MANSON - The Manson Community's long running effort to secure a parcel of land, commonly known as Leffler Field, for public use is a step closer to occurring. The five acre (4.97) parcel is located in the center of downtown Manson.

On Nov. 26, a vacant land purchase and sale agreement was completed between the Estate of Edna R. Leffler and two buyers, the Manson Park and Recreation District and

Funds needed for medical treatment

Dear Editor:

My name is Christopher Dodson. I have a 10-year-old rescue dog named Neva. She is in need of medical treatment. She has a large tumor on her leg, and unfortunately I'm unable to financially obtain services needed. Hive on a Social Security Disability income of \$751 a month. I applied for a Good Samaritan Grant from WSU but was denied. I contacted Neva's veterinarian and

was told their compassionate care is for local Leavenworth residents only. The receptionist at the Manson's veterinarian office suggested I contact the Wenatchee Valley Humane Society's Pet for Life Program, and there I was told they have no funds for medical issues. Because I would have to claim it as income, I'm unable to set up a Go Fund Me account. The only help offered has been euthanizing her. This at this time seems premature considering she is my emotional support animal which at present is counterproductive considering the situa-

Stage 1 burn ban called for Chelan, Douglas counties

UNION GAP - A ban on outdoor burning and the use of uncertified stoves and fireplaces began at 8 a.m. Sunday, Dec. 8, in Okanogan County's Methow Valley, and for all of Chelan and Douglas counties due to poor air quality in the region. A Stage 1 ban that began earlier this week in Kittitas and Klickitat counties will be extended. Restrictions on burning will continue through 12 p.m. Wednesday, Dec. 11, when conditions will be reassessed.

The Washington Department of Ecology is calling the ban because stagnant conditions are forecast in the region, putting people at risk for unhealthy levels of air pollution. Fine particles from wood smoke can easily get into people's lungs, causing heart and breathing

problems.

Under a Stage 1 ban, all outdoor burning is prohibited, including residential, agricultural and forest burning. Use of uncertified wood stoves, fireplaces, inserts, and other uncertified wood-burning devices is prohibited unless they are a home's only adequate source of heat. Use of cleaner-burning certified wood stoves, pellet stoves and other certified wood-burning devices is allowed.

Call 866-211-6284 if you think someone is illegally burning or you are impacted by smoke. Additional burn ban information is available at www.ecology. wa.gov/burnbans. Ecology's burn bans do not apply on tribal reservations, where the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency has jurisdiction.

Legislature has appropriated \$250,000 towards the acquisition from its 2019-20 Capital Budget. The remaining \$550,000 will be financed by Manson School District.

Three car accident on Beebe Bridge closes bridge

Editors note: This story has been corrected from what appeared in our Dec. 4 edition.

CHELAN - A three car accident on Sunday, Dec. 1 at 12:55 p.m. closed the Beebe Bridge for several hours and sent two people to medical facilities. Gray E. Jensen of Woodinville was driving southbound over the bridge when he lost control and struck the bridge to the left, then crossed over the centerline and struck vehicle two driven by Susan Bales of Auburn head on. Vehicle three, driven by Jose Mendoza of Chelan Falls was unable to stop and struck vehicle two. All vehicles came to rest blocking both lanes of the bridge.

Jensen was uninjured and has been charged with speeds to fast for condition. Bales was transported by aid to Lake Chel-





CHELAN - TLC is celebrating 2 years of service to Chelan Manson Seniors. TLC services include:

• 1,500 "one on one" visits to 65 vulnerable seniors. Visits last on average 2 hours or about 3000 hrs of service from 25-30 trained volunteers.

• Transportation for our clients, 15,000 miles logged doing visits and providing needed transportation for medical and other appointments.

· Friendship visits: Several of our clients were very socially isolated prior to our TLC volunteer visiting. These friendships have been associated with improved depression scores, improved adherence around attending medical and other appointments. For many there is joy in chats, lunch, playing games and other special times.

• Helped secure/connect with resources: Med Alert for fall risk, PT/SAIL exercise classes, Meals on Wheels, Lake Chelan Food Bank (LCFB) individualized food boxes.

 Provided in home help (chores, computer issues) or coordinated with local agencies for needed services: CVH, Rotary (ramps, steps), Aging and Adults (facilitator Alzheimer's Caregiver Support Group), EMS (fall assessments, medical alert devices, high risk client visits)

The primary costs of operation are 40-60 hours for TLC Coordinator and administrative expenses amounting to about \$15,000 annually. The Coordinator duties: 1) assess new clients, do joint initial visits with each client/TLC volunteer and provide ongoing training and support; 2) provide data/ narrative for grant writing with Mary Murphy, who

has generously donated her expertise 3) obtain visit summaries from volunteers, enter information into database for funding and internal needs 4) participate/partner with local agencies, i.e. Aging and Adults, CVH, CVCN, LCFB, Senior Center, Rotary around community needs: food security, improved use of Link Plus bus, and, in 2019, an Alzheimer's Caregivers Support Group.

