City takes steps towards Spader Bay 'green space' purchase

CHELAN - On Tuesday, Sept. 10, the Chelan City Council meeting room was standing room only. On the agenda was a potential acquisition of undeveloped property located on Spader Bay for the purpose of open space and public access.

"I think it would be safe to say that 95 percent of the testimony before the council opposed moving forward," said Jerry Isenhart, in an exclusive interview with the Lake Chelan Mirror.

Isenhart, himself a former mayor, said one of his concerns was "there is no access or egress from the property, and no real understanding of how it would be used for the total community benefit."

Isenhart, related through marriage to Councilwoman Wendy Isenhart, stated, "Personally I was surprised at the vote - as the presentations of the audience were all rational and full of valid, unanswered questions.

I suspect that this is still not a done deal," Isenhart said.

After nearly two hours of debate and citizen comments, the motion went on the floor: Voting yes - Wendy Isenhart, Kelly Allen, Ty Witt and Servando Robledo. The two no votes were cast by Ray Dobbs and Erin McCardle. Councilman Tim Hollingsworth was

not present.

The offer to the sellers, the former State Senator Linda Evans Parlette and her sister Terrie O'Neal, is \$400,000, but the reality is closer to one million dollars to actually develop the lakeside land into a public green space suitable for a walking trail, park and/or other recreational uses.

Thanks to Councilman Ray Dobbs' insistence, the 90-day clause for action on the steep, nine-plus rocky acres, was extended to 120 days for due diligence to be exercised as there are eight different properties to be looked at by the city.

Former mayor Bob Goedde was one of the last of the public speakers, and argued that the land purchase was questionable from the "actual use" point of view. "How many citizens will use this property?" he asked.

Early on in the packed-house meeting City Administrator Mike Jackson told the city



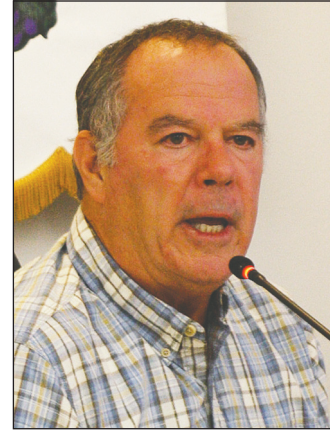

council that the agreement can be negated "for any or no reason" as several councilmen expressed a mood of angst in the room and among the general Chelan population.

Mayor Mike Cooney made an effort to assure the audience that "there is no agenda, no done deal" as has been surmised by more than one observer in regards to the proposal.

Former city councilman Skip Morehouse started his talk

The rain came, so did rocks and mud, again

For the second this time this year South Lakeshore Road, between The Cove Marina and the Lake Chelan Yacht Club, was closed due to rocks and mud across the road way, washed down Slide Ridge by the rain on Tuesday morning, Sept. 10. The road was reopened on Sept. 11.

CHELAN- South Lakeshore Road Update: A contractor for Chelan County begins work on Monday, Sept. 16, on South Lakeshore Road at Lake Chelan, removing debris from the

catch basin and channels at Slide Ridge. Contractor Batchelor Excavating of Manson was awarded a contract on Aug. 27 by Chelan County commissioners. The \$130,054 contract was in response to a July 2 landslide at Slide Ridge, which is at milepost 3, north of Lake

Chelan State Park. Batchelor will remove the material as well as re-shape and grade the two channels at the site and clean a large culvert that goes under the roadway.

At the time of the contract's signing, it was estimated the contractor would haul some

8,500 cubic yards of debris. However, a landslide on Sept. 10 at Slide Ridge added additional mud, rock and debris to the area and resulted in a two-day closure of the roadway. Batchelor originally was scheduled to begin work on Sept. 11.

The work is not expected to have any traffic impacts; however, motorists are asked to watch for trucks hauling debris in that area. Work is expected to last until about mid-October.

Crews will be filling washouts at Antoine Creek, Wash-

ington Creek and Apple Acres roads. On Tuesday, they begin hauling some of the material from the Slide Ridge landslide to the Chelan District Shop. The crew also will be spot grading on Union Valley Road and cleaning culverts in the Manson area.

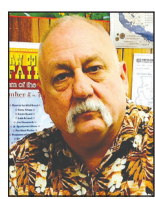

er Bay agenda item placed before the Chelan City Council on Tuesday, September 10.

I am, as a taxpayer, ashamed at the behavior of someone on our City Council or perhaps someone in city hall government staff or, most likely a little of both.

Let me cut to the chase, the City Attorney or one of Servando Robledo's councilmates should have taken Servando aside and explained that he needed to recuse himself from the vote and the debate in regards to the Spader Bay land deal.

