Lake Chelan Community Hospital & Clinics planning ground breaking for new hospital, spring of 2020

Design of hospital coming together

CHELAN - Lake Chelan Community Hospital and Clinics held a Community Forum for the hospital and clinics on Nov. 13, at the Chelan Senior Center with board member presentations followed by questions and answers. The last community forum was held in March of this year.

Phyllis Gleasman, board chair welcomed those in attendance.

Topics covered were staffing, review of goals, finances, new hospital, services and quality and strategic plan.

Why are staff leaving? Gleasman said that from Jan. 1 of this year to Oct. 14, 64 Lake Chelan Community Hos-

pital and Lake Chelan Clinic employees have left the hospital for the following reasons: retired, resigned/mov ed, inactive PRN, no-call/noshow, term/licensed expired, term/performance, term/job elimination, resigned/career change, resigned/disatisfaction, resigned/personal, resigned/commute, resigned/ other, and death. Seventeen were unavoidable she said, 14 regretable, but unavoidable and 33 preventable (e.g. poor recruitment, inadequate training, misalignment of expectation, etc. Overall turnover in 2019 has been 24 percent, 17% of that was regretable turnover.

Turnover in 2018 was 23 percent, 2017 was 17 percent, 2016 was 17 percewnt and in 2015 25 percent. National average is 19.1 percent.

Mary Murphy went over the following acronyms and explained training they have

Chelan Fire Dept. stars in 'Burning Down the House'

CHELAN - Emerson Village, the idea both in vision and physical reality, took a massive turn towards fruition as the Chelan Valley Housing Trust (CVHT) sponsored a house burning party Nov. 16.

"The guys really had a great training experience, especially because this particular house had a basement which gave them a unique opportunity," said Chelan Fire & Rescue Chief Mark Donnell.

Donnell, who took over for recently departed and deceased Fire Chief Tim Lemon, said it was an excellent chance for volunteer firemen and full time staffers alike to get special training, but admits the flames spread a bit faster then expected as the 3 p.m. "burn down time" was suddenly a 2 p.m. event.

"The fire spread a little faster then we anticipated," he said.

Donnell also pointed out the area had to be made safe by cutting down a dozen or so Arborvitae trees so the pre-planned blaze didn't accidentally spread and endanger other adjacent buildings.

"This has been a com-

munity effort all the way," begins Rachael Goldie, housing trust administrator, "from believing in our mission, to raising the funds, to purchasing this first site, to partnering with every business and individual who helped make this happen."

The community wasn't fully aware of this event as many drivers and pe-

Chelan Transmission Fire Hardening Drop-in Session Nov. 20

CHELAN - Join the PUD for an Informational Drop-in Session on Wednesday, Nov. 20 from 3:30-5:30 p.m. at the Lake Chelan Chamber of Commerce, 216 E. Woodin Ave.

Chelan County PUD has proposed upgrading a transmission line between Chelan Falls and Union Valley from wood to steel poles to harden

the infrastructure against fires. Steel poles allow fires to pass by them without burning, meaning lines can either remain in service during a fire, or experience much shorter outages to de-energize the line while a fire passes through. See the Project Fact Sheet for more details.

The PUD and its consultant have completed 30% design for the line section from Chelan Falls to Union Valley. Features

of the design include:

• Upgrading all transmission power poles between Chelan Falls and Union Valley from wood to steel.

• Ensuring clearances are compliant with regulatory requirements – which means some poles may be taller than existing structures, and some may be shorter.

· Poles will remain in the same general alignment as they are currently, although

new pole locations will be offset slightly from existing poles.

The next step is for the PUD to gather feedback on this design from the community.


Veterans honored with parade, barbeque

and what they can do: MD -Medical Doctor, DO-Doctor of Osteopathic Medicine, PA-C- Physician Assitant-Certified, PA-Physician Asssitant, ARNP-Advanced Registered Nurse Practitioner and DNP-Doctorate. The Lake Chelan Clinic currently has several ARNP's, a PA-C, an MD and and incoming DO. Dr. Waszkewitz has returned part-time and Lincoln Westfall, DO, will start seeing patients in December. Another change is that all labs are now being done at the hospital, with staff from clinic now at the hospital. Lab services are available 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.


Those attending saw a short cell phone video from George Rohrich, incoming CEO for LCCHC. He said he plans on taking the first 90 days to observe operations and strategy before making any changes. He will be on board the second week in December.

Gleasman went over the pillars adopted for the board which are: 1. People: Vision - Highly -skilled and engaged staff and providers. 2. Service: Vision - Provide an exceptional patient experience. 3. Quality and Safety: Vision - Provide safe, quality care by preventing patient harm. 4. Growth and Innovation: Vision - Strong Primary Care with access and availability. 5. Finance: Vision - Top 25th Percent Operating Margain of Washington CAH's (Critical Access Hospital). 6. Community: Vision - Comprehensive Communications; effective outreach in wellness and education. Jordanna LaPorte spoke

about finances. The goal is to be operational and profitable, and to increase their cash reserves by \$250,000 a year, so they can buy what need, when they need it. Labor (75%) is a big part of their costs (payroll and employee benefits). That has been taking up most of their operating revenue the past couple of years. Balance of costs have been paid out of tax dollars (non-operating revenue.) Projected revenue for 2019 is just under \$25,000,000.

Mary Signorelli spoke about the new hospital and showed those in attend the layout of the new hospital. As of the Nov. 4 design, it will be 59,436 square feet, and is planned with expansion in mind. The clinic and EMS will not be part of the new hospital building. Darrell Turner of Bouten Construction, and project manager for the new hospital, was available to speak with attendees after the boards presentation. The architects have started meeting with the City of Chelan Public Works Department. Ground breaking is planned for spring of 2020.

