



Chelan's Fire Department District 7 family remembers former Chief Tim Lemon. Lemon passed away Tuesday, September 17, 2019 at St. Joseph Medical Center in Bellingham, after a brief battle with pancreatic cancer. His wife Cathy Johnson Lemon along with other family members were at his side. His fire service career spread over 39 years, starting as a volunteer in Pierce County Fire District #16 and eventually becoming a training and safety officer in King County. He served as fire chief in Maple Valley, from 2001-2009 before moving to Chelan where he held the position of fire chief for 10 years, leaving earlier this summer to assume the position of Fire Chief for North Whidbey Fire and Rescue. A memorial service is being planned.

Gov. Inslee cuts ribbon to future in Cashmere

CASHMERE - Governor Jay Inslee cut the ceremonial grand opening ribbon at the old Cashmere Mill District site, Monday, Sept. 16, for the newest tenants of the Port of Chelan just constructed, multi-million dollar business park.

Both state representatives Mike Steele and Keith Goehner were in attendance as well as State Senator Brad Hawkins and Chelan County Commissioner Kevin Overbay.

The focus of the event was to show community support for Blue Spirits Distilling, LLC and Hurst International, LLC and it seemed to work quite well as the seating was full with another group of folks standing in various places.

The event was catered by Cashmere's own Taqueria el Chavo and also featured a guided tour of the Hurst printing facility.

Governor Inslee said he was excited that this particular facility could produce 15 million fruit labels per day. He was personally guided on a tour by Hurst CEO Ari Lichtenberg.

Blue Spirits Managing Member Jeffrey Soehren announced he had already employed 20 workers averaging \$30 per hour.

Cashmere Mayor Jim Fletcher said that it was not too long ago that he worked with Jeff as an small business economic advisor. "He was working out of his garage in Chelan," Fletcher said.

Lichtenberg took the podium and promised the community that his company was "here to stay and working with agriculture companies is our future."

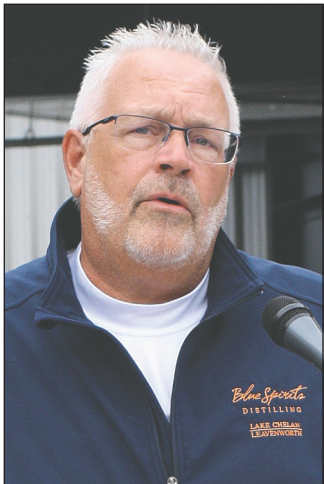
Soehren spoke to the audience and told them his company will become the "largest distiller in the state" once the Cashmere plant gets going at full capacity.

Preserving the light pillars, celebrating harvest in Historic Downtown Chelan

CHELAN - On Sunday, Sept. 15, the Historic Downtown Chelan Association (HDCA) hosted community members who gathered with local chefs and winemakers on Chelan's historic Old Bridge for an evening of food, wine, and fundraising. The 110 attendees were treated to a stunning sunset over the lake as they enjoyed four courses, thoughtfully paired with local wines and ciders. Chefs from local restaurants, including Local Myth Pizza, Riverwalk Inn, KaVe Roasters, and Campbell's Resort, donated their time and expertise to create impressive dishes, like cream of celery soup and cedar plank wild salmon. Ingredients were provided by local farms around the valley. Tim and Amy Andrews and Brandon and Nikki Keuhn from the veteran-owned farm Tatley Outpost in Pateros; and the family owned and operated Avina's Gardens in Chelan, among others, provided fresh and locally grown produce for this elegant farm-to-table dinner.

In addition to a wonderful family style dinner, the HDCA hosted a live auction,

raising over \$25,000. The success of the auction was possible only by the generous donations from over 30 businesses throughout the Lake Chelan valley. Packages like a Winterfest weekend getaway, Siren Song wine tasting excursion, and a family farm fun excursion made for some fierce bidding activity as the sun set. The funds raised at the harvest dinner will go directly to the HDCA's next project - the Riverwalk Pillar Preservation Project. This project will bring the original light pillars from the old bridge and give them a permanent home along the Riverwalk Park pathway. The pillars' bases will be auctioned off for further fundraising. Events like the Harvest Dinner allow the HDCA to move forward with improvement projects as well as fund the free community events throughout the year, including the Music in the Park series, Dia de Los Muertos, and Small Town Christmas. This picture-esque autumn evening was capped off with live music from local band Mugsy's Groove and a bridge dance under twinkling lights.

