## House burning makes way for 'S'more affordable homes'

*Emerson Village project begins with a celebration and help from Fire Dist. #7*

CHELAN—The Chelan Valley Housing Trust (CVHT) invites the public to attend a “S’more Affordable Homes” house burning party on Nov. 16 on the corner of North Emerson Street and East Chelan Avenue when Chelan Fire and Rescue will do a controlled burn of the existing home to make way for the trust’s first 5-townhome project.

“This has been a community effort all the way,” begins Rachael Goldie, housing trust administrator, “from believing in our mission, to raising the funds, to purchasing this first site, to partnering with every business and individual who helped make this happen. We’re grateful for all the support and want everyone to celebrate with our “S’more Affordable Homes!” burn party.

According to Assistant Chief Brandon Asher of Chelan Fire

and Rescue, the controlled burn, which will begin at 8 a.m., will offer live burn training scenarios for the firefighters. “Then around 3 p.m. we will literally burn the house down,” comments Asher. “Our goal is to have it burned to the ground by the time it gets dark.”

A safe viewing area of chairs and tables will be set up in the city parking lot directly across from the home on North Emerson Street for the community to help celebrate

this first step in the trust’s mission to provide home ownership for wage earners in the valley. Coffee, soft drinks and water will be available along with platters of miniature marshmallows on cocktail sticks, miniature chocolates and teddy grahams.

“We’re roasting the house instead of the marshmallows,” remarks Clint Campbell, vice president of the nonprofit housing trust. “The idea is when everyone brings their own passion, their own fire,

to this issue of more affordable homes, then real change does indeed take place. We’re finding a way for people who work here to be able to live here.”

To date, all the funding to support Emerson Village has come from businesses, the city and private donors. The .19-acre lot was purchased at below market pricing for \$200,000. “Big or small, every donation helps and during this

## Lake Chelan School District to hold Levy Form Nov. 20

CHELAN - This February, the current Educational Programs and Operations Levy and the Technology Levy that supports the students and staff of the Lake Chelan School District will expire. On the February 2020 ballot, the Lake Chelan School District will ask the community to consider renewing both Levy measures. Again, this is not a new tax, but simply a replacement of the current levies at a lower tax rate.

As a result of these two ballot measures, the District is hosting a Levy Forum for staff and interested community members on Wednesday, Nov. 20 in the new District Office located at 309 E. Johnson Avenue at 6:30 pm. The purpose of this forum is two-fold:

To inform and educate the community on the new Levy parameters and

To provide an opportunity for input on the current needs of the district that are underfunded by the state.

This will serve to assist the School Board in developing the Levy proposal prior to authorizing a resolution for the ballot in February.

## Schrier holds Town Hall meeting

LEAVENWORTH - U.S. Congressional Representative for District 8, Dr. Kim Schrier, held a Town Hall discussion in Leavenworth on Sunday, Nov. 10. Dr. Schrier received her degree from The University of California at Berkeley. She is a Democrat.

Approximately 30 people were in attendance at the event.

During her opening dialogue Representative Schrier admitted that the Affordable Care Act is flawed but she ran because she was concerned about the drumbeat to repeal it. At the time she ran Dr. Schrier was a practicing physician whose clients included a significant number with preexisting conditions.

Representative Schrier said she was surprised that Congress was not the contentious place she had expected. It is a much more gentele environment and she has worked with many people across the aisle in order to address some of her concerns.

Having said that it is important to note that Representative Schrier was confronted by a front row of individuals wearing Make America Great Hats.

Representative Schrier said she has worked with Republican Dan Newhouse on a bill to reform immigration laws as they apply to guest workers. They just introduced a joint bill to reform the guest worker laws

as they apply to agricultural workers because they can’t wait for a comprehensive immigration bill.

Schrier said many of these workers already have a long history of living here and her bill would help them find a path to citizenship.

Dr. Schrier encouraged the individuals in attendance to turn off their TV’s and to not pay attention to news they saw on Facebook or Twitter. “Read more,” she said. Get your news from multiple sources.

Most of the questions posed to Dr. Schrier focused on health issues.

The first involved concerns about vaccines. Representative Schrier was unwavering in her position that vaccines are safe and while a small percentage of the population may have side effects that are undesirable as soon as those are discovered those drugs are taken off the market.

Schrier said most of the

people who oppose vaccines have forgotten all of the horrible diseases that have been eradicated as a result of the use of vaccines. Diseases like small pox and polio have virtually been eliminated.

Schrier went on to talk about health care. She said she is the only woman doctor in Congress. There are 17 doctors in Congress and only three are Democrats. Schrier said she is co-chair of the new Democrat task force on health care.

