LCSD board approves 2019-20 budget, hears presentation

CHELAN - Lake Chelan School District Board Chair Jim Colbert began the July 30 meeting with a questions and comments period relative to the 2019-2020 budget in which no members of the public had any input.

District business manager Scott Renick provided the Board an overview of this year's budget. Renick mentioned that there are three items that make up the budget; 1. State funding which is based only on enrollment, 2. Transportation and 3. Food service based on number of meals. In the General Fund, the District estimates over \$21 million in revenues. "Both the revenue piece and the expenditure piece include about \$800,000 in added capacity," said Renick. That extra money is added in case next year's enrollment fluctuates, the extra is also there in case the District gets grants that would require them to use money from the General Fund. This year, Renick anticipates that the

District will have "a break even year."

Afterwards, the Board voted and approved the 2019-2020 District budget.

The Board heard Teaching and Learning Director Heidi Busk presentation on the highly capable, English Language Learners (ELL) and Professional Development programs in the District. In her presentation Busk reported that this year 57 students qualified for the highly capable program, out those students 21 percent are Hispanic. Busk compared 2018, 2019 District and state wide ELL data to show the Board the success the program is having in exiting students in the third through tenth grade. In 2019, 51 students exited the ELL program which Busk mentioned is a good percentage number. Last year alone, 103 teachers logged 1,325 hours of in-District professional development training. For the upcoming school year, Busk reported that in the teacher's contract for the year, the teacher will get an

additional paid day to attend a professional development workshop after school.

Superintendent Barry DePaoli reported to the Board that five candidates will be interviewed for the Special Programs Director position. DePaoli also mentioned that WSDOT needs a small portion of land on Farnham Street owned by the District in order for them to upgrade the ADA ramp. "They would pay us \$500," said DePaoli. The board agreed and Colbert signed the authorization for the easement. The two flashing beacons in front of Chelan High School are almost completed and should be ready for the upcoming school year. "We should have a safer pedestrian crossing, it is not going to reduce traffic, but it is going to make it safer," said DePaoli. Similarly, the beacons at Morgen Owings Elementary will be "safer for the kids."

DePaoli presented a proposal of rental rates for the conference and board rooms.

During her visit, Schrier toured the Manson Elementary Summer Meals food site, visited Manson High School to talk about school kitchen equipment grants appropriations proposal, visited the new Columbia Valley Community Health facility and toured Chelan Winery. She also participated in a roundtable discussion with the Washington Wine Growers Association and the Chelan Wine Alliance.

Schrier met with different



small business owners and some Lake Chelan Chamber of Commerce board members for an hour. Chelan City Mayor Mike Cooney was among them, along with Chamber Director and Washington State Representative Mike Steele and Historic Downtown Chelan Association Executive Director Erin McCardle. The roundtable discussion served

as a way for small business owners to tell their story on what it is like to own a small business in Chelan. The conversation revolved around shortage of labor in the valley, wages and forest fires.

Steele said that Schrier was very open during the conversations and wanted to receive as much feedback possible.

Planet walk at Riverwalk park is ready for you to orbit around

CHELAN - The Lake Chelan Rotary has been in the process of installing an interactive planet walk on the south side of Riverwalk Park that will educate young and old about our solar system.

After three months of conversations with Chelan Public Utility District (PUD) Commissioner's, Rotarian Russ Jones was able to receive the green light for the project.

Jones first brought up the educational concept five years ago. "I thought it would be a cool thing to have here, where people can get the basic knowledge of our solar system: the order of the planets and just a little bit of astronomy information," he explained.

The different planet stations will be spaced along the walk to a scale of true distance from the sun, and each will be made out of durable material. Each planet will be scaled down to match the 18-inch sun. In the stations there will be a picture of the planet along with a plaque full of information and a QR scan that will take you directly to NASA's website for more information.

Twenty-five fellow Rotarians have been involved with the project, plus a number of astronomers have also reviewed the information that will be posted at each station. The total cost of the project is \$15,000 and roughly half

Chelan's Jerry Isenhardt talks about his life and times now that he's in 'the Hall'

CHELAN -- Jerry Isenhardt sat down with NCW Media Managing Editor Gary Bégin on his back porch overlooking the beautiful southernmost part of Lake Chelan for three hours of history lessons and days gone Q&A discussion.

This is a shortened version of a much longer article to be found in the September Wenatchee Business journal:

"I remain humbled and honored, to say the least. It is the most meaningful professional honor I have ever received in my entire career," said Jerry Isenhardt, a local journalism and civic leader icon about his recent induction into the Edward R. Murrow Journalism Hall of Fame last May.

Isenhardt grew up on a farm on the outskirts of Wenatchee and eventually came to Chelan as a 24-year-old and immediately made an impact on the life of this tiny resort village. He was to be the new owner/operator of KOZI. He literally reinvented and reinvented the tiny rural radio station in the 1960s making it a "must listen" for the residents of Chelan and Manson.