180 Degrees Wrong!

To The Editor:
(First—Disclaimer: Gary (BEGUN) and I are teammates on the yet-to-be-formed Lake Chelan Curling Association)
Just read your “Apples to Apples” column in the September 18 Lake Chelan Mirror and you got the headline almost right. You do owe our Chelan City council member, Servando Robledo, an apology (“I am sorry Servando... but”).

Council member Robledo had every right to vote on whether to include the Spader Bay property, which is currently for sale, in with the street ends and other potential public waterfront sites under consideration for future public access to Lake Chelan. The City is paying to have J.A. Brennan and Associates look at EVERY potential public access site and then narrow it down to eight and give us more detail how much it would cost to develop those into usable, public lake access points. Now's the time and this property is currently for sale and we'd be remiss to not at least consider it. The selection of the final eight will take place AFTER the public has opportunity to weigh in on their choices. (Note: that meeting is scheduled for October 9 at the Chelan Senior Center).

The issue at hand was how to get a true price for the Spader Bay property (would the owners accept much less than the taxable value?) and include it as one of the eight potential sites. After a great deal of civil conversation and interesting comments by residents, most everyone in the room understood that the issue before the council was not what properties would be in the final selection, but what properties would go through a preliminary design stage by

the professional who has done all of Chelan's public parks including Don Morse, and is already in town working under contract. Not including a large piece of waterfront property that is currently for sale in this consideration would, in my mind, be the wrong move

Council member Robledo works for The Lookout, next door to the Spader Bay property, which may (or may not) appreciate having a public park next door. He is not an owner of the development where the just works there. I appreciated his comments. He knows the subject property and its limitations and added informed value to the discussion. The residents of Spader Bay came enmasse (with some great visual aids) to oppose the purchase of the lot as a park. They added informed value to the discussion. This is not a "conflict of interest" — this is a great democracy and a great city council at work.

I know conflict sells papers and you were so excited to have a room full of people and candidates and past-Mayors who love the bully pulpit and a chance to talk about "back in the day", but this was not close to the situation you used as a comparison in your editorial. Council member Robledo does not personally benefit one way or the other from this decision. You just wanted to tell your story about what happened in a town you once lived in. To suggest that voting on parks should be limited to people who do not live or work nearby and will never use it is crazy. And to publicly assume Councilmember Robledo just doesn't understand the complexities of recusal is demeaning. You owe him an apology.

Native plants to replace nuisance trees, brush on slope above Chelan Riverwalk Trail

Chelan PUD contractor to start work on Sept. 23

CHELAN – Native plants and shrubs will replace nuisance trees and invasive brush on an eroding slope above a section of Riverwalk Park trail on the south side of the Chelan River.

Clearing the existing trees and brush will keep trail users safer as well as revitalize the slope. It is the start of a three-year project to restore the slope and return native plants to the area, said Kyle Endelman, PUD Parks superintendent. The work will start Monday, Sept. 23, and take about a week.

Landscape contractor Young Bucks of Wenatchee will follow a plan developed by an independent urban horticulturist to manage planting on slopes in PUD parks, Endelman said.

The landscape firm will remove trees including black locust and invasive brush. The slope will be contoured and prepared for replanting with native plants and varieties that are better suited to reduce erosion and thrive in the local climate, he said. Estimated cost of the work is \$11,080.

Replanting will start in fall 2020 and continue as weather and maintenance schedules allow. Endelman said.

In addition to addressing the safety risk from the eroding slope and removing hazard trees, Chelan PUD is responding to a request from an adjacent landowner to clear a view corridor.