“Health Care is a complicated issue and I don’t think people who have not worked in health care should be driving the decisions,” said Schrier.

She went on to say that while we all want Universal Health care—that means everyone has coverage. She said she didn’t believe a single payer system is the only solution.

Schrier said they are working on a program where they limit the amount of your income you pay for health care to no more than 8.5 percent.

Schrier said they are also working on a program to limit the price drug companies can charge for prescription drugs to no more than 1.2 times what the drug sells for in six other countries.

Finally, Schrier said they are working on a bill to address “surprise billing” issues. This is where patients get a surprise bill because one of the supporting medical service providers was “not in the network.”

## Struggling through Winter

**CHELAN** - Just imagine waking up one morning and your world is turned upside down! This event can come in a heartbeat, such as the loss of a job, a horrifying medical diagnosis or a multitude of other reasons. This negative shift in your life can also take place after weeks, months or even years, struggling with addiction, relationship issues, ineffective financial planning and much more. In life's big picture, it really doesn't make any difference how you got to this point in life, you are here and now what do you do about it?

In our beautiful Lake Chelan Valley, we might be unaware but we are certainly not immune to the struggles of individuals and families in our community, many living paycheck to paycheck, beleaguered in life and some are homeless! Just trying to survive day to day is stressful, scary and downright depressing but during our cold winter months, survival becomes even more problematic, especially with reduced work for our families who depend on agriculture and tourism jobs. There is also good news in our Valley as we are blessed with an amazing non-profit organization that has been addressing these issues for over ten years, Chelan Valley Hope (CVH).

Chelan Valley Hope is a 501 c-3 non-profit organization that operates with a nine-person Board of Directors under the leadership of Michael Gibb, President. There are now two paid staff members, the Director and a Program Housing Case Manager. The organization currently enjoys 14 amazing volunteers that run the operations on a daily basis. Claudia Reed volunteers as Office Assistant and is excellent at managing the complexities of daily operations. Six volunteers are trained with Front Desk responsibilities, five are Intake Specialists, one serves as Bookkeeper, one serves in the role of an On-line Scheduler and one Non-Food Items volunteer who keeps shelves stocked and helps distribute items to clients. We also want to recognize Pastor Gabriel Ramos of the Berean Baptist Church, who helps with counseling, interpreting and occasionally he translates for Spanish-speaking clients. Retired Pastor, Tom Dunbar also helps in Spanish-English translation.

The search for CVH's new Director ended on October 2, 2019 when after several inter-

views with the Board of Directors and President Michael Gibb and the candidate meeting with several members of the CVH's volunteer team, Jean Gambrielle accepted the position. "I'm very excited to take on this new challenge and very thankful for those who have spent the last ten years making Chelan Valley Hope a success. I hope to build on past successes and advance opportunities to the next level for this great organization," Jean said. Michael Gibb, speaking for the Board of Directors and the entire CVH team said, "We are very pleased that Jean has made the decision to join our team. She brings great leadership skills, a long and successful career in the medical field and many transferable skills that will ensure her success as Director. You can read Jean's complete Bio at the end of this article.

Chelan Valley Hope, located at 417 S. Bradley Street in Chelan, is open Mondays and Wednesdays from 9 a.m. to 12 p.m. and 1-3 p.m. "We encourage people to call first and make an appointment," said Kathy Jackson, a seven-year veteran, providing the front desk services. "There is paperwork to complete before individuals can be entered into our client database and interviewed by one of our five Intake Specialists. Walk-ins in crisis situations are expedited through the process and helped immediately.

"The next step in the process requires spending 30 to 60 minutes with an Intake Specialist," said Claudia Swenson, who has volunteered at CVH for nine years. "We do a lot of listening and rely on our experience and intuition, as we evaluate each client's special needs and work together to create a plan addressing their highest priority needs. In winter we may provide one-time assistance with utilities or rent to keep families safely housed. Often the client leaves with a "to do" list with specific steps to help achieve

their goals."

Needs are many and resources can be in short supply. Unfortunately, many seasonal hospitality and agriculture industry workers find the winter months a real struggle as they fall behind on their bills. Chelan Valley Hope, along with a host of essential local and regional services and agencies understands the challenge and are focused on helping, while treating everyone with dignity and compassion.

The Chelan Food Bank is located in the CVH's building and is open 8:30-10 a.m. on Tuesdays and 9-10 a.m. on Saturdays. Food is just one of the basic needs for people in crises. Lack of medical services, unemployment, need for counseling, programs for drug and alcohol abuse and other needs critical for day to day living and housing. Topping the list is homelessness and that's where Catharine comes in.