Needless to say, the Trust

and their fire department conspirators came together to bring this newest phase of affordable housing to reality.

"We're roasting the house instead of the marshmallows," said Clint Campbell, vice-president of the nonprofit housing trust.

To date, all the funding to support Emerson Village has come from businesses, the city and private donors. This fifth of an acre lot was purchased at below market pricing for \$200,000.

The townhomes will sell

for \$200,000 and are available to those earning up to \$52,000, the valley's average median income.

"While this is a milestone for the housing trust, it's just the first step," emphasizes Tim Hollingsworth, housing

trust president and Chelan City Council member.

'We're in negotiations right now for other parcels of land and we can't thank the community enough for the way everyone has embraced our mission," he said.



Fall And Winter Whitefish

By John Kruse

Call them the Rodney Dangerfield's of the Pacific Northwest. The whitefish, whether it be the mountain whitefish found in streams or the lake whitefish found in **Eastern Washington reservoirs** and the Columbia River, are fish that like Rodney, "Don't get no respect". It's a shame, because in the steelhead-salmon-trout centric state of Washington, we are overlooking a fine gamefish that tastes good, fights well, and offers liberal limits of 15 fish per day with no minimum

Mountain Whitefish

Found throughout Central and Eastern Washington (as well as the Rocky Mountain states) the mountain whitefish is truly underfished. Many trout anglers look down on them but these scrappy fighters are a lot of fun and have a reputation of tasting very well out of a smoker. An average mountain whitefish runs from 8 to 11 inches long but 16-inch fish are not uncommon and even a 20-inch whitefish is not out of the question.

In the summer casting nymphs or streamers from a fly rod or casting small spinners works well for these fish but as the water cools in the late fall you should change your tactics. Danny Garrett is a fisheries biologist for the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife with a solid knowledge of whitefish. He suggests fishing a brightly colored nymph (with red, orange or pink) under a strike indicator above a dropper weight and near the bottom. Garrett says, "In the fall you'll find the whitefish in slow runs below riffles" and this is a prime time to target them. In late fall the whitefish will move into these riffles to spawn and they can be trickier to catch. After that, they will move into deeper holes for the remainder of the winter and in some cases will move out of streams into reservoirs such as Lake Roosevelt.

Unfortunately, many rivers and streams that traditionally provided good opportunities for late fall and winter whitefish (such as the Wenatchee and Methow Rivers) have been closedforseveralyearsbecause of the impacts on endangered summer steelhead. However, several rivers still offer good winter fishing to include the Yakima, Entiat and the Little Spokane Rivers (open December 1st through the last day of February) and The Kettle

River in Northeast Washington (open from November 1st through the end of February). On all of these rivers whitefish gear rules must be followed (only a single hook, size 14 or smaller is allowed and bait (usually maggots) may be

Lake Whitefish

Lake whitefish have a tremendous following in the upper Midwest and Great Lakes but only a few anglers target them in Washington State. These fish are not native to Washington but are now found in the Upper Columbia River and several connected reservoirs connected to include Lake Roosevelt, Banks Lake, Moses Lake, Potholes Reservoir and Scooteney Reservoir. They commonly weigh two to three pounds and the state record (caught on rod and reel) is 6.81 pounds).

Danny Garrett with WDFW says, "There is a tremendous biomass of whitefish in all of these reservoirs". However, Garrett says unless you know where to find them you probably won't run into them. In the summer the lake whitefish will stay in the deepest holes.

In the winter lake whitefish will move into shallower waters and reservoir inlets to spawn. At Banks Lake you will not only find them by the inlet but also at the very south end of the lake as well. This makes the months of December and January a great time for anglers to go after these fish from the bank or from a boat.

No matter what time of year you are looking for them, use your electronics to locate schools of these large fish near the bottom. Then, fish close to the bottom with bait like a shrimp fished under a slip bobber or use a small vertical jigging spoon such as a small Northland Forage Minnow Spoon, a Mack's Sonic Baitfish, a Swedish Pimple or a Cicada Reef Runner.

TheWashingtonDepartment of Fish and Wildlife has produced an excellent video about fishing for lake whitefish which can be seen on YouTube at https://www.youtube.com/ watch?v=ubC64vGneAo.

Finally, if you are looking for some recipes to cook up these chunky lake whitefish, try the Great Lakes Whitefish website at www.greatlakeswhitefish. org. You'll find recipes there for blackened whitefish with asparagus, broiled whitefish with caper berry aioli and even cedar plank-roasted whitefish with roasted tomato and olive relish. These mouth-watering offerings alone are enough to $get \,you \,bundled \,up \,and \,outside$ to try your hand at whitefish this fall and winter.

How do you know if you have dry skin?

All day long we lose water through small gaps in our skin cells by a process called trans epidermal water loss. Water from our body is continuously being released by and through our skin, not just when we perspire from exertion or excitement.

As we age our skin produces less sebum, oily substance that through the skin, and

trans epidermal water loss through evaporation can increase dramatically, especially in dry, windy or cold conditions. In the winter in cold climates we heat our homes, making the air inside even drier.

Frequent bathing actually encourages dry skin. After taking a bath or shower water evaporates from the cells making up the surface of your skin unless you can trap that water by applying a moisturizer before the water has a chance to evaporate.

Moisturizers improve dry skin by adding flexibility to the surface cells of your skin and by blocking evaporation. With many lotions, creams and ointments available, the more occlusive, thicker and "greasier" the moisturizer, the better it will block trans epidermal evaporation and trap water next to your skin. One of the greasiest but best at doing that is petroleum jelly, known as Vaseline®. 2. Minimize your caffeine intake.