Chelan Ridge Hawkwatch Field Trip with the Wenatchee River Institute, Oct. 3

CHELAN/LEAVENWORTH - Each fall thousands of hawks, eagles, and falcons fly along a high ridge above Lake Chelan on their way to winter territories. Join Wenatchee River Institute for a field trip to the Chelan Ridge Hawkwatch International (HWI) observation point to witness this amazing spectacle. Chelan Ridge HWI is located in the USFS Okanogan-Wenatchee National Forest.

Learn about raptor biology and hone your identification skills by assisting researchers as they count passing hawks!

During the excursion, you will hear from local biologists about the why of these migrations, as well as the how it all relates to habitat and land management. While visiting the field station, biologists will be working the trapping blind providing for a rare, close-up opportunity to witness a live bird capture, banding, and

release. Participants will also gather data in an effort to glean information about the health of North America's raptor populations.

After exploratory surveys in 1997 at Chelan Ridge Hawkwatch, in partnership with the USFS Okanogan-Wenatchee National Forest in 1998 HWI began annual counts at the Chelan Ridge site. These counts helped to monitor the raptors and learn more about their migration through the East Cascades of Washington State within the Pacific Coast Flyway. HWI has been banding raptors at Chelan Ridge since 2001, while also using the site to conduct satellite-tracking research.

Each season, counts typical-

ly range between 2,000-3,000 migrating birds of up to 17 species. The most commonly seen species are the Sharp-shinned Hawk, Red-tailed Hawk, Cooper's Hawk, Northern Harrier, Golden Eagle, and American Kestrel.

Field Trip Cost: WRI-Members \$45, Non-Member \$60, with WRI Otter Van transportation included. Participants will leave from the Wenatchee River Institute campus in Leavenworth at 8 a.m., or from the Penny Road Park and Ride in Wenatchee at 8:45 a.m. Please pack a lunch, snacks and water, and be prepared to hike for 30 minutes at approximately 6,000 feet elevation.

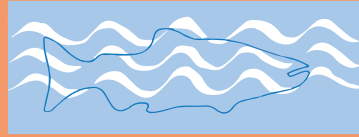

This year marks the 29th anniversary of the Salmon Festival at the Leavenworth National Fish Hatchery. Corky Broaddus has been a part of the festival for 22 years and talks with pride about what it stands for and how much it has grown. It was one of the first nature festivals in the country

and serves as a model for programs nationwide. What is unique about Salmon Festival is it promotes outdoor recreation while providing high quality natural resource education in a fun, family-friendly environment.

The first two days of Salmon Festival are dedicated to the students. Over 2,500 children from more than 85

classrooms are expected to visit on Thursday and Friday. For many schools this will be the only field trip they take all year long so the staff aims to make their experience extra special. Salmon Festival is expanding this year and one of the highlights will be representatives from 20 Native American tribes; including the local Wenatchis, on hand to share a wide variety of knowledge and skills. Salmon preparation, drumming, dancing, basket making, canoeing and storytelling are just a few of the areas that will be covered by the tribal representatives. The participation of the Native American community is of the utmost importance as the fish hatchery is located on traditional Aboriginal lands.

As a part of the local community since 1991 locals are well aware of the value of the of the Salmon Festival but the word has spread far and wide. The event has been the recipient of several awards over the years including the International Festival and Events Association's "Best Children's Program" award. Staff and volunteers work tirelessly year-round to make the festival happen. Corky Broaddus says that without the help of the volunteers the Salmon Festival would not happen. She made special mention of the high school

students that are eager to come and get their hands dirty every year to help out. This year Cascade High School will be receiving the Volunteer of the Year award, having worked to make the festival a success since it's inception. Broaddus says that every year she sees a number of visitors who came to the festival as children and high schoolers back to visit with their own families and that's one of the many reasons why she volunteers year after year.

There are many organizations that partner with the Fish Hatchery to make Salmon Festival successful. The Chelan County PUD and their River Ramble activities will be available for students on September 19-20, with some also available on the free family day on Saturday. A few of these activities include the 30 foot long Salmon Storytelling Tent and a traditional drumming demonstration. The curators of the Salmon Festival want it to be an inter-generational experience where grandparents can come with the little ones and learn and play together. With so many distractions for young people that encourage them to sit and stare at a screen, Salmon Festival is a rare free opportunity for the whole family to have fun and learn new things while enjoying the great outdoors.

Fun Fish Facts for You!