Catharine Morehead is CVH's Housing Case Manager. Catharine has spent over 25 years working in Behavioral Health Services with a focus in Music and Arts Therapies, before returning to the Chelan Valley. She is also CVH's trained Database Coordinator, operating the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS). HMIS is a federal program developed by the US Department of Housing and Urban Development that tracks homelessness. This data is beneficial for national and local agencies and used to better assist, help, equip, and provide both short and long term solutions for clients facing near-homelessness or homelessness situations, hopefully helping solve our homelessness problem. "Homelessness is an increasing issue in the Chelan Valley because we are a destination area, which has caused the price of homes to go up and many homes have been sold and placed in the vacation rental market for significant profit, said Catharine. Because of this, many

be dropped off at CVH during regular business hour or at the Chelan Fire Station. There are several businesses in our community that are accepting non-perishable food items that will be distributed at the Food Bank. A one time or recurring monthly donations to Chelan Valley Hope provides resources that will be shared with people struggling in our community. LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

An open letter to Mr. Gildroy

Please accept this letter on behalf of our client, the Chelan Basin Conservancy ("CBC"). We write to provide public comment on the above referenced Chelan Bay Mixed Use Development Application pursuant to the city's Notice of Application ("Application") issued October 2, 2019

CBC opposes any interference with the public's right of access over streets and alleys that were vacated in 1927. This includes, but is not limited to, Boulevard Avenue. As you know, the public was given the unequivocal right of direct access to Lake Chelan over these vacated streets and alleys. As you also know, the deed refers to property that is adjacent to and below the project site. This land is encumbered in "perpetuity" to guarantee the public a "right of access" to Lake Chelan "at all stages of water." Id. The encumbrance set forth in the 1927 deed was reaffirmed by the City through resolution in 1977.

The public's right to access Lake Chelan over the streets and alleys that were vacated in 1927 has been impaired by the Three Fingers for more than a half century. While

CBC supports the conceptual restoration of the public's right to access Lake Chelan over these streets, the Application's supporting document, maps, and plans do not fully and completely restore the public's right to access Lake Chelan. It appears that significant portions of the vacated Boulevard Avenue will be used for the applicant's private, commercial purposes.

For instance, although the lateral line of Boulevard Avenue on the eastern portion of the property proceeding to the lake is encumbered as a public waterway, the applicant's plans indicate that a commercial dock and moorage will be placed over portions of the public easement. This is improper. So too is the fact that the proposal does not provide the public with direct access to Lake Chelan, as required by the 1927 deed. The applicant's plan is to apparently construct a parking lot over a portion of Boulevard Avenue. This obstructs public access instead of promoting it.

CBC urges the city to ensure that all of the land vacated in 1927 that is within the project area is fully and completely protected, promotes public access, and utilized for public purposes. CBC is particularly concerned that the applicant

has not undertaken a careful and detailed observation of the boundaries set forth in the 1927 deed. At a minimum, the city should require the applicant to conduct a full survey of the boundaries of all vacated streets and alleys within the project area on behalf of the public. Providing the public with notice of these boundaries, complete with the physical demarcation of flags on the ground, is necessary under these circumstances.

Additionally, it is clear that the applicant proposes to construct three separate roads over Boulevard Avenue, one to service the residential development on each of the Three Fingers. These three roads obviously benefit the property owners and commercial customers, but not the public generally. The City should ensure that the applicant compensates the public for the infringement over Boulevard Avenue by requiring the applicant to dedicate an equal portion of property to the public elsewhere on the site. The public is entitled to full and complete remediation for the construction of any road that serves private, commercial uses.

CBC is concerned about other aspects of the Application. For instance, the one-way

street system over the Woodin Avenue bridge has significantly increased traffic congestion on SR 97. The applicant's traffic analysis concedes that the project will add approximately 440 weekday vehicular trips to SR 97, but this is based on information that was collected in April, not the peak summer months. While the applicant uses information provided by the state to "adjust for seasonality," the reliability of this information is unsubstantiated and unclear. Moreover, CBC understands the projection of additional weekday trips to be an average; thus, the weekday vehicular trips on SR 97 during summer months will be significantly higher than 440. The applicant's projection also ignores the additional vehicular traffic during weekends, which in summer months, are likely to be significantly higher than those during the weekday. The City should require the applicant to study traffic impacts during the week and on the weekends during the peak season. It is critical to obtain accurate information so that the public is aware of the likely impacts the project is expected to have on traffic congestion.

The city should also give increased scrutiny to the water-related impacts of the project.