Thrive Chelan Valley seeks help from community to bring training to educators, volunteers

CHELAN - Thrive Chelan Valley is partnering with both Lake Chelan and Manson School Districts to bring in high-quality training for educators and Thrive volunteers regarding traumainvested practices and adverse childhood experiences in August 2020. Officials from Thrive and local school districts are looking for community support to make their vision a reality.

In October, Thrive received \$12,000 from the Community Foundation of North Central Washington (via the Regional Impact Grant) to partially support trauma-invested training costs. Thrive's goal through the GiveNCW campaign is to raise an additional \$8,000, bringing the total to \$20,000.

Funds raised through the GiveNCW campaign will allow Thrive and local schools to bring in experts,

Kristin Souers and Pete Hall, co-authors of Fostering Resilient Learners, who offer resources which support educators and other caring adults in developing strategies which help create healthy, longterm outcomes for youth.

Local school officials estimate that approximately

30% of Chelan Valley's youth have been exposed to four or more adverse childhood experiences (ACEs). ACEs include traumatic events like childhood abuse, neglect, divorce, domestic violence and substance abuse in the home. Research states that a person with four or more ACES is 12.2 times more likely to

cide, 7.4 times more likely to struggle with alcoholism, and 2.2 times more likely to suffer from heart disease. Thrive Chelan Valley

tor, Kayla Helleson, shared her vision regarding this unique opportunity, "We believe that the more adults we have trained with effective strategies to support our youth, the healthier our students, schools and community will be. We encourage our community to support us in this endeavor

as we collaborate with our schools to develop proactive approaches that positively impact youth."

The GiveNCW Campaign opened Thanksgiving Day and runs through Dec. 31. Oatey earns rank of Eagle Scout



Elbert Morris Hubbard, Jr.

Elbert Morris Hubbard, Jr., passed peacefully away at his home on Willow Point in Manson, on Dec. 5, 2019, after a long Alzheimer's journey.

He was born April 10, 1935, at the home of his grandparents, the first child of Elbert and Aliene McKnight Hubbard, and was ushered into the world by his grandfather, Dr. I. G. Hubbard. He was later joined by siblings Sandra, Gary, Duane and Jon. They had an adventurous childhood on the shores of Lake Chelan, swimming, building the first water skis out of tennis shoes bolted to snow skis, making a diving bell from a water heater tank and camping at uninhabited Willow Point.

Elbert graduated from Manson High School in 1953 then attended Washington State College, earning his bachelors in education. He began his teaching career in Wenatchee at Lincoln and Sunnyslope Elementary.

On August 22, 1959, he and Hannah Cobb were married at St. Andrews Church, Chelan. They made their first home in



Lake City, and he began his 29 year career in the Northshore School District in Bothell, first teaching at Arrowhead Elementary. All the while he worked on his Master of Education Degree, taking classes during the school year and attending summer school with Hannah.

In 1963, at the age of 28, he was appointed principal of the newly built Moorlands Elementary in Kenmore where he served for 25 years.

At the year's end, he and Hannah welcomed their first child, Camille Lynne. She was the apple of his eye. During that busy and eventful period, he completed his thesis and received his Master's Degree in Education the next spring.

Todd Elbert came noisily into the family in 1965, knocking Camille off her only-



child pedestal. Four years later Kevin Michael "electrified" the family with his arrival.

Elbert made sure the family had plenty of fun activities, creating for them a model train landscape and Hannah planned weekend field trips, and in later years he always had "15-minute family projects" for all to participate in. Some of the best times were vacations and summers at the cabin on Willow Point. The kids learned to swim, drive a boat (there were many), sail, sailboard, canoe, etc. Special, too, was going to the family property up lake at Lightning Creek with all the cousins, catching fish, playing outside and getting bathed in the ice cold Lake Chelan waters!

Boating and flying were Elbert's lifelong passions, so in the 1970s he took flying lessons

at Kenmore Air Harbor. Many pleasant hours were spent taking family and friends for a flight around Puget Sound, out to Friday Harbor for lunch, and sightseeing around the Olympic Peninsula.

When, after 31 years in education, Elbert was ready to retire, he and Hannah packed up their Bothell home and moved to their much loved summer place on Willow Point. They became orchardists, bought a 7-acre apple or chard in Manson, proceeded to remove the big old red delicious trees and plant the new Gala apple.