It was especially important back then as a way of tracking wild fires.

From the day he took control of KOZI, time flew by. By the mid 1970's KOZI had become a solid member of the Lake Chelan Community. "I was 25-years-old when the purchase was approved. I was told that I was the youngest owner of any broadcast station in the U.S. at that time," Isenhardt said.

About the Hall of Fame award, Isenhardt said, "It is especially meaningful because Murrow College has produced an incredible list of highly respected graduates over the years."

KOZI went on to be named the best small market radio station in the state by the Associated Press in the early 1980s.

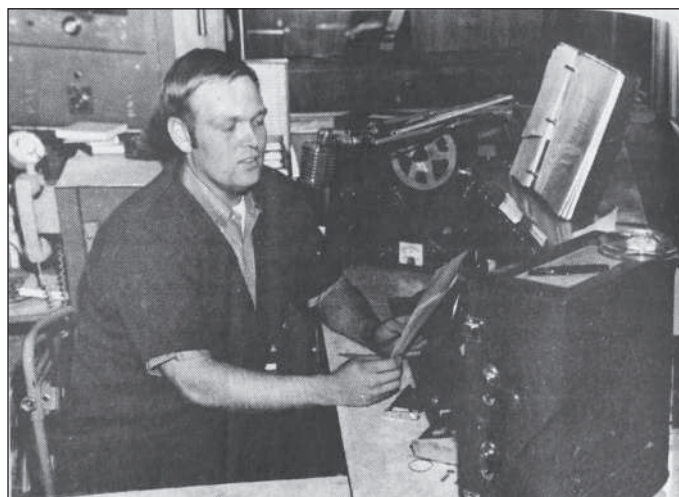
Well before that, around 1972, Isenhardt invented a new interactive talk show -- 2nd Cup of Coffee, which he calls, "an early form of Social Media."

Isenhardt had a radical idea and it worked. "We turned the tables on our listeners and said we wanted to make the them

(listeners and callers) the stars of the show and their calls and comments the highlight of the day. Our staff were just the moderators. It worked. Within six months of launch we had gathered an impressive following that never stopped growing," Isenhardt recounted.

Isenhardt sold the station to Harriet Bullitt of Leavenworth in 1999 for \$2 million. Isenhardt

then went on to invent another new concept - GoLakeChelan.com, which he ran from 2001 to 2018 before selling it.

"I called GoLakeChelan an experiment in technology, which indeed it was. The vision

was an on-line newspaper and radio station combined, with unlimited space for photos and videos, he said.

"I felt it would be truly successful if it could be interactive with those who patronized the web site. GoLakeChelan was ahead of it's time. It was

six more years before Apple released the iPhone, and three more years before Google, Gmail, Word Press, and MySpace were launched.

The biggest challenges to GoLakeChelan were that there was no model to copy, no book to read on how to do it."

Isenhardt found a way to make things work despite the "ancient" technology prevalent back then.

"I have come to believe that nothing is by accident.

The pathway of my journey has had far too many very identifiable landmarks to believe it was all just by chance. To wake up every morning and look forward to going to work is the best way to describe the daily routine. In the world of news, there was never two days the same, and that would keep the energy flowing," Isenhardt said.

He concluded about his journalism adventures, "Exciting would be an understatement."

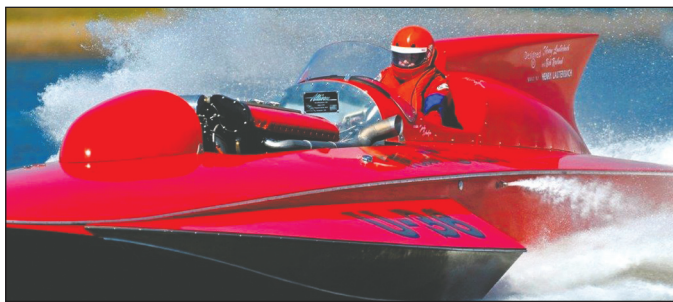
Commemorative t-shirts are available for \$25 at

A typical political ploy when attention isn't wanted. She also visited the Lake Chelan Chamber of Commerce and the CVCH walk-in clinic in Chelan.

It has been said for many years that when Washington, D.C. politicians want to announce bad news, they wait until late on a Friday evening so as little press as possible can shed light on the issues.

Why has Schrier adopted this strategy, or has she? I think I'll just blame her unwitting staff who thinks it is

just fine that no local news at an event means no articles or photos or pestering of the doctor turned liberal crusader can occur.

I'm also guessing that she knows this area of the state may be a bit too conservative for her tastes, another reason to avoid the press.

In conclusion, I believe this is an attempt by Schrier and her handlers to "control the news" by not being transparent with her itinerary and then, maybe, sending out a press release after the fact.

I guess I was thinking liberals always wanted as much attention as possible, but Will this result in a future press release with hand-picked photos and comments?