There is limited discussion of potential adverse impacts to the lake due to pollutants, both during construction, and as a result of storm water runoff when the project is completed. The City should ensure that there will be no net increase of pollutants into the lake. The sheer volume of the project, coupled with its construction and operation, which will all occur over the lake, warrant detailed disclosure and careful public scrutiny. There is simply not enough information to conduct any meaningful analysis of these impacts from the information submitted.

Finally, it is unclear how the City will ensure that the project's demand for water, once constructed, will not adversely impact the City's water supply. Demand, at times, already exceeds supply. CBC is aware of several projects that have already gone through permitting with the City but the supply is insufficient to reliably support already-approved projects. We ask the city to compel the applicant to undertake analysis that confirms that the project will not diminish the already limited water resources available to current users.

# Christmas tree permits now available for purchase online

WENATCHEE - Bright twinkling lights, handmade ornaments, and the scent of pine in the air all bring to mind thoughts about the upcoming holiday season and the Christmas tree which is the center of many homes.

Starting November 1, it was easier to obtain a permit to cut Christmas trees from the Okanogan-Wenatchee National Forest. Forest visitors may purchase them in person at national forest offices, from participating vendors, or now online. The Okanogan-Wenatchee National Forest is one of 13 National Forests participating in offering permits online through the Open Forest system pilot program.

Permits purchased online will have to be printed to be valid. However, this program allows people to purchase

Christmas tree permits from the comfort of their own home, or by using their mobile device, instead of traveling to a Forest Service office. Learn more online about purchasing a permit and gathering a Christmas tree at <https://openforest.fs.usda.gov>.

Free tree permits are available to fourth graders as part of the national Every Kid Outdoors initiative. Fourth graders with a valid Every Kid Outdoors pass can get one free holiday tree cutting permit from the Okanogan-Wenatchee National Forest. In order for students to receive a free tree permit, they must present an Every Kid Outdoors pass or a valid paper voucher printed from the Every Kid Outdoors website.

Christmas tree permits cost \$5 each. Each tree permit allows a family to cut one tree, with a tree height limit of 15

feet, or dig a small live transplant tree. Permits are limited to two permits per household. The permits are non-refundable and are only good on the Okanogan-Wenatchee National Forest. Christmas trees cannot be harvested in Wilderness areas, campgrounds, developed recreation areas, or tree plantations.

Traditional permits are available at all ranger district offices and the forest headquarters in Wenatchee. Most forest offices are open from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday; be aware, permits are not available from the Naches and Cle Elum district offices after 4 p.m.

# Stocking up for Cough and Cold Season

A couple of years ago, I spent one long, miserable week in January in bed with influenza. I coughed, I sneezed, my nose ran, and it felt like every cell in my body HURT. When I ran completely out of my cough and cold medicine I felt even WORSE. Ever since, I check my medicine cabinet before every flu season to make sure I have plenty of my favorite remedies on hand.

1. Delsym® for cough.  
Delsym® is a concentrated form of dextromethorphan (DM), the same active ingredient as in Robitussin DM®. Each Delsym® dose lasts for 12 hours, so taking a dose before leaving for work lasts all day. Delsym® is almost as powerful as codeine against a cough, but since it doesn't cause drowsiness it's much safer to use when driving a car or working around machinery.

2. Tylenol® for fever and headache.

I prefer taking extra-strength 500mg acetaminophen tablets for headache and fever over ibuprofen or naproxen because acetaminophen is less irritating to my stomach, especially if I'm not able to keep anything down but chicken soup.

To protect my liver, I stay within the maximum daily dose of acetaminophen, which is 8 extra-strength tablets (4 grams) daily. For those over 70 years old the recommended maximum dose is 3.1 grams, or 6 extra-strength 500mg tablets.

I won't run out of acetaminophen (Tylenol®) any time soon because my dear husband purchased a twin pack of Costco®-sized bottles last year. Because the supersized bottles don't fit in our medicine cabinet, I keep a smaller bottle of acetaminophen tablets on the shelf instead, refilling it when needed from the larger bottles I keep in a nearby closet.

3. Aleve® for body aches.

My worst influenza symptom is severe muscle aches. The last time I had the flu I SWEAR that a ninja snuck into my bedroom while I was asleep and whaled on me with their nun chucks.

I prefer non-prescription naproxen (Aleve®) over its



cousin ibuprofen because naproxen lasts twice as long (8-12 hours). I hated waking up in the middle of the night when my ibuprofen wore off after only 5 hours.

