Two arrested, charged; stolen property returned

CHELAN - Sheriff Brian Burnett reports on September 23 and 24, several thefts, burglaries and car prowls were reported in the Chelan area. The combined property taken in these multiple crimes was over \$5,000.

Surveillance cameras at one of the burglary sites captured a suspicious vehicle. This vehicle was later seen driving in Chelan, was stopped, and some of the stolen property was seen in the vehicle. Both the driver and passenger from the vehicle were arrested.

A search warrant was subsequently served on the vehicle, and the stolen property was returned to the owners. Other items were recovered from the vehicle, but the owners have not yet been identified.

The suspects have been charged with Burglary 2nd Degree; Theft 2nd Degree; Possession of Stolen Property 2nd Degree, Unlawful Possession of a Controlled Substance Heroin; Possession of Burglary Tools, and Vehicle Prowl 2nd Degree.

Chelan hospital Board approves schematic design concept for new building

Project on schedule to break ground in Spring 2020, complete in late 2021

CHELAN - The Lake Chelan Community Hospital and Clinics (LCCHC) Board of Commissioners voted to accept the schematic design concept for the new hospital building at a special Board meeting Oct. 1. The approval allows the team to continue forward with specific design development, explained Mike Ellis, LCCHC Interim CEO.

The LCCHC Board Facilities Steering Committee worked closely with architects and the general contractor to ensure patient needs are met in the new building, Ellis said.

Spader Bay purchase by city shows 'failure of leadership'

Dear Editor,

Merely the fact that the purchase of the Spader Bay property was on the agenda shows the failure of leadership in the Mayor's office. After claiming for years we should run the city as a business, Mayor Cooney has repeatedly dismissed his proclamation and lunched towards favoring ingratiating his status with those he considers more influential or recognized successful patrons of our community and dismissed the needs of the City infrastructure, staff and local citizens. This is not new to Mayor Cooney he has often taken the contrarian view, resulting in the loss of competent staff, local housing, and a major ecological, and a financial cost to the City of Chelan.

His first major successful sale (as a councilman) was to convince the City Council to give away to new home builders our water and sewer services. My last count was he delivered to the local residents around \$500,000 in debt, which should have been covered by the new homeowner's. You are now paying that bill with the new higher water and sewer charges.

Undisclosed to us is the real cost of recycling. Several months ago, he claimed on KOZI radio the recycling program was running in the black. (no part of City government runs in the black, cities are not allowed to make a profit) This at a time another \$7,000 was transferred from the garbage account to the recycling account for the purchase of more recycling bins. It costs four times as much to recycle as it does to dump. Your garbage rates are increasing to pay for the recycling program hidden in the garbage rates. The curb-

side recycling is an expensive program not meeting the goals of conservation.

A third point, he opposed the funding of Lake Chelan Research Institute for the monitoring of water quality in Lake Chelan. That funding was for \$20,000 per year for five years. Now he is in favor of purchasing an undeveloped property with no beach access for over \$70,000 per year for 20 years. This so tourist can look at the lake and trample thru an otherwise quiet neighborhood. Who is Mayor Cooney working for?

Two years ago, the City Council identified about \$10,000,000 in projects that needed funding. We identified miles of trails that need improving and completing. The golf course needs improved teeing areas and irrigation system, cost; over \$1,000,000. Don Morse Park can use \$2,000,000 to complete part of the plan started five years ago. The maintenance shop construction, passed by the council two years ago has been shelved, it would have improved efficiency and work conditions for park employees. A well liked and competent employee, Karen Sargent is now gone. Do we need another unfunded project at Spader Bay?

Purchasing view property and undeveloped trail property was never on the list. Spader Bay property does not provide safe lake access or a beach for either tourist or locals. Mayor Cooney's confluence of a desire for more beach access with the Spader Bay property is a perfect example of the misdirection you can expect from the Mayor's office in the future.

Brennan and Associates will present the results of their feasibility analysis. Citizens will learn of the opportunity to create enhanced or additional community access points to the lake. Concept designs will be provided for eight potential lake access points already owned by the City as well as an undeveloped property site on Spader Bay.