John Thomas (Jack) Stevens

John Thomas (Jack) Stevens, 93, passed away Tuesday, the 3rd of September, surrounded by his loving family. Jack was born in Seattle on June 19, 1926 to Marguerite Patricia and Sydney Alexander Bailey Stevens. He was raised in Seattle where his father was elected to the Washington State House of Representatives. In pursuit of his love of flying, he served in the Army Air Corp before the end of WWII. He attended Whitman College before transferring to Washington State College (University). At a 4th of July party in Manson in 1949, he met the love of his life, Barbara Claire Peterson. They were married on June 17, 1950, becoming the first couple to be married in the newly remodeled Manson Methodist Church.

They made Manson their home where he became an orchardist, and for many years helped his father-in-law, Art Peterson, in the orcharding business and in developing a golf course on family owned property in Stehekin. During this time, Jack was proud to play an instrumental role in bringing the North Cascades National Park and Recreation Area into the Stehekin Valley. While continuing to own and operate their orchards, Jack and Barbara moved their family to Bellevue in January of 1962 when Jack began working for Boeing.

Jack left Boeing to pursue his interest in the field of real estate. He became a Real Estate Broker, General Contractor, and Commercial Real Estate Developer, founding his own company, Stevens Properties. During the Seattle recession of the early 1970s, he was recruited by People's Mortgage Company to complete and sell repossessed housing developments. He later became a Vice President at People's National Bank where he oversaw the construction and leasing of their corporate headquarters in downtown



Seattle. During the 1980s Alaskan economic recession, he was again recruited to go to Anchorage to help solidify two failing banks through merger and the sale of repossessed properties.

In the mid 1990s, Barbara retired from teaching and they returned to live permanently in Manson. They purchased a strip mall and surrounding property in Manson. They redeveloped the strip mall into the Wapato Point Village Inn Motel, which they operated for almost 20 years. At the ages of 87 and 85, they finally decided it was time to sell the motel. Jack continued to manage Stevens Properties until his death.

Jack is survived by his wife of 69 years, Barbara; his brother, Gary Stevens; his four children, Deborah Stevens Gianulis, Kerry Stevens Miller, John Craig Stevens and his wife Annette; and Stacia Stevens Kallstrom and her husband Ted; 12 grandchildren and 7, soon to be 8, great-grandchildren. He was preceded in death by his parents and his beloved sister, Marguerite.

A memorial service will be held at 4 o'clock in the afternoon, on Friday, September 27, at the North Shore Bible Church in Manson, Washington. The service will be followed by a dinner, which was Jack's wish as he wanted to express his gratitude to the community, his family and friends, for their many years of support. His family looks forward to celebrating his long and meaningful life with everyone who can attend.

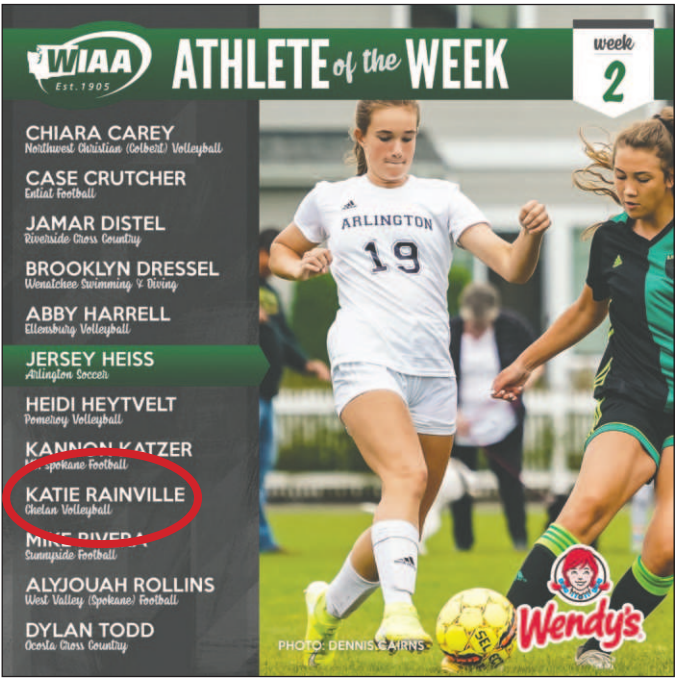
