Groundbreaking for new hospital May 2020

CHELAN - Community questions were answered during the public forum held by the Lake Chelan Community Hospital and Clinics Board of Commissioners last Wednesday, May 8.

“The agenda of the forum this evening is to provide information to the community about the changes that have occurred in the hospital over the last year and updates on the progress of the new facility,” said Phyllis Gleasman, Chair of the LCCH Board, as she opened the evening’s event.

Last year during a two day

retreat, commissioners identified six areas to focus on to move the hospital to the

next level; People, Service, Quality and Safety, Growth and Innovation, Finance and Community. Each committee is direct result of the six pillars that were established. The commissioners’ expertise and input keeps LCCH on track explained Gleasman.

Commissioner Jordana LaPorte of the Community Committee briefly reported on the committee. “We’ve had a lot of meetings in the last eight months over many different topics,” she said. The committee LaPorte is part of identifies, explores and evaluates opportunities to expand overall communication, wellness and outreach offerings to the community. One of the goals identified in the committee was to hold at least two public

Manson Park Board approves Ed, Lanny Armbruster memorial

MANSON – A memorial will be placed at Manson Bay Park in the name of Ed and Lanny Armbruster as approved by Manson Park and Recreation board on May 9.

Years ago, there was a memorial down at Singleton Park in Manson for Ed which was put up by the community, when he passed away. As time went by, “it was taken down and destroyed,” said Shannon Freels.

Freels requested that the new memorial for the Armbrusters to go in right under Gary Knowlton’s memorial picture. “We would like to request all those plants to come out and just make that all rock. Put in appropriate plants that will not overgrow or be a problem,” Freels mentioned. In there would go the Armbrusters’ memorial which will be made out of rock that forms a fountain and on the side two plaques will adorn it, one for each of them. The cost of the memorial is \$1,300 which Freels and Viki Downey are fundraising for.

“I am in favor of it, but why in a PUD Park?” asked board chair Rob Campbell. “These have been our parks even though the PUD owns them,” said Freels. She also mentioned that both Ed and Lanny loved the water, as Ed was part of the Lake Chelan Reclamation District and Lanny enjoyed Manson Bay Park. “The swimming area is centrally located, it would get a lot more attention. People would see it, recognize it and appreciate it,” said Freels as to the Manson Bay being the best placement for the memorial.

Freels told the board that she will work with Parks Director Robin Pittman once the funds are collected. Board Commissioner Randy Reed suggested looking into adding trees that could go in next to the memorial to provide shade. Shannon agreed and will bring back a proposal with different tree options.

Pittman informed the board on the recent award Aquatic supervisor Downey received

Council talks traffic calming, street enhancement plan

CHELAN – In a special meeting on May 7, the Chelan City Council heard from Eric Johnston of SCJ Alliance on design ideas to provide traffic calming, transportation options and street enhancement in Chelan.

In terms of transportation, SCJ Alliance has been working with the City of Chelan for over 10 years off and on. “There’s a number of issues we are trying to resolve as we go through the Downtown Improvement project,” said Johnston as he began his presentation. Incomplete infrastructure, regional traffic, summer crowds, parking, cut-through traffic, growth vs. small town, shifting travel modes, along with access and circulation are some of the issues Johnston touched on. “We are trying to make sure all of that is accounted for ... everything we are doing

today, we want to make sure it is meeting the needs 20 years out,” he said.

In 2009, the Chelan origination/destination study was conducted to see where people are coming from and see where they are trying to go. “We studied that to see what kind of traffic we are dealing with,” explained Johnston. A year later, in 2010, the Chelan Downtown Master Plan was implemented. The project was focused on the downtown area quite heavily and included all the main intersections. SCJ updated the Chelan Transportation Plan in 2011 and again in 2017. “We are trying to be consistent on what we have been doing over the years, so we are not rethinking every year, but we are revisiting and fine tuning it,” said Johnston. He added that all the studies equal the results seen lately in town. Bradley, Johnston, Woodin and now Columbia are examples of such. “It takes

awhile to do some of these things, so we want to start thinking about the future now,” he said to the council.

Johnston explained the Complementary Corridors Strategy to the council which

forum events per year, which LaPorte is excited about. “It’s frustrating to have only two people show up at our board meetings,” she said.