Input from the community is encouraged.

A quorum of Councilmembers is expected to be in attendance but no action will be taken.

Increased construction costs made it difficult, but the new hospital is designed to stay within the \$44.5 million budget approved by voters in 2017.

Project manager Dick Bratton, Kreg Shelby from Bouten Construction, and Keith Null and Jamey Barlet from CollinsWoerman, the project's architect firm, attended the special Board meeting to present the revised design concept and answer questions. "These

men have done a remarkable job," said Mary Signorelli, one of two LCCHC Commissioners on the LCCHC Board Facilities Steering Committee.

Key priorities for the architects were preserving patient and staff safety, quality of care, and client care areas, said Barlet, who met often with hospital staff during the design phase. The approved schematic design, which keeps the overall building footprint as tight as possible, has two wings for patient rooms. The 59,250 square foot building will include 23 private patient beds, two operating rooms suites and a procedure room. The Emergency Department, which will be larger than what exists in the current hospital building, will have seven rooms as well as space for triage. The master plan leaves room on the site for a future EMS and medical office building.

Bouten Construction has already initiated communication with subcontractors, said Shelby. Once final construction documents are completed, subcontractors will begin bidding. The new hospital project is on schedule to break ground in Spring 2020. Expected occupancy is late 2021.

"It's very rewarding to see the teamwork and effort staff put into the new hospital project," said Phyllis Gleasman, LCCHC Board Chair. "Without their understanding and insight, we would not have been able to get schematic drawings where they are today. It was a total team effort, and we're excited to move forward."

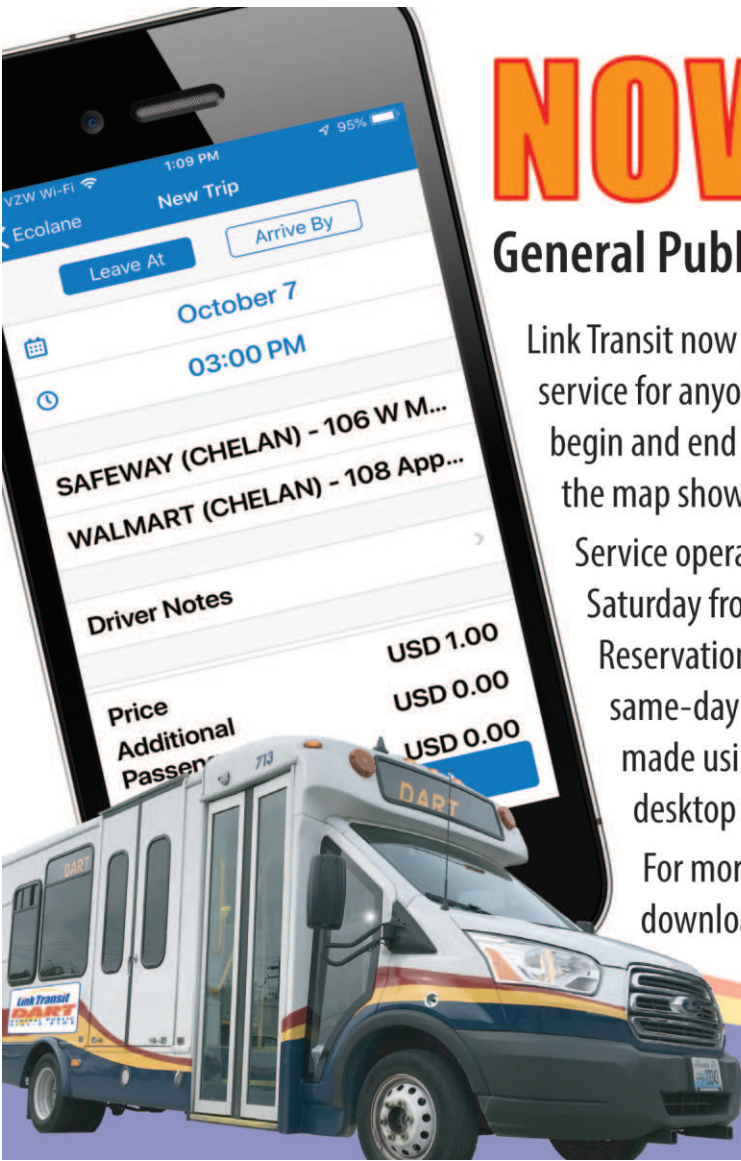

desktop or mobile app. Cost per trip is just \$1.