- Did you know a female spring Chinook salmon can carry more than 4,000 eggs?
- Salmon returning to the Wenatchee River travel 500 miles and over 7 dams from the Pacific Ocean to get to their place of birth here in Icicle Creek
- 150,000 visitors have enjoyed Salmon Fest during these past 19 years
- Fish can get sunburns
- Bobby Beaver and Sammy Salmon, mascots of Salmon Fest, have been hugged by 150,000 kids since the festival began in 1991
- Swimming Mayflies may shed their skin as many as 27 times!
- Caddisflies eats dead leaves and the fungi on the leaves may be a source of nutrition, much like peanut butter on bread
- Vocabulary Words to Know:
 - Redd - nest dug in gravel by female salmon to put her eggs in
 - Anadromous - fish that migrate from fresh water to salt water and back to fresh water to spawn
- The oldest known salmon is 7 years old. Count the rings on a fish scale to determine their age....much like counting the rings on a tree
- The oldest salmon fossil found is 50 million years old
- 5 to 6 million years ago salmon had fangs, weighed over 500 lbs. and were ten feet long

THE WASHINGTON OUTDOORS REPORT

THE PERFECT TIME OF YEAR FOR A HIKE

There's something about September if you like to hike the mountains and forests of our state. Perhaps it's the crisp feel of the air in the morning in the lowlands and in the mountains throughout the day. Maybe it's the softer light that shows off the pastel of changing colors of the foliage to yellow and scarlet. Or maybe it's just the fact that hordes of summer hikers are by and large off the trails after Labor Day.

Whatever the reason, it's a

good month to go hiking. One great destination this time of year is found at Stuart Lake in the Alpine Lakes Wilderness. The trailhead to Stuart and Colchuck Lake southeast of Leavenworth is a popular one, so much so the U.S. Forest Service had to institute a no-parking policy along the side of the gravel road leading to the parking lot. Having said that, if you can visit mid-week, you'll still find quite a few cars at the trailhead but surprisingly few hikers heading towards Stuart Lake as their destination. The reason? Most hikers are

heading up the trail 2 ¼ miles to Mountaineer Creek and taking a left on a trail that takes them to Colchuck Lake. This lake is a beautiful destination in its own right and also the gateway, via Aasgard Pass on the far side of the lake, to the Upper Enchantments that draw thousands of hardy visitors every year.

Of the hikers that stay straight on the trail to Stuart Lake you'll find many of them are climbers, not interested in spending time at the lake but instead, interesting in testing themselves on the granite

rock face of nearby Mount Stuart. That's why, even with a parking lot full of cars, you may find yourself alone or with very little company along the shoreline of Stuart Lake.

Take the time and linger over the picnic lunch you hopefully brought along to enjoy after the 4 ½ mile hike in with a 1,665-foot elevation gain from the trailhead. The views of the lake and towering mountains are amazing and at this time of year you'll see the changing colors of the larch trees turning from green to bright yellow to gold.

The fishing for cutthroat trout can be good too. Try casting a 1/8-ounce Roostertail,

Mepps or Promise Keeper spinner or if fly fishing, an attractor fly like a Royal Wulff to draw strikes. The trout population is healthy but not endless so if you want to keep a couple for a shore lunch over a gas stove that's fine but otherwise consider catching and releasing these fish that measure anywhere from 7 to 13 inches in size.

A Forest Service Recreation Pass is required in your vehicle for the Stuart Lake trailhead. You'll also need an overnight permit (available but in high demand) from the Leavenworth Ranger District Office or through an online lottery since Stuart Lake lies within the Enchantment Zone of the Alpine Lakes Wilderness. On the other hand, you only need to fill out a free permit at the trailhead and deposit the stub into the box there for a day hike.

MORE SEPTEMBER HIKES

Looking for other fall hiking opportunities? We reached out to Anna Roth with the Washington Trails Association to learn about some of her favorites which include:

NE WASHINGTON - WHISTLER CANYON TRAIL - This little-known destination

is located near Oroville. You'll burn some calories as you gain up to 3,000 feet of elevation along this 12-mile long trail which is part of the Pacific Northwest Trail. Its open to hikers and horses and offers stunning views of the Okanogan Valley and Osoyoos Lake along with a chance to see a variety of wildlife species from wild turkey to mule deer to mountain goats.

OLYMPIC PENINSULA - QUINULT NATIONAL RECREATION TRAILS

Located near Lake Quinault, enjoy a 4.25-mile round trip hike that takes you along an interpretive nature loop amongst giant Sitka spruce and western hemlock. Other parts of the trail follow the shore of Lake Quinault and alongside Falls Creek. This is a family friendly hike with only 350 feet of elevation gain.

If you go hiking this September remember there are several hunting seasons underway in our National Forests so hot pink and blaze orange are not only fashionable, but smart choices for hikers to wear.