Mary Murphy, who serves in the Quality Committee, stated that “quality is the most important thing in terms of hospital.” To her quality translates to trust, “we want you to come back.” She mentioned that changes at the hospital and at the clinic have taken place to make sure quality standards are met. “We depend on you to give us feedback about the care you’ve received ... please help us to get better at what we do,” Murphy emphasized to the attendees. A few community members, who were present, spoke about their “unsatisfactory visit” to the hospital and asked how to provide their feedback. “Any door is the right door,” answered Murphy. She suggested to contact CEO Steve Patonai or any board member to address their concerns.

Commissioner Fred Miller then moved on to talk about the Finance Committee. “The primary activity that we do is review the monthly and yearly financial statements. Looking at the ratios, the good and the bad. What could be changed and find out who should do it,” commented Miller. At the moment, the committee is looking at a Revenue Cycle

Management. The committee also reviews the annual budget, financial policies and annual audit. He clarifies that the committee is advisory to the board and they do not make a final decision. “Going forward with the new hospital construction, the Finance Committee will be highly involved every step along the way,” Miller mentioned.

Murphy spoke again this time on the Affiliations/Partnerships Committee. “Affiliations and partnerships are absolutely key to thriving in the future for all healthcare systems,” she said. This committee allows LCCH to formally and informally build relationships in order to find ways to increase the variety of services. “We want to look for the opportunities for us ... our role

is to explore and study,” said Murphy. Currently LCCH has affiliations with Swedish, University of Washington, Columbia Valley Community Health and Confluence Health.

Wrapping up the committee updates was Commissioner Mary Signorelli. Signorelli is one of the seven members who sit in the Facilities Committee. “We function for the purpose of working with the replacement hospital architects, consultants, contractors and staff,” said Signorelli. She mentioned that the committee has been working since before the bond was passed. In meeting held on May 6 with the architects and contractors, the board went over a timeline and the new space for the hospital. “Almost everything we have is a draft ... we don’t have anything set,”

she clarified.

“Our goal as the commission and facilities committee has been to stay within the budget that was approved by our community when they passed the bond. We’ve had to make some changes to the original plan that we had and that’s where we are at right now,” Signorelli explained to the attendees. In order to stay within the budget the plan had to be scaled down. However, it was kept in mind what is needed. Scaling down to 54,000 sq. ft. still gives LCCHC the necessary room to be functional and efficient.

Future plans for EMS were addressed by CEO Patonai. “We haven’t determined how we are going to get EMS on campus, but they need to be on campus. They need space for their trucks, two sleep rooms,

a lounge and an eating area,” said Patonai. Funds for the EMS garage will be built into the budget in the near future.

In order to keep the community informed on future progress of the hospital, other forums will be held. Signorelli also mentioned that a newsletter will go out and updates will be posted on the hospital’s website. “We are working hard to keep communications going out to you,” said Signorelli.

According to Signorelli, further delays are not anticipated. Yet between now and ground breaking a lot of things need to get approved. “That’s going to take about a year to get all of those. We are trying to keep things moving,” she said. It is predicted that ground breaking of the new facility will happen in May of 2020.

will help with project design decisions in the future. In the Transportation Plan, Gibson, Union Valley Rd, Woodin, Johnson, Navarre, Sanders and SR 150 are identified as having the most vehicular traffic. Nixon, Columbia, Woodin, Wapato and Bradley are streets emphasized for bicyclists and pedestrians.

For example, Sanders St. will be aimed at keeping the traffic flowing and at the same time slowing it down by adding landscaping. Bike lanes, sidewalks, and on-street parallel parking will also be part of the improvements. “We know that is going to be more traffic on these streets so let’s make it more pleasant for the homeowners,” said Johnston.

On the non-motorized streets such as Nixon Ave., multi-use paths, sidewalks

and landscape buffer will be implemented to accommodate pedestrians and bicyclists. “It’s a more comfortable environment, there’s less traffic which gives you the opportunity to do these other amenities,” stated Johnston.

The council then had a discussion to figure out which streets are a priority, based on Johnston’s presentation. It was determined that Gibson needs to be modified in order to keep traffic under control. “It looks like a place you can speed and it is also a residential neighborhood,” said councilmen Tim Hollingsworth as to why it should be a top priority. “We need to have a nice balance between the pedestrians and motorized areas,” said councilwomen Kelly Allen. Emerson and Cedar were another streets thrown in the mix by the council to be studied and be turned into a pedestrian route.