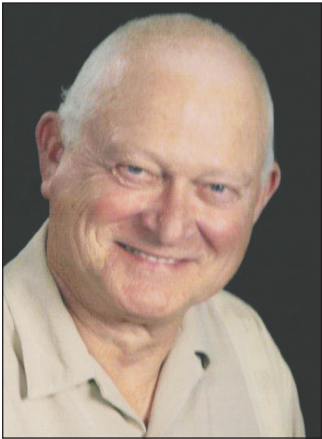

(8/22/1924 – 9/18/2019)
Born in Chelan, Wash., August 22, 1924, to John and Ina Pearl (Anthony) Veroske Passed away in Boise Idaho, September 18, 2019, at age 95. Graduated Chelan High School - 1942. Married Wilma Helen Cox February 23, 1944. 75 years married.



1943 – Entry into Army Air Corps

Bill was raised in the Ardenvoir region up the Entiat River, Entiat, Wash., in the North Cascades mountains. Father, John, a Polish immigrant, farmed and worked at the nearby Harris Mill. Mother Pearl, from North Dakota, tended to the home, poultry, food animals, the garden and raised five children. Pearl was active in establishing a public school every 5 miles in the region. Bill attended one of those 1-room schools through age 13, the 8th grade. That fall, he moved to Chelan with his high school aged brother, Jack, where they rented a small home and attended Chelan schools. Bill spent summers in the Ardenvoir where he gained a Dept. of Labor and Industries permit at age 13 to work in the Harris Mill as “handling box shook”. This was a prized possession that he displayed proudly on his office wall throughout his life. In Junior High School, he met his future wife, Wilma Helen Cox. A ticket seller at the Ruby Theater, Wilma would let Bill in to sit in the last row where they would hold hands when Wilma wasn’t selling tickets or candy. These Junior High School sweethearts married on February 23, 1944, a marriage that flourished with love and adoration for over 75 years. Bill always claimed that in school he wasn’t a very good student. Report cards showed otherwise. In high school, he was Class President and ASB President. He also excelled in football, baseball and track where he set a Chelan High School record for the shot put at over 50’, a record that

stood for 52 years. In 1994, he helped mentor another CHS student, Michael Young, who then set a new record. He also won a Golden Glove boxing award in 1941 at an Elks/ A.A.U. boxing tournament in Yakima. After high school he attended the University of Washington in Seattle for a semester before entering the army on Dec. 1, 1943. He served our country for two years in the U.S. Army Air Corps as a B-17 turret gunner, honorably discharged as a Corporal on December 21, 1945. Following discharge from military service, Bill spent two years in bed rest due to a rare lung disease contracted in Georgia. He busied himself and provided some income by making small pipe cleaner animals (rabbits squirrels skunks etc.) that local Chelan merchants sold. Following recovery, he worked as a clerk at Chelan Hardware. He often quoted his father’s financial advice: “Son, always save 10% of everything you earn.” He credits his discipline to this single statement to his saving enough to make a down payment on the purchase of a decrepit 12-acre apple orchard on the north shore of Lake Chelan in 1950. His determination, hard work and skills at apple farming became evident when he cured the orchard’s ills in his first year, resulting in success that allowed him to pay off his purchase after his first crop. This was the beginning of a 38-year career in the apple industry. As a land developer,

