer services that are similar to a funeral home where services are available for home pickups as well as a drop-off location in Okanogan.

We track the pets throughout the cremation process in the same dignified and thorough manner that people are cared for with. If a pet has to be put down, the local vets have our paperwork and can easily facilitate the process of pickup and cremation at NCW Pet Cremation on the family's behalf. If the pet dies at home, just call us at 509-422-2353 and we can either meet the family in Okanogan or if needed we can arrange pick up of the pet at the home.

Costs for pet cremation are based on weight. The costs generally range from \$100 up to \$325 for the larger pets. We currently accept Visa/Mastercard, personal checks and cash. We are in the process of making pre-arrangements available through our website and financing through CareCredit.



Road work, bulb outs will transform Chelan streets

Construction begins in May 2019, March 2020

CHELAN – WSDOT representatives Jeff Deal and Christopher Shell met with the Chelan City Council on Tuesday (Jan. 5) evening to go over design elements for

the 2020 paving project and traffic control project, that includes the roads starting from Lakeside all the way up to Willmorth Drive past WalMart.

The first two months of construction, WSDOT will do work on the south end of Dan Gordon Bridge meaning that a traffic control setup needs to be in place. "We initially looked at potential detour traffic thru town and then another option we have is alternating one-way traffic," said Deal.

WSDOT leaned towards having a detour since this will alleviate the issue of getting people backed up in traffic. Deal mentioned that the detour they planned on would run thru the heart of downtown from the now one way (coming into town) Woodin Avenue Bridge. Councilman Ray Dobbs suggested to push the detour up to East Johnson Avenue.

Lake Chelan School District to move into renovated offices by April

CHELAN – Blews Constuction, Inc. of Spokane has been remodeling the property at 307 E. Johnson since January 7 which will serve as the new central offices for the Lake Chelan School District

"We want to take advantage of a vacant building so we are in the process of renovating that," said LCSD Superintendent Barry DePaoli.

The space once occupied by Columbia Valley Community Health Center will now consolidate LCSD's HR, business manager, food services, the board room and the superintendent's office in the same area as the special programs secretaries and their Ed Psychologist.

This change will allow everyone to be together and will create efficiencies for the district as DePaoli stated. Ten new offices and a larger boardroom will be the feature of the new space.

Host Compliance to solve short term rentals dilemmas in unincorporated Chelan County

MANSON – Chelan County Director of Community Planning and Development Dave Kuhl stopped by the packed Manson Community Council meeting on Tuesday, Feb. 19 to talk about short term rentals in the area and all over the county.

"We will talk about Host Compliance technology solution, the Manson Ordinance that we will take countywide and give you an idea of the upcoming process that we will be going through," said Kuhl as he began his presentation.

The idea is to have input from all parties, the ones who run vacation rentals and the ones who are impacted, he said. In Manson alone, there are 60 registered vacation rentals with a typical nightly rate of \$250. Ninety-four percent of the rentals are for whole homes which are mostly single family (53%). Countywide there are an estimated 1,500 listings for vacation rentals.

Lake Chelan School District to build new high school if bond proposal is approved by voters in April

CHELAN – The Lake Chelan Mirror met with Lake Chelan School District Superintendent Barry DePaoli to talk about the Lake Chelan School District Bond Proposal which will be voted on April 23.

It all began in 2016 when the Lake Chelan School District held a community visioning forum in which 100 people participated. The forum was an opportunity to look at long-range strategic plans and goals for the district which for the most part focused on academics. Time was also spent discussing facilities, early childhood learning, as well as community business partnerships and technology.

"With that, we looked at what do we align those strategic goals with the facilities and learning environments of the future," said DePaoli. From there a facilities audit took place, "we brought in a contractor to look at all of our buildings and they looked at all the demands the school district has, what repairs we need to do. Then we had an architect come in and analyze our buildings and look at how we can best reconfigure for the future," DePaoli explained.

Two major PUD projects proposed in Chelan area

CHELAN - An informational drop-in session was held at the Lake Chelan Chamber of Commerce on March 13 by the Chelan County PUD as an effort to talk to the community about future projects.

A group of PUD staff was available for two hours, to discuss two major projects for the PUD including a new Chelan Dam substation and the Chelan transmission fire hardening.

"The last time we did strategic planning, customers were interested in replacing or rerouting infrastructure to protect it from fire and storms," said PUD's Transmission and Compliance director Chad Bowman. Wildfires become a huge problem as it kept on damaging infrastructure. As an example, in 2015, a number of poles burned down and it took over 36 hours to get service back to Chelan.

Chelan Fire Commissioners start talks on fire chief replacement

CHELAN - Commissioners began a conversation on the replacement for the Fire Chief. "We have two approaches, evaluating internal candidates and our open testing," said Chief Lemon. In order to conduct the open testing, Chelan Fire and Rescue would need to contract with a firm that specializes in executive recruitment. Lemon mentioned that Prothman out of Issaquah charges between \$17,000 to \$24,000 and ESCI out of Portland, Oregon averages between \$12,000 to \$20,000.

If the commissioners were to hire someone internally, they would need to conduct interviews with the candidates and then collectively decide on one. "Externally, you typically want to have a four-month window, so you have one to two months of advertising and at least two weeks to a month of deliberation," stated Lemon. To him, it makes more sense financially to hire someone who is already part of the fire district.


'Life is Sweet in Lake Chelan' when you are crowned Miss Lake Chelan

Manson Bay Park gets safety improvements