Finally, truly retired when they sold the orchard, Elbert and Hannah had more time to travel and spend time with their family. They took 6 wonderful hikes in the Cascades, flew twice to New England in the fall to pursue family genealogy and were able to visit the historic 1740 home of one of Elbert's ancestors, Nehemiah Hubbard, in Middletown, Connecticut. Italy was a destination in 2000, Ireland and Scotland in 2006, and Alaska for his 80th birthday cruise.

Watching his grandchildren grow up and having them visit the lake on vacations and in the summer were very special. Fun, too, were seeing them play soccer and baseball, attending dance and piano recitals, orchestra concerts and high school graduations. He was so proud of his kids and their families!

Then began the long Alzheimer's journey. Elbert, the story teller, became Elbert the listener who asked in amazement, "How do you know so much about the Hubbards?" The always busy organizer learned to let Hannah do things he'd always insisted she do with him - like winterize the outside water and turn it on in the spring. He learned to be the passenger and let her do the driving. Even though his decline was physically challenging, he still walked briskly to the mailbox as long as possible. The organizing perfectionist allowed someone else to organize him, and gratefully thank them. The high energy person became very mellow, but his sense of humor remained.

The greatest gift for Elbert and his family was to spend his last days well cared for at home. We can't thank enough the loving, capable and gentle care he received from Ana, Yesenia, Javier and Lettie. Ana was with him at the last, holding his hand and making

a peaceful transition on to his next journey.

Elbert leaves behind his loving wife of 60 years, Hannah, his 3 fabulous children, Camille (and Scott) Mullikin, Todd Hubbard, Kevin (and Jacquie) Hubbard, six beautiful grandchildren, Dennis and Josh Chriest, Justin, Brett, Adrienne and Danielle Hubbard. He is also survived by brothers Duane and Jon and step-sister Linda McKenzie; nephews and nieces: Jerry and Jim, Lori, Brad and Tara, Cindy, Rod, Kim, Michelle, Wendy and Jennifer. He was preceded in death by his parents, Elbert Hubbard, Sr., and Aliene Haynes, stepmother Frances Hubbard, sister Sandra McClellan, brother Gary Hubbard, nephew Jeff McClellan and his beloved grandparents, Dr. I. G. and Edna Hubbard.

Steliko Lookout now available to rent

ENTIAT - Nestle into your sleeping bag at the top of a mountain, wake up to a fantastic sunrise, enjoy a spectacular sunset, watch chipmunks scamper around and birds fly by, all experiences that will soon become available to individuals renting the Steliko Lookout on the Entiat Ranger District.

"During the past year we have been working with volunteers to remodel the lookout so that it would be available for rent," said Entiat District Recreation Natural Resource Specialist Jon Meier. "We replaced the flooring, painted the interior and exterior, in-

stalled a new door, replaced the windows and siding, built new beds, and updated the small kitchen area."

The Steliko Lookout was built in 1947 on top of Steliko Point, about 12 miles northwest of the town of Entiat. It had been in use until the mid-1990s, and intermittently since then. With modern means of locating wildfires, such as aerial observation and satellite technology, it no longer needs to be staffed as a fire

"We are excited to provide the lookout as an overnight rental opportunity. Whether you hang out and relax at the lookout all day or do one of the many adjacent activities,

such as hike or bike the Steliko Ridge Trail or explore nearby roads, you're bound to have a great time, who knows you may even spot a fire," Meier said.

The lookout can be accessed by a high clearance car, preferably a SUV or 4-wheel drive, during the summer and fall; during the winter and spring the road leading to the lookout is gated closed. "It is a year-round opportunity for folks to enjoy a part of Forest Service history," Meier said. "In the winter people will need to walk, cross-country ski, snowmobile, or snowshoe the 1.6 miles from the Steliko Work Center

to the lookout." Currently, the lookout is available for a donation of \$50 per night. Donations will directly fund the maintenance and upkeep of the lookout. The lookout accommodates four people and no pets are allowed inside the lookout to allow those with allergies to enjoy the lookout as well. Contact the Entiat Ranger Station at 509-784-4700 to make a reservation or get additional information.

"The lookout was remodeled into a recreation rental to provide a unique overnight opportunity that the public can enjoy. Lookout towers are iconic structures that will always be linked to Forest Service history. Providing this lookout for public use allows visitors to tap into that

OLYMPIA - The Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW) has established rules for fluorescent hunter pink.

During the 2019 legislative session, the state legislature passed Senate Bill 5148 that allows hunters to wear fluorescent hunter pink. The Fish and Wildlife Commission recently adopted rules to implement the legislation, which allows



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announces pink is legal hunters to wear fluorescent hunter pink, fluorescent hunter orange, or both. Several other states have passed laws allowing hunters to wear pink clothing for safety.