Naproxen and ibuprofen work better for body aches than acetaminophen, but if you take them while dehydrated from vomiting or diarrhea, they can harm your kidneys, and they cause stomach irritation, even ulcers. People who take blood thinners like warfarin, Pradaxa®, Xarelto®, Eliquis® or Plavix® (clopidogrel) need to be especially cautious to avoid stomach bleeding. To reduce your risk, always take them with a full glass of water or some food.

4. Sudafed® for sinus and nasal congestion.

I only stock the original version of Sudafed® that contains pseudoephedrine, the one you have to sign for, because the other formulation isn't very effective. I prefer the red coated 30mg tablets over the white 60mg tablets because I have trouble sleeping when taking the higher dose.

5. Actifed® for runny nose and sneezing.

I learned about Actifed® as a hospital pharmacist many years ago. We'd get an urgent call from the surgery department, requesting we send something ASAP to dry up the runny nose of a surgeon or scrub nurse. This was before we had the prescription Atrovent® nasal spray available, which can dry up a runny nose in a flash, so instead, we sent them a couple of tablets of Actifed®, a surprisingly effective combination of the antihistamine triprolidine and the decongestant pseudoephedrine.

Pseudoephedrine relieves stuffiness while triprolidine stops the drips and decreases

sneezing. Triprolidine has another benefit: unlike its antihistamine cousins diphenhydramine and doxylamine, it rarely causes drowsiness, so those surgeons didn't have to worry about nodding off in the middle of a hip replacement. Today, Actifed® is only available behind-the-counter.

6. NyQuil® for night-time multi-symptom relief.

While I prefer single ingredient products to treat my specific symptoms, if my husband gets sick he insists on "something to knock me out, so I can get some rest." The green original flavor and red cherry flavor original Nyquil® contained 5 active ingredients: acetaminophen for fever and aches, dextromethorphan for cough, pseudoephedrine for stuffy nose and sinus pressure, and both the antihistamine doxylamine and 10% alcohol to help you sleep.

After pseudoephedrine was banished behind the counter in 2006, Nyquil's® formula changed, now including several variations, using phenylephrine instead of pseudoephedrine. Nyquil® Severe Cold and Flu remains closest to its original formula.

7. Apple juice to prevent dehydration.

Instead of drinking Gatorade when losing fluids from vomiting and diarrhea, apple juice is an effective and tastier option.

## THE WASHINGTON OUTDOORS REPORT

By JOHN KRUSE

### Fishing:

An unexpected fishery opened up on the Icicle River Nov. 2 for coho salmon. Some 4500 fish are expected in the Wenatchee River basin, far beyond what is needed for hatchery operations. Boat anglers can launch from the Leavenworth National Fish Hatchery and fish their way downstream to fish towards the mouth of the river. Bank anglers have limited public access which includes one pull out on East Leavenworth Road and a section of the river downstream of the hatchery. Casting spinners or twitching jigs are two ways to catch coho. Be warned though, the fish have made a long journey to get here so be prepared to either catch and release them or consign them to the smoker.

Staff at the South-Central Washington regional office for the Washington Dept. of Fish and Wildlife say this month is the perfect time to catch and release sturgeon in the Columbia River Gorge. That's because the lower water flows and falling water temperatures improve both the bite and the resulting fight from these fish which can reach eleven feet in length and several hundred pounds in weight.

Tim Nizich at Clark's All Sports in Colville says trout fishing throughout Lake Roosevelt has been very good. Anglers are trolling pink flies, streamers and rooster tail spinners and using lead core line to get to where the trout are in 50 to 100 feet of water. The rainbows are averaging 16 inches in size and some are reaching 20 inches in length.

### Shellfish:

Dan Ayres, the Coastal Shellfish Manager for the Washington Dept. of Fish and Wildlife, says... "This year's razor clam system is going to be real gang buster! We have strong populations on almost all of our beaches and we are offering a whole lot of razor clamming dates in the months ahead. Populations are up and for the most part, there are a good number of larger clams."

### Wildlife:

A moose has taken up residence in the Horan Natural Area in Wenatchee. At least two local outdoors photographers have posted pictures of the adult cow moose on social media over the last two weeks. Be sure to give this big animal space and don't crowd it. Moose can be

dangerous and forcing it out of its habitat (and on to nearby city streets or highways) could be very detrimental to this animal's long-term prospects.

Jill Sessions works at Confluence State Park which manages this natural area. She is no stranger to moose, having lived in Alaska for 25 years. Sessions says, "Let the moose do its thing and don't try to approach her. It's fine to take pictures but do respect the animal. Never approach a moose or encroach on its natural area. View it from a safe distance. If you see the animal's ears pin back or if the moose lowers its head and shoulders, that's a warning you are too close and may be in danger."