he acquired a succession of land parcels, developed them into highly productive apple orchards and then sold each in order to develop the next orchard. Throughout this time, he provided summer employment for numerous Chelan junior high and high school kids teaching job skills, accountable work ethics and respect. He worked closely with Washington State University’s Tree Fruit Experiment Department including dedicating several acres of one orchard to development by its students for experimental planting and tree cultivation. His success led to visits from apple growers all over the world, a cover article in “Grower” magazine, and to his visiting the USSR in 1991 with a contingent of apple growers from the U.S. and around the world. On this trip, he gained a greater appreciation of our free-market system as they visited high quality government orchards but also saw crops rotting in the fields and could rarely find fresh fruits in city markets. Throughout his life after this experience, he liked to quote one resident who stated, “We pretend to work and the government pretends to pay us”. In 1988 he and Wilma sold their last orchard, 37 acres above his first orchard, to Joe Snyder, Bill’s key employee of 30 years. That property is now the site of Benson Vineyards Estate Winery, one of Lake Chelan’s finest wineries. With the support and energetic help of his wife, he contributed extensively to their community. Many of the

Coach and occasional umpire for Chelan Little League baseball Seven years on National Ski Patrol at Mission Ridge Helped established a volunteer ski patrol volunteer program and training at Echo Valley. Help acquire and install the Echo Valley Poma lift. Chelan - Douglas Country Farmers Home Administration Loan Committee Wenoka Credit Corporation Loan Committee Trout, Inc., Board of Directors Lake Chelan Recreation Association Chelan School District Maintenance and Operations School Levy Committee President of the Men’s Division of Lake Chelan Golf Club Motivating force behind creating the Chelan High School boys and girls golf program. Helped start a 3-on-3 basketball tournament, drawing teams statewide, to benefit the Chelan High School athletic program. 1990s and 2000s: Trustee on the Lake

Chelan Community Hospital Foundation Board. Instrumental in securing a large contribution from Edna Bragg to establish the Bragg Scholarship Fund. The fund has given over \$1,000,000 in healthcare education scholarships to Chelan residents so far. Helped mentor promising shot put Chelan athletes, helping to guide Michael Young who broke Bill’s 52 year record in 1994. Was the first and inductee into Lake Chelan High School Hall of Fame along former State Senator Linda Parlette Evans and three others. Recipient of North Central Washington Educational Service District’s Friend of Children award. (Note: True to Bill’s spirit, he entered a BioGift Anatomical Donor program, desiring to give even after his passing.) In late 2008 (age 84), Bill and Wilma left their home of nearly 30 years on Lake Chelan and moved to Portland, Oregon, to be closer to son, Nick, and their sole grandchild, Ariel Veroske. Bill remained active, golfing in the summer, skiing in the winter, daily exercise walks and gardening. Still an expert skier he made his last run off the top of 9800 foot Mount Bachelor, Oregon, at age 86, still making his signature parallel turns. He, Wilma and Nick continued returning Chelan twice annually to maintain their lakefront property and visit friends as the recession ravage values, until the property sold in 2014. Bill had suffered from increasing hearing loss from his time in the Army Air Corps and years of operating orchard equipment. In 2016 he was diagnosed with early stages of dementia. The

combined effects of inability to engage socially begin to take their grip. In late 2018 it became necessary to move Bill and Wilma into separate memory and assisted-living facilities. They achieved 75 years of marriage on February 23, 2019. In August, 2019, Bill moved to Boise, Idaho, close to Wilma and their daughter. Wilma was with him at the time of his death holding his hand one more time - and no doubt feeling the love from their junior high school days when they would hold hands in the Ruby Theater, and of a beautiful lifetime together.

Survivors include his wife of 75 years, Wilma, age 96 of Boise, Idaho, son Nick Veroske of Portland Oregon, daughter Sally Hunt of Boise Idaho, and his sole grandchild, Ariel Veroske, of Denver Colorado. Bill was preceded in death by his four siblings, brothers Jack and Fred “Fritz” Veroske, and sisters Helen Beamguard Fitzpatrick and Susie Olson Hendrickson. The Mountain Goats are off to a great start and Domser was last week's Seattle Seahawks/WSFCA Football Coach of the Week. Congratulations Travis!





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