> "Hunters must follow the same requirements as hunter orange if they wear hunter pink," said David Whipple, WDFW hunter education division manager. "If you hunt during a season that requires visible clothing, you're required to wear a minimum of 400 square inches above the waist that is visible from all sides.'

A hat, by itself, does not meet the requirement. Hunters may wear fluorescent hunter orange and fluorescent hunter pink on different garments or the same garment. As with hunter orange, a camouflage hunter pink pattern is legal as long as it is fluorescent. Hunters can find more information on hunter pink at wdfw.wa.gov/hunting/ requirements/ethics-safety/ hunter-orange.

"This legislation follows that of numerous other states across the country and simply gives Washington hunters an

additional color option to be seen while out in the field," said Jen Syrowitz, Washington Outdoor Women Director. "And, if one grandfather in pink inspires his granddaughter to explore the outdoors, that is a great supplementary outcome!'

Since WDFW began requiring hunters to wear hunter orange, as well as pass a hunter education class, hunting incidents have declined significantly in Washington.

"We're excited to add this new option for our hunters," added Whipple. "Many hunters, regardless of gender or age, are looking forward to wearing fluorescent hunter pink."

The first week of December is National Hand Washing Awareness Week, promoting awareness of the importance of the handwashing in preventing the spread of

Using an effective hand washing technique at key times during your day is absolutely the MOST effective way to reduce diarrhea, colds and viral illnesses of all kinds in yourself and your family, as well as in your community.

According to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), only 31 % of men and 65% of women wash or sanitize their hands after using a public restroom, and healthcare personnel practice hand hygiene only about half as frequently as we should. Yikes! When it comes to performing this vitally important skill to protect our health, most of us could really use an upgrade.

How should you wash your hands?

First, you have a choice between hand soap or hand gel or sanitizer. Which one is best? That depends. Unless your hands have dirt, visible soil or grease on them, you can effectively wash or sanitize your hands using either soap and water or an alcohol-based gel or foam, as long as the alcohol gel or foam contains at least 65-70% alcohol. If your hands are dirty or greasy, washing them with soap and water is more effec-

In health care settings like clinics, hospitals and nursing homes, using alcohol-based hand rubs for hand hygiene is strongly encouraged because they are more convenient to use and when used properly. they can kill bacteria more effectively and quickly than washing with soap and water. Alcohol based hand gels are also less irritating to the skin than soap and water, which

tive than using gel or foam.



is important because health care workers need to wash their hands frequently during each shift as they care for their patients.

Do you need an antibacterial soap?

No! The key to effectively cleaning your hands is removing bacteria and viruses from their surface by using friction and then rinsing them away, not by attacking them with a

Personally, I avoid antibacterial soap because my hands break out in red, itchy welts from my allergy to triclosan, a common ingredient in liquid antibacterial soaps like Dial® and Softsoap®. When I travel, I always pack a small squeeze bottle of shampoo with me to use instead of the industrialstrength antibacterial soaps common in airport and restaurant restrooms.

What's most important is HOW you wash your hands. You should rub the soap or alcohol gel over every surface of your hands, including your fingertips, fingernails, and between your fingers, for at least 15 seconds.

One strategy to keep you rubbing long enough is humming a catchy song that takes 15-20 seconds to complete while you rub the soap or gel around your hands in a systematic pattern, covering their tops, palms, between your fingers, fingertips and fingernails. One verse of a song like Freres Jacques, The Itsy-Bitsy Spider, or two verses of shorter songs like Happy Birthday, the Alphabet Song, or Row, Row, Row Your Boat all last about 15-20 seconds. My own personal favorite? The Itsy-Bitsy Spider.

hand-washing technique. Here are 6 Key Strategies for Effective Handwashing:

1. Do it frequently. Wash or sanitize your hands BEFORE eating, BEFORE and AFTER caring for loved ones who are ill, AFTER using the bathroom, handling animals or pets, and sneezing or wip-

ing your eyes or nose. 2. Check the label.

For effectiveness, make sure the alcohol-based hand gel you buy and use contains at least 65-70% alcohol.

3. Rub your hands thor-

Make sure you are rubbing soap or gel over EVERY surface of your hands, especially all of your fingertips and fingernails.

4. Don't skimp on hand

Many people swipe hand gel around and that's it. Apply enough gel so that it takes about 15 seconds to dry completely.

5. Sing a song.

Sing or hum a song that lasts for at least 15 seconds while you wash your hands. It helps kids learn effective handwashing and keeps you (and them) from stopping too soon.

6. Antibacterial soap is not required.

Effective handwashing or sanitizing depends on good technique, not on using soap that contains an antibacterial chemical.

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
